Three of Goldthwaite's enthusiastic good road advocates, Messrs. J. H. Randolph, L. R. Conroy, and Judge Weaver went to Temple this week on business connected with the establishment of a government highway thru this county. A special to the Temple Telegram from Belton says about the three gentlemen: Judge R. B. Weaver, county judge of Mills county, J. H. BRYAN SPEAKS

Gives Facts and Suggestions On Food Conservation

Hon. Wm. J. Bryan delivered an address in Houston a few days ago and said in part:

"We are now entering the biggest war the world has ever known," said the speaker "and this war is costing more than all of the world wars put together. No president has had to bear the burdens now on President Wilson's shoulders and no congress has ever had to solve the weighty problems presented to our present congress. About 1,000,000 of our young men are now being trained to take their places in the battle line, and they will soon be sent to offer their lives to make the world safe for democracy.

"Under the circumstances surely we at home can do our part by supporting the government in every way required, willingly loan our money and render the many services now possible. No loan we can possibly make to the government is equal to that of offering of life. On this day I want to remind the people that it has been said that food will win the war, and I believe that it is true. We must first feed our soldiers; and then feed ourselves, and save enough to feed the Allies.

"This a time of co-operation, and Herbert Hoover is now at work bringing about this co-operation and co-ordination that is absolutely necessary. We must intercede those who are producing, Mr. Hoover is appealing to the boys and girls of the nation, and they are responding by joining the corn, earning, pig and other kinds of clubs. They are doing their part. We must produce more pork, and I suggest that American cities for the time of the war repeal their ordinances forbidding pigs in the city limits. Allow city dwellers to keep pigs in the city under regulations formulated by the city health department.

"We are told that in one year people of this nation waste food valued at \$700,000,000. This will go a long way toward furnishing the allies with what they need. We must conserve our wheat and use corn, rice and other cereals. Our allies know all about wheat, but they can not use corn and rice to the same advantage that we can.

"Then we have been allowing \$145,000,000 worth of food products to go into the manufacture of liquors each year. The government has stopped one-third of this waste by closing the distilleries, but they let the breweries live. I cannot understand this. The breweries and the distilleries have been partners for years in this material waste of food products, and just why one-third of the wastage should be killed and the other two-thirds allowed to live is a problem to be solved. 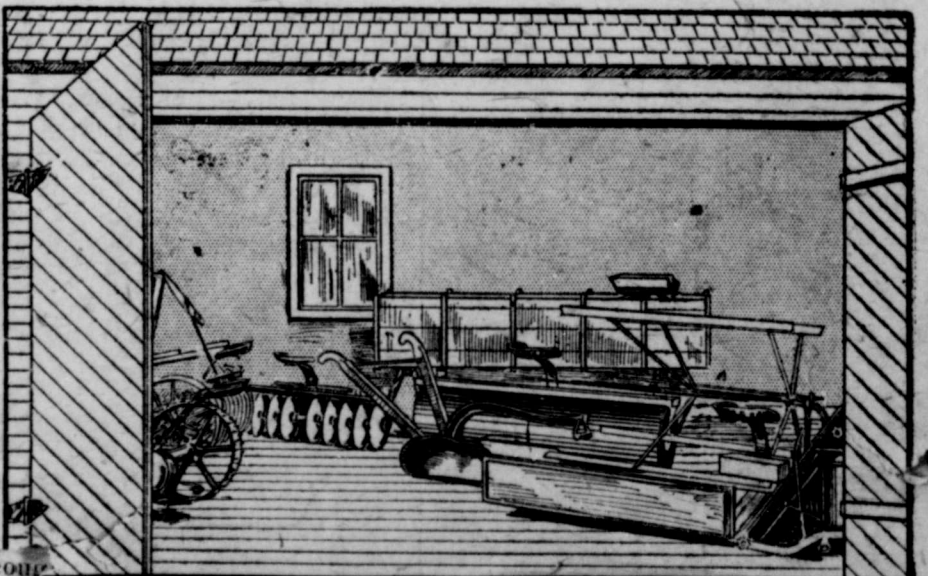
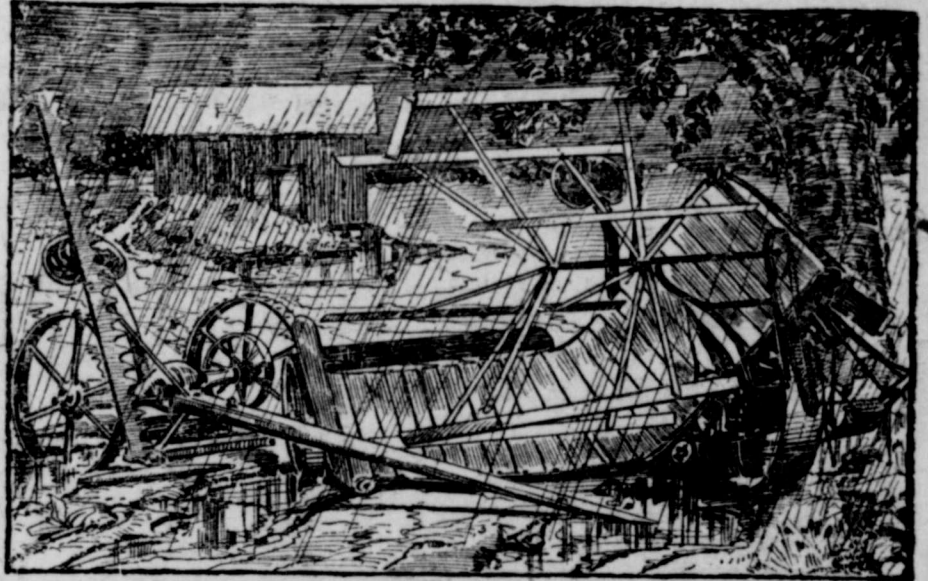

