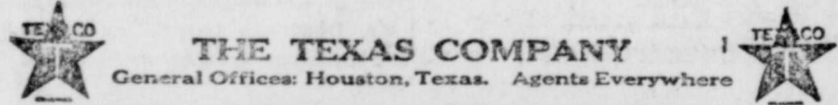

President Wilson's actions in severing relations with Germany was the signal for activities by a number of the smaller neutral nations, especially those of South America, who appeared to be awaiting the lead of the United States.

In an address in Brooklyn Sunday ex-president Wm. H. Taft advocated conscription for military service. He said the volunteer system would take the flower of American manhood eager to do service for the country and leave behind those who must be dragged to duty. He said uniform conscription would equalize the burden and the responsibility.

At last General Pershing with his punitive expedition is safely out of Mexico. It was the opinion of many that the return trip would never be made until the stars and stripes were planted in the City of Mexico, but the outcome of the expedition must be pleasing to everybody, no matter whether they favored going into Mexico in the first place or staying out.

The San Saba News has purchased a late model Mergenthaler Linotype machine, which will be installed as soon as all details can be arranged. This is another evidence of the deserved success of the News, which is one of the best county papers in Texas. Editor Smith is to be congratulated upon his spirit of enterprise and the Eagle rejoices because of his prosperity.

The war situation is the all-absorbing topic now and every citizen has a good cause for taking an interest in the subject for the situation is indeed grave. There has been a diversity of opinion regarding the rights and wrongs of the contending forces in Europe and every American citizen had a right to criticize and condemn any of the nations involved, but when it comes to this country becoming involved they all unite in the patriotic declaration: "My country, my she ever be right, but right or wrong, my country."

Great Britain is no longer the only nation that can say that the sun never sets on its territory. Since the United States acquired the Danish West Indies it can make the same boast. Hitherto the little island of Culebra, which is virtually a part of Porto Rico, has been our most easterly point of land, and the island of Babalac in the Philippines our most westerly point. The distance between them is just a little less than 180 degrees, or half the circumference of the earth. St. Croix in the Danish West Indies, is thirty-eight miles farther east than Culebra—enough to bridge the gap. Just as the sun is rising on St. Croix it is setting on Balabac.—Youth's Companion.

Secretary of State Lansing, by direction of President Wilson, sent Ambassador Bernstorff, the representative of Germany, his passport Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock, thereby informing him that all negotiations and dealings between this government and Germany were ended. At the same time the United States Ambassador at Berlin was recalled and the affairs of the embassy were placed in charge of the Spanish Ambassador in Germany. This action was the result of the proclamation by the German government that unrestricted submarine warfare would be resumed and that no warnings would hereafter be given vessels and no search would be made to ascertain the nature of the cargoes. As soon as the announcement of the severance of diplomatic relations with Germany was announced preparations were begun to protect this country's interests and uphold the honor and dignity of the United States should her rights be infringed upon or her commerce interfered with in a way not permitted by international law. The severance of diplomatic relations is not always followed by a declaration of war, but there are few instances where such severance was not followed by such declaration.

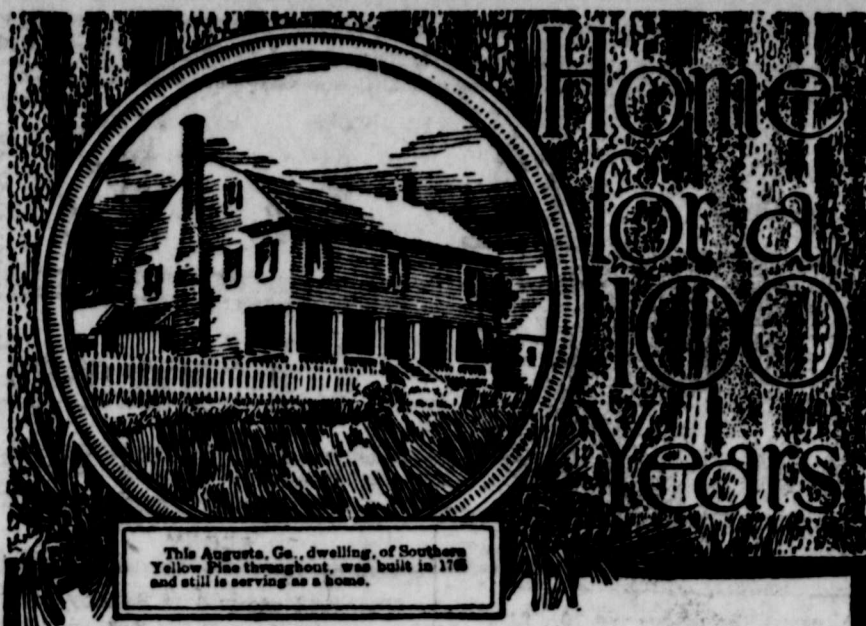

Coming down to sober thinking, there is need of looking into the claims which the Sunday has upon us. The old time doctrine that the Lord's Day is intended distinctly for rest from temporal care and worldly pleasure is a doctrine which needs new emphasis. The good Book holds out of the sanctity of the Sabbath and moreover the observance of which is necessary in order to the best type of citizenship.

Our Mullin friend, Mr. Cobb, has written some good things on Sunday keeping, which were enjoyable and should be helpful, but our moral weakness is such that we need a frequent reminder and in a form stronger than a hint.

There is in the Sabbath doctrine something fundamental. Everywhere in all the world where the Lord's Day is disregarded or desecrated the morals of the people grow low and hurtful. No one can use the day for gain or worldly pleasures without hurt to society. This is why the laws of our country have sought to save to it some degree of respect and reverence. I noted some time ago that statistics showed that Toronto, Canada, had less crime proportionately than any town in America.

In seeking an explanation it was stated that one could see the explanation by spending a few Sundays in Toronto and see how Sundays were observed. One part of the explanation used the following: "There are more people in Sunday school and church in Toronto than any town of its size in America."

Referring again to laws of the land, it's a fearfully weak life that tries to do nothing more than obey the law. I see no law requiring me to loan my wagon to a neighbor and I should be branded as worthless were I indisposed to loan. There is no law forbidding a fellow going down to the barns and sleeping with the horses, but wouldn't that be an unwholesome thing to do? I suggest if some of us don't do better on Sundays that it would somewhat demoralize a real good horse to compare with us much.

Then who dare steal time from the Great Creator of time. Suppose I should call on you asking for charity. My need is great and your pity is exercised, you happen to have seven dollars and give me six of them, keeping one dollar for yourself. While you sleep I creep in and steal the seventh dollar. Such inexcusable theft is too bad to joke about. "The ox gets in the ditch" so much these days and often Sunday is a day of sport until society is endangered. After much thought and observation I think it would not harm society and morals so much to go out in the darkness of the night and steal a little from our neighbors as to labor or sport on Sunday. For my part I am glad we don't need to do either. When we give the Lord's Day its rightful place in our thoughts and hearts it then will be that we can no more take God's time for selfish ends than we can take things of value from our fellowman. One great teacher and observer of another state made use of the following sublime statement, "He that has no Sabbath has no conscience and he who has no conscience has no God." SAM SAY
