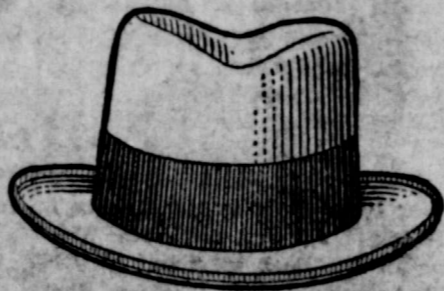

Most of these money orders go to the mail order houses of the north and east, which not only demand cash, but demand something that they know is worth one hundred cents on the dollar before the goods are shipped. A town whose people send their cash to the mail order house and give their credit business to the home merchant is in a fair way to fall. NO MEETING HELD

Rain Prevented Commercial Club Session Tuesday Night.

Every taxpayer is interested in this matter and should attend the meeting of the club and discuss the proposition.

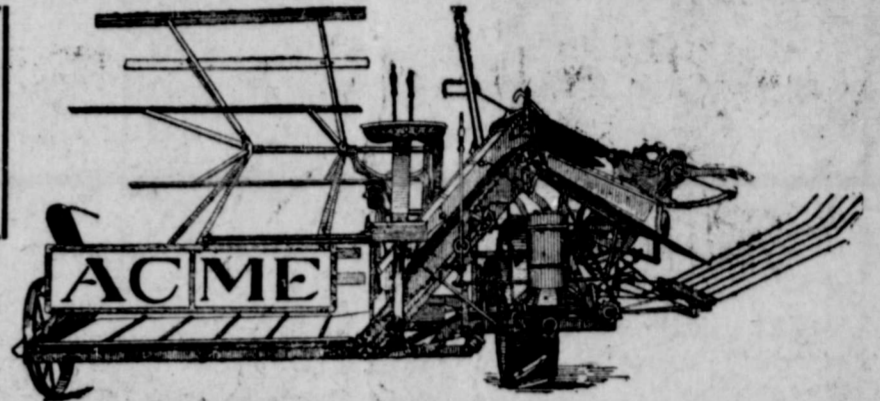

FIRE AT BROWNWOOD

Fire was discovered Wednesday morning between 4 and 5 o'clock in the R. M. and Arthur Low buildings on Center avenue, and by 6:30 the two buildings had been gutted by the flames. The Palace cafe and confectionery, the Queen theatre, the Modern Woodmen hall, the Fad Studio and the Art Shop are the sufferers in addition to the owners of the buildings. The total loss is estimated at more than \$15,000, partially covered by insurance.

The fire is believed to have been started from the kitchen range in the Palace cafe. Walter Cross, owner of the Palace, stated that the range was practically cold at 12 o'clock Tuesday night when the cafe was closed, and that if there was any fire in the stove it could only have been a very small quantity. There are indications, however, that the fire started from the stove and after running across the floor of the cafe kitchen, ran up the wall and into the second story. Driver Basham of the down town fire wagon says that as he reached the scene of the fire the flames were bursting through the roof.

The buildings in which the fire occurred will be immediately rebuilt or repaired, and it is understood that the Queen theatre and the Palace cafe will also re-establish as soon as possible. Owners of these concerns were unable to announce any plans on account of the confusion following the disastrous fire.—Brownwood Bulletin.

The state of Idaho will prohibit the sale and manufacture of intoxicating liquors within its domain on and after January 1916.

A mine disaster was reported from Thurmond, W. Va., Tuesday, when 180 men were entombed by an explosion in a coal mine.

Notwithstanding the wars in Europe and Mexico, the revenues of this government reached the high water mark for the month of February.

The Texas senate refused to concur in the resolution by the lower house for a sine die adjournment on March 13. It is thought the session will continue until the first of the coming month.

The Brownwood Daily Bulletin has been enlarged from four to eight pages and will hereafter publish a Sunday morning edition. The Bulletin is an excellent paper, carrying Associated Press reports.

The newly discovered oil field at Thrall, between Taylor and Rockdale, bids fair to rival the Beaumont field. While only one gusher has been brought in, there are many "rigs" at work and many more wells will be sunk rapidly.

