If the United States had as good roads as there are in Europe, it would mean a saving in transportation of foreign products of \$250,000,000 per annum.

There are two things on a road that are just about as bad as a mud hole or a sand bank—one of these is a goggle-eyed culvert, the other is a hump-back bridge. The elimination of all four of these impediments is a thing to be devoutly hoped for.

Good roads for motorists cannot be built so that they will not be a benefit to vehicle traffic of all kinds. It is equally true that when roads are built for wagons and buggies they will be a benefit to the motorist. What helps one is a benefit to both.

The successful office seeker of the future and the one who will be called higher, is the man who will pay more heed to improved highways and less to the tariff and other theoretical questions. The "dear people" are not as interested in their legislators knowing the intricacies of the currency question, as they are in having them to enact laws that will give them relief from matters that are vital in their every day life. They want less buncombe and more sense, less smoke and more fire, less shooting and more game, fewer laws and better laws.—Homer D. Wade.

FARM FACTS

Diversification is the highway to prosperity.

The thinking farmer is the successful farmer.

Farming without thinking is like reading without light.

Up until the present time our land has been mined instead of farmed.

Permanent agriculture and livestock rearing and feeding are inseparable.

Feeding livestock upon the farm establishes a home market for the crops. A load of corn is more cheaply transported when converted into animal products.

Marketing farm products is an item that must be reckoned with when profits are accounted for.

Millions of dollars have been expended in solving the marketing problem and still it is not comprehensive.

When the farmer and merchant properly understand each other, then they will have no trouble in working together.

Adding the silo to the farm simply means applying one of the first principles of modern manufacturing industry to the oldest of all industries.

The rapidly increasing population gives rise to a larger demand for food both in the form of bread and meat, and the farmer must meet this demand not only by increasing production, but by a betterment of marketing facilities.

The feeding of farm animals not only enables the farmer to return from 85 to 90 per cent of the fertilizing value of the crops to the soil, but in growing such crops as peas, alfalfa, clovers, and other legumes, there is more nitrogen stored in the soil than is sold in the form of animal products.—Peter Radford.

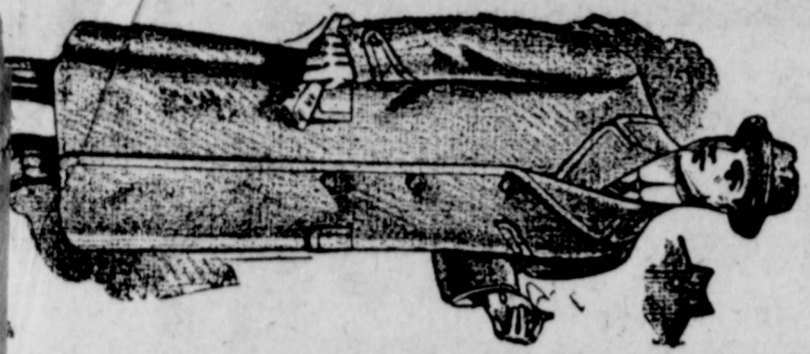

The Mexican election to be held Sunday is attracting no attention from the people in that country and it is said that few of them will vote. The outcome will be of no consequence, as Huerta or some of his clan will claim the office of president and the rebellion will continue.

A special train carrying 179 soldiers of the Alabama and Florida forts was wrecked en route to the Mississippi state fair Monday afternoon and 20 soldiers were killed and a number injured. The engine jumped the track a short distance from a trestle and ran on the cross-ties for a considerable distance, but the coaches went through the trestle and plunged down 25 feet.

Lieutenant Governor Will H. Mayes has the sympathy of all the people in the death of his aged father, which occurred in Brownwood the early part of the week. Governor Mayes had officiated in the opening of the Dallas fair on Saturday and started for Louisiana to fill a lecture engagement when the message reached him announcing the serious illness of his parent.

The death of C. J. Glover, business manager of the Waco Times-Herald, is regretted by all who knew him and by many of the newspaper workers who did not know him personally, but knew of his work and his splendid ability. Mr. Glover was found dead in his bath room Monday afternoon and a bullet wound in his head told the sad story. Prior to his connection with the Waco paper he was connected with the Bellon Journal for a number of years.

Governor Wm. Sulzer was very vindictive towards those who took the initiative in his impeachment and he was right in most of his conclusions. He did wrong by using his campaign funds for speculation, as well as in making an incorrect report of his campaign expenses and in attempting to induce witnesses to refuse to testify against him, but he could be justified in most of his misdoings by the fact that the men who contributed the money care nothing for his expenses. They wanted his influence in the office and he knew it. The worst thing arguable to him was failure to keep faith with the people who elected him.

