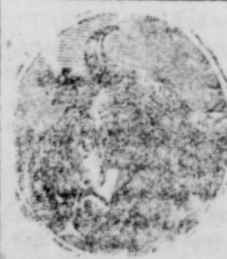

Becker had already been granted a new trial and the condemned murderer's statement will likely have the effect of clearing the former officer of the charge.

A young school teacher in the mountain regions of Kentucky has reduced the illiterates in one county from 1,100 to 23 within three years. Touched by the sad condition of the uneducated people, many of whom were not only willing but anxious to learn, she originated the idea of having school at night for parents who could neither read nor write. On account of the treacherous roads of the mountain district, these schools were held only on nights when the moon was shining, hence their name "The Moonlight Schools of Kentucky." Many men and women, who three years ago were unable to write their own names, are now teaching in the schools, and the farmers who barely existed are becoming well to do because of scientific methods they have adopted since they learned to read literature sent them by the government. While the per cent of illiterates in Texas is indeed small compared with that of the older states, yet the example of the Kentucky teacher may be well followed in isolated sections of the state where education is difficult to obtain.—Commercial Secretaries.

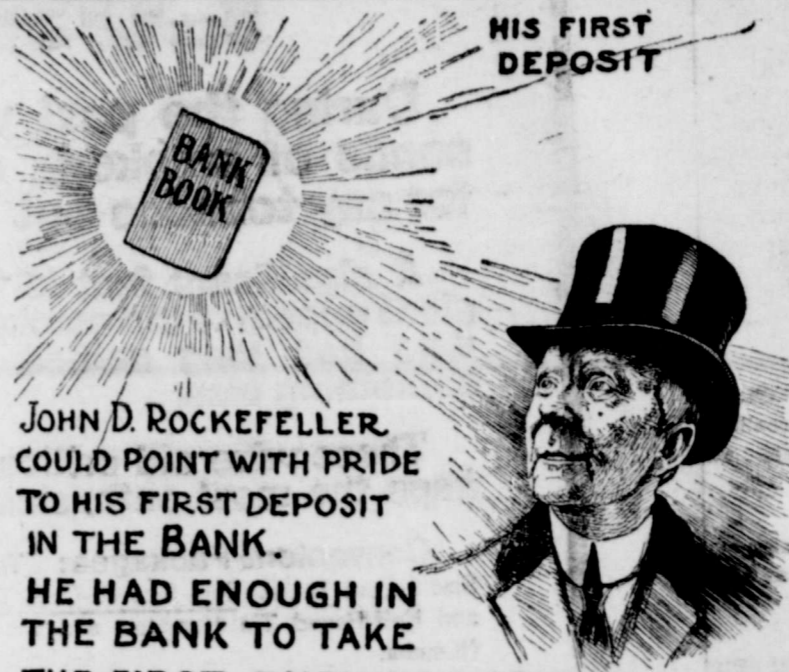

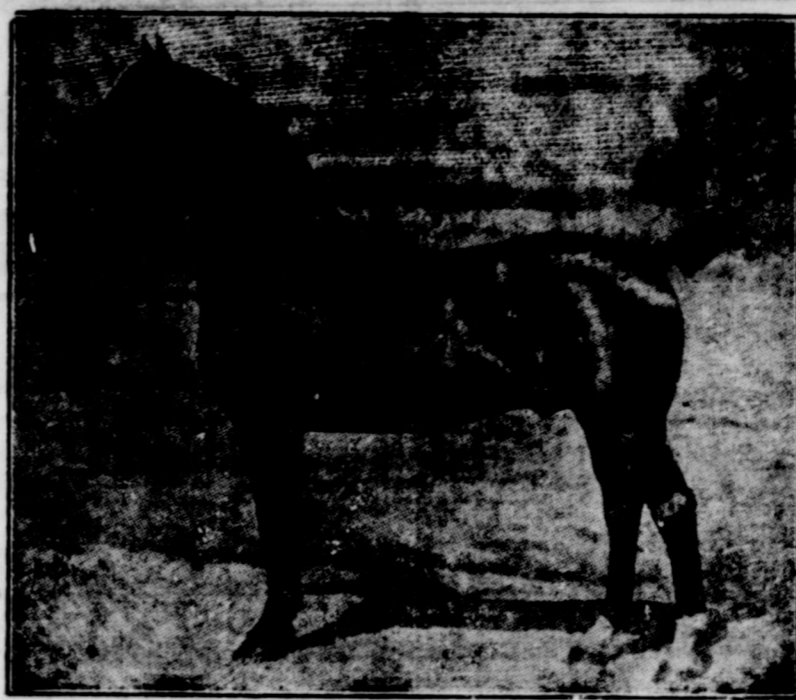

The law which requires the naming of an official stenographer for a district court and compelling each county to pay its pro rata of the stenographer's salary is certainly an unnecessary expense to the tax payers and should never have been enacted. The stenographer gets paid for making transcripts for litigants and he certainly should not get an additional salary from the tax payers for doing the same work. The repealing of this law would be beneficial to every taxpayer in the state.

