FIGHT THE WORMS.

President Dew of the Commercial Club Offers Valuable Suggestions and Help.

Mills county has the best prospects for a full cotton crop we have had in years, and the late rains almost insure it; holding all the bolls the plants put on, but as is always the case with continued cloudy weather and cool nights, through the month of August we are likely to be bothered more or less with the leaf worm working on the cotton, especially in low places, and if they get much headway are liable to materially reduce the final output in this line. After the crop is this far advanced, it is folly to let the worms spoil the yield, and with the expectation that some one would be interested in combating their ravages, we have asked the department of agriculture to give us the benefit of the most approved plan of handling this pest, and have this letter from Mr. F. B. Paddock, Assistant State Entomologist.

To control the Cotton caterpillar, or leaf worm, it has been found out from experience that powdered arsenate of lead, as a dust spray is best. It is best applied by spreading two sacks from the end of a pole which is carried on horse back down the cotton rows. The amount to be applied depends on the size of the cotton, usually from 2 to 5 pounds per acre. This poison should not be mixed with any other material. It is not advisable to use it as a liquid spray. Powdered arsenate of lead will not blister the people or the horse that comes in contact with it in spraying the cotton. Paris green is liable to burn the cotton foliage and stop its fruiting, but if it is used it should be diluted or mixed with lime or flour 1½ pounds of paris green to 15 or 20 pounds of slaked lime, dusted on through a ducking sack will usually kill the worms and save the crop, on each acre. It frequently occurs that the first crop of worms cover just a small plot in the field

and if they are poisoned at once it reduces the cost and saves the crop. If allowed to remain they multiply fast and the field is soon covered.

The fight on the worms should not be delayed. Poison applied to the Cotton plant usually takes its effects in about 10 days and no further danger is liable to man or stock after that time unless an unusual amount was applied which is not necessary.

