#### PATRIOTIC SERVICE

##### A Large Audience and Interesting Program

The district court room and balcony were crowded to standing room during the patriotic service there Tuesday from ten to twelve o'clock.

The service was originally planned by the Commercial club, to do honor to the young men who enrolled for the army on that day, but the first program outlined was greatly augmented by the ladies clubs and in its entirety it was one of the most interesting services of the kind ever held.

At 10 o'clock L. E. Miller, vice president of the Commercial club, called the meeting to order and made a short talk, after which the program of the business men and ladies' clubs was carried out in detail with Mr. Miller presiding. The exercises were opened with prayer by Rev. I. T. Morris, after which Mayor Will H. Trent read President Wilson's proclamation calling upon young men to register their names on June 5.

Patriotic songs were sung by the audience and patriotic speeches were made by Messrs. O. C. Goodwin, L. E. Patterson, A. J. Harrison, J. C. Darroch and W. E. Miller, and a beautiful reading entitled "Your Flag and My Flag" was given by Miss Rose Keese.

The Goldthwaite orchestra furnished music throughout the time and the beautiful selections and patriotic music added greatly to the meeting and were enjoyed and appreciated by all present. The kindness of the members of the orchestra will long be remembered by those interested in mak-

ing the patriotic service interesting and helpful.

The occasion was one of solemnity and the feeling and expressions of the people were far from being hilarious or joyful, but it was a service in which everyone taking part recognized the gravity of the time and the meeting was appropriately closed with prayer by Rev. W. R. White, after the audience had sung "God Be With You Till We Meet Again."

##### BUY A BOND

It is the patriotic duty of Americans to buy the liberty bonds offered by the government and at the same time it is a good business investment. These bonds bear 3 1-2 per cent interest which is about one-third the legalized rate in Texas, but it is safer than any other security to be had and is exempted from taxation, which adds at least 2 per cent to their revenue value, as any other security would be liable for taxes at from one-half to three per cent and in some cases much greater. The amount invested in these bonds is not entirely lost to other investments, for the owner of a government bond can borrow within very nearly face value of such bonds whenever he desires to use the money. All banks and individuals recognize the value of these securities.

The Eagle hopes the Mills county people who have money to invest or put out on interest will buy a liberal number of these bonds, which can be purchased from any bank and all bankers will take pleasure in securing such bonds for their customers.

## PIPE LAYING BEGINS

### Water Works System Soon To Be Installed

Work was begun Thursday afternoon by Contractor W. N. Sullivan in making the ditches for the water works mains and he expects to have it completed and the piping in the ground in 40 days, altho the contract allows 60 days in which to do the work. A start was made at the big wells near the lake and the first line of pipe will be laid to connect the wells with the reservoir on the mountain side, in the eastern suburbs. The contract calls for 34,000 feet or about six miles of ditching, which will include the distance to be covered by the water mains, but of course does not include running pipe from the mains to the residences and other places where water is to be used.

A representative of the Oneal engineering company is here looking after the details of installing the water works system.

