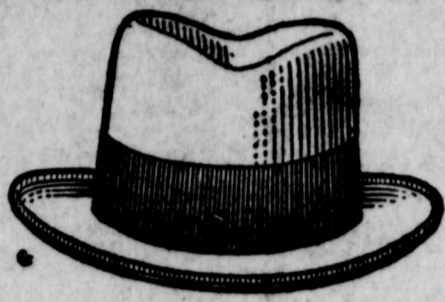

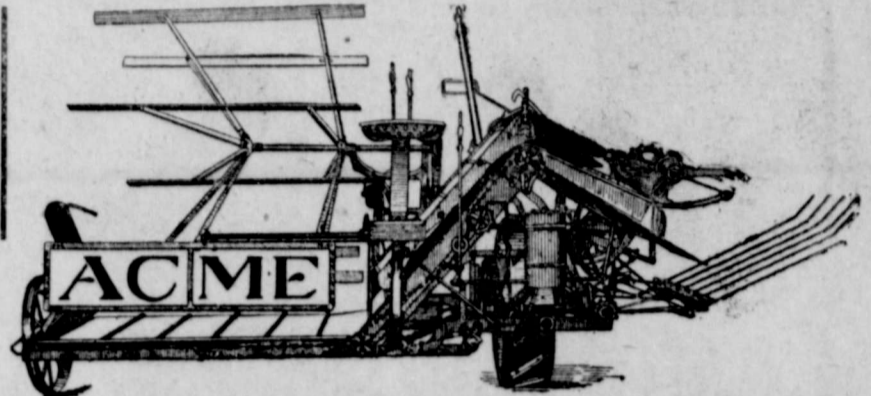

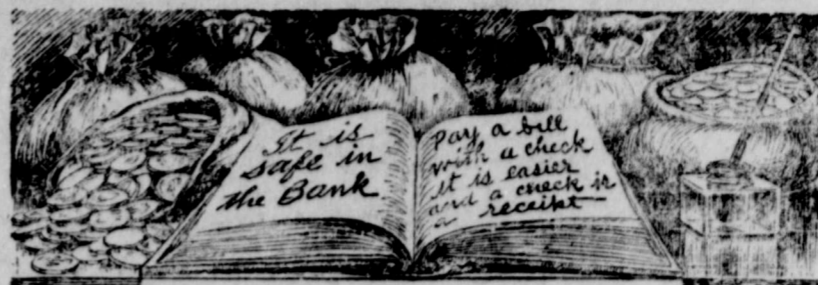

REPORT OF SUNDAY SCHOOL ASSOCIATION

The quarterly meeting of the Mills County Association was held Sunday, March 7, at Mullin.

By reason of cold weather many Sunday school people were not permitted to attend. However, despite this fact, representatives from several communities of various parts of the county were present.

At the morning session, following a preliminary song service, Mr. S. H. Allen was called by Rev. Hunt, who conducted the meeting in general, to speak to the subject "Purposes of the Association." Mr. Allen outlined in a clear cut, vivid way those purposes. He advanced no theories and premises but gave out reasons for the existence of such an organization in a practical, concrete manner. As a great underlying purpose, he said that the association meant to increase the efficiency of the Sunday school in training young men and women for Christian citizenship, in gathering more children to the Sunday school standard and in short, to serve as an aid, protection and a betterment to all the children of this county.

Following this part of the program an address on "The Relation of the Child to the Church," was given by Dr. A. E. Baten, who was preceded by a well rendered solo by Miss Ollie Williams. Dr. Baten's address may well be called a great Sunday school lecture. His lengthy simile, likening the child to the scion or bud grafted into the trunk of the fruit tree, was impressive. As in grafting, he said, just so is the child engrafted into the Christian relationship, insignificant at first but finally to be the best bearing branch.

The afternoon session was largely taken up by a round table discussion, Dr. Baten leading. Many questions, too numerous to mention, were asked and made and much helpful discussion was had. Good singing was had, especially the inspiring quartet music rendered by the Mullin boys.

The Association ended with the annual election of officers. The following were chosen: Prof. A. H. Daniel, president; Frank Bowman, vice-president; and Robert Weaver, secretary.

Close voting took place regarding the place of next meeting, which resulted in selecting Big Valley as place of next Association to be held June 6.

It is hoped that another meeting will be held at Mullin by reason of their ability to entertain their visitors. The visitors enjoyed the care taken of them, not only because the Mullin people know so well how to entertain, but also because they are good people and possess the desire to serve and care for their guests. As was expressed: To be with them is delightful; to dine with them royal.

The wonder is not that so many went to the association, but why more Sunday schools were not represented. There is no reason why every Sunday school in the county should not have some of their members attend the association. It is not only well that every Sunday school teacher should make use of these meetings, but it is a duty if they would be more efficient teachers. It is earnestly desired that all superintendents, teachers and others interested in Sunday school would attend the association in June and to those not interested an invitation is extended to come and become interested. **ROBERT WEAVER,** Secretary.

One of the most successful social events of the season, given in Goldthwaite, was the Cotton Party given by Miss Lillie Martin and Mrs. John C. Hicks, to the Entre Nous Club, their husbands and escorts on the evening of the 19th of Feb. 1915. The party was given at the beautiful and spacious home of Miss Martin and was replete with fun and hearty enjoyment from the time the guests crossed the threshold until they bade the hostesses good night.