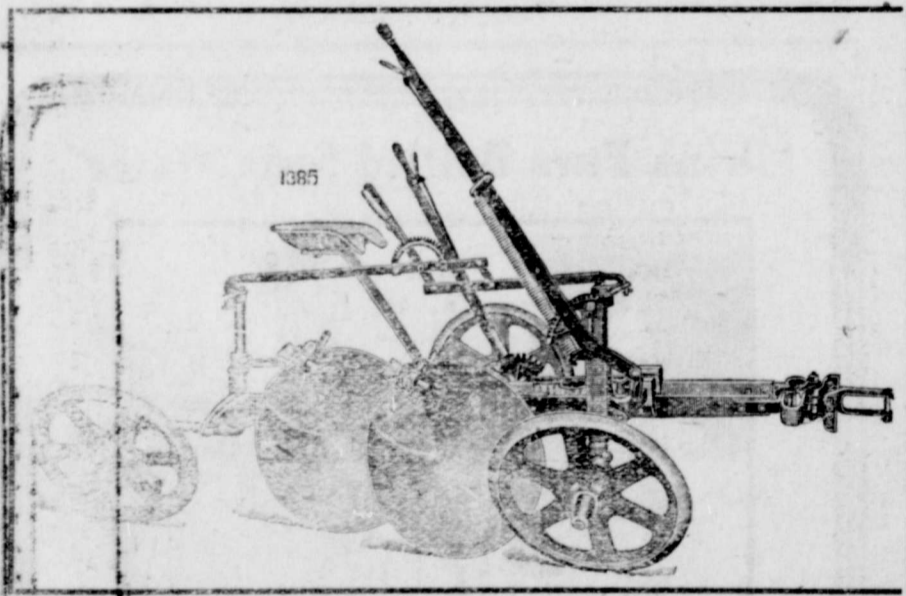

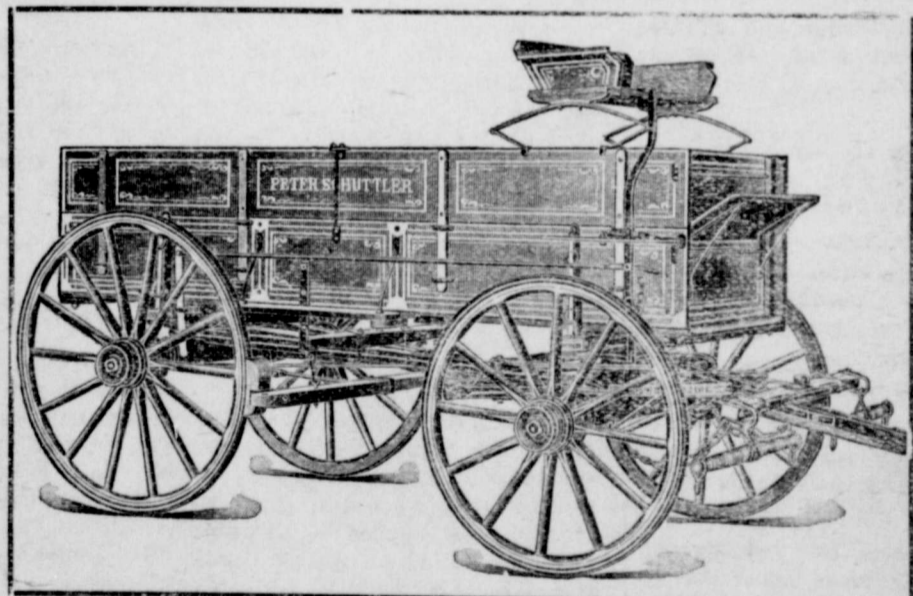

The railroads have asked the railroad commission for authority to increase freight rates 15 per cent and the commission is to hear evidence on the proposition. If the increase is allowed it will amount to \$5,000,000 to the shippers of Texas and will increase the railroad earnings to that extent.

Governor Colquitt has called a special session of the legislature to convene next Monday, Aug. 24, to enact a law, providing for public bonded warehouses, in order that the cotton crop of the state may be properly housed and held for suitable market conditions. In the call a provision is made for the consideration of other matters that may be submitted by the governor.

Japan this week "kicked into" the war by issuing an ultimatum to Germany to withdraw from Kiauchau, China, and deliver the territory to Japan to be returned to China, also demanding that German battle-ships leave Chinese and Japanese waters. Such an ultimatum would never have been promulgated by the little brown men had the German empire been free from entanglements and this action will not likely be of lasting benefit to Japan.

The contest of W. P. Lane for nomination for congressman-at-large was to have been heard by the Democratic executive committee at Austin yesterday, but the finding has not been made known. Mr. Lane's contention is that he received more votes than Mr. McLemore, but the failure of seven county chairmen to make reports in the time required by the law prevented their reports being considered by the state convention and the returns in possession of the convention, exclusive of the seven counties, showed a majority for McLemore. If his contention proves correct he will undoubtedly be awarded the nomination, either by the committee or the courts, for the failure of a county chairman to do his duty will not be allowed to change the result of an election.

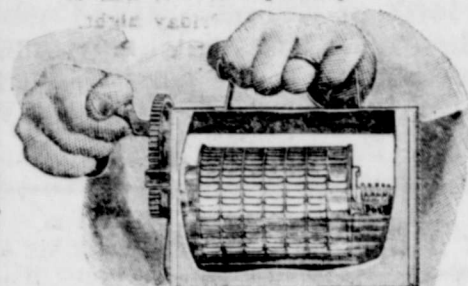

The first bale of 1914 cotton brought to this market was grown by J. O. Taylor of Rock Springs community. It was brought in Tuesday afternoon and ginned at the Greathouse gin that evening. When placed on the market Wednesday, McKinley-Corrigan Co. bought it at 10 1/2 cents per pound. The bale weighed 404 pounds and was of good class.

