THINGS IN GENERAL.

The report of the special commission to fix the boundary between New Mexico and Texas has decided in favor of the Lone Star State. The point of dispute was where the bed of the Rio Grande existed in 1856 the date of the original Clark survey. The report has been approved and settles a dispute of 50 years standing. About 60,000 acres were involved.

The largest advertising contract ever entered into by a Texas marketing organization has been let by the Southwest Texas Truck Growers' Association, who have signed an agreement with the Curtis Publishing Company to spend \$12,000 in advertising the Texas Bermuda Onion to the people of the nation. It is estimated that the Texas Bermuda onion crop will reach about 4,500 cars this season and with the aid of the advertisements the sales manager believes the entire output can be profitably marketed.

The death of the Maderos will have a depressing effect on the rubber industry of Mexico, according to those in position to know the situation. The Madero family controlled practically all rubber lands of interest in the republic outside of those owned by the Intercontinental Rubber Company. During 1912 about 14,000,000 pounds of guayule rubber was manufactured in Mexico. During the past few years much of the rubber trade has been diverted to Brewster county, Texas, where the largest rubber factory outside of Mexico is operated and large increases in the sales of that company are reported since the recent disturbance on the other side of the river.

The horse is evidently coming back in Texas, judging from the reports of the United States department of agriculture, which have just been issued, showing that "Dobin" has increased \$8.00 in value within the past twelve months. The total value of all Texas horses has increased \$11,

150,000 during this time and a gain of 23,000 in the total number of head is also shown, which certainly offsets the theory that the automobile is displacing him. The Texas horse was worth \$30 each ten years ago, while the latest figures placed upon him by Uncle Sam gives him an average value of \$82 per head. A large number of Uncle Sam's cavalry steeds were bred in Texas and the polo players of two hemispheres look to the Lone Star State for their ponies. Texas is running Kentucky a close second for beautiful women and fast horses.—Commercial Secretaries.

COMMERCIAL CLUB.

The Commercial club meeting was fairly well attended Monday night. President Miller being absent at the opening of the meeting, Vice President J. C. Street presided.

The fair committee, composed of B. F. Geeslin, W. C. Dew and R. M. Thompson, was appointed to confer with a similar committee from the Confederate camp to determine the date for the fair and reunion.

E. M. Boon and J. B. Whiteman were appointed to call on the business men and request them to buy fire extinguishers for their places of business, in order to reduce the fire risk.

The road committee reported having agreed with Mr. J. D. D. Berry upon the salary to be paid him for supervising the road work which is to be done with the \$2000 special road fund set aside by the commissioners court. Mr. Berry also agreed with the committee to solicit contributions from citizens in communities where road work is to be done, in order that those who are willing to aid in the good roads movement by giving of their time or furnishing teams, may do so.

The club members were invited to accompany the road committee and fair committee to Big Valley to attend the open meeting of the Farmers Union and it is likely a number of club members will attend the meeting.

FROM MRS VAN GLAHN.
Los Angeles, Cal., Feb. 22, 1913.
Editor Eagle:
While the citizens of this city are doing homage to this day on which "The father of our country" came into existence, I will celebrate it by writing to the Eagle; its ancestor being the ensign of liberty and stamped on every American coin, silver or gold. Yes, this bird of freedom plays an important part in the history of our country. The Gold-thwaite Eagle, a type of it's forefathers, is an important function in Mills county and to those who have wandered into distant lands and are kept in touch with the loved ones at home by the weekly visits of this big free-hearted Bird.

Since the cold wave swept over this land in January, we have had many days of sunshine and clear, balmy air, resurrecting frost bitten plants. Seed sown after the freeze are yielding vegetables for our tables. Our young friend, Carroll Rodgers, of Mullin, who arrived in this city on the 4th of January, spent Sunday with us and we were discussing this, he said "I assisted my aunt, Mrs. Thos. Baird, to plant her garden after the freeze, and now we are eating vegetables from the garden."

This country has an abundance of rain. On the morning of the 19th a hail storm showered Los Angeles with particles of crystalized moisture and on the day following there was a slight frost, but no damage done. The worst snow storm for years is reported to be raging on Mt. Wilson and pleasure seekers are preparing to visit the scene and indulge in "Snow Skuds" which is said to be very popular with old and young.

I must tell you of the Orange Show now in progress at San Bernardino. Two million juicy oranges greet the eyes of visitors at the third national orange show at San Bernardino, a short run from Los Angeles. This show is housed in an enormous tent. So if any person is frost timid and believes that the cold weather in January has seriously damaged the orange crop; he would undergo that which would forever render him immune to the fear, if he should visit the orange show. Oranges of all sizes are now on exhibition and the glitter of the golden fruit in the tent makes one feel that he has found the secret treasure cave of Midas. One of the most interesting exhibits is a locomotive built of oranges. The wheels revolve and to all appearances, it could travel as nicely as a real machine. The most unique and attractive exhibit is a log cabin built of oranges. A wild-cat skin stretched on the door of the cabin adds picturesqueness to the pioneering atmosphere.

I am feeling fine as these February days grow longer and the sunbeams stronger. Everything is music from the chirp of the bird and the insect to "The song of the farmer in the furrow." And then as the psalmist says, "Lift up your eyes unto the hills" and see the snow clad mountains pierce the cloudless blue on the edge of the horizon. Ah yes, this is a glorious land at all times, but especially on these days, when all earth laughs back in joy to the smiling sun stooping to kiss everything into new life.

