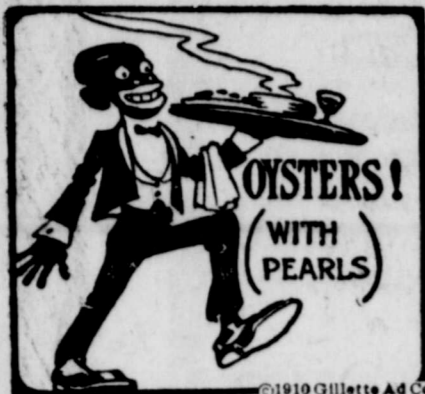

The little town of Carthage, over in eastern Texas, suffered heavily from a fire in the business district Monday morning.

Just where the end of the present high prices will be found is hard to predict, but it is a fact that a halt must be made somewhere in the near future.

The prices of wheat greatly advanced the first of the week, and as a result the price of flour was put up a few more notches, which comes pretty near being out of sight as well as out of reach.

The marriage in Oklahoma City last Sunday of Judge Thacker of the Oklahoma supreme court and a daughter of Judge Phillips, chief justice of the Texas supreme court was reported the first of the week.

Six hundred volunteer soldiers at Camp Wilson, near San Antonio, are under charges for trespassing upon private property in the neighborhood of the camp. Among other charges noted against them is that they have been "catching snakes" on private premises.

The trial of John Copeland on a charge of being implicated in the killing of William Black, an anti-Catholic lecturer, in a hotel in Marshall about two years ago, is in progress in Galveston and will probably consume several weeks of the court's time. A special venire of 500 men was summoned for the trial.

The jury in the federal court at Houston trying the case of Bolton and Taylor of Wharton, on a charge of conspiring to use for their own benefit the funds of a bank at Wharton conducted by them, returned a verdict Sunday, finding both defendants guilty. The men are brothers-in-law and one was the president and the other the cashier of the bank.

A man was arrested in Dallas Sunday who confessed to being one of the robbers who held up and robbed the Burrough's Adding Machine company of \$30,000 a few weeks ago. He implicated his brother and another man in the crime and said they secured most of the money. The officers only recovered a few hundred dollars from him. He said they expected to get \$180,000 by the robbery and were greatly disappointed.

The record for liberal campaign contributions has fallen to H. O. Gossett, manager of the free employment bureau of Fort Worth, who this week delivered to the Woodrow Wilson campaign committee the check he received for a full year's salary as water superintendent of Fort Worth. It so happened that the office was rather more honorary than burdensome and the salary was only \$1 per annum. Anyway, Gossett gave his entire year's salary to help the Democratic campaign committee.

In addition to making a living on the farm we should strive to make a life. We should do the things that help make the community, leave an influence that is elevating among young people and thus develop into ripe old age refined and benevolent citizens. Not all of our energies should be taken in making a living. Some ordinarily given to less important things should be given to making a life. Let the making of a life be paramount among young people. If this be done there will be a living commensurate with the life—a living that typifies and exalts the life that is worth living. This kind of character will be worth more than the wealth that could be accumulated and the end of such life will be the beginning. Such a living makes life brighter and better. Such a living is worth making.—Farm and Ranch.

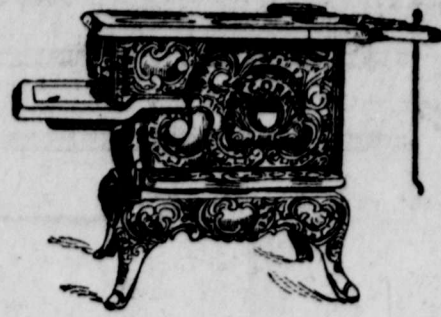

Our problem in the Southwest is to use land more profitably. That land is abundant and still comparatively cheap when compared to land of the same productive capacity in other parts of the country can not be denied. Yet there are thousands of acres where the income could be increased without great expense.

As population increases there will be a greater demand for farming land. Many of the lands now producing no revenue will be converted into farms or pasture to supply the demand for more food, clothing and shelter. This will make it more difficult for the homeless to secure homes.

The cities and towns are growing faster than rural communities. This is one reason why prices of farm products are increasing and land values steadily advancing. That the time will come when there will be a greater demand for farms seems evident. Even now many business men who have no idea of going to the farm see opportunities for farming and are anxious to invest in farm lands.

Tenants who are in a position to buy farms should do so without delay. Others should begin to save and prepare for home owning as soon as possible. From land prices in other localities with no better facilities than our lands in the Southwest, it is reasonable to expect that our best lands in a few years will be much higher. And judging from the way many of them are managed they will produce less than they now.

The country is concerned in having the lands yield income. Society is best served when the resources of the country are utilized economically.—Farm and Ranch.

COL. GOODWIN DEAD.

Colonel G. I. Goodwin died yesterday afternoon at 2 o'clock, after being ill since his wife's death several months ago. For a number of weeks his condition has been hopeless and his son, District Judge Goodwin has been continually at his side. Colonel Goodwin was 81 years of age, and leaves one son, Judge Goodwin, at whose home he died.

The funeral services will be held this afternoon at 4 o'clock from the residence of his son, Judge John W. Goodwin, at 1421, Avenue D, with members of the Masonic lodge assisting in the services.

Colonel Goodwin was a pioneer citizen who had much to do in the upbuilding of Texas and in the establishment of institutions which are making the state famous as the most progressive member of the union. He has taken a leading part in the legislation of the state, was a prominent member of the Baptist church, a consecrated Christian and veteran of the civil war.—Brownwood Herald, Oct. 27.

STATE HIGHWAY BILL

A report from Austin says: The State Highway Department bill, agreed upon by the Texas Good Roads Association and endorsed by Governor Ferguson, provides that the department shall be maintained from a fund to be raised by the collection of a regular tax on motor driven vehicles. The fee will be 25c for each horsepower with a minimum of \$7.50 and a maximum of \$15.00 per year. Motor trucks and motor vehicles for hire would pay double the fee required of vehicles in private use. Motorcycles are to be charged \$2.00 per year. One-third of the gross amount collected shall be returned to the counties from which it was received and used for road maintenance. The money would be spent under the direction and with the approval of the highway commission.

LAMESA

Editor Eagle:

As some of my friends asked me to let them hear from us thru the Eagle, I thought I would drop them a few lines.

We reached our final destination Oct. 2. We saw some pretty country and also some very rough, tho I like here in Dawson splendid so far.

Dawson county is situated principally on the south plains. It is a smooth, level country with the exception of a few shallow lakes scattered about. We bought fifteen miles southeast of Lamesa.

Crops are fairly good here this year. Feed seems to be plentiful and cotton made good where the boll worms didn't bother it.

A good rain fell here the 14th and grass is looking fine. The cattle are all pretty and fat.
