The preliminary report of the department of agriculture of the national government shows the farm crops of the United States to be worth a hundred million dollars more than the crops of this country last year. This does not indicate "hard times" either for the farmer or the people engaged in other lines of work or business.

Two granite shafts have been erected in the Alamo court at San Antonio as monuments to the heroes of the alamo. These shafts are gifts from Prof. Shiza of Japan, who came in person to San Antonio to present the monuments to the people of Texas and be present at their dedication. The granite came from Nagashino, Japan, which place is known as the alamo of Japan.

A copy of the first issue of the Texas Journalist, published by the school of journalism of the University of Texas, has been received at this office and is filled with good things for the newspaper workers and the general public. The paper is a model of typographical neatness and gives evidence of editorial ability. The master, hand of Hon. Will H. Mayes, chief of the department of journalism in the University, will guide the destinies of the new publication.

The Fort Worth Stock Yards Company has arranged to supply any individual or community desiring them high-grade registered hogs at the lowest possible price and ship them immunized against cholera. Several communities, Pecos, San Angelo and Fort Stockton, notably, have taken of this opportunity. In each of those towns the business men organized a finance committee and invited every farmer who would engage in hog raising to make application. Every application was passed on by the finance committee, that is, the ability of the applicant to care for the hogs as well as his ability to discharge the obligation incurred, were inquired into. Applications for a car load were made, and the finance committee ordered a car load, paying for the consignment out of the fund to which they were the contributors and taking as their security the notes of the farmers, among whom they were distributed. Here is a simple and feasible way of bringing about an increased production of hogs, which with all meat animals, will command a profitable price for several years to come, and it will profit the farmers to raise them and the business men in every community to give them organized assistance, in the way that the business men of San Angelo, Pecos and Fort Stockton have done.—Dallas News.

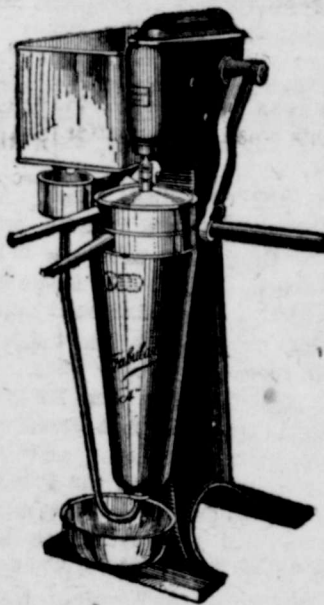

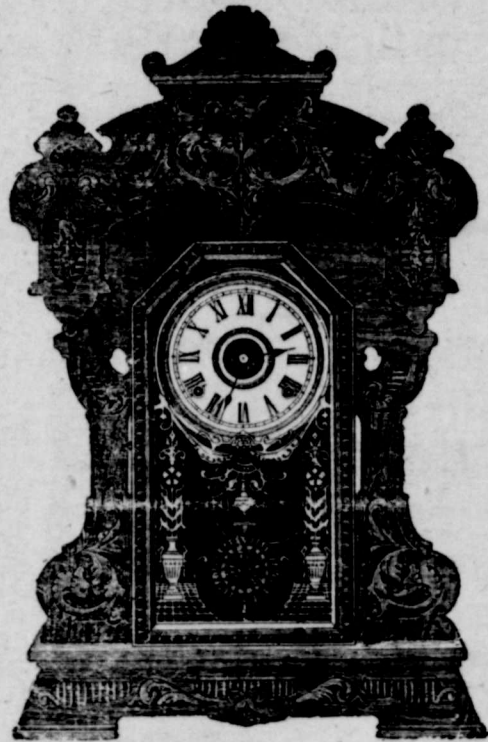

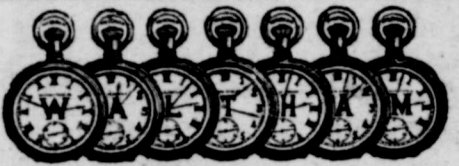

To hoard money like a dog buries a bone is to put oneself in the same class with the canine. And if every canine hoarded it would soon be a case of dog eat dog. Of course if a man has money that he does not owe he is at liberty to bury it if he wants to. But he is not at liberty to bury somebody else's money. It is only by letting live that we live ourselves.

The pay-in-advance plan for newspaper subscriptions used to be considered only possible with daily or semi-weekly papers of state-wide circulation, but in the last few years a number of county papers have tried the plan and none of them have gone back to the slipshod way of sending the paper on forever and getting the pay at any time or no time. In the progress of the newspaper business, as in all other lines, it requires considerable grit to undertake new and advanced plans, but when they have proved to be advantageous everybody is willing to accept them. The time is not far distant when the pay-as-you-go, stop when out plan will be the rule with all newspapers worth the subscription price and a year like the present, when subscription money is almost a curiosity about a newspaper office, will do much to bring about the change and the publishers will then perhaps have more "change" than they are now reputed to have in their keeping.

Perchance we cannot sell our cotton today—it will keep; mayhap we pay more for our flour and meat than of old—we can rejoice that the growers prosper thereby; we may be unable to build the new house just now; we may have to enter losses instead of profits in balancing the work of the year; we may have to deny many necessities as well as luxuries to ourselves and our families. But what boots it if these things be true so long as Heaven blesses us with a fair measure of health, so long as our loved ones are with us and are not being slain on the battlefield, so long as our soil laughs with abundant crops when tickled with the plow, so long as blackened chimneys and countless dead do not mark the sites of our homes, so long as the sun shines and our nation endures, so long as the setting of every sun brings us one day nearer the time when, in the abundant prosperity that shall cover the land, we shall forget the troubles of the present?—Manufacturers Record.