The Allison state law on the state books prohibits shipments of liquor from wet to dry districts. The Allison liquor law prohibits interstate shipments of liquor. It is said to have teeth, and on its final passage it received the votes of all those who are members of the state senate. This should make dry districts absolutely dry in so far as the shipment of liquor is concerned. Residents of dry districts are privileged to purchase supplies for their own personal use, but they must carry their purchases with them, as the law makes it a penitentiary offense for a dealer to ship to his customers. It is a drastic law. It was signed by an anti-prohibition governor and received the votes of the leading anti members of the legislature.—Port Worth Record.

In idle moments, when work is slack and time hangs heavily, the whole family should devote its efforts to beautifying the yard and cleaning up the premises. Lots of times it is better to work all day in the fields and the shade of the house beneath some tree affords a cool spot where spare time can be utilized in planting flowers and vines. Nothing adds to the beauty of a home as much as attractive gardens and shady walks and these environments can be secured with little expense. A creeping vine on the veranda or on the porch only prove attractive. The air cool within the gravel walk from the garden and to the porch and to the both looks and feels better.—Mrs. E. P.

THE NATIONAL CAPITAL.

Events of Interest From the Seat of Government.

The privilege of printing what somebody else has to say as a part of the remarks of a congressman has been greatly curtailed in congress and when Congressman Raker rose for the purpose of inserting in the Record the views of an outsider, Representative Borland of Missouri and others objected fiercely. However, Raker tied the House up in the controversy for nearly an hour and wore out his fellow members until they acceded to his wishes. Raker contended that occasionally some one besides a congressman says something of value—strange as it may be, and that the use of the Congressional Record as a means of publicity, in such a case, is eminently proper. However, other members of milder mannerism who do not possess the mannerism to force congress to accede to unusual demands, will not be likely to repeat the Raker performance.

It has been made clear by the administration that independence for the Philippines is not to be accorded in a hurry, and Governor General Harrison upon his arrival at Manila gave out a document in behalf of President Wilson that the people of the islands should be content to be granted additional liberties by easy stages. The president proposes to give the Philippines the majority control in both houses of the legislature, but when it comes to absolute independence as provided by the Democratic measure known as the Jones bill, it is clear that the administration, while seeking to comply with the Baltimore platform, will proceed cautiously.

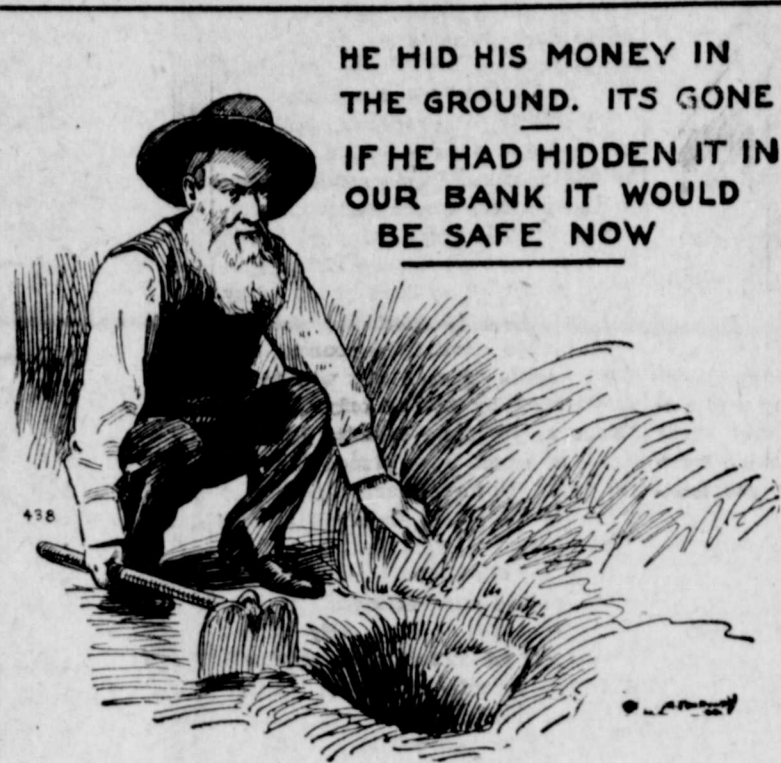
Representative Lafferty of Oregon has introduced a currency measure which takes the short cut, disposing of the bankers and providing for loans to be made by the United States government straight to the farmers at two per cent interest.