SOLDIER BOYS REGARD Y. M. C. A. AS GODSEND

PROVIDES SUBSTITUTES FOR HOME LIFE—GOOD CHEER, SOCIABILITY, CLEAN LIVING.

Texas Boy Says Can't Resist Writing Mother and Home Folks With Materials Furnished.

One of the most humanizing organized activities of war time is the work of the Y. M. C. A. in army training camps, in prison camps and in camps behind the firing line. Wherever your boy and the other boys may be sent that big organization will be close beside them with its tonic atmosphere of sociability and clean living.

Can't Resist Writing Home. Any one of the 75,000 Texas boys in the cantonments, or any one of the "Sammys" in France, would tell you the same thing this Texas boy wrote to his folks at home:

"I feel as if you ought to know something of the work of this life-saver—the Y. M. C. A. Since the 'Y' shack was opened, the Mesa bar and Bill's place are pretty well deserted. If you have loved ones at home, you just can't resist the open ink bottles and the pens and paper. It makes you ashamed to think that the 'Y' is more interested in your loved ones than you are. It hands you out religion in doses a man can take. It tightens up the halter that gets loose when a man gets away from home. Who pays? I don't know, but whoever it is, God bless them. They are—the fathers of thousands of boys."

Look to Y. M. C. A. President Wilson, Secretary of War Baker and Secretary of Navy Daniels are looking to the Association to afford them wholesome recreation, opportunity for study, substitutes for home life and manifold other comforts and necessities. The Y. M. C. A. program is designed to do just this thing for our boys from the time they enlist right up to the firing line—for they must die clean or come back straight if the yearnings of hundreds of thousands of homes are to be realized. To provide these few touches of home whatever be the money cost of doing so, is in reality an insignificant service compared to the sacrifice these men are making for us.

Texas to Help Generously. Texas is expected to give more than the \$400,000 allotted as her share of the \$35,000,000 national Y. M. C. A. war work fund to be raised in the campaign from Nov. 11 to Nov. 19.

While crossing the Atlantic the early part of the week Miss Helen M. of Milwaukee became in danger of submarine assault and jumped overboard. It is not known how long she had been absent from the ship when her state room was discovered empty, but she left a note which indicated her determination.

