**FROM ROY HICKS**

The following letter received from Roy Hicks by his home-folks will be interesting to the Eagle readers:

Boston, Mass.  
 Sept. 24, 1917.

Dear Home Folks:

Guess you have been badly worried over me, but I couldn't help it. We were not allowed to tell when we sailed so I just dropped you a card. Did you get it? My address is U. S. S. Albany, care of postmaster, New York City.

We have been at sea 26 days. Only got in this moon and I'm writing this ashore.

I've been worried because I know you all have been.

We only allowed to send cards from the ship, so don't expect letters for quite a while after receiving cards. I like the life so much, but my! it feels good to be on shore. I have liberty now and can write what I want to this time.

We did not see any submarines—to tell the truth, I was so sea sick, I could not see for about a week any way. I thought one minute I'd surely die, the next I'd hope I would, and again I'd be mighty glad I didn't. "C." I was sick for a solid week. I'll bet I really vomited 100 lbs. of food, but I'm well over that now. Thanks for the small things and large ones in proportion. I think we will be in port about a month now, so every time I come ashore I'll write a letter. On ships, remember, it will be only cards.

The night of Sept. 5th, we came very near being wrecked by a storm. The wind registered 115 miles an hour and several times the ship almost turned over. I was on watch on the bridge and the captain said (while the storm was raging) that there was no chance for us. Well, I was scared, but I never let anyone know it. I did not expect to ever see land again, but we rode the storm safely, and I'm O. K. Two of our life boats were beaten to splinters, and our wireless mast was blown off. We tied ourselves with ropes to the bridge and then we would nearly fall off. The next morning only one of our ships was with us and we were four days finding them. There were two we never did find. Don't know what ever became of them. Just imagine the wind blowing 115 miles an hour. I hope I will never be that close to eternity again in my four years and surely don't think I will be.

I don't care very much for Boston. It's an awful dirty place. Say, I'm just in love with the navy. It's grand, and I'm happy as a baby. I'll write you a letter when I'm ashore, no matter what, so don't worry over me because I'm O. K. I love you all more dearly than myself and I'd not wilfully neglect you for the world, so don't worry. Write me all you can, but don't expect over one letter a week, the rest will be post cards.

Well, I'll close for this time. With oceans of love and kisses.

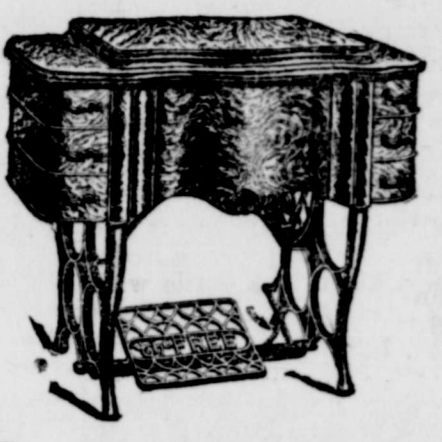

Tropical hurricane damage done in Florida and other states last Friday was severe, but the loss was not nearly so great as was feared when the report of the raging of the storm was first made.

The Federal bureau gives out the encouraging report that old High Cost of Living has been getting some hard jolts lately and that the indications are that his rule is nearing an end.

Petitions were presented in the United States senate this week asking for the expulsion of Senators LaFollette, of Wisconsin, Stone of Missouri and Gronna of North Dakota because of their actions and expressions relative to the war.

One of the American flyers, Douglas McMonagle of San Francisco, was killed in a battle with German machines somewhere along the front in France, a few days ago. One of the sad features about his death was that his mother was on her way to visit him and had almost completed her journey of 6000 miles when he was killed.

The campaign for the sale of second issue of liberty loan bonds was begun Monday and treasury officials and others interested expect the issue to be largely over-subscribed in a short time. The issue is for a minimum of three billion and will bear interest of 4 per cent. The bonds are non-taxable except as to income tax and are looked upon as a very desirable investment.

Governor Hobby has suggested that all cities desiring to have the new Northwest Texas insane asylum in or near them file their applications at once, as the board will soon begin inspection of proposed sites. The asylum must be located north of the Texas and Pacific railroad from Fort Worth to El Paso and west of the Santa Fe railroad from Gonzales to Fort Worth. At least 500 acres of land will be required.

In a pistol duel at Sweetwater Monday afternoon ex-sheriff and ranger, George McMeans, of Ector county was shot and killed, while Frank Hamer was shot and seriously wounded. The parties, with others were en route to attend the trial of a man charged with murder in Snyder and met in a garage by accident. Hamer, the wounded man, is the husband of the woman whose husband was killed in the Snyder tragedy.

It is stated by entomologists and others that there is no danger of the pink boll weevil becoming anything like a menace to the cotton growing industry in this country. The only place in Texas where the insect appeared was near Hearne and it has been decided that cotton seed brought from Mexico is chargeable with the weevil getting a start at that place, there being no danger of more weevil developing at that place or being brought to this country in the same way.

