### PRICES GOING UP

Those who are not in vital touch with the conditions in the paper market can not fully realize the situation. Prices are advancing so fast that an order in response to quotations is filled at a price in excess of the quotations and wholesale dealers and jobbers will not guarantee a price list for five minutes. Some of the stock used in the job printing department has increased 400 percent and the end is not yet. To say the least has taken advantage of the war conditions to increase its profits is but to use a term that is easy of belief but difficult to prove. However, the fact remains that the situation in this line of business is more serious than ever known in the history of newspaper making and printing. Serious because of the fact prices have already reached a prohibitive stage in some instances and the end is not yet. The Eagle has purchased for present future delivery a supply of paper stock sufficient for some time to come and while that stock advance in subscription rates has been made, but it will necessitate attention to the subscription and the elimination of names not paying the account is at the advanced price the paper is certainly not profitable to the publisher and if he fails to collect the dollar he is indeed in a predicament. Efforts were made by the pastors association of Brownwood to secure the services of the Ham-Ramsey combination for a summer meeting at that place, but the evangelists were unable to give that town a date before November, which was considered too late.

A food riot in Terreon, Mexico, a few days ago demonstrated the distressing conditions in that war-ridden country. Men, women and children assembled in the streets and cried and prayed for bread. The rioting finally broke into a riot and many buildings which contained food were wrecked or damaged. A supply of corn was sent to the town for distribution to alleviate the suffering of the populace. This condition, doubtless, exists in almost every part of that country, where war has been in progress and destruction the watch-word for years.

The figures are largely guesswork; but probably the number of men actually under arms in Europe last year averaged from twelve to fifteen millions—say, rather more than half the total number of males in the United States aged 18 years and upward, who are gainfully employed. These men produced very little. If about half the male workers of every sort in the United States knocked off work for a year, we should expect an enormous decrease in national production. But it seems likely that Europe last year produced about as much as ever before.—Saturday Evening Post.

Approximately 1,000,000 acres of state school land was thrown on the market this week by State Land Commissioner J. T. Robison. The bulk of this land is situated in the northern and western portion of the state, and while much of the land is to be sold on conditions of actual settlement and on 40 years' time, there are many thousand acres sold without condition. Bids for the land are made by mail. The price ranges from \$1 to \$5 per acre, and the state reserves to the school fund all minerals that may be found on the land. Some land, however, is sold without the mineral restriction.

The "Villa hunt" in Mexico by the United States army still continues, with very small hope of successful termination at an early date. Villa and his followers have the advantage of knowing the country perfectly and they also have the sympathy of all Mexicans, regardless of political or revolutionary affiliations. Ultimately the outlaw band will be taken, but the obstacles that must be overcome before that time are many. The only reason old Carranza does not oppose the movement of the United States troops is that he fears personal violence from Villa, but if he can secure some treacherous agreement with the villainous outlaw we will soon see that he thinks no more of our forces and our country than does his erstwhile companion, Villa.

**JUDGE SPANN'S RECORD IS  
PRAISED**

Judge F. M. Spann of Temple has completed two months of service as district judge of the Twenty-seventh judicial district, and reports which have been received by the Telegram show the following record: Forty civil cases have been disposed of since February 1, and twenty criminal cases have been finally disposed of with eight convictions and sentences to the penitentiary.

Among the policies instituted by Judge Spann in conducting the affairs of the court are the making the jury lists secret by order of the court, and refusing to accept business reasons as an excuse from jury service.

Commenting upon the dispatch of business under the administration of Judge Spann, one who has been in position to observe closely the workings of the court said: "By insisting upon all jurors doing duty, finding absent jurors and refusing business reasons as an excuse for jury service, jurors have learned that a summons means to attend court; the jury panels have been full and the attendance good. Out of a special venire of 120 on March 15, there were 118 present. One of the absentees sent a doctor's certificate and the other broke his buggy down trying to get to court in time. The result is that the dabbler of the 'pick up' or 'professional' juror is eliminated, and the method is placing the Bell county jurors, like Caesar's wife, 'above suspicion.'