The principle applied in the "pure food" law passed in 1906 seems likely to be extended to pure fabrics. Bills with this in view have been introduced in congress from time to time, but as they have commanded no particular public support they have not progressed very far. It is now said that President Wilson is very much in favor of some sort of legislation such as that presented by Representative Linguist of Minnesota. This bill provides for the legislation in interstate commerce of all "adulterated" fabrics. It is common knowledge that the consumer is frequently worsted in the purchase of silks, linens, woolsens, and even cottons, and unless the purchaser be a good judge of goods there are no laws to prevent "adulteration" of all kinds of fabrics. The remedy proposed is to compel manufacturers to label their goods, showing of just what material they are made.

In view of the second great disaster at sea in a year, it is somewhat comforting to know that the Department of Commerce at Washington has been at work for a long time studying the perils of navigation, and Secretary Rodfield's committee has just prepared its recommendation which will be submitted to the International Conference in London. The recommendations cover every phase of safety equipment, dealing particularly with the use of electricity, search lights, wireless, life boats, lanes of travel, ice patrol, etc. Since the Titanic disaster there has been no further thought among navigators of constructing a "Non-sinkable ship" such as was claimed for the ill-fated liner. The energetic investigation of these disasters and the rules that are being laid down for better protection of life and property on the high seas is commanding the attention of all the civilized governments. Our own department of Commerce is co-operating close and constantly.

The Wilson administration has evidently given up trying to keep its thumb on the Mexican situation. Pat's famous plea never jumped so swiftly nor uncertainly as Huerta, but since less than five thousand Americans are said to still remain in the troubled regions of Mexico the strain upon the Washington government inflicted by the international nuisance in the southwest has been considerably lessened.

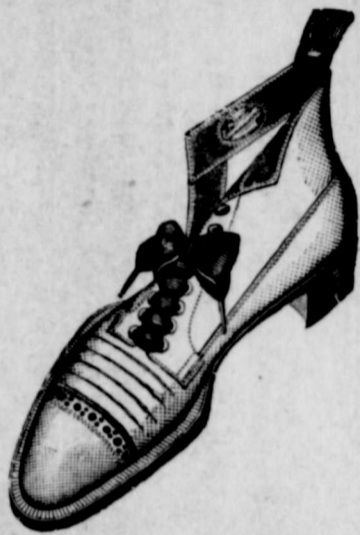

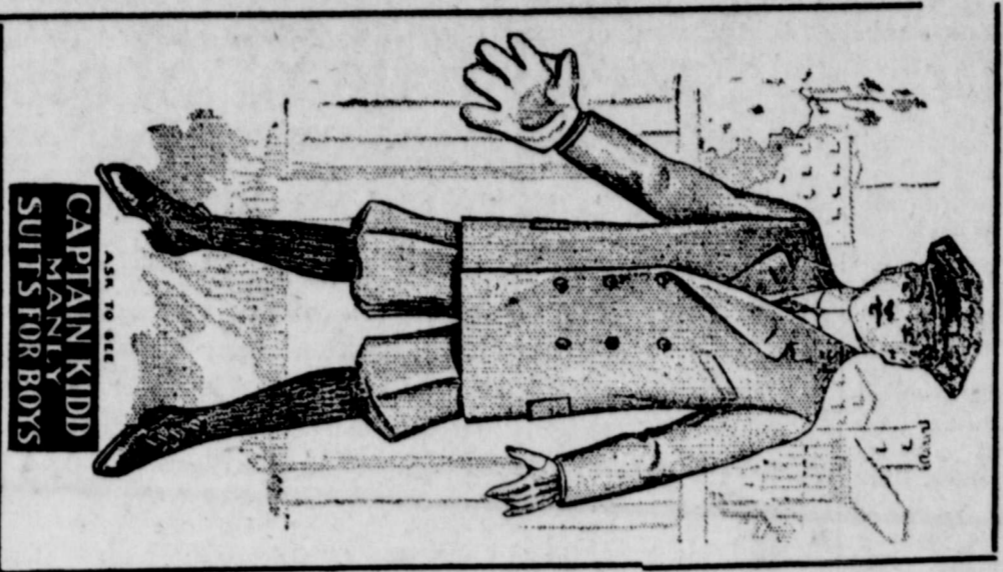
