Of all the good road arguments, a good road is the best.

Of equal importance to building good roads is their maintenance.

Improved highways mean increased traffic; increased traffic a bigger bank roll.

The two greatest factors in civilization are good schools and good roads. Of the two good schools are the most important, but they can never attain their full usefulness until good roads are a reality.

A commercial center is a certain location that commands a large volume of business. This condition of affairs never exists unless adequate transportation facilities are available, either by rail, road or waterway. Few cities possess sufficient waterways with which to insure proper handling of commerce, nor are conditions such that it is profitable for capital to invest in steam or electric lines, but the public highway is always available, and at a small expense can be transformed into an artery of commerce that will for years to come solve the transportation problem. This condition is especially peculiar to Texas communities and the sooner we commence work on our highways the quicker will our cities become commercial centers.

### GOOD ROADS DAY.

Plan of Improving the Roads Approved by a Great Many Citizens.

Many of the citizens of the county have approved the plan of making Nov. 5 and 6 road working days in all parts of the county and a large number have announced a determination to aid in the matter. The plan as outlined by Governor Colquitt and other good roads advocates is for every able bodied man to devote the two days to road work and those who do not care to enter actively into the work are to contribute a sufficient amount to employ the labor. Governor Colquitt announces that he will do the work himself and will also contribute \$25 to employ labor. Of course, there will not be many who will do that much, but every one can either work the two days or "send a hand." By the plan it is hoped to make great improvement in the public roads in Texas.

Mills county is never behind the most progressive counties in the state and the Eagle believes the good record will be maintained in the road working. If 2000 men do two day's work on the roads in this county at the time appointed there will be more good work done on the roads than will ever be done by any other plan.

Those who expect to co-operate in the matter should notify Judge Allen or one of the commissioners, in order that an outline of work may be prepared to prevent conflict and in order that the work may be properly distributed over the county. Many business and professional men can not take the time to do the work themselves, but they can employ some one to work or can pay the amount necessary to one of the commissioners to employ men or teams.

Let's all help, for we are all advocates of good roads and this is one of the best methods of obtaining them.

We purchase annually from other states and countries \$30,000,000 worth of corn, \$24,000,000 of pork, \$10,000,000 of sugar, \$9,000,000 of potatoes, and various other food products aggregating \$35,000,000 in value.

The floods along the Guadalupe river have been greater in the last week than at any time since 1869. In the vicinity of Victoria the water spread over a vast area.

The state department has announced the decision that no treaty rights were violated by the Canadian government when Harry K. Thaw, who escaped from a New York asylum, was deported.

Governor Colquitt is expected home from Panama next week and Lieutenant Governor Mayes will leave at once for Mississippi and Alabama to fill lecture dates with a chatauqua association.

The great Texas state fair will open in Dallas next Saturday and will continue for two weeks. This is the largest and in every way the greatest state fair in the United States and people are attracted to it from many states.

Burglars "blew" the vault in an abstract office in Vernon Sunday night in the hope of entering a bank vault in an adjoining building, but after the destruction of the abstract vault they found a stone wall between them and the vault.

The wife of a farmer in Bosque county was arrested the first of the week and jailed at Waco charged with having poisoned her three step-children. Two of the children died after eating their dinner and the third was in a critical condition for a time.

Twenty-two convicts made their escape from the Imperial state farm near Richmond Saturday night and their escape was not known until Sunday morning. They were all white men and escaped by sawing a bar from one of the windows of their cell.

When the jury in the case of Mrs. Reuter, charged with being an accomplice in the murder of her husband at Bartlettville, Okla., brought in a verdict last Saturday finding her guilty and assessing her punishment at a life term in the penitentiary, she fainted. The murder of her husband was exceptionally cruel.

The removing of Gen Sam Houston's picture from the Texas senate chamber and substituting therefor the likeness of Joe Bailey has brought forth a strong protest from citizens from all parts of the country. The artist who painted the two pictures claims the ownership of the Houston picture, but that is no good reason for reopening the "Bailey question" in Texas.

