A special from Brady says: "A movement is on foot here for an organization calling for at least one hundred members, ten of whom would be on guard each night. By this plan it is thought to curb any tendency on the part of foreigners or irresponsible parties towards incendiarism or riot during the present warlike period. The organization is being encouraged by both city and county officials.

Present conditions indicate a cotton crop of 14,266,000 equivalent 500-pound bales this year. The Department of Agriculture forecast this total production Saturday in connection with its report announcing the condition of the crop on June 25 and the preliminary estimate of this year's acreage. Last year's crop, the smallest since 1909, was 11,191,820 bales, while two years ago it was 16,134,930 bales, the biggest crop ever grown.

The Mexican situation has greatly improved in the past few days and it now appears to be certain that there will be no war or armed intervention by this country. While many thousand soldiers are now on the border and everything is in readiness for operations against the outlaw nation, the communication of Carranza to President Wilson was very satisfactory and if the old greaser will attempt to do right in future and use his utmost power to prevent outlaws from his country crossing the line into the United States it is likely we will use no harsh measures.

Dr. R. E. Vinson became president of the University of Texas Saturday, taking the place of Dr. W. J. Battle, who has been acting president for over a year, following the resignation of former President Mizes. The event was signalized by a dinner given to Governor James E. Ferguson, members of the board of regents and representation of the ex-students association, with a few invited guests. The formal inaugural ceremony, however, will not be held until November 30, Thanksgiving Day. It is proposed to make this occasion an event for general homecoming of students and graduates of the university. The ex-students association is to take a prominent part in this affair.

This hall will be dedicated to the memory of the women of the South. No fitter memorial could be imagined than this. It will serve in a helpful way to keep alive the traditions and the spirit of the old South.—Houston Post

The death of Mrs. Hettie Green, characterized as the richest woman in the world, was reported from New York Monday. Within a short period she had suffered three strokes of apoplexy, which proves the strength of her constitution, notwithstanding she was eighty years of age. Mrs. Green was a wonder for economy, especially because of the fact that she was reared in wealth and in early life many millions were given into her keeping at the death of her parents. She accumulated a large additional fortune, but it is doubtful if her estate is as large as it would have been under business management looking to making money rather than saving money. She was a model of close fistness. Her son Ed will receive the bulk of her estate, it is supposed, and as the money is about all he has inherited from his mother he will likely have a pretty good time on the old lady's savings.

Does not preparedness mean that we take more interest in education, spend less for intoxicating liquor, and train our youth for moral and industrial efficiency?—Farm and Ranch.