COMMISSIONERS COURT

The Mills County commissioners court met Monday to transact some important business and remained in session only the one day.

Petition of P. L. Stuck and others for an election in North Brown school district to authorize the levy of a special tax for school purposes was rejected because of some irregularities.

Petition of John Mark Boler and others for an election in school district No. 33 to reduce the special tax from 35c on the \$100 to 20c was granted. The election was ordered for May 9 and John Mark Boler was named as presiding officer.

The clerk was ordered to pay the official stenographer of the district court \$250, which amount is Mills county's part of that officer's salary.

Returns from the election in Cold Springs school district to abrogate the 20c special tax was found to be favorable to the abrogation and it was so ordered.

It was found that the returns from the pool hall election held in Goldthwaite could not be received and the result declared until next Monday, at which time the court will meet and declare the result and order that no pool hall be allowed to operate in this city after 30 days from the date of the order.

The court selected two locations for watering basins to be placed on the square, one at the north east corner of the court yard and the other at the northwest corner of the square. Piping was ordered run from the public well to these basins which will be made of cement and so arranged that teams and stock can be driven to them from every angle. The ladies of the Self Culture club will pay a part of the expense of these watering places and the city council will also pay part, thereby making the expense light on all and providing ample watering places for the farmers' teams.

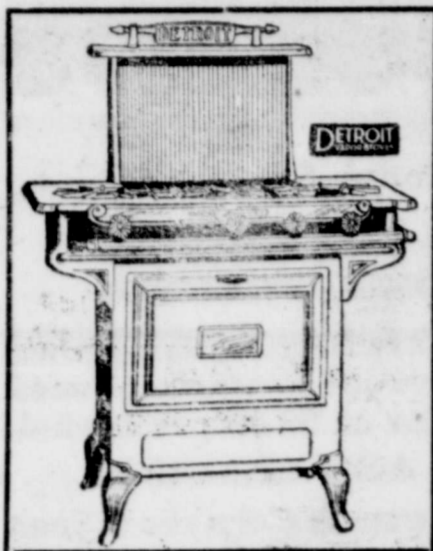

Governor Colquitt Saturday announced the appointment of Claude O. Yates, a well known chemist and druggist of Austin, to the position of state pure food and drug commissioner, to fill the vacancy caused by the recent resignation of J.S. Abbott, who quit the state service to accept a position with the bureau of chemistry at Washington.

A special from the Rusk penitentiary says: "Fifteen guards are out of jobs here today. The penitentiary commissioners have decided that 86 convicts here shall be put on their honor. The doors to the prison are open and the men go their way at will. The warden, night sergeant and steward in the future will take care of the work on the farms adjoining the prison. They will direct the work, but have had orders to store away their revolvers and shot guns and 'make men, not criminals' out of the prisoners."

A special from Austin says: "Sam Sparks will support Thomas H. Ball for governor this year, it is said. Sparks has not yet issued a statement and will not do so until after Ball has made his opening speech, but he frankly declares that he expects nothing to appear in that declaration that would prevent his support. While Sparks is opposed to prohibition and even opposed to submitting a constitutional amendment at this time, he says that is a matter for the legislature and the people, and he does not regard the prohibition question an extremely important issue in this campaign, and on all other issues he expects to be in full accord with the Houston man."

For some days there appeared to be trouble brewing for the big greaser who claims the presidency of Mexico, because of the arrest of some of the American bluejackets stationed at Tampico, but the danger appears now to have passed. The men were placed under arrest and paraded thru the streets of the city by the Mexican federals and Rear Admiral Mayo demanded that they be immediately released and that the Mexican war vessels fire a salute to the United States flag as apology for the outrage. The demand was referred to the Big Greaser who promptly refused to comply. Then the American battle-ships were ordered to Mexican waters with instructions to enforce the demand. Late dispatches say the salute will be fired, but the Mexicans require that the United States vessels return the salute. To the uninitiated this looks like a "dogfall," but the authorities say there is nothing objectionable in the requirement and that the United States guns can return the salute without the slightest sacrifice of the dignity of this nation.

There is bad trouble threatened at Tulsa, Okla., over horse racing and bookmaking at the fair. The Jockey Club officials say the horse races will be run regardless of what happens. Thursday state rangers fired on the horses when the first race started. All other events were called off. Gen. Canton, in charge of the troops, ordered all horses off the track, saying that the next order would be "shoot to kill." Then he announced that if a horse was led on the track his men would kill it. The citizenship is strongly in favor of the races. Thursday afternoon when Manager Bob Allison forced himself through the lines and ordered on the first race the crowd cheered for an hour. Gov. Cruce has undertaken to stop race track gambling and has wired Gen. Canton to take full charge of the situation and to pay no attention to court orders, as the state troops have power over court orders when martial law is declared. The governor says he has no objection to clean horse racing, but says gambling on the outcome of races must be stopped at all hazards.