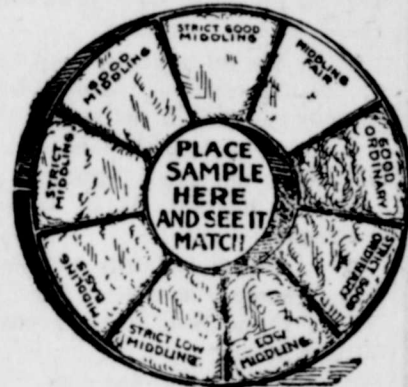



KILLING IN BROWNWOOD

Late last Friday afternoon, J. S. Arnold, with a shot gun, shot and killed Virgil Algood and his uncle, Frank Algood, as the latter two men were driving in a buggy near the gin in the Woolf Valley neighborhood. At the time of the shooting Arnold was on the ground a short distance from the Algoods. Following the shooting Arnold was taken into custody by Constable McBride of May, who brought his prisoner to Brownwood and lodged him in jail. Arnold refused to discuss the killing.

J. E. Arnold is president of the Brown county Farmers' Union, and has lived near May for the past seventeen years. He is 59 years old, and has a family of six children, four girls and two boys. The Algoods are also highly respected citizens, living in the Hopewell community, this county. It is understood that the unwritten law will be used by the defense in the killing of Virgil Algood, while Arnold maintains that the killing of Frank Algood was entirely unintentional.

An examining trial was held in Brownwood Thursday at which no testimony was offered beyond that taken at the inquest. Mr. Arnold was admitted to bail in the sum of \$5,000, which was readily given.—Brownwood Bulletin.

THE MEXICAN SITUATION.

The evident determination of Gen. Carranza, the new provisional president of Mexico, to ignore Gen. Villa in the organization of the new cabinet and the control of the government will likely lead to a new revolution in that blood stained country. It is doubtful if the populace would be willing for Villa to be robbed of the glory of his victory, even though he would willingly submit to the outrage by those whose success was made possible by his bravery and good management. But for Villa Mexico would still be ruled by the villainous and brutal murderer Huerta and the whole world must give the credit to Villa for the overthrow of the bloody beast. If Gen. Villa is forced to institute another revolution, he will have the sympathy of the nations of the earth as well as the support of the people of Mexico. The only reason Carranza could have for ignoring Villa and attempting to rob him of his victory is the knowledge that he is not the equal of the constitutionalist leader and fears the popularity of Villa causing his political overthrow.

THE WAR IN EUROPE.

The European war is holding the attention of the world and the progress of the armies is watched with unabated interest everywhere. President Wilson has issued a proclamation to the people of this nation urging them to remain neutral in thought and speech, but in this he asks an impossibility. Every thinking person has ideas and sympathies that must find expression and few will heed the president's advice. The outcome of the war cannot be foretold even by the wisest heads, for the fortunes of war have always been uncertain and in this case the end can surely not be seen and to prophesy of the result will only be an expression of the desire of the prophet. The overwhelming odds against which Germany is fighting places that nation at a decided disadvantage, but the apparent success of the kaiser's troops to this time indicates the overcoming of these odds. The only assistance that great country has had from the other nations of Europe so far has been the feeble efforts of the Austrians, but this has been of little benefit. There have been no battles between the fleets as far as known, but the expelling of war correspondents from the battlefields prevents authentic reports from the scenes of conflict and the reports that are received by authority of the English centers are largely imaginary on the part of the correspondents.

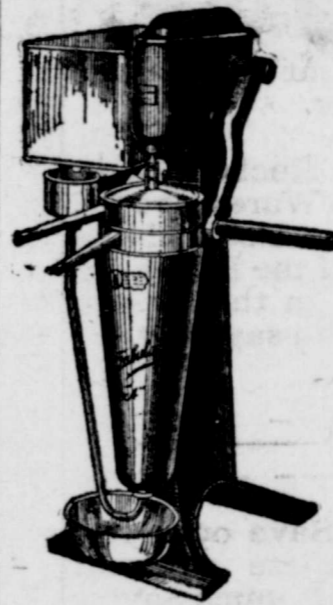

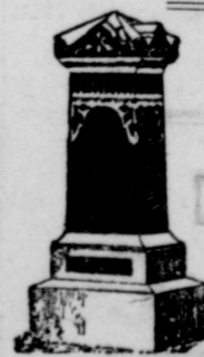
