Again has the Eagle been forced to decline a large advertising contract for a dry goods firm of a neighboring town. We sincerely appreciate the fact that the firm in question made the offer of business and recognized the value of Eagle advertising space, but the Eagle believes in advertising and is confident that the advertisements placed in its columns by local merchants yield gratifying results to the buyers and sellers alike. Therefore, we could not afford to publish advertisements that would induce people to go to a competing town to buy their supplies. There are few newspapers published in towns of Goldthwaite's size that can claim as liberal patronage by the local business men the year around and it is a duty the Eagle owes these business men to refuse to advertise for competing towns.

Besides this the Eagle believes it is to the best interest of the people to buy their supplies from their local dealers and to accept money for advertising for "foreign" dealers at the same time believing that best interests of the readers would be served by dealing with the home merchants would at least be a questionable transaction.

**FINANCE COMMITTEE MEETS**

The committee appointed to solicit funds to defray the expenses of the Democratic national campaign met in the court house Tuesday and organized by electing Hon. P. H. Clements chairman.

It was decided to appoint solicitors at Goldthwaite, Mullin, Star and perhaps other points to present the matter to the Democrats and assist in raising the amount expected of Mills county for the campaign. R. V. Littlepage and A. E. Evans were appointed to solicit in Goldthwaite, J. A. Hester and W. W. Tippen at Mullin, R. H. Patterson and T. E. Hamilton in Star.

All funds collected up to yesterday afternoon were remitted by Chairman Clements to the national committee in New York.

Mills county should raise at least \$100 and in reality should raise much more. The amount apportioned to Texas is \$100,000 and surely Mills county will do its part in the matter of assisting to finance the campaign. Those who can see the solicitors or any member of the finance committee and make contributions during the next few days are requested to do so, as the funds are needed by the national committee.

**CITATION**

The State Of Texas

To the Sheriff or any Constable of Mills County—Greeting:

You are hereby commanded to summon F. H. Perkins by making publication of this Citation once in each week for four successive weeks previous to the return day hereof, in some newspaper published in your County, to appear at the next regular term of the District Court of Mills County, to be holden at the Court House thereof, in Goldthwaite, Texas, on the first Monday in October, A. D. 1916, the same being the 2nd day of October, A. D. 1916, then and there to answer a petition filed in said Court on the 8th day of August, A. D. 1916 in a suit, numbered on the docket of said Court No. 1534, wherein Randolph & Allen, a firm composed of J. H. Randolph and J. T. Allen, are Plaintiffs, and F. H. Perkins is Defendant, and said petition alleging substantially, that on or about the 3rd day of February, 1915, said F. H. Perkins executed and delivered to said plaintiffs his promissory note, with mortgage clause, for the sum of \$552.20, bearing interest at 10 per cent per annum from date, and due and payable Oct. 1st, after date, and providing for the payment of a reasonable attorney's fee if said note is not paid at maturity, and is placed in the hands of an attorney for collection, which plaintiffs allege has been done, and that a reasonable fee for said services is the sum of \$63.55; that plaintiffs are the owners of said note, and that there is due and unpaid thereon, after demands made on defendant, the aggregate sum of \$699.30, together with interest thereon at the rate of 10 per cent per annum from the date of the filing of said petition, that said note further recites that it is given as renewal of certain other notes in said petition more particularly described, and that same is given for the purchase price of, Deering 6 ft. binder, and Double Disc Moline Plow, and John Deere Double Disc Plow, and that a lien is retained on said machinery aforesaid for the securing of said note. Said petition alleging that said F. H. Perkins' residence is unknown, that he secretes himself so that the ordinary process of the law cannot be served upon him, and asks for the issuance of attachment to be levied upon the property of said defendant. Plaintiffs further, by supplemental petition filed in said cause on the 24th day of August, allege that a writ of attachment was issued in said cause on the 8th day of Aug. 1916, and thereafter levied on the following property as the property of said defendant, to-wit: 1 dark bay mare 15 hands high, 10 years old, blind in left eye and has star in forehead, and her four months old black mare colt; 1 light bay mare, six years old, 15 1/2 hands high, has scald on right shoulder, and her bay horse colt about four or five months old. 1 light bay or brown mare 10 or 11 years old, 15 1/4 hands high, with white streak down face, and her blue mare colt about four or five months old; 1 sorrel mare 12 years old, 15 hands high, branded on left thigh, and with white spots on side low down, also her sorrel yearling horse colt, with blaze face; also one John Deere Double Disc Plow, one Deering 6 ft. binder, one Texas Dandy Cultivator, one John Deere two horse planter, and one John Deere Drag harrow, being same implements bought by said F. H. Perkins from Randolph and Allen at various times.

