#### A NEAR TRAGEDY

He was examined at the sanitarium and the physicians advised him that it would not be well to remove the shot unless they caused him trouble later. Therefore, he still carries the shot in the leg as a memento of his experience.

KILLED BY FREIGHT TRAIN

A young man about twenty years of age was killed Saturday morning about 3 o'clock on the Santa Fe track a short distance above the water tank by an east bound train. Two young men who had been in Lampasas only a few days had started to walk to Lometa and when a short distance above the Santa Fe tank they stopped to rest and one of them laid down on the track and both of them fell asleep. The body was badly torn up, one foot cut off, his legs broken and back torn to pieces. The body was brought here and after an inquest was held the body was prepared for burial and interment made here Sunday.—Lampasas Leader.

In order that Texas may benefit properly from the \$85,000,000 federal appropriation from congress for good roads work, Governor James E. Ferguson will recommend to the thirty-fifth legislature an enactment of a law creating a state highway commission. Since the congressional measure has been passed, the government has been urged by county officials and good roads organizations to take some action. It is estimated that Texas will receive nearly \$3,000,000 of the federal appropriation, provided the state appoints a highway commission and state engineer. The highway commission matter was proposed to be included in the state platform adopted in Houston last week, but that plank was not included.

Returns from school district election at Buffalo showed that a majority of the voters were in favor of abrogating the 25 cent special school tax for the district.

In the election at Big Valley a majority favored raising the special school tax from 30c to 50c on \$100 valuation.

The court spent Tuesday in Hamilton conferring with the commissioners court of that county relative to the building of a first class road from Hamilton to Goldthwaite.

The petition of J. M. Huckaba and others for a second class road in precinct No. 2 was granted.

Petition of J. H. Aldredge and others for the creation of a voting precinct at Mount Olive school house was rejected.

The petition of J. B. Huckaba and others for a bridge across Bennett creek on the Goldthwaite and Canadian road was rejected.

The jury of view on a road petitioned for by E. T. Davis and others in Mile Grove community was given further time.

Reports of officers were examined and approved and accounts were audited and allowed.

Court adjourned Wednesday afternoon, after having completed the business of the term.

President Wilson has announced that he will not make a speaking campaign, as he considers it beneath the dignity of the president of the United States to enter into a political scramble.

A farmer in Montague county plowed up a number of bars of metal thought to be silver a few days ago and it was thought the value of the metal would reach perhaps \$200,000 or more. He carried the bars to the government assayer at Denver and learned that his find was about \$800.

Announcement was made of the death of Dr. John B. Murphy, one of the world's most eminent surgeons, at a health resort in Michigan. He was credited with being the first to operate for appendicitis. He was also the inventor of the Murphy button, by means of which severed intestines can be connected.

Quite a sensation was sprung in the Ham-Ramsay meeting in Fort Worth Sunday night when the first named member of the firm prayed for some member of his congregation who was in sin to be stricken by death. Many of the congregation proved their disgust for the fellow and his bunch by leaving the meeting before the service had begun.

Representative McLemore has introduced a bill amending the interstate commerce laws to restore to the state railroad commission the power to make intrastate rates. Introduction of the measure was precipitated by the decision of the interstate commerce commission on the Shreveport rate case, in which the contentions of Texas shippers were defeated. Passage of the measure will remedy the situation in so far as Texas shippers are concerned, McLemore believes. A similar measure is now pending in the senate, having been introduced last March by Senator Sheppard.

Whatever may be the outcome of the present controversy between the railroads and the four brotherhoods, the task of precluding any recurrence of such a menace to the country ought to be taken up at an early day. The consequences of a strike such as this would be too extensive and too appalling to make the threat of it tolerable. At least we should go as far as the Canadians have; that is, forbid the declaration of a strike until an opportunity shall have been given for an impartial inquiry into the controversy which threatens it. This would assert no more than the public's rightful authority, if authority is to be measured by its interest in the controversy.—Dallas News.