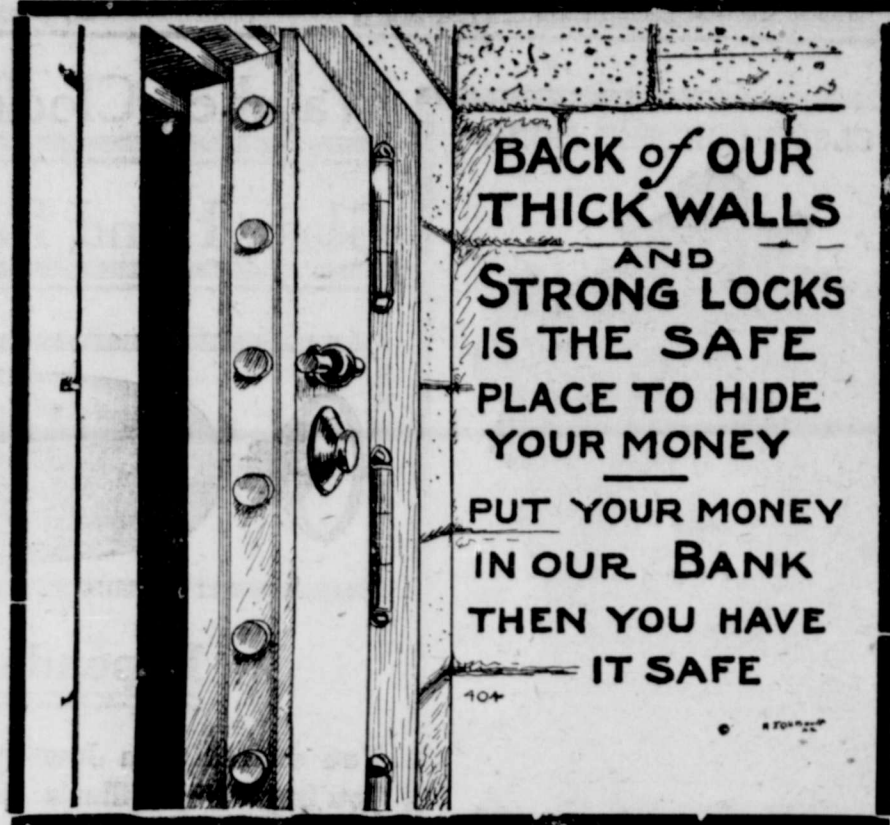



WHEN THE WAR IS OVER

If the European war lasts as long as some predict the United States need have no fear of increased immigration, because there will be no male population to come over and later send back after their female relatives. What few there are left will be in demand to run the mills and factories and work the farms at home. We are not likely either to have to compete with the cheap labor of Europe. Everything will have to be rebuilt and the laboring class is going to be restless and hard to pacify; the cost of living will be greatly increased and the price of money enhanced so that their scale of wages will have to meet the need for labor. The old law of supply and demand is going to make itself felt. The war is making enormous inroads on their supply of labor, and by their destruction increasing the future demand. Thus the demand will far outweigh the supply. And the disbanded soldiers will be hard to persuade to go back and rebuild and start all over gain, and will demand enormous rewards for doing it. When the war is over, the greatest task will just then be begun.—Comanche Chief-Exponent.

CONTRACTS FOR SERVICE

Postmaster General Burleson has recommended that rural mail routes be let to the lowest bidders instead of paying carriers fixed salaries as at present. Mr. Burleson contends that by this change the government can save many million dollars, and he is doubtless correct. But why single out the rural carriers for the bidding system? Men can be found some of them competent, some incompetent, who will take the routes for much less than the carriers are paid now, but the same can be said of railway postal clerks, postoffice helpers, postmasters, congressman and even cabinet officers. If the bidding system is to be used to cut the government expenses, why not use it all along the line? The rural carriers do not receive too much for the service they perform; in fact when the work and responsibilities are taken into consideration their salaries are very low. In our opinion the government should pay what the job is worth, rather than farm positions out to the lowest bidder. But if the bidding system is to be adopted to save expenses, apply it to all employees. A great deal more could be saved through letting positions that carry higher salaries to the lowest bidder than by farming out rural carrier position, which pay a bare living.—Honey Grove Signal.

AGRICULTURAL INSTRUCTION

In connection with its competitive contests next year for the largest net profits per acre from corn, cotton, kaffir, milo, feterita, peanuts, cowpeas, wheat, oats, barley, baby beeves and hogs, the Texas Industrial Congress is planning to offer prizes in a home gardening contest in town and country.

The plan contemplates conducting the contest as far as possible, in connection with the city and country schools, although boys and girls not attending school will be enrolled. Dr. P. P. Claxton, of the United States bureau of education, is strongly in favor of gardening in connection with the schools, saying that with proper direction the average child can produce on an eighth of an acre from \$50 to \$100 worth of vegetables, adding "more to the support of the family than could be purchased with the same child's wages, working in factory, shop or mill." Dr. Claxton also says that "if children can contribute to the family's support while in school, it will make it possible for them to attend three or four years longer than they now do," a consideration of great importance in Texas where so small a proportion of children graduate in the high school studies.

Agricultural instruction in the Texas rural schools is in a more or less formative stage, and the aim is, or should be, to work toward a better development in this respect. The Texas Industrial Congress very much desire that its home gardening contest shall prove of benefit in bringing this result about.
