#### TRUTH STRANGER THAN FICTION

Our correspondent from Owl Creek furnishes us an item that for its remarkable nature, surpasses anything that we have ever read—and impresses that indeed truth is stranger than fiction.

Mr. and Mrs. Turner of that community went to the field one day last week to pick cotton. Mrs. Turner commenced picking while Mr. Turner went further on to some turn rows along side some stubble. Soon he heard his wife screaming for him to come to her. Responding promptly on reaching her he found her on her knees on the cotton sack grasping with a large rattle snake—it having ten rattles. The snake had made its way between her skirts and had reached her waistline before it was discovered. Dropping on her knees and holding it tight, she prevented it biting her. About six or eight inches of the snake was exposed. Turner put his hand on the body of the snake and cautiously moved it up until he reached his head then he seized it with a death grip about the neck, the snake began to rattle and coiled many times about his arm, but he held on to it and freed Mrs. Turner from a position in which the least slip must have meant her death and perhaps his, too. Being released Mrs. Turner gathered some large rocks, these being placed close at hand, Mr. Turner freed his arm and threw the snake from him in a partially dazed condition and proceeded to kill it. 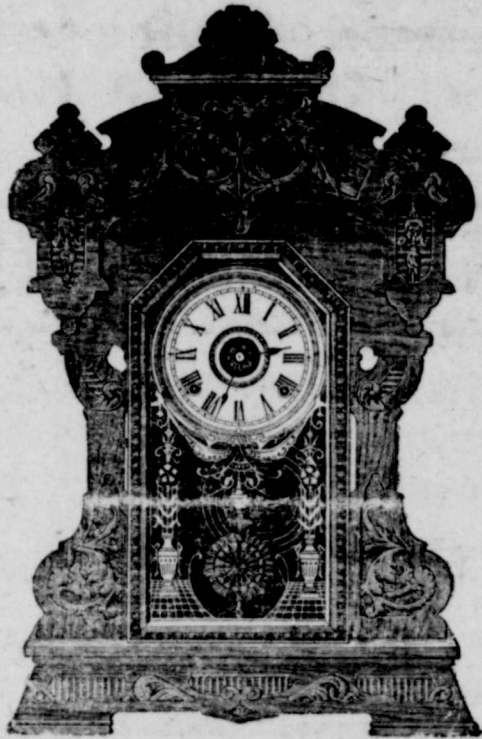

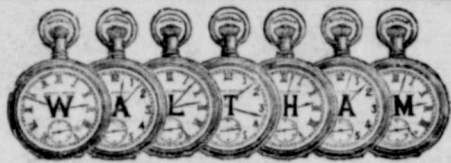

The regional reserve banks will open Nov. 16, which is the date set by Secretary of the Treasury McAdoo.

A Waco manufacturer has received an order for \$100,000 worth of saddles and harness of the warring nations of Europe, and a San Antonio firm is to supply \$250,000 of the same line of goods.

A report from Naples says that Mount Vesuvius is again in eruption and the inhabitants of that vicinity have become greatly alarmed. The last serious eruption of Mount Vesuvius occurred in the spring of 1906 when about 500 persons were killed and fifty thousand rendered homeless. The property loss was estimated at \$20,000,000.

The papers are having quite a lot of fun at the expense of Congressman Slayden for having been found "jay walking" by a policeman in San Antonio. Most of the cities make it a penalty to cross the streets at points other than the regular crossings, but probably Washington allows them to cross wherever they like.

In reality, there is mighty little European "war news" received in this country that is based on facts and the probabilities are that the most of us are badly misinformed on the progress of events in the war zone. The warring countries maintain a strict censorship and allow only such reports sent out as are favorable to their side.

The Temple Telegram announces the death at San Antonio of W. B. Glass, who was formerly foreman of the Santa Fe at Goldthwaite, Brownwood and Temple. He has been unable to work for a year. His widow, a sister of Greg McGregor, and two children survive him. It was the privilege of this writer to have known Billie Glass, and he was a fine workman and a good man in every sense of the word. The body was buried at Temple.—Lampasas Leader.

An appeal to the leading farmers of each cotton-growing community in Texas, and especially to men prominent in farmers organizations in the South is contained in a little pamphlet just issued by the A. & M. college. The substance of the appeal is for co-operation in securing a substantial reduction in the cotton acreage next year. The bulletin is constructive in that it suggests, indeed, it minutely itemizes a-rea-ges that can be put in certain crops to take the place of cotton acreage, and secure the farmer larger returns.

The recent decision of the higher court holding that liquor could be shipped from points outside the state into prohibition territory has caused a great deal of speculation in the minds of many as to its result on prohibition. Some have even thought liquor could be shipped from Texas points and orders solicited in prohibition territory, which of course is not the case and the attorney general again this week announced that the publisher of a newspaper, carrying liquor advertisements in prohibition territory is liable to criminal prosecution.

The conditions in Mexico are far from being settled, although indications have been for a peaceful termination of the war or wars in that country. The trouble appears to be that all of the leaders and many who have not heretofore evidenced any leadership want to be president of the nation. They do not agree to wait their turn or take their chances at the polls, but they want to shoot their way into power. Any one of the factions can be satisfied by making their leader president, but he must then deal with all the other aspirants at the head of a rebellion. The trouble in the governmental affairs will never be settled until a strong man like former President Diaz appears and rules the country with the same system that Diaz ruled it.

