FIRST BALE

It Arrived Friday night and Was Ginned Saturday.

The first bale of 1915 cotton to be marketed in this city was brought in last Friday night, Aug. 20, and ginned and marketed Saturday morning. On account of the rains during the week the cotton was stained and therefore, made a poor sample and the price was not as good as would have been paid had the cotton been of a better grade.

The bale was brought in by F. R. Carpenter from J. C. Street's farm five miles east of the city. It was ginned by Walter Fairman and bought by McKinley-Corrigan Company at \$3.42 1/2 per 100. It weighed 559 pounds and a premium of \$28.25 was given Mr. Carpenter by the business community.

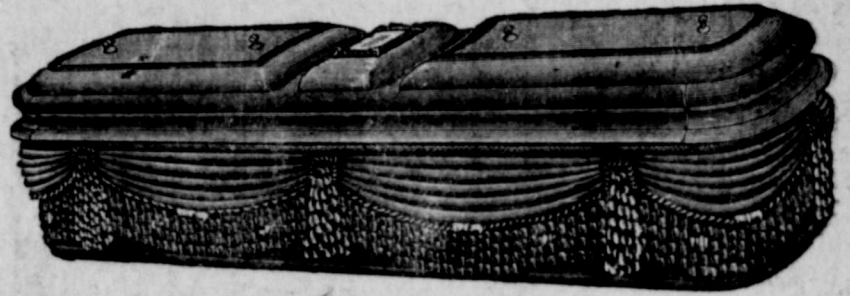

Judging from the start the grand jury at Atlanta, Ga., has made in the Frank lynching case it is useless for any member of the mob to fear inconvenience or annoyance.

Farmers of Nueces county met at Corpus Christi this week and sent out a call for cotton pickers. They stated that 3,000 pickers would be necessary in that county to save the crop from damage and perhaps loss.

Conditions in the coast country have greatly improved this week and the effects of the storm will not likely be so severe as was at first feared. Railroad traffic has been resumed on most of the roads and soon normal conditions will be reached by all roads.

If one mail order house can afford to spend \$8,000 in postage stamps to carry their catalogues to families in all parts of Texas, how much can the manufacturers and jobbers of Texas afford to spend in advertising the merits of the plan to buy it made in Texas?—Fort Worth Record.

It is predicted by Thos. A. Edison, the wizard of electricity, that there will be seven years of prosperity and plenty in the United States, that the European war will close by the end of next year and the prosperity in this country will be even greater after the war than it will be prior to that time.

One of the reasons for the prosperity in Mills county is that a great majority of the people believe in patronizing their home dealers in preference to foreign concerns. True, some still patronize catalog and mail order houses, but their number is growing smaller and time will be when this will be a county of universal home patronage advocates.

Among those who perished in the gulf storm last week were all the members of the Florea family of Richmond except one little girl, who was rescued from drift in the bay. The family had been at Seadrift for the summer and it was there the storm came upon them and they lost their lives. Mr. Florea was editor of the Richmond Coaster and a popular member of the Texas Press association.

It would be as difficult to tell the conditions in Mexico and along the Texas border as it would be to give a correct account of the progress of the European war. Every day the indications are different and the outlook changed and frequently reports on the same day are conflicting. One of the late reports is that Carranza has issued a proclamation of amnesty and many Mexicans are leaving Texas for their native land, but whether they expect to take up arms against this government or join the fighting men against some faction of their countrymen it is not known.

The reports that are being sent out relative to the financial exhaustion of the warring nations of Europe would indicate that the gigantic struggle will have to close before many more months. It is not likely these stories are anything like correct, for each country's statement is sent out by its opponents, which makes it sure that such statement is largely guess work, but reason and a slight knowledge of the financial requirements of such an immense war makes it reasonable to suppose that exhaustion is not far from any of the nations involved.

Advice from Washington is to the effect that the federal government is preparing to assist in financing the cotton crop. One report says: "Treasury officials have made public an announcement by Secretary McAdoo that, in view of the action of the allies in putting cotton on the contraband list he would, if it became necessary, deposit \$30,000,000 more in gold in the Federal Reserve Banks at Atlanta, Dallas and Richmond for the purpose of enabling the reserve banks to rediscount loans on cotton secured by warehouse receipts."

GAME LAWS ARE CHANGED

Robert Goodfeller, Chief Deputy Warden, says that hunting enthusiasts should know of the following season on game in Texas: Doves, months of September to February inclusive; quail, December and January; turkey, December, January and February; deer, November and December; duck, October 15 to February 15 inclusive.

It was stated that the rattling of horns in deer hunting was forbidden by recent statutes, as was also the use of headlights or other strong illumination.

The bag limit on all birds, duck, doves and quail is fixed at fifteen. Deer are restricted to three bucks in one season and turkey the same.

Licenses are necessary for residents of the State when hunting outside their own or adjoining county and cost \$1.75. The non-resident license is \$15 per year. Six months residence in the state is sufficient to obtain a residents license.—EX.

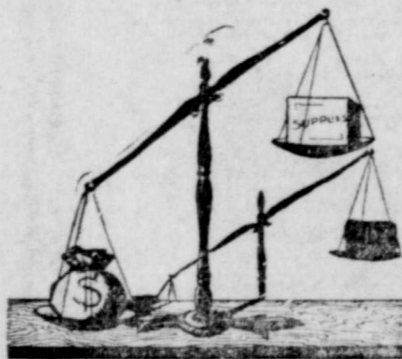

BIG LAND DEALS

The increased demand for Mills county real estate, as well as the good price it commands is indicated by two transactions of the past few days.

Judge S. H. Allen sold for Capt. J. W. Driskill the property known as the Driskill ranch on the bayou, in the upper edge of this county, for a consideration of \$14 per acre. There are 2314 acres in the tract, which made the purchase price \$46,396. W. C. Johnson of Waco was the purchaser and he will place his sons in charge of the ranch. The deal did not include the cattle on the ranch or the growing crops. It is understood Capt. Driskill and family will move back to this city, where they have a fine home and many friends.

Another deal of equal importance was concluded by Mr. W. C. Dew this week in which he sold the Kemp farm, known as the Goenhour place, in the Center community for a consideration of \$48,000. W. B. Worsham and his two sons and his son-in-law, A. L. Short, were the purchasers. There are 800 acres in the tract and this price makes the land bring \$60 per acre. A considerable amount of it is irrigated and the irrigation plant goes in the deal. This transaction was made some weeks ago, but part of the consideration was in trade and the property thus secured was converted into money this week by Mr. Dew. The sale here noted did not include the stock or growing crops on the place. This farm sold some years ago for \$10,000 and the increased valuation is an indication of the estimate placed on Mills county land by those fortunate enough to have holdings in this good county.