REVIVAL IN PROGRESS.

Much Good Work Being Done by Christian People.

A revival was begun in the Methodist church last Sunday morning and has grown in interest at every service since that time. A tent has been placed next to the church building and is being used for the services. Large congregations attend the meetings and great interest has already been manifested by the Christian people of all denominations and all are working in harmony and with the one purpose of getting benefit from the meeting for themselves and their friends and neighbors. Rev. A. P. Lowrey, an evangelist of wide reputation, is conducting the meeting, assisted by his wife and Mr. W. B. Woodruff of Palacios, who expects to enter the ministry in the near future. The local pastors and church people are helping in the meeting, to be sure, and everything is moving along beautifully and the consensus of opinion is that this will be one of the greatest meetings Goldthwaite has ever seen.

Goldthwaite is a fine place for just such a revival, for most of her people are church members and church workers and when they join hearts and hands in a work of this kind there are great and lasting results.

Services are held at the tabernacle each morning at 10 o'clock and at 7:45 in the evening. The night crowds are the largest, of course, but there is no cause for complaint because of the size of the congregations at the morning services.

A prayer meeting for the ladies was held at the church yesterday afternoon while the men held a prayer meeting at McKinley-Corrigan company's store. It is likely these prayer meetings will be continued through next week, the various business houses of the city being used for a meeting place for men, while the ladies will meet at the church or at private residences. It has also been stated that the business men will be requested to close their places of business during next week and it is likely a committee will be appointed by the pastors of the local churches to make the request.

Mrs. Lowrey will address the children at the tabernacle Sunday afternoon and an urgent invitation has been extended the children of the town and country to attend. The older people, will, of course, be welcome to attend this service, but it will be primarily for the children.

The men's prayer meeting this afternoon will be held in Rev. J. T. Weems' store.

A progressive justice of the peace in Houston has announced that hereafter he will perform marriage ceremonies on Wednesdays free of charge.

The Texas court of civil appeals has held that it is swindling for a person to deliver cotton that is inferior to the sample submitted to the buyer.

Some of the London newspapers appear to be "sore" because this government took such drastic action to enforce a demand for apology for the arrest of bluejackets when there was so little trouble made over the killing of Benton, a British subject. They do not appear to realize that Benton was to all intents and purposes a Mexican citizen, if in fact he was not really a naturalized citizen of that government. He lived there many years, married a Mexican woman, was an office holder under the Diaz administration and was evidently looked upon by the Mexicans as one of their own citizens.

How many male and female ancestors were required to bring you into the world? First, it was necessary that you should have a father and a mother. That makes two human beings. Each of them must have had a father and mother. That makes four more human beings. Again, each of them must have had a father and mother, making eight more human beings. So on we go, back to the time of Jesus Christ, fifty-six generations. The calculation thus resulting shows that 139,235,017,489,534,079 births must have taken place to bring you into this world—you who read these lines! All this since the birth of Christ—not since the beginning of time.—Houston Post.

Again has Gen. Villa, commander of the constitutionalist forces in Mexico, been victorious over the federal troops. The federals have never been able to withstand the rebel commander and his wonderful success in the numerous hard fought battles puts him in a class by himself as a leader of victorious armies. The best the federals can do is to interest him for a few days and kill a few of his men, but the cost to them in blood is too great to be prolonged. For Gen. Villa to undertake a task is equivalent to its accomplishment and the announcement that he has plans for taking one of the federal strongholds is always followed by the report of his success. One of the hardest fought battles of the present war in that country took place at San Pedro Las Colonias, Coahuila, Saturday, Sunday and Monday and resulted in the federals being routed with terrible loss.

CITY COUNCIL.

The city council met in called session Thursday night for the purpose of organizing for work. Mayor W. H. Trent presided at the meeting and all members were present.

Messrs. Street, Grisham and Walters drew the long terms and Mr. Chas. Rudd drew the short term, while Mr. F. N. Hubbert was a hold-over. Messrs Walters and Grisham were appointed finance committee and Messrs. Street, Rudd and Hubbert were made the street committee.

L. E. Miller was re-elected city secretary, a position he has held since the incorporation of the city. J. B. Brinson was selected as tax assessor and O. H. Yarborough was selected city treasurer, while L. R. Conro was retained as city marshal and street commissioner. L. B. Walters was elected mayor pro tem.

The resignation of J. B. Brinson as city recorder was received and G. H. Denison was selected to fill that office.

The duties of tax collector were added to the office of marshal.

The street committee was authorized to confer with the commissioners court relative to the watering troughs to be placed on the square and given plenary power to act in the matter.

IMPORTANT ROAD CONVENTION

On Monday, the first day of June, there will be held at the court house in Goldthwaite, a convention of the road overseers of Mills County. Some expert, practical, dirt road builders will be with us on that occasion to help us solve our own road problems. It is hoped that every road overseer in Mills county will be here by 10 o'clock a. m., on the 1st day of June. Let every man interested in good roads in Mills county come, too.
