STUDENTS AT DENTON

News Items From the North Texas Normal College

The summer session of the North Texas State Normal College at Denton, Texas, opened on May 31. The enrollment has now reached 1441 with 122 counties in Texas represented, as well as six outside states.

On June 29 the students from Lampasas, Mills, McCulloch, Brown, Coleman, San Saba, Llano and Burnet counties met and organized the Central West Texas club with the following officers: Mr. E. H. Herford of Llano, president; Miss Ruth Harris of Lometa, Lampasas county, secretary. The membership of the club includes J. O. Aldredge, Caradan; Misses Edith Miller, Alline Howell and Johnnie B. Harrison, Goldthwaite, Mills county.

The purpose of this club is to gain an acquaintance with those nearest our homes who are attending the normal as well as to promote social advantages during the term.

In addition to the regular faculty of the normal, there are a number of teachers from various schools of North Texas who are working in the summer schools.

On the evening of the fourth of July the courthouse square of this city was the scene of a preparedness parade. The Normal band and representatives of the colonial sons and daughters were followed by the faculty and students body in the march from the Normal College to the square. The program was instructive as well as interesting, but what touched us most was the presentation of the first flag from Betsy Ross to George Washington acted by students in the Normal.

We have not missed an issue of the Eagle and are always glad when it comes. We appreciate the news

from different communities and urge that every writer send news from their localities so we students may have the opportunity of knowing the happenings in our county.

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FINDING PROFITABLE CROPS

The fact that diversification of crops this year is practiced to a considerable extent gives us a chance to find the crops that are profitable and those that do not pay ordinarily to produce them. It is quite true that no definite conclusions should be drawn from one year's results. Market prices and seasons that control the yield must be duly considered. But while several crops are growing the same season and no quite similar soil is a good time to collect data.

Every crop should be grown on probation that it pay a profit above the expense of production. The fact that it is a staple crop in the community and staple markets are established of course must not be overlooked. But all things considered no crop should be grown simply for the sake of diversification or a variety. What the manager wants is profits upon his labor and equipment. The sooner he finds the unprofitable crops the better will he meet his opportunity.—Farm and Ranch.

CONFEDERATE REUNION

Large Crowds and Good Programs for Each Day.

The twenty-ninth annual Confederate reunion is now a matter of history and will be remembered thru the years to come as one of the most pleasant events of the kind ever held under the supervision of Jeff Davis camp.

Early Wednesday morning the crowds commenced to arrive and up to the afternoon yesterday throngs of people were coming and going between the town and the reunion grounds. Quite a number of the old soldiers camped at the grounds, while the town was filled with the veterans and their friends from this and other counties.

The programs were interesting throughout and the entertainments on the "joy way" at the grounds attracted a goodly number, while the association of friends and neighbors was the most pleasant part of the gathering.

Thursday was the main day of the reunion and most of the business houses closed the greater part of the day, in order that all might enjoy the happy occasion and there was indeed a great gathering at the grounds for that day.

Yesterday was political day and all candidates and their representatives were given an opportunity to make known their desires and tell of their qualifications, therefore, there was no lack of oratory at the grounds at any time.

Each day there have been good speeches made which have interested and benefitted the audiences and each day the people have been entertained by those who have told of the heroism and patriotism of the Confederate soldiers. The most important speech of the occasion, however, was delivered yesterday by Hon. Pat Naff of Waco, who was invited to come and speak for the ceremonies in unveiling the Confederate monument just completed. He is one of the most gifted orators of the state and his speech at this time delighted a large audience.

One of the most pleasing portions of the program was a musical entertainment at the tabernacle Thursday night by Mrs. John Scott and a number of helpers, assisted by several young ladies and girls who gave readings appropriate to the occasion. A program could not have been prepared that would have been more pleasing to the old soldiers and their friends.

Yesterday was the last day of the 1916 reunion and as the day drew to a close and those who had gathered at the camp grounds to do honor to the old soldiers dispersed they gave expression to many kindly thoughts and much appreciation for the grand old heroes of the sixties.

BOLLWEEVIL CATCHER

Messrs. W. E. Harper and Robert Littlepage have patented a machine to catch and kill bollweevil and if we do not miss our guess the machine will be a great success. It is in size similar to an ordinary cultivator and is drawn by a double team. Two brushes which turn upward as they run are operated in the center in such manner as to brush everything that is loose upon the cotton stalk into a tin valley which in turn empties onto two steel rollers which run so close together as to pulverize everything passing between them and in this way the weevil is taken from the stalk and killed.

