The friends of Senator Culberson are suffering no uneasiness as to the outcome of the primary today, but they are extremely anxious for a large majority to be given the senator, as an endorsement by the people.

The main forces of the West Indies storm, which was reported to be raging in the Gulf last Saturday, struck the section about Corpus Christi, doing vast damage to property and causing the loss of 14 or more lives.

The election today is expected to attract very little attention from the voters and the number who will go to the polls will be small. No local candidates being interested causes a lack of interest on the part of the people.

The people at Gainesville, Fla., dealt swift justice to a negro murderer and his protectors the first of the week. The negro killed an officer and was being harbored by other negroes when he and his helpers were all hung by a mob.

President Wilson's efforts to avert the threatened strike by the railroad employes is commendable in extreme. He has held conferences with both sides to the controversy and it is confidently believed by many of those in position to know that his counsel will be of benefit in reaching an understanding by both sides.

At Gainesville an 8-year-old boy was playing with a shot gun and as a result his 6-year-old sister is dead. Fire arms are strange toys for children, but very helpful to the undertakers. The fellow who gives his children deadly weapons to play with is closely related to the one who takes the coal oil can to start a fire in the cook stove.

Many big newspapers throughout the country are planning to condense reading matter and reduce the number of pages in order to conserve the print paper supply. Scarcity of print paper is becoming a serious problem, so much in fact that publishers have no assurance whatever of future supplies. In order to meet the vastly increased prices made by the paper mills some publishers have raised the price of subscription. — McKinney Courier-Gazette.

The success of the Ford Motor company's business has been and is yet one of the wonders of the age. A statement by one of the officials of the company is especially encouraging to newspaper publishers. He says: "Our advertising department in buying advertising is absolutely devoid of sentiment as in the buying of vanadium steel or any other merchandise. We figure that it is as much a part of the cost of producing an automobile as is the steering wheel or the carburetor, and we buy our advertising in as cold blooded a way as we do the steering wheel. For our purpose we almost exclusively use the newspapers because we find that through them we reach the people along the lines of the least resistance."

The condition of the paper market is so serious that newspapers are being urged to use economy in their output and to conserve their available stock to the last degree. Many of the big dailies have reduced the number of pages of their regular issue, have cut off exchanges to a large extent and refuse to fill orders for extra copies by news dealers. Just when the conditions will improve can not be told, for the outlook is for a shortage far greater than that of the present. Of course the paper trust has a great deal to do with the condition and it is believed by many publishers that the government could assist greatly by putting paper and material entering into its manufacture on the free list, but this relief can hardly be expected for a long time to come.

USING THE FEED CROPS

It is hoped that a larger percentage of our grain, hay, stlage and other products of the farm will be sold this year as finished products than in years past. It seems that more feed has been and will be produced on farms in the Southwest this year than for many years. This is especially gratifying when we remember that it means better prices for cotton and greater independence among farmers.

But since we will have the feed it is highly desirable that we get good prices for it. Those who feed as soon as the crops are harvested are likely to receive low prices.

The best way to get good prices for feed crops, such as corn, oats, hay, sorghum, kafir, milo, febrita, Sudan, etc., is to feed these crops to animals and sell the animals or animal products. In this way the farmer sells his feed as finished products.

Not the least of the advantages in feeding crops to livestock is the conservation of soil fertility. Every ton of hay, every hundred pounds of oats, and every bushel of corn contains nitrogen, phosphorus, potassium and lime. If these feeds are sold the fertility constituents are removed from the soil, leaving the land poorer. If the feeds are fed to livestock and beef, mutton, pork, milk, butter, cheese, eggs, poultry, etc., sold, the fertility saved and returned, better prices are likely to be had for the feed and the soil maintained for future crops.—Farm and Ranch.

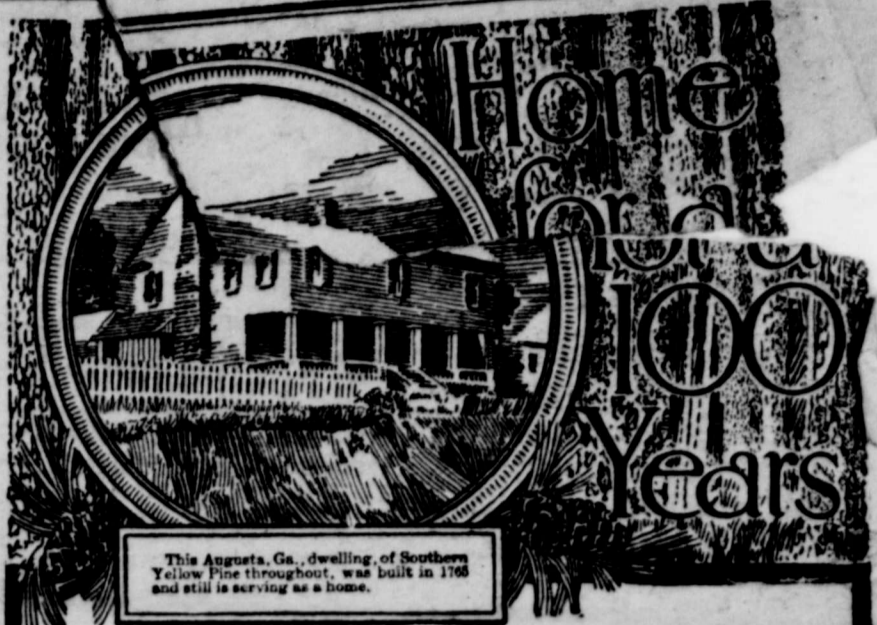
Mrs. J. A. White buried Dec. 16, 1916.

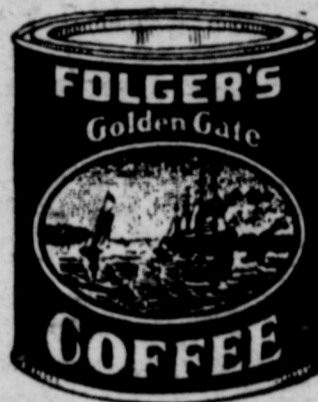