The revolutionists in Mexico have suffered several defeats lately and if the fortunes of war continue to go against them for the next few weeks they will be overwhelmingly defeated. Changes come suddenly sometimes, however, and those who sympathize with the revolutionists are hopeful that a change for the better will come soon.

A man arrested in Chicago this week charged with the murder of a woman with whom he was known to be on intimate terms confessed that he committed the murder and also claimed to have murdered nineteen women on former occasions. For a time his confession was given credence and he was characterized as a modern Bluebeard, but it turns out that he is a "dope" fiend and that most if not all of the murders confessed were the imaginations of his diseased brain.

The chairman of the penitentiary commission of New York took upon himself a term in the state prison last week to ascertain the conditions existing there. After a week's experience he is enthusiastic for reforms of the management and the system generally. The trouble with the commissioner is that he views the matter from the standpoint of an innocent and honorable man and can not realize that the treatment of prisoners is meant as a means of punishment for misdeeds, rather than for the purpose of making them comfortable and contented.

## THE NATIONAL CAPITAL.

Events of Interest From the Seat of Government.

Washington, D. C., Oct. 4.—The Senate took a whirl at the method of distributing lands opened to the public at a recent session, and treated the legislation as an emergency measure because a Nebraska forest reserve was due to be restored to the public domain on the first of October. The scandal of the entry of public lands, the long waiting of applicants in line, the disappointments and expenses inflicted upon those who could not file, is a familiar story in the west and middlewest, and Acting Secretary of the Interior Jones, Representative Ferris as chairman of the Public Lands Committee in the House, and Senator Meyers of Montana, took the initiative in preparing a bill providing that the President may prescribe the methods of disposing of public lands in future under the lottery system—a method which has proven its merits in many cases. Senators Norris, Shafroth, Jones, Walsh and Lane participated as the defenders of the bill in a spirited discussion in Senate, the result of which was that the measure, which had previously passed the House, became law. Senator Walsh explained that the measure is to become general law, whereas heretofore relief has been provided through special legislation in separate cases.

According to the present system of weighing mails as pointed out by Representative Stafford of Wisconsin, the star route carriers, railroad carriers and the contractors are not to have an adjustment of their compensation in some cases for four years, notwithstanding the greatly increased weight of mails that has occurred by reason of the parcel post. It appears that the country is divided into contract sections, and compensation in New England will be adjusted by weighing during the present year, while New York, Pennsylvania, Delaware and West Virginia were taken care of last spring. The middle west is to be cared for next year, while the southern section of the country is not due for more than three years. Congressman Mondell of Wyoming declared on the floor that the greatest difficulty in carrying mail was in the middle west, and he said that the same amount of sympathy was not due carriers in more settled communities, as in cases where "the fellow who has to travel over mud roads over mountains and through forests in all kinds of weather and meet all sorts of difficulties."

In discussing the currency legislation, Mr Hardy, representative from Texas, has won considerable approval by his defense of the gold standard. In the course of a speech he declared: "I want to say, further, that the man who in this day and time, at this part of the twentieth century, professes to believe that the United States or any great commercial country of the world will ever depart from the gold standard and go back to our former uncertain and nonparity maintained currency is fighting a shadow; he is afraid of the east wind and the west wind."

From now on there is going to be a good deal of rivalry in the celebration of the different processes of completion of the Panama Canal, which is about the most popular institution on earth among Congressmen. Representative Stephens of California won the pole by declaring that the Isthmian Canal officials should let him know the exact moment of the explosion which would carry out the Camba Dike, in order that all the whistles and bells and patriotic speech-makers of the Pacific coast might be promptly set off. It is declared that by October 10 there will be fifteen feet of water in the Culebra Cut.

The Senate has not yet fully made up its mind to pass the currency bill. Senators who oppose the bill have discovered that they are being "hurried" and in case they muster sufficient support it may be that the talking process will not be completed by December, in which case the round of debate would have to be done all over again in the winter session. There is some Democratic dissatisfaction, and notable Senators pointed out are Reed and Hitchcock. On the other hand as this is not necessarily a partisan measure it is confidently predicted that there will be plenty of Republican support.

