PRIZES FOR GRAIN CROP

To encourage the movement for a reduction of next year's cotton acreage, and for the information of the farmers of the state in order that they may prepare their land now, the Texas Industrial Congress announces its intention to offer prizes next year for the best yields, cost of production considered, on not less than five acres cultivated in wheat, oats, barley, and perhaps rice.

Because of their value for winter pasture and in preventing surface washing, and also because of their low cost of cultivation as compared with cotton, these grains are nearly as profitable as cotton in ordinary times, and are certain to be more profitable than an overproduction of cotton, in view of the European war situation. Small grains afford an admirable substitute for cotton on much of the land cultivated in cotton this year, and which, if the acreage is at all reduced, might not otherwise be utilized. The European war assures splendid prices for feedstuffs of all kinds, and the farmer who plants winter wheat and other small grains this fall can count upon getting good prices, such as have not been realized for a number of years.

The abundant recent rains have insured enough moisture in the ground to start the prompt growth of all grain crops, and there can be no better possible preparation of the soil for them than the cultivation which the land has received in growing this year's cotton crop. Grain does best when sown upon a firm seed bed that has been deeply prepared sufficiently in advance of the sowing to have become firmly settled. This is just the condition in which the cultivation of cotton has left the ground. The farmers may reasonably expect, therefore, a good yield of wheat, oats, or barley planted now in the middles between the cotton. This can be done with any of the

drills made especially for that purpose, or by running a bull-tongue through the middles, making about four furrows, sowing the seed in these furrows and then covering them with a harrow, or the seed may be sown broadcast and then covered with a harrow. Where this method is used not less than 2 bushels of oats and a half bushel less of wheat should be sown; if the drill is used about one half the quantities is sufficient.—Industrial Congress.

"BUY-A-BALE" REMINDERS

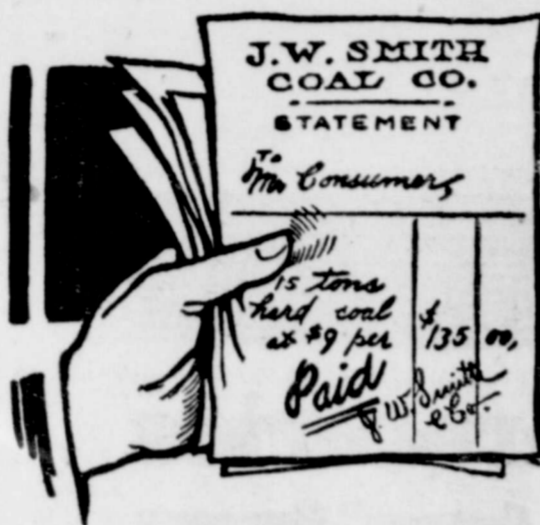

A schooner with fifty or more passengers aboard was wrecked in a storm off the coast of Oregon last Friday and only a few of those on board were rescued.

A special term of federal court has been held at Amarillo this week by Judge Meek to clear the docket of carried-over cases before the September term of the court begins at that place.

The interest of the reading public is still with the European war and little else is read about or thought about, if one may judge by the subjects of conversation heard everywhere.

Plans are being formulated for the reclamation of 50,000 acres of fertile land in the Brazos bottoms by means of levees. Districts are to be formed and bonds issued to secure funds to build the levees.

Governor Colquitt called a special session of the legislature to convene at Austin this week to consider the state banking bill outlined by him some days ago. There is great opposition to the measure and it is not likely to be adopted until it has been very carefully considered by the lawmakers, if it is enacted into a law at all.

Pastor Russell of New York, head of the "Bible Students Society" delivered a lecture in Fort Worth Sunday in which he made the prediction, or rather the statement, that the European war would close by the end of the present year, at which time the reign of Christ on the earth would begin. He claims that a spirit of brotherly love will continue for a thousand years from this time.

The buy-a-bale movement has undoubtedly been of much benefit to the cotton growers and has strengthened the market greatly, but it has also given many business concerns an opportunity to get considerable free advertising. The difference between the market value of the cotton and the 10 cents a pound price is not a high price to pay for the immense amount of advertising some of these purchasers have received.

General Villa, the distinguished leader of the constitutionalist forces in the late war in Mexico, has sent a message of congratulation to President Wilson for the determination to remove the United States forces from Vera Cruz. In the message he firmly states that there is not antagonism between the constitutionalist leaders in Mexico and states that the relations between himself and Gen. Carranza are cordial.