Said original petition further alleging that on the 3rd day of Feb., 1915, defendant executed and delivered to plaintiffs his chattle mortgage to secure said note, on following property, to-wit: one sorrel mare and her increase, mare branded 12 years old, 15 hand high, one Deering 6 ft. binder, and one John Deere Double Disc plow.

Plaintiffs ask judgment for their debt, interest, attorney's fees, costs of suit, for foreclosure of their mortgage lien, and for foreclosure of their attachment lien on above described property, etc.

Another division of soldiers, numbering 12,000 men, has been ordered to the border during the week. Just what the necessity is for this increase of force has not been made known to the press or public.

A proposition is under consideration in Ballinger to try for artesian water at that place, to supply the water works system. The long continued drought in the west has caused the Colorado river to become almost dry at many places.

J. M. Allen of Goldthwaite has purchased the Buck Taylor place on North Main street. Mr. and Mrs. Allen and their three daughters will soon come to make Belton their home. The family comes to this city for the benefit of the schools, especially Baylor college.—Belton correspondent of Temple Telegram.

When the German submarine Deutschland was preparing to make its homeward journey a combination of sports in England placed bets with the stock exchange in New York at fifty to one that the vessel would not reach its home port safely. As a consequence of their overconfidence in the English navy's ability to rule the seas they are out a considerable amount and many Americans are "to the good."

The death of Bank Commissioner John S. Patterson occurred at Waco Tuesday. He was shot and fatally wounded at Teague Monday afternoon when he attempted to post a sign closing the Farmers and Merchants State Bank of that place and the three Watsons, who were executive officers of the bank were arrested charged with the shooting. Mr. Patterson was carried to Waco and given attention by surgeons in the hospital, but it was thought from the first that he could not recover.

While the complete returns from the senatorial election last Saturday will not be received until the reports of the executive committees of the various counties, which committees meet today, it is known that Senator Culberson was nominated to succeed himself by an immense majority, reaching in the neighborhood of 75,000. The fact that Colquitt was defeated by almost two to one should be positive proof to the nation that most of the Texas Democrats endorse Mr. Wilson's administration.

The information is given that the threatened strike of the railroad trainmen will be called Monday, unless the railroad managers accede to the demands of the trainmen. The strike has been delayed for some time and to one on the outside it would appear that the men are doubtful of the advisability of their contemplated action, altho they voted almost unanimously in favor of it. They perhaps realize, or at least the leaders know that the public is not in sympathy with them and they must rely on their own force and resources to win the battle, if it is won. The public realizes that the railroad workers are the best paid of any class or occupation in America and that they work under more favorable conditions than any other workmen, as a body. Their demand for more pay is believed by most people to be unreasonable and the sympathy of the public as a whole, will go to the railroad managers. If the railroads grant this demand, even though it is not justified by conditions of the business or the service required of the trainmen there is no reason to hope or believe that the demands will stop at that, but other demands and requirements will soon be made and on and on the demands will grow. The money with which the increase, as well as the present high rate of wages is to be paid must come from the public in the way of freight charges and passenger fares and these rates are already so high that they are positively burdensome.

### ROUGHING IT ON THE PLAINS

Claud, N. M., August 20th, 1916.  
Editor Eagle:

When I wrote last I told about steering a barge. Since then I have been riding a sled, not the kind drawn by reindeer, over the glittering fields of ice, faster than a railroad train. We are told of a reindeer that carried his master 800 miles in one day. Somebody says 'I don't believe that.' Why should we doubt any story that comes from the land of the midnight sun. Perhaps their day is equal to one-half our solar year.

The sled I have been riding is a substitute for the cultivator. Two runners are framed about eight inches apart and an iron seat is fastened on them and a four foot knife is inclined from either side to cut the Russian thistle in the middle of the three foot rows. These runners just fit the middle buster furrow. The knives cut the weed roots and leave the deep furrow, where the corn, maize or cane grows and sturbed.

They tell a story here about a boy who came here in an early day when there was free grass and plenty of room for cattlemen. This boy secured employment and wrote back home that he got good wages and had nothing to do but ride the ponies and that he had sugar coated prunes to eat every day. It seems that this story has been circulated freely in the east. When a boy gets a \$50 saddle, spurs and lariat rope he thinks he is ready for the wild and woolly west. A young man from Oklahoma, came here with such an equipment a short time ago. He was brought out in an automobile. Next morning he asked Ernest "who rides the fence?" Well, I thought of Spurgeon's picture of a man straddling the fence. This young man stayed ten days riding a sled seated very near the ground with a fog of dust settling on him until he looked like an Ethiopian.

The work now adays on one of the ranches is running a fresnal, riding a sled, a two-row go-devil, a disc harrow, a seeder or row binder. There will be sown on this ranch—the sowing has begun—600 acres of wheat.