This is food conservation week. All over the nation there is a concerted action to induce householders to pledge themselves to the Food Conservation League. Formerly believed the campaign to preface "hard times" at home, are beginning to understand the true meaning of the campaign and its importance. We say that others may eat is the true meaning and the true spirit of the proposition.

A pacifist at Cincinnati, who in a public prayer last Sunday implored the Deity on behalf of the Kaiser and his advisers, was taken to the woods, in the outskirts of the city Sunday night by a number of masked men and horse-whipped. After he was released and made his way back to the city he announced that he was heartily in accord with the principles outlined by President Wilson in explaining the aims of the country in the war.

The announcement that deposited governor, James Ferguson, will soon establish a weekly newspaper at Temple has caused some interest and attention. It is presumed that the proposed publication will be strictly a political organ and deal with matters of state wide rather than local interest. The company to publish the paper has been incorporated for \$1000 all of which stock is owned by Mr. Ferguson except \$5 each owned by his former assistant secretary J. H. Davis, jr. of Temple and John Ward, an attorney.

Labor troubles and differences should be settled by arbitration during the war, if not at all times. The indications are that the federal government will have to take control of these matters and forbid strikes and lockouts while the country's every resource is taxed and its every energy is exerted to protect the rights of the people of other nations as well as our own rights. This is no time for men to attempt to fatten their own purses by taking advantage of the situation and those who are minded to do so by their innate honesty and are unmindful of the public welfare should be handled by law.

CLEAN COTTON FIELDS

Getting Rid of Weeds and Rubbish Will Reduce Boll Weevils

Next year's boll weevils can be fought very effectively today. The Bureau of Entomology of the United States Department of Agriculture urges that all weeds and rubbish be cleaned out of the cotton fields throughout the South at this time. All stalks still remaining in the field should be destroyed by the time of frost or as soon thereafter as possible. This cleaning up will decrease the possibility of destruction

of boll weevils next year. The species is greatly reduced in numbers this year, but although the boll weevil's strength is weakened at present he will try to regain some ground next year. To destroy weeds, rubbish, and stalks now is to destroy to a large extent his prospective army for that drive next season.

A concerted campaign throughout the South, if taken up immediately and pressed vigorously will save a considerable amount of cotton next summer. Quick action is the watchword for this work. Reports to the Bureau of Entomology from all field men in the cotton belt and from state entomologists indicate that this has been one of the lightest boll weevil years since the pest entered the country. The only sections in which the damage has been comparatively heavy are the sea island sections of Florida and southern Georgia, and the northern portions of the Mississippi delta. The cold weather of the early part of 1916, caused a falling back of the weevil around the entire limits of its dispersion last year and resulted in a great reduction of weevils throughout the South. However, about August 1, the weevils began to regain some of this territory and reports indicate that there will be some points which have remained infested throughout the year. These places will be favorable for dispersion this fall. Therefore, it is very important that a concerted campaign be undertaken now to clean up the fields and lessen further the boll weevil damage next year.

EXPERIENCE IN FARMING

There is an erroneous idea in the world regarding the value of experience in good farming. No amount of knowledge, as important as it is, can compensate for a lack of experience in good farming. Young men sometimes have the idea that a college course in the agricultural college is all that is required for a successful farmer. That a course in college is valuable and saves the student much labor and perhaps many failures no one can deny, but it is necessary that the student use the knowledge and theories to become a successful farmer.

The student of agriculture has far greater advantages than the farmer without college training. The college student may in a few years far surpass the practical farmer who has spent his lifetime on the farm, or the student may fail altogether. Training with experience will be required for best results.

With all honor to our colleges of agriculture, experiment stations and the various activities of the United States department of agriculture, the experience of our successful farmers is after all of paramount importance. It is the foundation of our agricultural practice and our farm management. Without this experience our agricultural literature would be lacking.

Is it not true that our colleges, experiment stations and bureaus engaged in agricultural propaganda are in danger of developing faster than experience proves the practice of farming? Are we not over-emphasizing the theoretical at the expense of the practical? Many persons

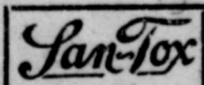

FROM ARIZONA

Light, Arizona, Oct. 29, 1917.