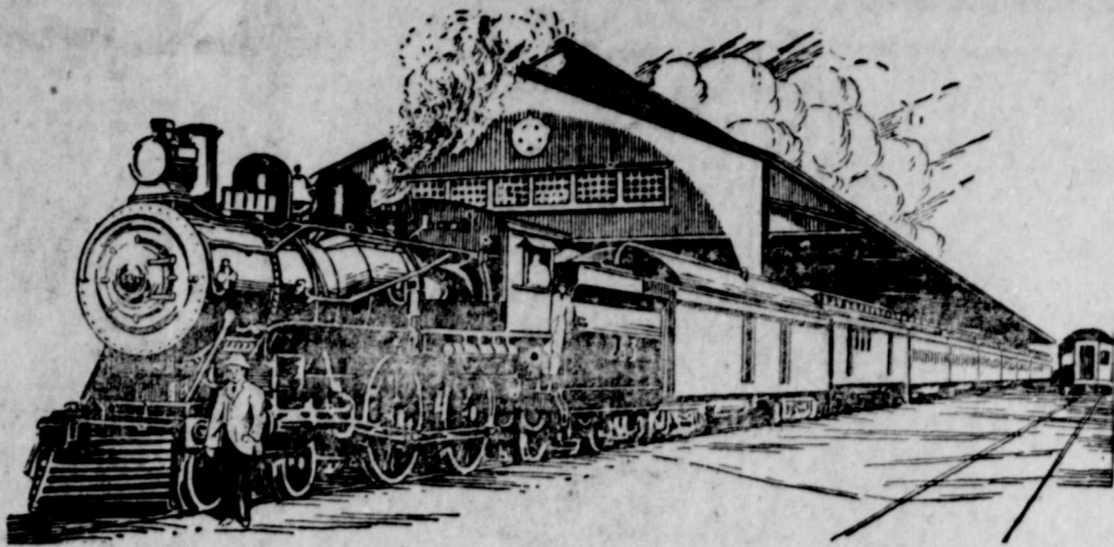
On entering the door, the guests were greeted by the strains of Dixie, rendered by Miss Edna Lowrie. They were there met by an officious colored Butler, Henry (In reality Fritz Martin well disguised) who with all the courtly ceremony of the old time southern servant, ushered them into the cloak room, where their wraps were cared for. They were then conducted into an adjoining room having two tastefully decorated offices in each end, by another colored butler, evidently a brother to Henry who went by the name of Bud and whose features strongly resembled John C. Hicks, but whose dignity was considerably less. This was the inspection department.

Mr. Walter Fairman presided in one office as inspector of the men, while Mrs. Fairman presided in the other as inspector of the ladies.

Each inspector held two kinds of badges, one of white on which the word "loyal" was printed and the other of black bearing the fatal legend "condemned." Most of the men found to their consternation that they were in the condemned class for having failed to wear a tie of cotton and most of the ladies likewise received a black badge for having dared to come to the court of the cotton queen in gowns of anything but cotton.

The guests were then ushered into the parlor by the obsequious butlers and presented to the Cotton Queen on her throne. Mrs. Harry Martin indeed looked a queen. Over her head was suspended a canopy of cotton, and withal no one could doubt her regal state.

After all the guests had been presented to the Queen the order was given for the condemned to pass out of her presence into the sitting room where the doors were closed upon them while the court decided upon their fate. The few loyal ones were permitted to remain with the Queen while the condemned waited in trembling anticipation of what their punishment might be. from Henry and Bud some of them came perilously near to breaking the record.

After the condemned had been properly punished, partners were chosen for the Virginia Reel, in which condemned and loyal were alike permitted to engage. Bits of flowered calico were drawn and matched for partners. Mrs. John C. Hicks played "Turkey in the Straw" while the graceful and beautiful old colonial dance was given. The Queen sat as judge and decided that the most graceful and skilful dancers of the evening were Mrs. J. A. Gillespie and Mr. Owen Yarborough. For their excellence they each received a prize which was a tiny bale of cotton brought in on a tray by Henry and Bud and presented to them. On opening the bales they found them to contain each a large red bandana handkerchief. After this Henry and Bud danced some plain and fancy jigs in the dining room with such success that the guests became more firmly convinced that they had indeed been imported from some Southern plantation of Uncle Tom's Cabin times.

The guests were then invited into the dining room, which they found most ingeniously and appropriately decorated. The dining table was overlaid with a snow white linen cloth and in the center stood a large doll whose dress represented a giant bale of cotton. Her cap also represented an open bale of cotton inverted and placed on her head. 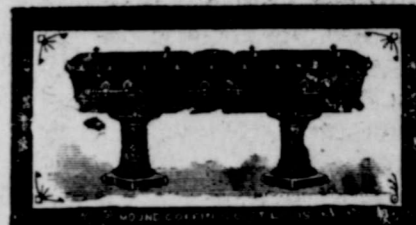

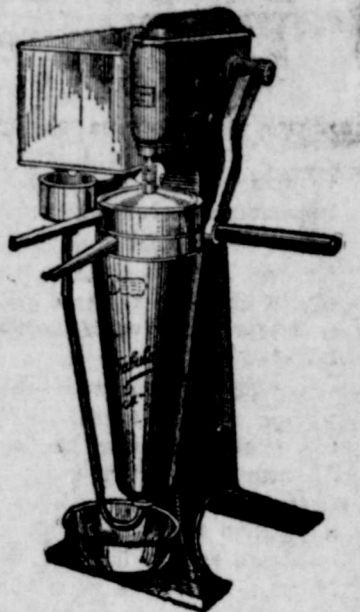

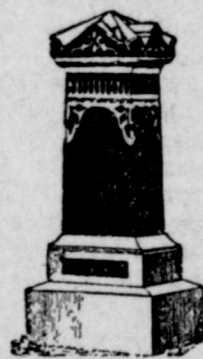