The senatorial primary is to be held throughout Texas next Saturday and the Eagle thinks there is no doubt that Senator Culberson will be nominated by an overwhelming majority. Not only is he one of the most able men in America and one of the strongest supporters of the Democratic administration, but his long public service without even a suspicion of infidelity to the people and his trust commends him to everybody. While men he had helped to places of prominence and influence were campaigning the state against him in the first primary and misrepresenting his physical condition he remained at his place and did not even dignify their ungrateful acts by calling attention to them. While his opponent has been busy taking issue with the administration and giving comfort to its enemies, Senator Culberson has been giving every particle of his mighty intellect to make the administration a success and bring benefits to the people. If the senator was in reality in ill health, as some of his opponents attempted to make the people believe and doubtless did make some believe, that would be a very poor reason for turning out one who has proved his fidelity by a life time of service.

### THE OUTLOOK FOR COTTON

The last report of the Bureau of Statistics, United States department of agriculture, shows considerable deterioration in the forecast for the 1916 cotton crop. The forecast is for a crop of 12,916,000 bales weighing 500 pounds each. On June 25 the forecast was for 14,266,000. It will be seen that the present outlook is less promising than a month ago by 1,350,000 bales.

Drouth in many localities, with floods in others, accounts for the less promising yield at this time. The cotton belt east of the Mississippi is much less favorable for a cotton crop than the Southwest. In fact, the Southwestern states in most instances make a better average than other states except California.

With these facts before us we should not be in a hurry to market the 1916 crop. There are good reasons for believing that prices will be higher unless the crop is thrown upon the market as fast as it is picked. No one knows what the market will be, but every thinking man knows that it is not wise to require the market to take a crop in the short time that it is generally sold.

There are better facilities for storing and holding cotton than in years past. Those who wish to do this may find facilities in most localities.—Farm and Ranch.

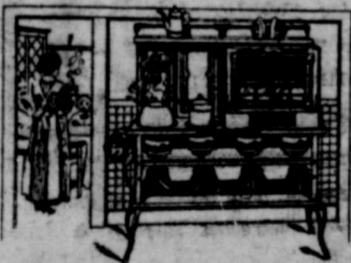

Special stress is laid on that feature of the law which requires every ginner to take three samples of each bale ginned. The constitutionality of this phase of the law has been upheld in the higher courts.

**THE SABBATH AND SABBATH OBSERVANCE**

Since my last article and coming from an unexpected source one of the aged sires of the county approached me and complimented my efforts in writings on this subject. Said it was good and he enjoyed reading what I had to say, but I had confined myself to the Old Testament Sabbath and asked why I did not write something about the present or New Testament Sabbath. I began to try to collect my wits to answer him, for it had never occurred to me that the changing of the dispensation had in any way affected the law concerning Sabbath observance. So I asked him wherein he thought there was a difference and he said it was positively declared by Christ that the Sabbath of the new dispensation was made for man and not man for the Sabbath and that he would like to hear from me.

After giving the matter some thought and without any comments from the more learned, we are driven to the conclusion that God saw that man in all ages of the world would be worshippers of something and that with the very best surroundings and helps it would be hard to keep him from idol worship, hence being a Holy God and desiring a holy people He set aside one day in seven, with a positive command that it must be kept holy, by thoughtful, God honoring rest from all labor and giving to us our best opportunity to fulfill the first and great commandment by loving fellowship with God. It is also the highest expression of Christian humanitarianism, of love to man. One of its purposes, God declared, was that man servant and maid servant should rest and be permitted to worship also. Then, as we said before, rest and let rest on the rest day. Not to be spent in idleness, which is Sabbath breaking hardly less than Sunday work. Not doing nothing but doing good and doing good will naturally wean us away from selfishness, for selfish pleasure is no less forbidden than selfish work and to make us unselfish on all days, we are called from all forms of it on one day of each week, backed up with a promise from God that we shall have increased delight

and in suspending work on this day for gain we increase our earthly prosperity. The richest nations are the sabbath keeping nations.