"The business of the court has been dispatched in a most efficient and business-like manner. The strictest order is kept in the court room and so smoothly is the machinery run that the court has been compared to a federal court."

"The court is getting the full cooperation of all the officers and attorneys. No time is lost in long-winded speeches, objections, quibbling or rag chawing. An earnest and successful effort is being made to administer the affairs of the court in an economical manner."

"Judge Spann is making good, and his administration is causing much favorable comment and giving general satisfaction. He has disposed of some of the largest cases and most complicated litigation that has ever been upon the dockets of this county. He has shown himself fully able and qualified to perform and carry forth the work which was so ably done by Judge Robison."

Judge Spann will hold court in Lampasas county this month, in Mills county in May, and in Bell county in June, July and August.—Temple Telegram.

The people here are glad to know of the success of this new district judge, who is to hold court here next month. Judge Spann has a number of friends and acquaintances here who are well pleased with the record he is making.

A "buy it at home" club would be beneficial to any community and the larger the club membership the greater the prosperity of the community.

A huge moving picture combination is being formed and when it begins business Mary Pickford is to be the star actress and is to receive half a million dollars a year salary.

In an election last Saturday, Fort Worth voters gave a majority in favor of moving picture shows and other places of amusements being allowed to operate in that city on Sunday.

Since the trouble with the Mexicans developed and it was seen how utterly unprepared the government was, even for protection of its borders there has been mighty little talk in opposition to preparedness.

A negro who had assaulted a young white girl in Oklahoma was taken from the examining court at Idabel, Okla., about noon Monday and lynched. His body was suspended from the second story of the court house. It is said that 500 men took part in the hanging.

A grand jury in Chicago offered a suggestion to the court that a hanging be scheduled for each Friday for six months as a means of decreasing the number of murders in that city. The suggestion is a good one and could be adopted to advantage in several of the larger cities in Texas.

An engine pulling a freight train on the Sweetwater division of the Santa Fe exploded a short distance west of Brownwood at an early hour Monday morning. The engineer, fireman and two brakemen were injured and two cars were derailed and traffic on the San Angelo and Sweetwater divisions of the road was delayed for several hours.

The death of Col. Cecil Lyon, which occurred at his home in Sherman Tuesday, removed from the ranks of men one of the foremost business men and political leaders in Texas. In political matters, especially in his own party, Col. Lyon was a leader of force and power. He belonged to that wing of the Republican party known in the early days as the "lily white." It was due to his efforts more, perhaps, than to the efforts of any other man that the negroes were eliminated from politics and the management of party affairs were given into the hands of white men. He was a staunch friend and supporter of Col. Roosevelt and during that gentleman's administration wielded a great influence in the distribution of political patronage in Texas.

As a farmer and friend of the manufacturer and merchant, I want to suggest an "Advertise it in Texas" movement. The manufacturer and jobber may blow loud blasts on the horn of patriotism, but if they will put an ad in the newspapers of their territory, making a business presentation of their goods, they will find it more effective than waving the Star Spangled Banner. The farmer is as much interested in the price of the things he has for sale, and the advertising columns of his newspaper are his price list. The price is the thing, and the farmer wants the figures in cold type. The press is the most powerful agency for progress the world has ever produced. We have all sorts of ways calculated to promote business and honor industry, such as trade days, bargain days, labor day, etc., and why not advertise things they have to sell, and everybody subscribes to the local paper and all delinquents pay a year in advance. 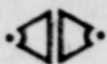

### USING GOOD JUDGMENT

In no other occupation is good judgment of more importance than farming. The business man must use his judgment as to making investments, securing labor, marketing products, etc. He often finds after it is too late that his judgment as to certain transactions was poor. The only remedy is to be more careful in the future.

But where business men have a few risks and a few opportunities for using good judgment, farmers have many. There are more unknown quantities in the mathematics of farming than in the equations of the ordinary business man in the town or city.

At this season of the year the weather is often deceiving. A few bright, pleasant spring days may cause the planter to begin too soon. It sometimes happens that valuable seeds are lost by planting so early that a freeze kills the plants. Yet late planting may cause the plants to be injured by drouth, poor markets, insects or other enemies of the farmer.