The Eagle has received a copy of the Chinese Almanac, published by Rev. H. G. Hallock, an independent missionary in Shanghai, China. The pamphlet is printed wholly in the Chinese language and we suppose is filled with interesting facts and figures. We also presume it has a large circulation and it is apparently well filled with what is evidently well-written advertisements of business concerns either in China or some where else. We certainly appreciate the kindness of the reverend gentleman in favoring us with a copy of his publication.

A proposition has been submitted to congress by a number of Southern congressmen, headed by Congressman Henry, to authorize the loan of \$500,000,000 to cotton farmers by the government at the rate of \$35 per bale. These gentlemen claim that the emergency currency recently authorized is being used for selfish ends by the bankers, instead of giving assistance to the farmers. While the plan may not be acceptable to the government, it at least proves that these congressmen are using their best endeavors to find a solution for the financial difficulties of the country and they are entitled to the gratitude of the people everywhere.

Lightning set fire to a number of oil tanks at Port Arthur Sunday and a large amount of oil was lost.

A conference of governors is to be held in Washington Monday to discuss ways and means for securing a reduction of the cotton acreage in the southern states in 1915. The proposition to levy a tax of 10 cents per pound on all cotton raised in excess of a stipulated amount is one of the subjects to be discussed.

Nothing is really impossible except getting the traditionalist to see that the impossible is not impossible at all. Ideas gain ground slowly, but they gain, and the men who clear the pathway for others to tread are of course misunderstood, misrepresented and often maligned. But they are not stopped in their course, and sooner or later their ideas get to be accepted, their plans are put into effect, and the world moves on to another stage of progress. Those who obstruct are swept aside.—State Press.

The spirit of criticism and fault finding grows in the heart with great rapidity. It is much easier to cultivate than the spirit of consideration and love. Much of our criticism is unjust and frequently is unkind. We have failed to take into consideration all the facts connected with the act or the attitude of the person whom we criticize. Perhaps at the same time that we are finding fault or uttering criticism our own life or conduct may be as justly criticized as the life of the one whom we are criticizing or with whom we are finding fault. Kindness, consideration, and love should characterize every citizen.—Journal and Messenger.

Some people will make a bill and when the collector comes around to collect it they will swell up and tell him that it is wrong and almost insult him about the matter. This is not the right spirit and if a man is particular about being asked to pay his bills he should not make any accounts, but should pay cash as he goes. Of course there is a chance for a mistake to occur in a man's account, but the right way to do is to tell the collector in a polite way that you believe that there must be a mistake in it. Be pleasant when you are paying your bills and thus make the bill collector's life more pleasant.—Jacksonville Progress.

The administration has decided to appeal officially to the public to help maintain existing conditions. The public cannot fail to respond. The only danger is one which it may create itself. Its course is simple. All it has to do is to sit tight, to do nothing to disrupt the fortunate conditions in which this country happily finds itself. Don't rock the boat—that's the central idea! The swell from the great battle ship, "Europe" will be felt, but it will not hurt us. It need not even break over the sides. There's nothing the matter with the boat that we are in. Straight and strong, well-seamed, well-caulked, well-timbered, with reasonable guidance it will bear us safely and prosperously thru. Don't rock the boat! Keep its head well up against the sea! Don't let it get into the trough of the waves! Let every man realize that at this moment calm confidence and calm thankfulness are the first duty. They are absolutely justified by the favorable situation in which we find our selves. They are the certain guarantee of a continuance of those conditions.—Chicago Herald.

We think that the average and that include nearly all of us, would do well to quit thinking and talking about the war. The European war is not affected by street-corner discussions in Weatherford. The price of cotton is not going to advance merely because we need the money. Time is the most important element in the present situation and the man who can wait and work is the one who will win. Before the bulk of our crop is gathered the war may be brought to a close. But of this we may be sure, that everything in the way of food stuff that we can produce will be in demand at a good price. And preparations should be made now for a complete change in our methods of farming. Forewarned is forearmed and certainly we have been forewarned not to plant a big cotton crop in 1915.—Weatherford Democrat.