It is said that two thirds of the world's mail is in the English language—a fulfillment of the promise that Sabbath keepers shall ride upon the high places of the earth. If the observance of the Sabbath brings all these good things to us, then how truly we should appreciate the saying of the Christ, that the Sabbath was made for man and not man for the Sabbath, which we think adaptable to the human family under both dispensations.

A young flag bearer in time of charge ran ahead of the command with the flag and the captain cried to him to bring the flag back to the company, but the boy shouted, "Bring the company to the flag." If as a Christian nation we would bring the Sabbath up to the true ideals of a Sabbath, our losses on land and sea, by fire, storms and otherwise would be less and a happier Bible reading, Bible loving Sabbath and God honoring people would go forth as an army with banners to conquer the powers of evil and whose mighty tread would shake loose the prison locks, throw wide their doors and set prison bound, prison shackled men at liberty to join the mighty host to shout the praises of Him who said, "The Sabbath was made for man and not man for the Sabbath."

God is no respecter of persons, therefore, he made no laws, nor issued any commands to suit the peculiar whims of a favored few who might want to side track from the main line of duty to exercise their profound selfish ideas of right and wrong, but He commands all men everywhere, at all times and under all circumstances to abstain from worshipping any but the true God, from theft, lying, taking God's name in vain and holds all alike in strict observance of the Sabbath that all may truly and lovingly appreciate the fact that our all wise loving, tender, compassionate, Father gave to us one day that He designates as the Sabbath of the Lord, made for man in which he can and should observe in Holy Commemoration of Him who prepared for man

an eternal Sabbath of rest when the ups and downs, cares, trials and afflictions of this old world shall have blown away.

God in giving to man His first commands or laws did so with a "Thou shalt" which means no less today than then and will hold all equally alike guilty who transgresses the same. When we get our thoughts away from selfish ends, away from men's ideas, instead of God's, and confine ourselves to the real meaning of Sabbath observance as a holy command from Him who has a right to command, we will be a prosperous and happy people.

#### LAW BECOMES OPERATIVE

The compulsory school attendance law becomes operative with the beginning of the scholastic year in September. It is, therefore, important that all persons should familiarize themselves with the provisions of the law. Following is the text of the compulsory feature:

"Every child in the State who is 8 years old and not more than 14 years old shall be required to attend the public schools in the district of its residence, or in some other district, to which it may be transferred, as provided by law, for a period of not less than sixty days for the scholastic year, beginning September 1, 1916, and for a period of not less than a period of eighty days for the scholastic years 1918, 1919 and each scholastic year thereafter a minimum attendance of 100 days shall be required. The period of compulsory school attendance at each school shall begin at the opening of the school term unless otherwise authorized by the district school trustees notice given by the trustees prior to the beginning of the school term; provided that no child shall be required to attend school for a period longer than the maximum term of the public school in the district where the child resides."

Children who are being taught in a private school and those who have a private instructor can be exempted from the requirements of this act as an feeble minded and invalids, or those that are blind, deaf or dumb. Those living more than two and one-half miles from a public school for their own race will also be exempted. A provision is also made that a child more than 12 years of age who has completed the fourth grade work in a standard elementary school may be excused from attending school where the services of such child are necessary to the support of a parent or other relatives standing in the same relationship.

Temporary absence is excusable on account of sickness of the pupil or of serious illness or death in the home. The fact that attendance is impossible on account of high water or severe storm can be established as an excuse.

Where a parent or guardian makes oath and establishes inability to purchase the necessary books and other school supplies for a child required to attend school the county must furnish such books and supplies.