The New York police claim to have unearthed a plot of anarchists to kill with bombs John D. Rockefeller. And drew Carnegie and other wealthy men in that city. Two men were arrested who it is claimed attempted to blow up St. Patrick's cathedral which was to be the beginning of the wholesale dynamiting and murder.

No matter how one views the European war and whether sympathy goes to the German people or the allies, everybody is glad to see the "unspeakable Turks" overcome and destroyed and the greater destruction of the people and their country the more happiness is engendered among civilized people. The horrible Turkish nation should have been blotted from the face of the earth long ago.

A negro believed to be guilty of the murder of a white man, who was found dead in a garage in Waxahachie Sunday morning, was taken by a mob and a noose had already been adjusted about his neck when officers appeared and induced the mob to turn the negro over to the law. The argument of the officers was that others might be implicated in the crime if the negro could be induced to make a confession. He was hurried to the Dallas jail for safe-keeping.

The state department of education has gathered some figures on the salaries paid school teachers in Texas which will be of interest to teachers at least and perhaps to others. They show that in common school districts and independent districts with fewer than 150 scholars the average annual salary for teachers is, whites \$369.76 and for negro teachers \$266.11; or an average for all teachers \$363.81. In independent districts having a scholastic enrollment of 150 or more, according to the statistics, the average annual pay for white teachers is \$601.03 and for colored \$416.28; or an average for all teachers of \$577.05.

In several of the western states and in the territory of Alaska women enjoy the privilege of the suffrage equally with men at all elections. The first of the states to grant this privilege was Wyoming in 1869, followed nearly a quarter of a century later by Colorado and successively by Utah, Idaho, Washington, Oregon, California, Arizona and Kansas. In Illinois, women have the privilege of voting for all statutory offices, which includes presidential electors and municipal officers, granted by statutory enactment, but they cannot vote for constitutional state offices, members of the legislature or members of congress, since the full suffrage requires a constitutional amendment for its establishment.—San Antonio Express.

The new Marketing Association broke its record here yesterday on shipping hogs. The 25th was the date set for the shipment and all day Thursday the wagon loads of hogs streamed into Comanche. Sales manager Lane was on the ground early and weighed steadily all day and six o'clock in the afternoon found him just weighing the last load. It took four men busy all day weighing and writing orders. The association shipped altogether 449 head of hogs and one car of cattle. They paid out here at the advance price on the hogs \$4,873.00. The four hundred and forty-nine head weighed 99,000 pounds. Sales manager Lane superintended the weighing and accompanied the shipment to Fort Worth. At the same time there were several other cars shipped. Ed Blue of Comanche shipped a car and Loudermilk and Hatley one car; McGinnis Brothers one car. Making a total of ten cars of live stock in one day. Of this the association shipped all but three cars.—Chief.

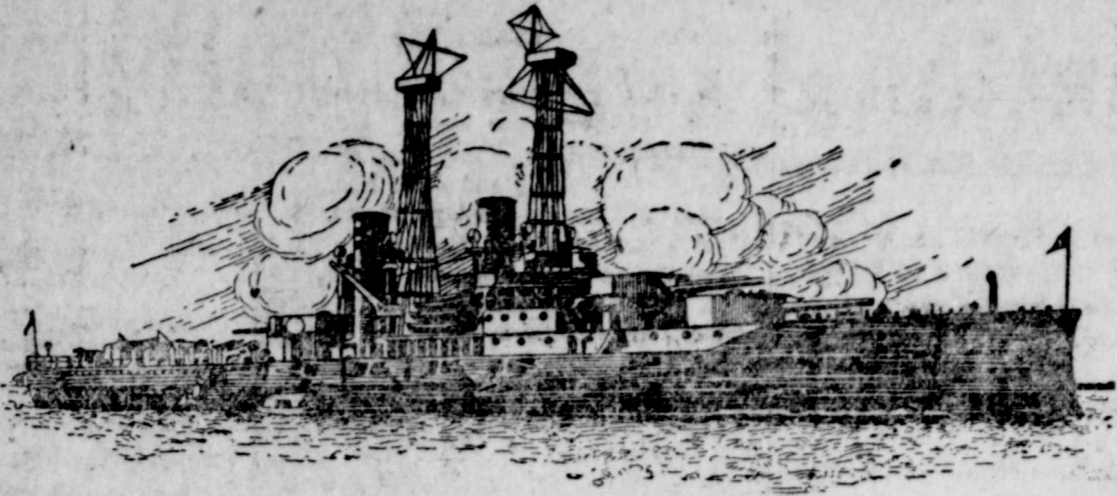

CO-OPERATIVE PLANS

Mr. O. H. Robbins, county farm demonstrator, has received the following letter from the Department of Labor at Washington:

The Post Office Department and the Department of Agriculture are co-operating with the Department of Labor in aid of the plan for the employment and distribution of laborers in the United States; the former through its post-masters, officers in charge of branch post offices; the rural mail carriers; and the latter through its field and other services throughout the United States, among which you are numbered.

The purpose of this plan is to supply labor where required in every section of the Republic, and your assistance is respectfully solicited. Communications from you concerning the necessity for workers in the locality in which you reside and the vicinity thereof are especially desired. The Department of Labor will appreciate your efforts in notifying farmers and other employers of Labor in your neighborhood of the inauguration by said Department, with the co-operation of the Departments above mentioned, for a plan to furnish farm or other labor at all seasons of the year.

In order to enable you to advise both prospective employers and employees desiring to avail themselves of the opportunities presented by said plan, the following explanation of the methods adopted may be of service: Blanks for use of employers desiring help and for persons seeking employment may be had on request from the postmaster, or officer in charge of any branch post office, or rural mail carrier. All application blanks when filled out and signed should be folded and returned to the postmaster or other officers mentioned, whereupon they will be forwarded to the proper officer of the Department of Labor, where they will receive special and prompt attention. When thus returned no postage will be required; otherwise the usual postage will be necessary.

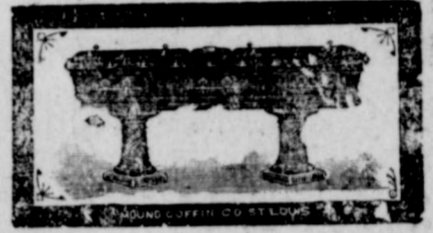

IS IT TRUE?

An Important Matter to Cotton Growers of the South.

A special from Washington, D. C., appears in the daily papers this week relative to "half and half" cotton which is well worthy of investigation by cotton growers. The Eagle has no interest in the matter further than to give information to those who may be sufficiently interested to make an investigation to ascertain if the department report is correct and if the cotton will not be marketable. Perhaps, it is some special kind of "half and half" cotton and not the grade commonly known by that name, but whatever may be the facts, those interested should investigate before planting time. The special referred to reads as follows:

Washington, March 3.—Cotton producers in Oklahoma, Texas and Arkansas were warned today by the department of agriculture against the planting of the "half and half" variety of cotton, which department experts have found "far inferior to cotton ordinarily produced in those sections."

Field tests by the department on numerous varieties have shown that "half and half" does not maintain a high rank in total lint yield per acre. Its lint is of poor character, irregular, waxy and very short, much more of it less than seven-eighths of an inch in length, and untenderable on future contracts under the cotton future law.

The department points out that buyers will penalize it whenever discovered and many interior buyers as well as practically all of the larger cotton firms have declined to handle it at any price. The department's warning says production of the "half and half" variety will be likely to seriously damage the reputation of the markets where grown.

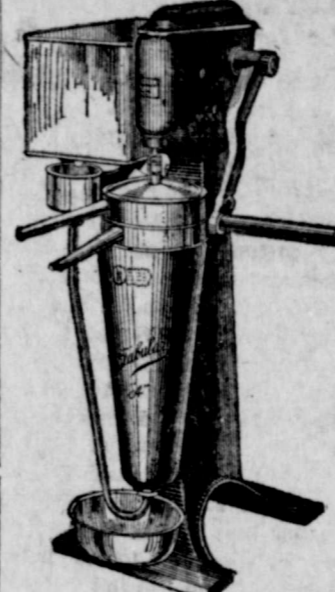