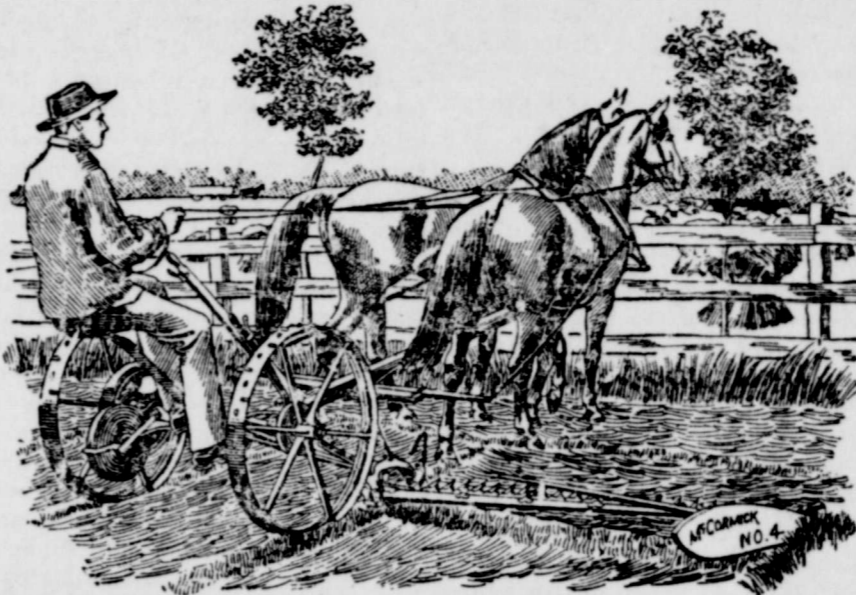

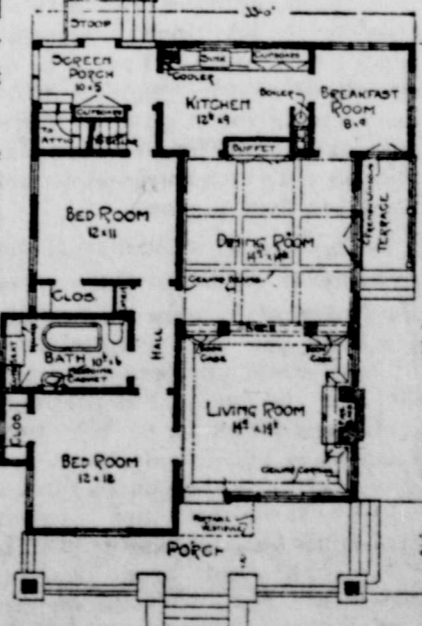

Cyclones killed a number of people in Kansas and Missouri this week and a great amount of property was destroyed.

The fact that Germany is planning to get a submarine base off the coast of Venezuela indicates that that government is not expecting an early settlement of the international difficulties.

Those who object to the selective draft as a means of securing the necessary number of soldiers in the United States army have a perfect right to volunteer their service before draft is made, even though they enrolled their names at the place designated Tuesday.

An alleged "black hand" letter was posted on the door of the postoffice in Dallas last Saturday demanding \$3000 from the postmaster. Monday a Mexican who is said to be sadly lacking in intelligence, called at the office and stated he desired to see the postmaster and get the money demanded. He was, of course, taken into custody.

The census of Mexicans from the border counties because of the fear of conscription for army duty has caused a serious situation with the sheep raisers, who depend upon Mexicans to shear the sheep. In some sections small grain growers are experiencing a shortage of harvest hands because of the departure of the Mexicans.

There was not much outward opposition to the enlistment plan Tuesday altho there was considerable talk and many rumors for some time prior to that date indicating that a serious situation might develop. The fact that the war must be won by America and those whose interests are allied is well understood and the American people are patriotic almost to a man.

The conditions in Russia continue to attract the attention and cause concern to those who are interested in the outcome of the European war. The outlook at times is for the people of that nation to stand firm by their alliance with England and France while at other times the situation becomes alarming lest the unstable people should decide to make a separate peace or discontinue their activities.

The council of national defense has a proposition under consideration to provide \$4000 life insurance for every soldier entering the government service for the European war, this amount to be free to the soldiers and officers alike, while additional amounts can be taken out by those who desire to do so at regular insurance rates, the United States government to finance the plan and provide an insurance department for that purpose.

Regardless of what may be the outcome of the action of Governor Ferguson in vetoing the appropriations for the maintenance of the state university at Austin and the medical department at Galveston, as far as the next session is concerned, there is sure to be a reshaping of the law which allows the chief executive such far reaching power. In fact, it has not been realized heretofore that it would be possible for one man to destroy the higher educational institutions of the state to satisfy a whim or to settle a grudge against some man or set of men. The truth of the situation has just dawned upon the great public and another session of the legislature will not close without steps being taken to prevent a recurrence of the difficulties in this particular.
