FIREWORKS ORDINANCE

All persons are notified that the law regarding the discharge of fireworks within certain limits of the city will be strictly enforced during the holidays. I have no option in the matter, but must insist that the law be properly observed and I hope there will be no violations and no occasion for the marshal to make complaint because of such violations.

Herewith I give an extract from the ordinance referred to, in order that there can be no misunderstanding:

Chapter 7, Art. 3—It shall be unlawful for any person or persons to discharge any sky rocket, roman candle, firecracker, cannon cracker or other fireworks, upon, into or across the public square in the city, or on, into or across any street, alley, vacant or enclosed lot, in the city, within the limits of the following boundaries, or on into or across any cross street crossing the following mentioned streets within said limits, to-wit: On Fisher street, from and including Fifth street to Second street. On Parker street, from and including Fifth street to Third street; on Reynolds street, from Fifth to Third street; on the territory known as the railway right of way or any vacant lot, or any street or alley adjoining the right of way, from and including Fifth street to and including Second street, or on, into or across any street, alley or vacant lot, adjoining the Methodist, Presbyterian, Christian or Baptist churches in the city, or on, across or into any street alley or vacant lot adjoining the Round-bale gin, the Roller mills, Perry gin or Fairman & Sou's gin in the city. Any person violating any of the provisions of this article shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction fined in any sum not exceeding twenty-five dollars. I shall instruct the marshal to strictly enforce this ordinance.

HOLIDAY FIRE DANGERS.

The custom of merchants decorating places of business for the holiday trade is a most hazardous one from a standpoint of fire. The decorating of churches and school houses for Christmas trees and other means of entertainment is also dangerous. The promiscuous use of fire works is at all times a menace to life and property.

For the purpose of trying to impress upon the public the need for care throughout the last two weeks of December, the department calls attention to the following important suggestions contained in the Holiday Fire Bulletin issued by the National Protection Association:

Stores, Churches and Bazaars:—Holiday fires in these while filled with people are usually holocausts. Eight inflammable decorations make fires easy to start and easy to spread. A match, a gas flame or an electrical defect may do it.

Watch cigar, cigarette and pipe smokers. Do not permit them to "light up" inside buildings. Do not make the slightest change in electrical wiring without consulting electrical inspector.

Warnings For The Home:—Every year in America many children are burned to death by fire from Christmas candles. Do not decorate your Christmas tree with paper, cotton or any other inflammable material. Use metallic tinsel and other non-inflammable decorations only, and set the tree securely so that the children in reaching for things cannot tip it over. Do not use cotton to represent snow. If you must have snow, use asbestos fibre.

Do not permit children to light or re-light candles while parents are not present. They frequently set fire to their clothing instead; and the tree itself will burn when needles become dry. Do not leave matches within reach of children at holiday time. Candles are meant to be lighted, and

if the children can get matches they will experiment with them. They imitate their elders.

A house of merriment is better than a house of mourning.

These suggestions are considered most timely, and they are offered for no other purpose than as an effort to arouse the public to a point of alertness that will prevent, as far as possible, a repetition of fire losses that have heretofore marked Christmas celebrations.

The governor has offered a reward of \$500 each for the capture of the Kyle bank robbers.

Governor Colquitt this week issued a pardon to 51 convicts, that number representing the years of his age.

The governor of Arkansas has announced the pardoning of 360 convicts in the last few days. He is opposed to the convict lease system and this is one way to abolish it—by getting rid of the convicts.

It is announced from New York that Miss Helen Gould, the noted philanthropist, is soon to wed Finley Shepard, a railroad man of St. Louis. Miss Gould has spent a great deal of time and money in an effort to better the condition of railroad workers.

It is stated by correspondents from Washington that Senator Bailey intends to resign early in January, in order that Editor Johnson of the Houston Post can have the honor of serving as senator a short while before the place passes to Hon. Morris Sheppard. It is claimed that all of the anti-prohibition representatives and senators and many of Mr. Bailey's supporters in the legislature will support Mr. Johnson.