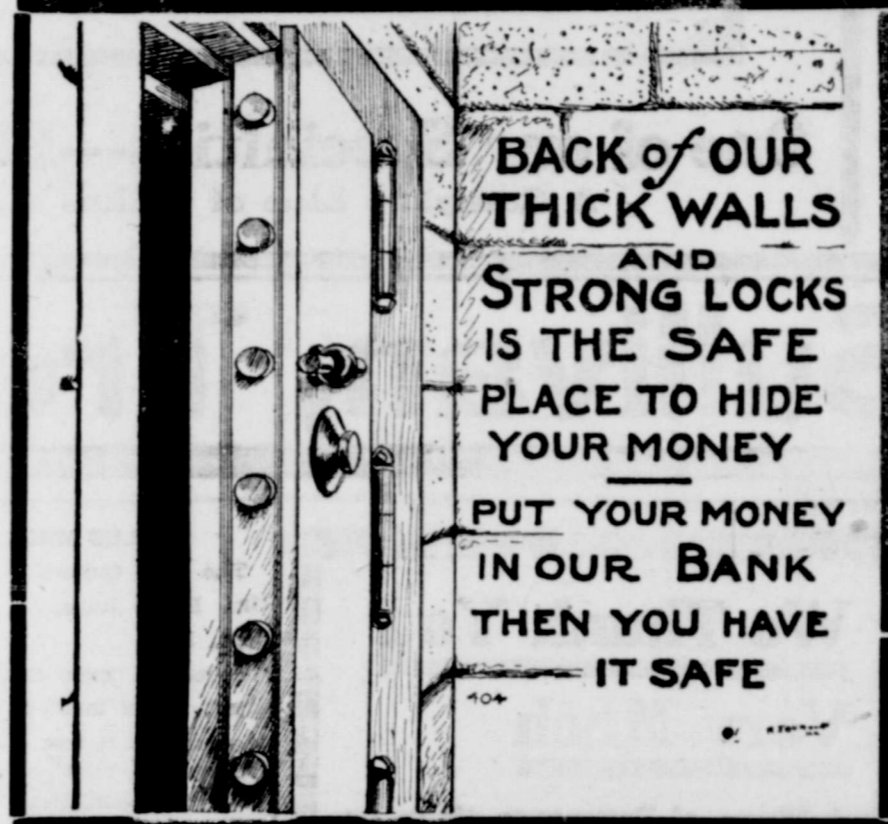
Rainfall at Goldthwaite from Sept. 1 to Sept. 23 2.00 in.



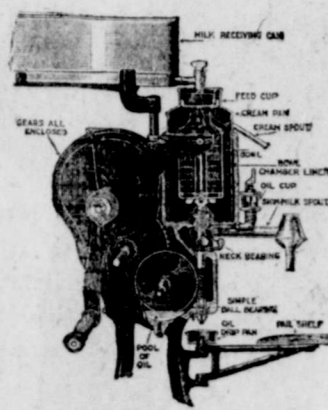

The European war continues with unabated fury and neither side can claim a victory or anything indicative of a victory. The final result cannot be foreseen and opinions are divided as to the probable outcome. In France the allies and Germans are facing each other in a battle line more than 100 miles long and have been in the same position for almost two weeks. Both sides claim to be effecting great slaughter in the ranks of their adversaries, but the probabilities are that the result of the terrible battle has been by no means one sided. Both sides have lost heavily and from their location and equipment it is certain that they will both continue to lose heavily, while a change in location would likely be of little benefit to either side. On the Russian frontier and in Austria-Hungary the Germans and Austrians appear to be holding their own against the Russians, while great destruction of life is reported wherever engagements have been recorded. The ending of the war can not be even imagined at this time, for all of the hostile nations claim good prospects for final victory.

Secretary McAdoo states that he has been much surprised and disappointed over the manner in which the banks are disbursing the emergency currency and he has denied the application of some banks for additional currency on that account. Just how he expects the banks to disburse the currency is not clear. It is unreasonable to say they are hoarding the money for the simple satisfaction of having it in their vaults, when they could loan it to the people and relieve distressed conditions. Bankers, as a rule, are good business men and as such they would not likely be guilty of such childish acts. The necessity for security for loans has not been reduced because of the issuance of the currency and it is but reasonable to suppose that the bankers will continue to demand sufficient collateral for funds they disburse. To expect them to do otherwise is unreasonable and will hardly have the effect of changing the requirements.

Scarcely had the ink dried on the paper on which was written the declaration that Gen. Villa and Gen. Carranza were firm friends when the announcement was made that Villa had denied Carranza's right to be chief officer of Mexico and was in open revolt. Perhaps their differences will be arbitrated, but at the present time the outlook is for another revolution in Mexico.