23. Since I did not post my letter yesterday, will add one or two items of special interest to some of my friends.

Ocean Park is being rapidly rebuilt since its destruction by fire, and promises to be a more attractive resort for summer visitors than ever. "The Mysterious Jail" will, I am sure, be a greater tangle to those who enter its portals than formerly. Be sure to come.

Now I'll make a short quotation from the Los Angeles Times about the Panama Canal. "Not only the wonder of the age, but the greatest wonder of the world in all ages.

"The steamship companies of the world are busy with brain and hand planning for the approaching opening of the Panama canal, which is to revolutionize the commerce of the world.

"These are concrete facts showing what will happen when the canal is opened. At the present the commerce passing from the Atlantic to

the Pacific coast of the U. S. in value to \$125,000,000, include the business passing Tehuantepec, too. For five toward the end of 1912 the rise passing from the Atlantic to the Pacific amounted to \$24,000,000 by the Tehuantepec R. R. while \$5,000,000 worth went by the Panama. I hope this may be interesting to the readers of the Eagle and fill many with a desire to come and be at the opening of this wonderful canal in 1915. G. V. M.

LEGISLATIVE NEWS.

The Katy consolidation bill, after passing the house over the governor's veto by an overwhelming majority, passed the senate by a vote of 22 to 6, with three members absent.

If a bill introduced by Senator Hudspeth becomes a law, Texas will have a home for dependant girls, to be located in the central part of the state.

Senator Collins has presented a bill which defines and prohibits newspaper subscription contests.

The Bohmer bill for the disfranchisement of all illiterates, whether white or black, was called up in the house and passed that body by a good majority. The bill provides that besides a poll tax receipt, an educational test will be applied to all voters.

When the deficiency bill for the comptroller's department comes up for discussion in the house this week, an amendment will be offered to investigate the methods employed by Comptroller Lane in dealing with liquor dealers and liquor licenses.

Senator Vaughn of the First Senatorial District presented his resignation, February 3, and withdrew it March 1. The governor says that the resignation was accepted, but the attorney general holds that Senator Vaughn had a legal right to withdraw the resignation. Senator Vaughn voted to pass the Katy consolidation bill over the governor's veto.

The workmen's compensation bill proposed by Senator Collins, after being materially amended, passed the senate at a night session during the early part of the week.

A concurrent resolution introduced, providing for the indeterminate sentence, was signed by Weinert, Paulus, Murray, Willacy and Nugent.

Morris of Coryell introduced a bill in the house which, if it becomes a law, will put a stop to all party line telephone service in the state. He proposes in his bill to prevent the tying or connection of one telephone to another without consent of the parties concerned.

Under the Collins compensation bill as passed by the senate, employees of railroads doing an interstate business, employees of cotton gins and of all plants employing less than ten men are exempted from the provisions of the act.—Commercial Secretaries.

The fat stock show is to be opened in Fort Worth today and will attract stockmen from all parts of Texas and from other states.

President Woodrow Wilson took the oath of office Tuesday at noon and ex-President Taft bid farewell to the executive office forever.

The opinion of the attorney general that social clubs have no right to dispense liquor without paying the license is undoubtedly correct and will be upheld by the higher courts.

The explosion of dynamite in the depot of the Houston, East and West Texas railroad at Lufkin Sunday night caused the destruction of the building, together with a number of box cars, and a considerable amount of property in the town was damaged. The cause of the explosion will probably never be known.

Fire which was supposed to have been of incendiary origin destroyed practically all of the main buildings of the Rusk penitentiary last Saturday. The loss to the state will reach \$100,000. One convict, Pat Roberts, who was sent up from Dallas county, died of heart failure during the progress of the fire.

A most diabolical act was committed by a former policeman in Dallas Friday night when he ran amuck, shooting at a woman in a crowded street. A little girl was killed, a man dangerously wounded and the object of his wrath wounded slightly. Jealousy was said to be the cause.

Both houses of congress held a Sunday session in an effort to complete the business on the calendar before the expiration of the regular session on March 4.

Governor Colquitt is clearly out of accord with the legislature. His appointment of United States senator was repudiated and his veto of the Central-Katy consolidation bill was not respected, but the bill was passed by both houses over his veto.

The last day of the regular session of the United States senate a large number of President Taft's appointments were confirmed, but these confirmations were only in cases where the outgoing president had not transcended the bounds of right and courtesy in naming his appointees. His attempt to load the Democratic administration with thousands of his adherents was thwarted early in the session by the democrats and Progressive senators.

Hon. Albert Sidney Burleson, congressman from the Austin district for many years, was appointed postmaster general by President Wilson. This is the first time in the history of the nation that a Texas man has held a place in the president's cabinet and no better man could have been selected than Mr. Burleson. He is a native of the state, is a self-made man, having risen from assistant city attorney of Austin to the present exalted position. All Texas is proud of him and appreciates the honor bestowed by President Wilson when he selected a native son of Texas for one of the most important and responsible positions in his cabinet.

President Wilson appointed the following cabinet officers: Wm. J. Bryan of Nebraska, secretary of state; Wm. G. McAdoo of New York, secretary of the treasury; Lindley M. Garrison of New Jersey, secretary of war; James C. McReynolds of New York, attorney general; Albert S. Burleson of Texas, postmaster general; Josephus Daniel of North Carolina, secretary of navy; Franklin K. Lane of California, secretary of the interior; David Franklin Houston of Missouri, secretary of agriculture; Wm. C. Redfield of New York, secretary of commerce; Wm. B. Wilson of Pennsylvania, secretary of labor. Secretary Houston is well known in Texas, having served as president of the A. & M. college and also of the University of Texas.
