Hs sister, Miss May, accompanied him home and boarded the train Tuesday morning for Blair, Okla., to attend commencement of the college there in waich her sister graduates. <br> Dick Page has accepted a position with the Texas Harvester Co. and will enter upon his duties next week. | interesting history <br> Some Facts About the Last War With Mexico. <br> Dispute over the Texas boundary line plunged the United States and Mexico into the two years, war of 1846. <br> That war cost the United States in lives 2703 men, including 383 officers; in money $\$ 15,000,000$. <br> It cost Mexico 7,000 men killed and wounded, and 3730 prisoners of war. <br> The United States sent 21,509 regulars and 22,027 volunteers into the Valley of Mexico. <br> Congress declared war May 18, 1846, <br> The Mexican forces evacuated the City of Mexico Sept. 14, 1847. <br> The treaty of peace, signed Feb. 2 , 1848, was proclaimed July 4, 1848. The treaty fixed the R'o Grande river as the international boundary line between Mexico and the United States. <br> The relations between the United States and Mexico, stra ned by American recognition of Texas independence in 1887, and further strained by the annexation of Texas by the United States in 1845 , came to the breaking point when Gen. Zachary Taylor, with a force of 3,000 men, invaded on March 12, 1846, the territory between the Nueces and the Rio Grande rivers, which were the disputed American-Mexican boundary lines. The Mexicans immediately took the defensive and ifien. Ampudia met Taylor's army April 25. May 13 congress declared war. <br> In February, 1847, Gen. Winfle!d Scott, veteran of the war of 1812. succeeded Taylor at the head of the army in Mexico. March 9, 1847, he landed a force of 12,000 men at Vera Cruz, Twenty days later the city sarrandered. The battles of Cerro Gordo, Puebla and Contreras and other engagements led the commander in chief of the United States forces to Mexico City and with | national palace Septembr 14. The fall of Chapultepec ended the Mexican war. <br> The war took from Mexico and gave to the United States the states of Cal fornia, Nevada, Utah, Arizona and parts of New Mexico and Colorado.