The disclosures of the Census Bureau show that although three and a half years have elapsed since the enumeration much of the work re-

mains uncompleted, and many of the reports have never been made. Thus several million dollars worth of census work has relapsed into junk. Worse still, clerks are kept on old work, hereby holding back annual reports that are useless unless made on time.

Government investigation of vitrified brick as a paving material for country roads concludes that notwithstanding the first high cost, that four distinct advantages are obtained, to-wit: Durability, easy traction, ease of maintenance and good appearance.

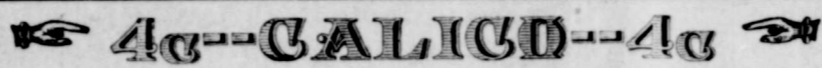

### PURITY SUNDAY PROCLAIMED.

Acting Governor Mayes Designates November 9 to Be Observed Throughout State.

Austin, Texas, Nov. 29.—Acting Gov. Will H. Mayes has issued the following proclamation, addressed to the people of Texas.

"Whereas, The seventh International Purity Congress will be in session in Minneapolis Nov. 7 to 12, and this congress has for its purpose the creation and crystallization of an intelligent public sentiment and activity against those social evils that undermine our manhood and womanhood, and the promotion of social and personal purity, especially standing for the annihilation of the white slave traffic and the establishment of a single and high standard of morality and for social, civil and moral betterment; and

"Whereas, The real wealth of every state consists largely of the good health, purity and opportunities of its children and is based on a clean and strong womanhood and manhood, and even unborn generations have a right to demand a better and purer environment, freed from corrupting tendencies; and

"Whereas, The world stands appalled at the evidences of the barter and sale of many of the daughters of our land, into lives that are far worse than any imaginable slavery, and it is the duty of every patriotic man and woman who values the happiness, the good and the purity of our young womanhood, and the strengthening of our young manhood, to do everything possible for the suppression of this destructive vice;

"Therefore, As acting governor of Texas, I proclaim Sunday, Nov. 9, as 'Purity Sunday,' and recommend that on that day the questions then being dealt with by the National Purity Congress be brought to the attention of the people everywhere throughout the state. I especially commend the observance of this day to the clergymen of all denominations and creeds, to the officers of fraternal orders and to all organizations having for their purpose the uplift of humanity, and to all mayors of cities, towns and villages. Where the rules and regulations of churches do not prohibit, I request that this proclamation be read in the churches, that special sermons be delivered and addresses be made upon the topics touched herein and that all men and women in sympathy with the purposes of the Purity Congress and of this proclamation attend such services on that day.

"Full information as to publications and books for use in the preparation of sermons, addresses and discussions on 'Purity Sunday' may be obtained free from the World's Purity Federation, La Crosse, Wis. Information pertaining to the white slave traffic in America may be secured by addressing Hon. Stanley W. Finch, special commissioner of the United States Department of Justice for the suppression of the white slave traffic, Fidelity Building, Baltimore, Md.

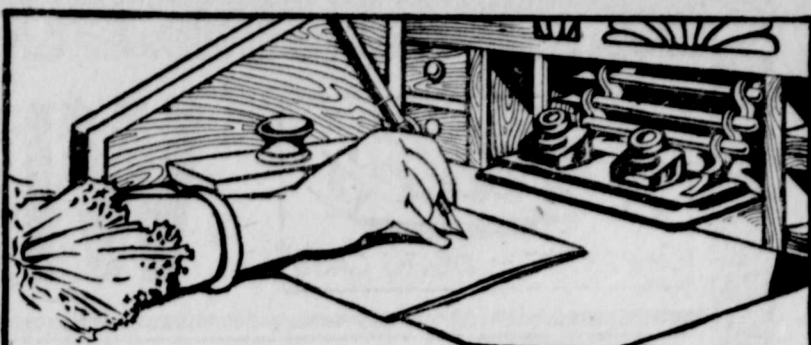