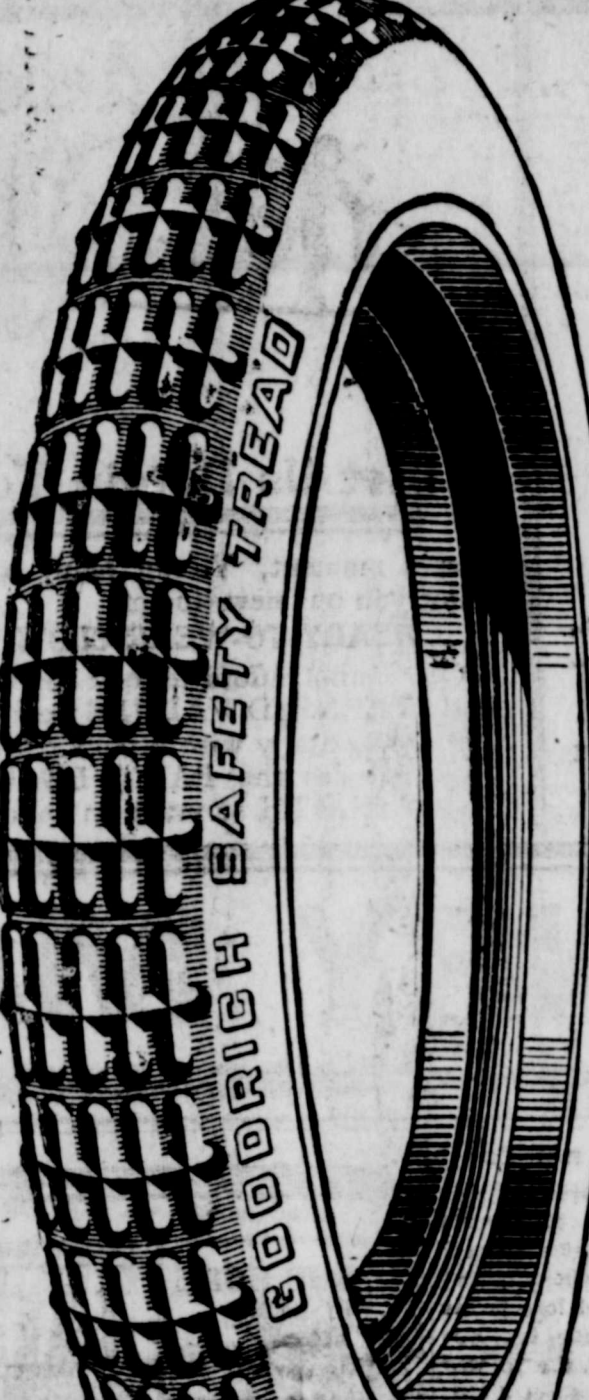

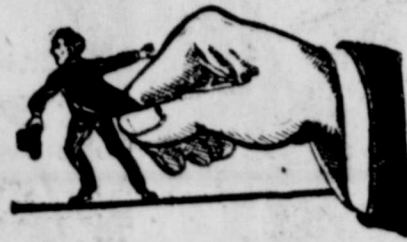

Our colossal national waste and individual extravagance was fully exposed in an address delivered by George Hurst before the Kansas Bankers' convention at Salina recently. The speaker declared that the people of this country lose more in waste and extravagance than France in her stupendous cost of war. There is little doubt that we waste much of our annual wealth in over-eating. Not only is the value of the foods wasted by so doing, but we reduce our efficiency and invite disease and ailments to which human beings are heir. The greatest need of the American people is a knowledge of food and a better understanding of human nutrition. This will help save needless waste and be the means of increasing efficiency. Just what animals have contributed to civilization may never be fully understood. But when we compare the civilization of China and India, countries with few animals, with our own and with some of the European states where animal products are largely used as food, we are impressed with the greater efficiency of animal foods. The rapid increase in meat prices and the difficulty of getting dairy and poultry products has caused deplorable living conditions among the poor in cities. That the American farmer may have an abundance of these foods is a source of safety and security to this nation. Should the time ever come when these foods cannot be profitably produced on our farms our civilization would be endangered.—Exchange.

MEETING CLOSED

The meeting held at the Christian church by Elder Foy E. Wallace closed Wednesday night and Mr. Wallace and wife left Thursday for Thorpe Springs to perfect arrangements for entering the college there. He is a preacher of force and earnestness and his sermons were always heard by large congregations of interested listeners. The result of the meeting was eighteen converts, all of whom were baptized, the last baptismal service being held Wednesday night after the close of the services at the tent.

Mr. Brightwell of Bell county conducted the singing and assisted in the meeting. He is a man of fine ability and made many friends in the city, who will ever be glad to renew the acquaintance with him.

While here Mr. Wallace delivered two special lectures to the Men's Bible class in the Woodmen hall. Both of these lectures were heard by large congregations and were helpful and appreciated.

Federal Inquiry or Railroad Strike?

Faced by demands from the conductors, engineers, firemen and brakemen that would impose on the country an additional burden in transportation costs of \$100,000,000 a year, the railroads propose that this wage problem be settled by reference to an impartial Federal tribunal.

With these employes, whose efficient service is acknowledged, the railroads have no differences that could not be considered fairly and decided justly by such a public body.

Railroads Urge Public Inquiry and Arbitration

The formal proposal of the railroads to the employes for the settlement of the controversy is as follows:

"Our conferences have demonstrated that we cannot harmonize our differences of opinion and that eventually the matters in controversy must be passed upon by other and disinterested agencies. Therefore, we propose that your proposals and the proposition of the railroads be disposed of by one or the other of the following methods:

1. Preferably by submission to the Interstate Commerce Commission, the only tribunal which, by reason of its accumulated information bearing on railway conditions and its control of the revenue of the railways, is in a position to consider and protect the rights and equities of all the interests affected, and to provide additional revenue necessary to meet the added cost of operation in case your proposals are found by the Commission to be just and reasonable; or, in the event the Interstate Commerce Commission cannot, under existing laws, act in the premises, that we jointly request Congress to take such action as may be necessary to enable the Commission to consider and promptly dispose of the questions involved; or
2. By arbitration in accordance with the provisions of the Federal law" (The Newlands Act).