The legislature adopted the suggestion of Governor Hobby to postpone the building of the West Texas A. & M. college and several other educational institutions for the present, on account of the excessive expense to which the state has been put and the certainty of a large deficit in the state's revenues, notwithstanding the tax rate is to be the legal limit and the highest in the history of the state. Governor Hobby begins his administration in a way that gives reason for hope that that he will make good

## LIGHT, ARIZONA

Dear Friends in Goldthwaite and Mills County:

Arizona is a great country and considering the natural resources and surroundings, it seems to me the inhabitants might have everything they need in the way of material things. It is a very beautiful country too. In all of my travel thru the southeast corner of Arizona, I saw very few grave yards and the highest number of graves I counted in any one place was six. Homesickness seems to be the worst ailment that the people here have and I can testify to the fact that it will not kill anyone for I have had a very desperate attack of it myself since I have been here.

Some few people in this region are just now finishing proving up their claims on land on which they filed a few years ago. People from many states in the Union have taken up land here. Many families and some single men and young ladies have filed. In some instances only the wife and mother have remained and lived alone to hold the claim while the husband and sons or daughters were engaged in other occupations back at home. This accounts for the dreadful loneliness and homesickness that many have endured in this new and undeveloped country. There seems to be no more land here on which people may file, and were it not for war conditions, which is now hindering progress everywhere in this country would no doubt develop very rapidly.

There are only fourteen counties in the whole state of Arizona, the counties being very large. My sister lives near the central part of Cochise county, which is about 80 miles square, in what is called the Sulphur Springs Valley. We are surrounded on all sides by mountains—on the north by the Dos Cabezas range, on the south by the Swishelms, on the east by the Chiricahuas, (pronounced cher-y-ow) and on the west by the Dragoons. The mountains are very beautiful, but at times to be so surrounded gives one a desperately lonely feeling as if one were imprisoned or entirely shut off from the rest of the world. The valley is beautiful, too, with its large herds of fine cattle and fields of beans, as well as maize, corn and other feed stuffs.

Beans are the principal field crop and the one on which people count most as a crop to sell. It has rained here like it has in Texas this year, only in spots. Where the crop has been successful, people count on making fifty dollars per acre on their beans.

The crops here require much less work than in Texas because of the level sandy soil and because of the difference in the kind of crops planted. This is a fine lazy man's country when everything turns out well.

I must not forget to tell you about the fruit in this country. I have not seen any orchards in the valley and they tell me there are very few, but we made a visit Saturday to some friends of my sister's who live in the Chiricahua mountains or rather in a canyon of the Chiricahuas and they have such an orchard as I never saw before. They had pears, apples, peaches, plums, grapes and berries of all varieties in the greatest abundance. Some of the peaches were as large as the largest apples we see in the market and the apples and pears are twice as large as ordinary apples and pears. The delicious flavor of this fruit is beyond my power of description. It is said to be much better than California fruit. I sent my husband a box containing samples of a few varieties of apples, pears, peaches and grapes and I hope he will show them to some of the Goldthwaite people, for seeing is believing.

The vegetable gardens in this canyon are very fine too, pole beans are loaded with big fine long pods of Kentucky wonders, sweet peppers measuring from six to nine inches long and nine

The owner of this place has an automobile truck and is constantly going and coming from Douglas to market his fruit, getting from four to eight cents a pound for it. Scarcely anything is sold by the bushel, gallon or quart here, but nearly everything by the pound.

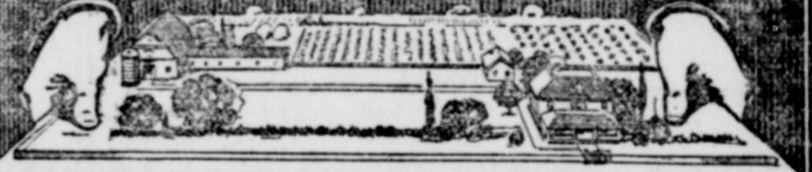

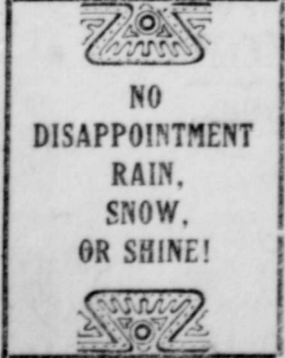

The government expends more than five thousand dollars a year to give free mail delivery to the rural patrons of this office, an amount in excess of the gross receipt of the office. Three routes are now served by automobiles which improves the service greatly. It is quite probable that the department will at an early day cause inspection of the roads, with the purpose of discontinuing service where patrons do not show a lively appreciation by giving some extra attention to the highways.