This machine was in operation at the reunion grounds yesterday and was examined and approved by many. The principle upon which it operates furges the belief that it will be a success and if so, the patentees will vie with John D. Rockefeller for first place in the financial world, besides being benefactors to their country.

Some of the South American countries are preparing to go to war. It is thought Peru and Venezuela will contest landed rights with Colombia and Ecuador.

Fire destroyed the plant of the Brownwood Morning Herald Monday. The paper was established about a month ago and met with a hearty reception from the people of Brownwood and throughout this section of Texas. The loss is said to have been \$18,000.

A wreck on the main line of the Santa Fe near Caldwell Saturday night was remarkable in that no one was killed and but one passenger hurt when the train, which was moving at a very rapid speed, left the rails and turned over, after plowing its way thru the embankment for some distance.

A bill has been introduced in the lower house of congress providing for the appointment of a commission to negotiate for the purchase of a part of Lower California and other territory from Mexico. It is not likely, however, that such commission could accomplish anything worth while, even if there was somewhere the authority to dispose of such territory for a financial consideration.

A supporter of any of the five real candidates for the United States senate can figure his favorite the winner with a certainty that is gratifying to him, but the unfortunate part of the matter is that the supporters of the other four candidates can figure their men in with the same degree of certainty. Some of the candidates who are believed by many to be sure winners are put by others into the 'also ran' class.

The attorney general is called upon for opinions on some very strange questions about election time. One of the questions recently submitted which appears to be useless and absurd is whether or not others than Democrats will have the right to vote on the question of submission which appears on the Democratic ballot. Under what method of reasoning it is thought members of other political parties should be admitted to a Democratic primary is not clear.

The next week will be one of the busiest political circles have known for many years. Perhaps there has never been a senatorial contest that attracted so much interest, while the gubernatorial campaign is attracting considerable attention. Most of the congressmen have opponents and some of them are in a fair way to be defeated for reelection, while district offices are coveted by quite a few and the crop of county candidates has not been an entire failure in this section. Next Saturday will end all of the contests and we can then devote our time to reading the European war news and our energies to discussing the Mexican situation.

The arrival at Baltimore, Md., Sunday of a German undersea merchant ship carrying one thousand tons of dye-stuffs and other merchandise has caused great interest throughout the world. The vessel left Germany June 23 and encountered no difficulties in running the blockade and crossing the Atlantic. It is claimed the vessel is the first of a fleet being put in operation by the Germans and if the return voyage is accomplished successfully, carrying food-stuffs and such articles as copper and rubber needed by the German army, there will be a new aspect to war conditions, for never again will the blockading of a port be possible and contraband goods can be carried at will. The dye-stuffs and chemicals brought by this vessel will relieve the situation in the United States in a small degree and if the other vessels that are to follow are enabled to reach port safely with their cargoes the fear of shortage of such articles will be dispelled.

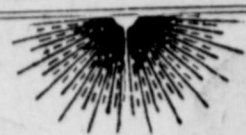

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE STATE CONSTITUTION RELATING TO LEVYING TAX FOR SCHOOL PURPOSES

H. J. R. No. 30) House Joint Resolution,

Proposing an amendment to Section 3 Article 7, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, authorizing the levy and collection of an ad valorem county tax not to exceed fifty cents on the one hundred dollars valuation of property for the maintenance of the public schools of the county, and authorizing the levy and collection of an ad valorem district tax not to exceed one dollar on the one hundred dollars valuation of property for the maintenance of the public schools of the district.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 3 of Article 7 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to hereafter read as follows:

Section 3 School Taxes—One-fourth of the revenue derived from the State occupation taxes, and a poll tax of \$1.00 on every male inhabitant of this State between the ages of 21 and 60 years shall be set apart annually for the benefit of the public free schools, and in addition thereto there shall be levied and collected an annual ad valorem State tax of such an amount, not to exceed 20 cents on the \$100.00 valuation, as with the available school fund arising from all other sources will be sufficient to maintain and support the public free schools of this State for a period of not less than six months in each year. The Legislature may authorize the levy and collection of an annual ad valorem county tax within the counties of this State not to exceed 50 cents on the \$100.00 valuation of property situated within the county; provided, a majority of the qualified property paying voters of the county voting at an election to be held for that purpose shall vote such tax, for the purpose of maintaining the public free schools of the county, and the Legislature may also provide for the formation of school districts by general or special law, without the local notice required in other cases of special legislation, and all such school districts, whether created by general or special law, may embrace parts of two or more counties, and the Legislature shall be authorized to pass laws for the assessment and collection of taxes in all said districts and for the management and control of the public school or schools of such district, whether such districts are composed of territory wholly within a county or in parts of two or more counties. And the Legislature may authorize an additional ad valorem tax to be levied and collected within all school districts heretofore formed, or hereafter formed, for the further maintenance of public free schools, and the erection and equipment of school buildings therein; provided that a majority of the qualified property tax-paying voters of the district, voting at an election to be held for that purpose, shall vote such tax not to exceed in any one year one dollar on the \$100.00 valuation of the property subject to taxation in such districts, but the limitation upon the amount of school district tax herein authorized shall not apply to incorporated cities or towns, constituting separate and independent school districts.

