JOHN L. WARD  
 John L. Ward, for the past two terms the active prosecuting attorney in the District Attorney's office, has announced his candidacy for the office of District Judge of the 27th judicial district, which includes the counties of Bell, Mills and Lampasas.

This candidacy is based on a record as a public official and as a citizen which is known to all men. As a citizen it began in Temple when the then young man decided to drive his stakes in Bell county. Things went hard with him for a while, but gradually his strength of intellect and of character won the attention deserved, and his friends urged him to make the race for Justice of the Peace. This step was the beginning of a political career which has been of unvarying success to this good day, and which promises to be continued through successive higher steps as the earned reputation acquired in town, county and district become more widely common property.

As Justice of the Peace John Ward made an efficient officer. Time and again he was re-elected and strong opposition was encountered all along the way. Gradually that opposition was overcome to a large extent, and today there are scores of his first political opponents now ready to back him for anything he seeks.

The office of County Attorney was the next goal, and the voters of the county overwhelmingly elected him to that place. He brought to the office a strong individuality and a knowledge of men and affairs which made him an effective weapon in the enforcement of the laws, some of which had been violated so long and so flagrantly that there was almost loss of hope of ever bringing Bell county to a stage of character the great majority of her citizenship deserved. John Ward "cleaned up" the troublesome gangs and combinations in short order, and he gave the county one of the very best administrations it had ever known.

Then the advancement to District Attorney was made and in the wider field he has proven even greater master of the situations than when he was fighting his way into the confidence of the people and into the respect and fear of the lawless elements. The court records in all the counties served will show what has been accomplished and in these records reposes Mr. Ward's faith to believe that the good citizens desire him to continue in places where he can do good.

In the counties of Lampasas and Mills, joined with Bell in the judicial district, Mr. Ward is very popular and strong. He has made a practice of leading the ticket in those counties, and there now come to him very flattering letters and words of commendation, many from the citizens who were at first opposed, but were later won over by the services given.

Thoroughly familiar with court practice, from justiceship up, John Ward is today one of the strongest prosecutors in the state, with no malicious nor ambitious designs prodding him on, but with firm conception of his public duties, and before that duty there are neither friends to stand nor foes to deter from the straight course of duty. That is his record, vouched for by the career of the man, and by his hosts of friends in all the counties. A faithful and competent public official it is who comes before his people and asks them to give him the position one step higher.—Temple Telegram.

While Judge Ward has only served the people of this county in an official way for a short time he has made a very favorable impression throughout this section. He has given close attention to the duties of his office and has been impartial in his investigations and prosecutions. His opponents, if he has any, will find he is mighty strong in Mills county.

The explosion of a boiler at a gin in Lovelady caused the instant death of several men and the loss of considerable property Saturday.

It is announced from Austin that former state treasurer Robbins will be one of the candidates for the Democratic nomination for railroad commissioner in the next campaign.

Two unmasked men robbed the First National bank of Marble Falls of a considerable amount of money Monday afternoon, after shooting and perhaps fatally wounding an employe of the bank who attempted to draw a revolver.

The constitutional amendment submitted to the voters of California to abolish political nominations for state offices was defeated by a healthy majority. Party organization is best for all concerned and the voters know it.

One of the associate justices of the supreme court of Oklahoma, Judge Gibson A. Brown, died suddenly Monday while attending a session of the court in Oklahoma City. He was formerly a citizen of Texas and had only been a member of the Oklahoma court about one year.

A jury in district court at Nacogochison not guilty of the murder of her husband, who was killed in their home at that place some months ago. The deceased was the express agent and his wife was a trained nurse. It was claimed by the wife that her husband shot himself accidentally while shooting at a dog.

A meeting of congressmen, senators, business men and others interested in having a sufficient appropriation for the Mississippi river levees was held at Memphis, Tenn., this week, and a resolution was adopted asking the federal government to appropriate sixty million dollars for levee work along the Mississippi.

On account of frequent burglaries the postoffice department at Washington has sent out special warning to postmasters in the smaller towns. This warning and advice is also good for the business men in the small towns where no adequate protection can be given by officers. This is the season of the year when money is more plentiful and burglars are attracted to the unprotected towns.

Villa and his followers are said to be in a desperate situation since the recognition of the Carranza faction in Mexico. People along the border are fearful that the desperate outlaws will invade the border states and secure supplies. There seems to be no good reason, however, for fearing the Villa followers more than the Carranza followers—they are all outlaws who appropriate everything they can get their dirty hands on.

Robbers held up a fast train on the M. K. & T. railroad near Eufala, Okla., Monday night in the old time way. The train crew was lined up and the robbers attempted to blow the safes in the express car. Only one safe yielded to the explosives and the loot, therefore, did not likely amount to a great deal, although some rumors have placed the figures at a fabulous sum. There were ten or more of the robbers and they made their escape just like the James and other gangs did in the long ago.

Political alignments are being made and candidates are making their announcements for offices of small as well as great importance. There will likely be a hard fought campaign in some sections and even some of the county candidates will "warm up" the race. The national campaign is not likely to develop much warmth, however, as it is a foregone conclusion that President Wilson will be nominated without opposition in his own party, while opposing parties will experience difficulty in getting men of ability and strength to make the race against him.

## INSPECT THE EVIDENCE

Those Who Desire to Know The Facts Can Be Informed

A list of towns that have built water works in Texas and are operating them successfully, and details of the cost of these systems, the expense of operating, the profit accruing to the town from running the plants, the amount of insurance reduction and other interesting data will be on file for the investigation of citizens at the office of Hon. W. H. Trent, Mayor.

This information was secured at considerable expense by addressing letters to City Secretaries of the various cities in Texas, enclosing blank form or list of questions and a stamped envelope for the return of the answers.

By examination of the blanks that were returned by the various City Secretaries, it will be seen that but one City, Atlanta, Texas, is of the opinion that private ownership will be preferable. An examination of the statement from that city shows the low rate water charge, a reduction of the key rate from 90 to 52 cents, and revenue more than enough to pay operating expenses.

The citizens are invited to inspect the answers from the various cities and then ask the question why, if it is a good thing for 50 other towns, many of them smaller than Goldthwaite it should not be a good thing for the City of Goldthwaite to own its own water plant.

It will be seen that in the majority of instances insurance has been reduced from 40 to 50 per cent. This will amount to as much as the entire tax levy upon an issue of bonds to build a water plant.

After the first year or two it must be conceded that the water plant will more than pay operating expenses. In short, it is generally believed that a properly constructed water works plant will save enough in reduction of insurance, protection of property against fire, and the profit from operation will, without levying a tax after the first or second year to pay off the bond issue that is created to build the plant.

In private life business men would not hesitate to acquire a profitable piece of property if it could be shown that the property would pay the purchase price through its earnings.