The whole of Christmas is built around the love of a mother for a babe. Centuries have since rolled by; dynasties have risen and fallen; conquerors have waxed and waned; but none of these have stilled that cradle song in the quiet of the Judean starlight, or have two thousand years broken the communicable spirit of sympathy between that mother at Bethlehem and the mother of today. As Heaven lay around that Infancy in the Bethlehem stable, so Heaven lies around the cradle of every infant of today.—Ladies Home Journal.

The death of Whitelaw Reid in London Monday night left the United States without an ambassador to England, and President Taft announces that he will not appoint a successor to Mr. Reid, as his appointee would have only a few weeks to serve before the Democrats take charge of the governmental affairs. Mr. Reid was appointed to the most important position in the service in 1905, but he had, previous to that time, represented this government in Paris, France, and also as a special ambassador to Great Britain on several occasions.

Uncle Sam may miss it in selecting men for office now and then, but he knows a good mule when he sees it. He has recently purchased 1500 mules in Collin county and most of them will be shipped to Panama to work on the canal. The Texas mule is furnishing animal power for digging the big ditch and the nation does not possess a more able or patriotic asset than the Texas mule. He is the Commercial King of beasts and his flesh and blood are woven into the industrial fibre of the nation. The federal census reports show that we have 696,000 head of mules valued at \$75,168,000, an increase of 254,000 in number and \$53,575,000 in value during the past decade.—Commercial Secretaries.

The statement that "it is better to steal than beg" is not accepted as true and is not true, still the beggar or those who accept charity unworthily have their characters undermined thereby and the result is that they are less capable of self-support after they have learned to lean upon others and to secure sustenance without effort. There are cases of worthy charity, but these cases are much fewer than a casual observer would imagine. In a great majority of the towns and counties in Texas not one person can be found who could not make an honest support if they would but put forth an effort, but in many of these same communities are people who are pleading for a helping hand or for provisions to sustain life that they may spend their time in indolence.

G. C. Hamilton, formerly doing a grocery business on the East Side, this city, made an assignment for the benefit of his creditors last Friday.


While yet in the bloom of life, Mrs. Lee Anderson was summoned away last Tuesday morning, after having undergone several days suffering of typhoid fever.

FACTS ABOUT PARCELS POST

The new parcels post goes into operation Jan. 1, 1913.

Perishable articles, such as butter, lard, fruit, berries and dressed fowls, may be sent short distances.

Eggs for local delivery may be sent when packed in containers. When packed separately they may be sent any distance.

Fresh meats may be sent only within the first zone of fifty miles.

The following may not be sent: Intoxicating liquors, poisons, explosives, matches firearms and live poultry.

Books and printed matter are included in third class and may not be sent. The weight limit will be eleven pounds.

To find the size limit: Take a piece of string 72 inches long and wind it once completely around the parcel and then across the top lengthwise. If the ends of the string reach the sides of the parcel it comes under the limit.

The country is divided into eight zones and each zone into units. The local rate is 5c per pound and 1c for each additional pound. From the Dallas unit parcels may be sent to any office in the first zone, or up to fifty miles in any direction, for 5c for the first pound and 3c for each additional pound up to eleven pound.

The second zone includes postoffices from 50 to 150 miles from Dallas. The rate is 6c for the first pound and 4c for each additional pound.

The third zone is from 150 to 200 miles; rate 7c and 5c additional.

The fourth zone is from 200 to 300 miles; rate 8c and 6c additional.

The fifth zone is from 300 to 1,000 miles; rate 9c and 7c additional.

The sixth zone is from 1,000 to 1,400 miles; rate 10c and 9c additional.

The seventh zone is from 1,400 to 1,800 miles; rate 11c and 10c additional.

The eighth zone is all over 1,800 miles; rate 12c and 12c for every additional pound.

Parcel post packages may be insured for full valuation, with maximum of \$25, for an additional charge of 5c.

The parcels post law not only reduces the rates of postage, but increases the weight limit from 4 to 11 pounds.

Parcel post shipments may be registered and also accorded special delivery service on payment of the usual fees.

Distinctive stamps must be used on parcel post packages, but they

may be mailed in quantities of not less than 2,000 identical pieces without stamps affixed, the postage being paid in money.--Dallas News.