Sec. 2. The Governor of this State is hereby instructed to issue the necessary proclamation for the submission of this amendment to the qualified voters of the State of Texas at the next general election to be held in November, 1916, at which election all voters favoring this amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots the words, "For the amendment to Section 3, Article 7, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, relating to the levy of ad valorem school taxes not to exceed fifty cents on the \$100.00 valuation in the county and not to exceed one dollar on the \$100.00 valuation in the district, for the purpose of maintaining the public schools of the county or of the district." And those opposed to this amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots the words, "Against the

amendment to Section 3, Article 7, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, relating to the levy of ad valorem school taxes, not to exceed fifty cents on the \$100.00 valuation in the county, and not to exceed one dollar on the \$100.00 valuation in the district, for the purpose of maintaining the public schools of the county or of the district."

Sec. 3. The sum of \$5,000.00, or as much thereof as may be necessary therefor, is hereby appropriated to pay the expenses of carrying out the provisions of this resolution.

(Note.—H. J. R. No. 30 was adopted by the House March 6, years 1914, days 12. Was adopted by the Senate, with amendments, March 19, years 25, days 2. House concurred in Senate amendments March 19, years 78, days 19, present and not voting 1.) Approved April 1, 1915.

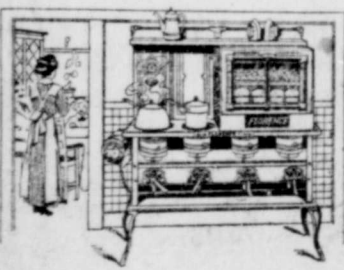

MONUMENT ERECTED

Marble Shaft Placed To Commemorate the Confederate Veterans.

The monument erected by Jeff Davis camp of Confederate veterans has been placed in position on the public square, opposite the northwest corner of the court house, and has been admired by many people since the contractor, Mr. J. N. Keese, completed the work.



The monument stands on a concrete base and on the pedestal appears the inscription C. S. A. 1861-1865, while on the four sides of the monument appear the names of those who hold membership in the Jeff Davis camp and all who have been identified with that organization in the past. The names of the states, companies, regiments and department of service are coupled with the name of each of the veterans whose memory will be perpetuated by the monument. On the shaft is the inscription, 'Erected in memory of Jeff Davis Camp, organized in 1887.'

This monument is now capped, but is to be finished with a marble statue of a Confederate soldier, but this statue can not be procured at the present time, as it is to be cut in Italy and war conditions make the work and transportation difficult at this time.

The members of Jeff Davis camp are certainly to be commended for the noble work they have done in providing this monument, which will be an ornament to the town and reminder thru the years to come of the valor and heroism of the Confederate soldiers.

LAND FOR HOMES

Much speculation has been engaged in relative to conditions in this country after the war. Various prophecies have been made as to what prices of farm products would be, and as to the financial and industrial status of the United States immediately following the European war. Of conditions when peace is made none of us know. But it would seem that with normal crops and normal transportation farmers have nothing to fear as to markets. There are good reasons for believing that our products should be stimulated with higher prices for other commodities generally following a great war. Of one thing we should be sure, that unless some very positive restrictions are placed thousands of immigrants will seek refuge here from taxation and devastation in Europe. That is likely to mean higher land values.

Now while banks have larger deposits and loans are more easily negotiated than usual it would be a good time for those who can buy homes. Judging the future by the past land values are not likely to decline. In fact, they are quite likely to advance. Those who can buy a small farm that seems to be worth the price and can secure reasonable terms would seem to be justified in doing so. There are greater opportunities for comfortable living and useful citizenship for home owners. Yet tenants can do much of value in the community. Their greatest handicap is the fact that they must move too often.

Even where one has a home, a garden, an orchard and a few acres to keep livestock he is in much better position to rent fertile land than where the home must be rented. With such a place moving need not be done and school facilities lost. Livestock can be kept, farming implements bought, household necessities accumulated and neighborhood attachments formed. These advantages are desirable when independent farming is done.—Farm and Ranch.