Those receiving benefits of rural free delivery should not rely alone on the road officials and county funds to keep these routes in fair condition, but contribute their time, and teams, if they hope to retain the good service which they now have. 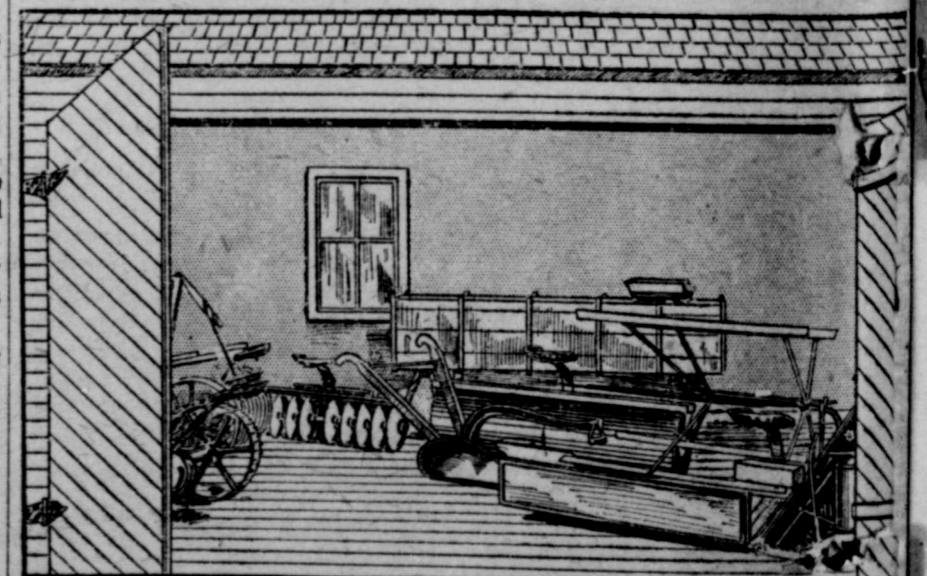
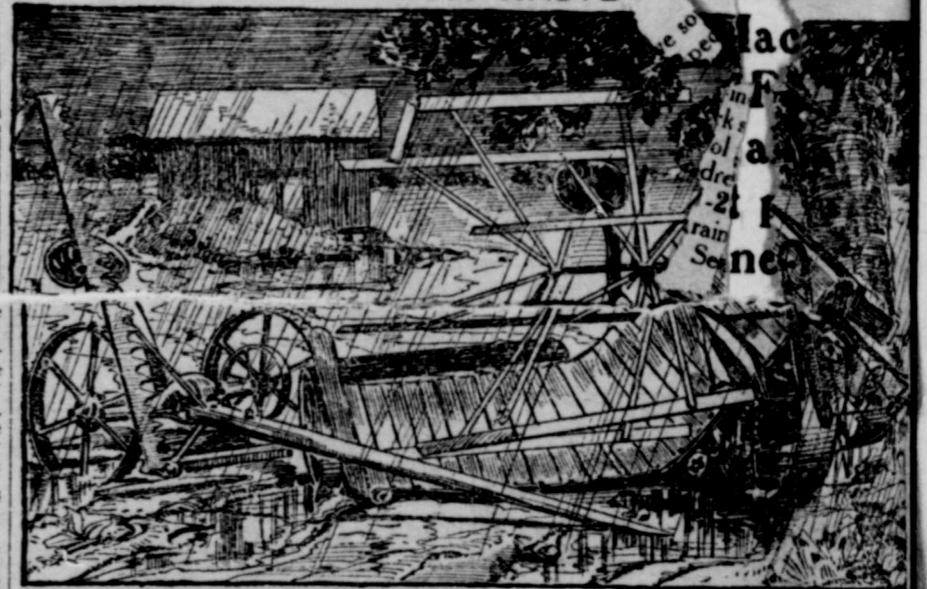

### FOR SCHOOL BENEFITS

The United States commissioner of education has issued an appeal to parent-teachers associations and mother's clubs urging that they use their influence to maintain the attendance in school. His appeal follows:

During the present school year and while the war continues, there will be many unusual temptations for parents and guardians of children to keep their children out of school, and there will be many difficulties in the way of maintaining schools at their full measure of efficiency. On the other hand, it is of the very greatest importance that the efficiency of the schools shall be maintained in every way and that there be no falling off in attendance. This is necessary both for the present defense of the country and for the welfare of the country and for the welfare and safety when the war is over. While we are fighting for the maintenance of democracy we must do everything possible to make the democracy strong and efficient in every way. This will depend on the schools more than on any other one agency; and I am, therefore, taking the liberty of suggesting to all parent-teacher associations and other similar organizations that they immediately use all of their influence in this direction. Of course each association will know of what is best to do for its particular school and community.

It is hoped that this appeal will be heeded. It will take the closest co-operation, as Farm and Ranch has often urged, to get the greatest possible benefits from the schools during such trying times as we are now entering upon. But the welfare of the state and nation as well as the individual and the community demand that we train the children and help them to be prepared for citizenship—Farm and Ranch.