Dear Friends at Goldthwaite:

It has been a long time since I have promised to write you about the schools and social life of this state and I am reminded it is time I should fulfill my promise.

There are some fine people in Arizona, in the neighborhood where we are, and when I speak of our neighborhood, I include people for twenty miles around in every direction. A more friendly or hospitable people I have not met anywhere.

I have not had the opportunity to attend but one big social affair at which nearly all of the people of the neighborhood were present and that was the annual neighborhood fair the nineteenth and twentieth of this month. At this fair there were exhibits of agricultural products, stock, fancy work and educational exhibits. In the educational exhibits were map drawings, writing, spelling tablets, drawings in pencil and crayon, cut work, illustrated stories, booklets of pressed wild flowers, etc.

There were many stunts performed for the amusement of the people, such as horse racing, foot racing and riding the wildest broncos to be found in the neighborhood. Everybody seemed to like everybody else and nobody called in question the conduct of anyone else. As two men were preparing for a horse race, I saw another holding up a bill of money and talking to some other man standing near, I said to a friend, "Look! are those men gambling on the race right before the women and children?" She said, "O, yes, that is Arizona. People think nothing of that here."

We went home at the close of the day, but many stayed into the wee small hours of the night for the grand ball, and I might add that a grand ball is usually the climax of every occasion of importance in this country.

People who have been used to finding their chief pleasure in the religious and social life of the church feel rather lonesome on occasions of this kind. But one could hardly expect a different condition of affairs when there is no church anywhere for miles around. Even the best of people need to have the right way always held before them to keep them in the right path. The banner of the Prince of Righteousness needs to be continually held up before the people here as well as everywhere else.

There is a little Sunday school about five miles from us which we attend and it is indeed like an oasis in this desert of unrighteousness. It is a union Sunday school made up of all denominations, there not being enough of any one denomination to have a church Sunday school. The teacher of the adult class, to which we belong, is a fine old Methodist preacher rather worn out in body, but by no means in intellect. It is a feast to have him teach and explain the lessons every Sunday as well as to make an occasional talk after Sunday school is over.

The schools in this state are certainly well provided for, though it seems to me the school system is not so well developed as ours in Texas. I am not a competent judge of the Arizona school system, however, as I am familiar only with the curriculum provided by the state for

the country schools. What is called the eighth grade in this curriculum is about what we have in the seventh grade in Texas. Not less than eight hundred and fifty dollars per year in apportioned for any one school however small, and no school is maintained for less than eight months in the year.

A district may have a school if there are as many as eight scholastics in the district, the scholastic age being from six to twenty-one.

The average salary for male high school teachers is \$137.70; for female high school teachers \$112.47. The average salary for grammar school male teachers is \$113.94; for female teachers is \$88.24.

Free text books are furnished the children by the state as well as maps, globes, charts and other appliances necessary to be used in teaching.

When a person has taught as much as twenty-five years in this state he may retire on a pension of six hundred dollars a year. So you see there is really some encouragement for a person to take teaching his life work here.

Arizona has laid the foundation for great things in education and if the gospel of Christ shall spread and go hand in hand with her educational system, she will surely become a great state. I might say right here that if Texas had the money for her schools that Arizona has, no state in the Union would long outrank her in educational system. She has splendid courses of study and plenty of ambitious young teachers, but with the poor salaries paid Texas teachers, there is not much encouragement for many of them to stay in the profession long, consequently many of our Texas schools have as apprentice shops for beginners in the profession.

Arizona has a compulsory school law and no child of the school age is allowed to be employed in any gainful occupation during school hours. This law is not as strictly enforced in some localities as it should be, as its enforcement depends on the public sentiment and standard of the citizens in the district.

Teachers of the country schools are not expected to teach beyond the eighth grade. When pupils have finished this course of study they are expected to go to the nearest high school. This however, is not compulsory and many do not have the opportunity to go higher than the country school provides. MRS. S. A. LOWRIE