SUNDAY

Editor Eagle:

It is evident that many do not know the object nor advantages of having one day in every seven days for a Sabbath Day. Every requirement the Creator has made of the human family is designed to be a blessing to man. Every violation of such requirement must sooner or later result in hurt to the violator.

If in the Book of books we have a God given Sabbath, it certainly is of great value to the individual who properly observes the day and it is also true that many frequently get on seriously dangerous ground.

There is something fundamental connected with the doctrine of the Lord's Day. Whatever may be the opportunities or attainments of any community if the Sabbath is desecrated the morals of that community will become low and bad.

There are physical reasons, mental reasons and moral reasons for the observance of Sunday but the present purpose is to treat the subject briefly from a moral standpoint. A friend recently received a letter from a citizen of a western county in which it was stated that some of the people there had been caring for hay on Sunday and others had been ginning cotton. One knows without investigation that the morals of such a county are fearfully bad. Really no one can use any part of Sunday for temporal reasons and justly claim to be a moral person. Working on Sunday in the grain fields or with live stock, indulging in games of sport and riding Sunday trains are things which lower the morals of the country and undermine the religion of the Bible. It is a dangerous sign to see so many with small ideas and little care of the Lord's Day. In these times the pulpit is not teaching sufficiently on the matter. The religious press is not strong enough on it, and parents are neglecting to teach it in the home as it should be taught. Abraham Lincoln from a patriotic heart, prophesied truly when he said "As we keep or break the Sabbath day, we nobly save or meanly lose the last and best hope by which man rises."

Again, it is dishonest to appropriate for selfish ends or personal gain a part of the time which God has sanctified as His. A beggar calls at some good man's home for charity. After hearing the beggar's sorrowful story the man gives the dependent beggar six dollars, reserving for himself only one dollar. While the good man sleeps the beggar rises and steals the one remaining dollar. How mean and low such a deed of theft! Why is it not equally bad to do God thus? We read that "They greatly polluted my Sabbaths and I said I will pour my fury upon them."

Some one has truly said "He that has no Sabbath has no conscience and he that has no conscience has no God."

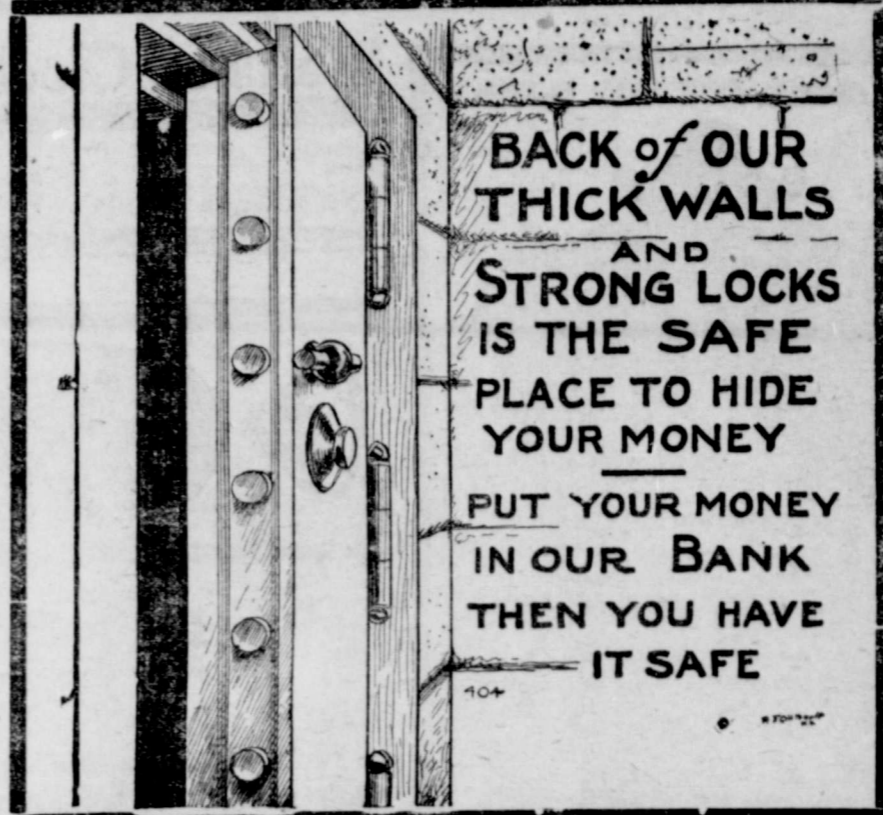

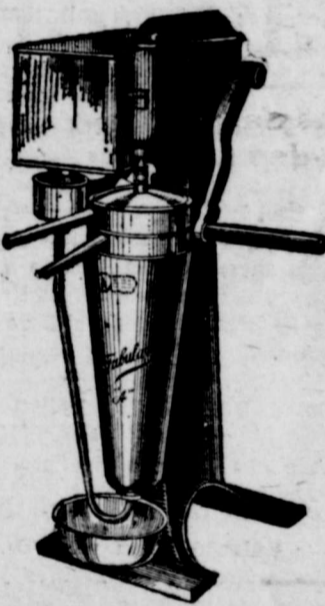
