It is plain to be seen that there should be some sort of a national crop and market commission to figure out the needed amount of production of any article according to the supply and demand requirements of the nation and the world. and also as to proper and widespread distribution of same, giving a fais living price to producer, dealer and consumer allke. Producers and consumers in Texas would often like ito know where the nigger in the woodplle" is, that both are hard hit as to price, while wholesale and retail dealers, and railroad and express companies wash their hands, as did Pilate, declaring thein Imocency and hold up thelr hands in horror at the insinuation that they are getting more than the most meagre profit for their services. <br> Political fallures are more damaging to our prosperity than crop failures, for man is a more powerful agent for progress than nature. wild ideas sown in the seed-bed of state choke down industry; the hot blasts of hate blight the tendrills of conflidence and suspicion creeping through the land scatters pests of discontent. A glance at the roster of incoming legislators indicates that we will have a bumper crop of statesmen this year as well as other useful commodities, but we are entitled to a good year. We have many men in the legislature big enough for the United States Senate and tall enough to see into the twentieth century. A good political crop means more factories, more raliroads, more farms, more mines and industrial enterprises, and Texas is badly in need of them. <br> We are fast getting in the smoke column in Texas. According to the last federal census report our manunacturing capital increased 82 per cent over the previous decade. We now have $\$ 216,876,000$ invested in 4.588 manufacturing enterprises. We | are building a factory per day and it is quite a common occurence to break dirt for a million dollar concern. The emergence of this great element of civilization has been painfully slow but with the intelligent attitude we now occupy toward industry and the advantages accruing from the opening of the Panama canal, there is no reason why we should not become the factory site of the universe.-Commercial Secretaries. <br> An Associated Press special from Madrid Spain, says: "Jose Canale jas Mendes, the prime minister, whom Spain has regarded as one of the greatest of statesmen, was shot and killed today , by Manuel Pardinas, a young anarehist. The, assas$\sin$ attempted suicide and it was first thought that he was dead, but when he had been carried to the hospital, he was found to be living. No event since the throwing of the bomb at the carriage of King Alfonso May 31, 1906, while the king was returning from the church after his marriage, has caused such general consternation and such public sympahty. So far as can be learned at present the assassination seems to be in no way part of a widespread political plot or revolutionary movement, but an isolated crime for which the exact motive remains obscure. The assassin, who was of Spanish birth, came recently fron, Buenos Ayres, by way of Paris. PracThe petition of the Retail Merchants and Jobbers association for a hearing to consider the matter of adoption of a rule prohibiting the sale and peddling of frnit and vegetables from railroad freight cars was denied by the rallroad commission. The commission found this to be a controversy between. retallers over which it has no authority.
