**GOOD ROADS—PAY**

The good roads question has a real and tangible business side as well as affording a means of comfort and pleasure. We have just recently read a statement from a section that is now enjoying real highways. One of the men in the county under discussion was relating the value that the roads had been to him. He said that before the roads were improved he paid little attention to anything except staple crops and marketed them when the roads were favorable, and when they were bad he stayed at home. But, he said, after the roads were improved he noticed buyers got to coming through the country offering to buy all kinds of produce, delivered at his door and for cash. He decided that looked like business and he got in the game. And now he says buyers call regularly at his home for all of his eggs, chickens, for his cream, and produce, and he has no trouble in selling all he can grow, despite the fact that he is a good distance from a big town.

This same man also relates that since the roads are good, and riding a pleasure, the town people drive many miles into the country to buy their produce, chickens and eggs, and that any farmer only has to hang out a sign saying what he has to sell to find a quick buyer.

The natural conclusion of this man is that good roads have paid him a big profit. And it is just as reasonable to believe that the same thing will result in any section that has really good roads.

There are any number of farmers in Hamilton county who can duplicate the above man's success if they can induce the building of good roads their way.—Hamilton Record.

**A FIRE**

Insurance policy is nothing more nor less than a contract entered into by and between a fire insurance company and its policy-holder, and as is the case in all contracts, is based on certain conditions and performances to be observed by the contracting parties.

On this particular occasion, we, the local representatives of the various fire insurance companies represented in Goldthwaite, desire to direct your attention to the "Electric Light and Power Permit" embraced in the written and descriptive portion of all fire policies covering on dwellings and mercantile risks which reads as follows:

"Privilege is hereby granted to us electricity for lighting, heating and for power and to generate electricity in the premises prescribed in this policy, when the electric equipment is in full compliance with the National Electric Code."

As we have before stated, a fire insurance policy is nothing more nor less than a contract entered into by and between a fire insurance company and its policy holder; and, therefore, according to the terms of the permit above referred to, you will note that the policy-holder is not permitted to use electricity in the premises designated in the policy for any purpose unless the equipment is installed in full compliance with the National Electric Code, and the insurance company issues its policy based on the supposition that where electricity is used in connection with the risk that the necessary equipment is installed in accordance therewith.

While a knowledge of such matters is much desired of its agents by the company, yet it is not supposed that the local agent shall qualify as an electrical engineer, neither is it incumbent upon him to determine whether or not electric equipment is properly installed.

We do not have the space to go into a speculative treatise upon the probable attitude of a company suffering a loss occasioned by the assured's failure to comply with the conditions of his policy, suffice to say that, while we believe practically all of the reputable fire insurance companies are fair in the adjustment of their losses and are not wont to take advantage of the technical errors that come to light now and then in the adjustment of losses, still we could not presume to anticipate their action in every instance, and as the observance of the provisions of the permit hereunder referred to constitutes such an important part of the contract, we, therefore, believe it both wise and expedient, and we recommend it, that where there are those who have electric lights, or use electricity for any purpose, that they see to it that the equipment is made to fully comply with the National Electric Code.

Villa is again active in Mexico, notwithstanding the fact that he has been declared dead and buried several times.

The national census bureau has made public a preliminary report which shows the death rate in the United States in 1915 was the lowest in the country's history.

A troop train in Mexico was wrecked a few days ago and 40 greaser "soldiers" were killed. These greasers were in pursuit of other outlaws who had robbed an express train of \$60,000 gold.

President Wilson is to make his first campaign speech at his summer home in New Jersey today and he is expected to give his views on the recently enacted eight hour law for railroads and other important subjects.

The condition of the cotton market this week has caused the sights of many to be raised as to the prospective price the staple will bring before the close of the season. Some reach as high as 20 cents per pound in their estimates.

The plan to bring about peace in Europe has not been abandoned by Henry Ford, the automobile manufacturer. He still has representatives at various points in Europe, endeavoring to find a way to bring peace to the warring countries.

Senator Culberson is endeavoring to have one of the government armor plate plants located in Texas and to that end is urging Secretary Daniels and the commission of which he is the head to visit this state and inspect the iron ore and other resources.

Whether the railroads will obey the eight-hour law or fight the measure will be decided by the legal departments of the lines which are now engaged in a careful study of the provisions of the act, it was said by a high official of the Missouri, Kansas & Texas. Many believe that employes other than trainmen may be included. A meeting of general attorneys will probably be held in Austin soon.

The suit of Henry Ford against the Chicago Tribune for a million dollars is based upon an article published in that paper in June criticizing Mr. Ford's policy in the matter of employes of his company enlisting in the army. While the paper did not say Mr. Ford was an anarchist, as has been stated, it did say he would prove himself an anarchist if he enforced such rules as were reported to have been adopted in his business.

Had the Democratic state convention in session at Houston declared boldly in favor of the legislature submitting the prohibition amendment to the voters of Texas many county prohibition contests in the intervening time would have been avoided. A majority of the voters in the July primary declared in favor of submitting the question to the voters of the state and it is not done the Eagle predicts that those responsible for denying the voters the right to pass on the question will have cause to regret it.

The prohibition election to be held in Tarrant county next Monday is attracting more attention than any similar election has attracted in years, if in fact, there was ever such interest in a prohibition election. Fort Worth is the center of the contending forces and every argument and every system known in the context of the issue is being used. There are those who are confident the pros. will win, while others are equally as sanguine of success for the antis. There is no denying the fact that there is a very close contest on either side.




