

A decision by the supreme court of the United States this week upholds the government in the prosecution of certain cotton speculators who, in 1910 combined to force the price of cotton upward. The decision of the higher court does not refer to the guilt or innocence of the men charged with violation of the antitrust law, but upholds the contention of the government that if the men entered into such a combine it was in violation of the anti-trust law.

One of the most important duties confronting the coming session of the Texas legislature is to make the necessary provision for the care of insane people of the state. The asylums are not nearly large enough and many of these unfortunate people are held in county jails. If the treatment given them in asylums is to be of benefit it is necessary that they receive such treatment promptly, as well as that they be given proper care -such care as can not be given them in a county jail. If it is necessary to double the size of the asylums let it be done, for the present condition is not what should be expected from the great state of Texas.

One of the most enterprising postmasters in the state is Postmaster down on the floor she set it on a Strong at Houston. He has organized a school of instruction, of which he is teacher, to give information to the patrons of his office as to the parcels post. Such matters as the character of postage required for these packages is easily understood, but the different zones and the various uses to which the system can be put will not be easily understood by the whole people. D, packages by mail and even the collection of the postage from the person to whom such mail is addressed must be thoroughly understood before the system can be given a fair trial.