Leaders Refuse Offer and Take Strike Vote

Leaders of the train service brotherhoods, at the joint conference held in New York, June 1-15, refused the offer of the railroads to submit the issue to arbitration or Federal review, and the employes are now voting on the question whether authority shall be given these leaders to declare a nation-wide strike.

The Interstate Commerce Commission is proposed by the railroads as the public body to which this issue ought to be referred for these reasons:

No other body with such an intimate knowledge of railroad conditions has such an unquestioned position in the public confidence.

The rates the railroads may charge the public for transportation are now largely fixed by this Government board.

Out of every dollar received by the railroads from the public nearly one-half is paid directly to the em-

ployes as wages; and the money to pay increased wages can come from no other source than the rates paid by the public.

The Interstate Commerce Commission, with its control over rates, is in a position to make a complete investigation and render such decisions as would protect the interests of the railroad employes, the owners of the railroads, and the public.

A Question For the Public to Decide

The railroads feel that they have no right to grant a wage preferment of \$100,000,000 a year to these employes, now highly paid and constituting only one-fifth of all the employes, without a clear mandate from a public tribunal that shall determine the merits of the case after a review of all the facts.

The single issue before the country is whether this controversy is to be settled by an impartial Government inquiry or by industrial warfare.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE STATE CONSTITUTION RELAT- ING TO LEVYING TAX FOR SCHOOL PURPOSES

H. J. R. No. 30) House Joint Resolution.

Proposing an amendment to Section 3 Article 7, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, authorizing the levy and collection of an ad valorem county tax not to exceed fifty cents on the one hundred dollars valuation of property for the maintenance of the public schools of the county, and authorizing the levy and collection of an ad valorem district tax not to exceed one dollar on the one hundred dollars valuation of property for the maintenance of the public schools of the district.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 3 of Article 7 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to hereafter read as follows:

Section 3 School Taxes—One-fourth of the revenue derived from the State occupation taxes, and a poll tax of \$1.00 on every male inhabitant of this State between the ages of 21 and 60 years shall be set apart annually for the benefit of the public free schools, and in addition thereto there shall be levied and collected an annual ad valorem State tax of such an amount, not to exceed 20 cents on the \$100.00 valuation, as with the available school fund arising from all other sources will be sufficient to maintain and support the public free schools of this State for a period of not less than six months in each year. The Legislature may authorize the levy and collection of an annual ad valorem county tax within the counties of this State not to exceed 50 cents on the \$100.00 valuation of property situated within the county; provided, a majority of the qualified property paying voters of the county voting at an election to be held for that purpose shall vote such tax, for the purpose of maintaining the public free schools of the county, and the Legislature may also provide for the formation of school districts by general or special law, without the local notice required in other cases of special legislation, and all such school districts, whether created by general or special law, may embrace parts of two or more counties, and the Legislature shall be authorized to pass laws for the assessment and collection of taxes in all said districts and for the management and control of the public school or schools of such district, whether such districts are composed of territory wholly within a county or in parts of two or more counties. And the Legislature may authorize an additional ad valorem tax to be levied and collected within all school districts heretofore formed, or hereafter formed, for the further maintenance of public free schools, and the erection and equipment of school buildings therein; provided that a majority of the qualified property tax-paying voters of the district, voting at an election to be held for that purpose, shall vote such tax not to exceed in any one year one dollar on the \$100.00 valuation of the property subject to taxation in such districts, but the limitation upon the amount of school district tax herein authorized shall not apply to incorporated cities or towns, constituting separate and independent school districts.

Sec. 2. The Governor of this State is hereby instructed to issue the necessary proclamation for the submission of this amendment to the qualified voters of the State of Texas at the next general election to be held in November, 1916, at which election all voters favoring this amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots the words, "For the amendment to Section 3, Article 7, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, relating to the levy of ad valorem school taxes not to exceed fifty cents on the \$100.00 valuation in the county and not to exceed one dollar on the \$100.00 valuation in the district, for the purpose of maintaining the public schools of the county or of the district." And those opposed to this amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots the words, "Against the

amendment to Section 3, Article 7, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, relating to the levy of ad valorem school taxes, not to exceed fifty cents on the \$100.00 valuation in the county, and not to exceed one dollar on the \$100.00 valuation in the district, for the purpose of maintaining the public schools of the county or of the district."

Sec. 3. The sum of \$5,000.00, or as much thereof as may be necessary therefor, is hereby appropriated to pay the expenses of carrying out the provisions of this resolution.