It is a misdemeanor to employ a child under 14 years of age who is subject to the provisions of the

compulsory law without first ascertaining that the child has complied with the provisions of the law. It is also a misdemeanor for the parent, guardian or other person having the custody of a child to fail or refuse to send said child to school for the required time.

And you are hereby commanded to be and appear before the Honorable District Court of Mills County, Texas, at the next regular term thereof, to be held at the Court House of said County, in the City of Goldthwaite, on the 1st Monday in October, A. D. 1916, the same being the 2nd day of October, A. D. 1916, then and there to show cause why judgment should not be rendered against you and the said land and lots sold under foreclosure of said lien to satisfy said taxes, interest, penalties and costs; all of which, together with other and further relief, general and special, being fully set out and prayed for in the plaintiff's original petition filed in said court on the 1st day of June, and appearing on the docket thereof as suit No. 1528, wherein the State of Texas is plaintiff and J. W. Weather, J. C. Street, W. K. Marshall and J. W. McNeal, their heirs and legal representatives, and all persons owning or having or claiming any interest in said land or lots, are defendants.

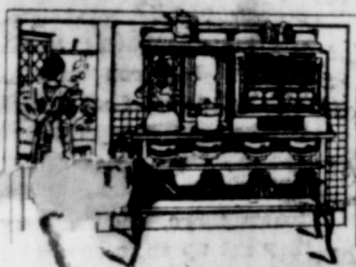

**FIRST BALE**

**Rapp of Indian Gap Opens the Market.**

The first bale of 1916 cotton brought to this city was marketed here Wednesday morning August 16, by Mr. Rapp of the Indian Gap country. This bale was brought in four days earlier than the first bale last year. Mr. Rapp had no hopes of securing the premium bale when he first commenced to pick his cotton and had made an effort he could have brought in the bale last Saturday, at which time he had a considerable portion of the cotton picked. He came to this city the first of the week and finding that the first bale had not been brought to this market, he returned home and loaded his wagon to make a try for the premium. The bale was purchased by W. H. Lane at \$16.05 per 100. It weighed 18 pounds, which brought \$99.20. J. P. Greathouse ginned the cotton and contributed the ginning. He also bought the seed for \$15 and the business men made up a purse of \$4.75 as a premium. This added to the ginning made the premium \$28.75 and the price paid for the cotton and seed made the bale net \$142.95. Mr. Rapp appreciated the liberality of the buyer and other business men of the town, and requested the privilege to express his hearty appreciation of their liberality.

**Last Year.**

The first bale last year was brought by F. R. Carpenter from J. C. Reed's farm, a few miles east of town. It was ginned by Walter Birman, weighed 559 pounds, was bought by McKinley-Corrigan Co. at \$8.42 1/2 per 100. It was badly ruined on account of the rain at that time, which caused the low price. The business men of the town gave Mr. Carpenter a premium of \$28.25.

**WATCH THE GROWING PLANTS**

Close observation of crops during the growing season is often very valuable. Without information as to how plants behave one always loses much. Each year we should gather information to be used the next and every other year we farm. If we neglect this we miss an opportunity and will never have it again.

Close observation gives us a good idea of the soil's needs. It is not a difficult matter to tell when the soil needs lime; what field would be improved by using a complete fertilizer or where nitrogen or phosphate or potassium could be used to good advantage. The growing season and the appearance of the plants will give us this information.

The farmer who observes can tell what fields he should drain, terrace or irrigate. He can determine the best direction to run the rows, the season best for planting, cultivating, harvesting, etc. He soon learns the crops that will likely be best for the various fields and can then arrange his rotations to include the best crops as often as is consistent with good farming.

In seed selection it is necessary that the manager study his plants carefully to determine those that show vigor, earliness, yield, freedom from disease, etc. It is not enough to go over the fields at harvest time to select the best for seed; the plants should be observed during the growing season so selection may be done intelligently. Some plants that make a good showing during the early season may not be suitable seed. It will take all the information you can get to select the desirable for seed.—Farm and Ranch.