This is a great wheat country. There was only 60 acres in that made 630 bushels this year on this ranch. Most of this is saved for seed. They sow about three pecks per acre. They can't raise oats. It is the winter rains or snows that makes the wheat. Oats can't stand the winter.

Whatever a man's opinions are about foreordination, predestination or efficacy of prayer he finds when he comes to these plains that altitude has given this plateau a cool climate that the distance from the mountains and the sea gives a very scant rainfall. I have been here nearly three months. There have been several light showers, but the awful drouth is broken August 20th. Corn will make some very good corn. It will stay green until frost. We are feeding nearly 100 head of hogs maize—ripe maize. This maize is about 18 inches high and has very good heads. Between here and Texico there is a checkerboard of roads—a lane on every section line. In one field you see corn that will make fine and across the lane the field is laying out—no stand. One half the land is laying out. You see people hauling wheat every day. Some fields made 25 bushels per acre this year. I heard one man say he made only 4 1/2 bushels. They are still hauling last year's threshed maize and kaffir corn.

These nestors drive good teams. Some of these mule teams are richly compassed with an ornate display of rubber rings and brass.

Land is worth about \$1,000 per quarter section in the dry. Lack of water is the draw back here. I can best explain this by stating a hypothetical case. A man has a well bored 375 feet deep, cases it with heavy iron pipe, puts a deep well cylinder on the end of a 2 1/2 inch galvanized pipe, puts in a wood plunger and puts up an 18 foot wood windmill. It runs and a beautiful stream of good soft water flows, there are cement tubs or tanks for the stock. After about 3 months, one day the wind blows, the mill turns but brings no water. It is July and 2000 white faced cattle are silhouetted against the sky. The sucker rod is drawn. The trouble is not located. It is thought necessary to pull the 2 1/2 inch pipe and cylinder. While it is being drawn

a cable snaps and the whole mass is hurled 125 yards straight down. Dogs are fixed, the pipe is caught but the pipe and cylinder are all smashed and fastened to the casing. The combined weight breaks a steel cable and it goes down, the casing is broken in two pieces. If you have a quarter section and you going to depend on the man who has spent \$1,000 for water.

There have been mirages most every day here. The wild waves dash high against a stern, dry, smooth plain.

This is an ideal land for automobiles. The dry roads and level prairie with smooth turf. If a horse or mule gets so he is hard to pen just chase him with an automobile. I saw a horse that had slipped his bridle while grazing refuse to let anybody catch or drive him. That night he was brought in by a big car with the big flashing lights behind him he made a bee line for the pen. These little cow ponies are the toughest, hardest creatures in the world. They can gallop all day and go in a run part of the time. They have introduced some Arabian stock here. Near the ranch is a 20 acre pasture called the trap. One pony is kept up and next morning he is ridden after the herd of ponies and another is caught for the day, has the grass pony serves his master without any feed. In the herd is generally an outlaw that the boys never ride, but woe betide the bragadocio tenderfoot. This pony was named Rag-time on this ranch.

One Sunday morning a short time ago a young couple passed here in an automobile. There had been a light shower the day before, enough to settle the dust. The morningephyra were freighted with ozone as they went speeding, coasting and gliding along over the smooth prairie they were happier than the lovers strolling through shady lanes or wandering over vineclad hills. A pneumatic tire ran off, but this could not mar their happiness, on they went through two gates and through part of three pastures before they discovered the loss of the tire. They came back and meekly asked if we noticed that the tire was gone when they passed. The tire went off at a tangent with an accelerated velocity that carried it so far from the road they were unable to find it. This is a case of smooth sailing on the plains.

During the awful drouth this summer, cattlemen bought pump-jacks and gasoline engines. So the cowboys, besides riding the ponies and walking after the sod plows had to crank the engines. Cranking a 15 horse power is something prodigious, too. It is right amusing to hear a cowboy, with boots and spurs on, expatiating on the ding-fod on the loly-jigger that runs the whim wham. The modern cowboy should be a Harvey house cook and an accomplished blacksmith.

On these big ranches you see the nestors old dug-out on many quarter sections. He liv'd his time without finding out that the country is adapted to raising wheat. The cattleman don't like the nestor with his herd law.

I was in Clovis the other day. The foremen were giving their horses a drill. Just about dark they ran over a man on a motorcycle, fatally wounding him. Just after the accident a crowd had gathered on the scene. A boy, who was an eyewitness, was telling how it all happened. The city marshal asked the boy his name and then where he lived. The lad said 7 filings north and pointed up the street. The city marshal laughed. Thus do the street gamins joke at the poor nestors filings.

The city of Clovis has bored a well 500 feet deep and are raising it out to 36 inches in diameter to the water line 245 feet below the surface. A machinery room will be excavated and a centrifugal pump installed. Great things are expected of this giant well of the plains.
