FIREWORKS LAW

The following notice issued by Chief of Police of Houston is equally applicable to Goldthwaite and other towns:

Searcy Baker, superintendent of police, has issued an order to policemen to strictly enforce the laws in regard to fireworks during the Christmas holidays. He says the law provides that dealers in cannon crackers and toy pistols must pay a state tax of \$500 and a city license of \$250. Persons who sell cannon crackers and toy pistols without this license are violating the law.

It is also a violation of a state law to shoot a cannon cracker or a torpedo in a public street or within 100 feet of a public building. Chief Baker thinks the war conditions make it doubly important that ammunition be not wasted in celebrations.

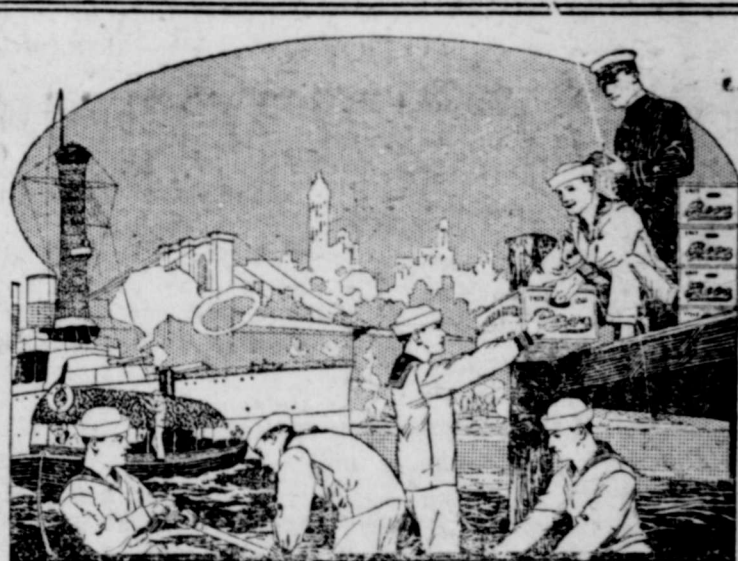

CAMP TRAVIS

The soldiers of Camp Travis
know that Christmas is coming,
and so do the employes of the
big postoffice that handles the
mail that is sent by, or sent to
the soldiers of this big camp. To
the end that the things sent the
soldiers at Christmas time may
be delivered in the best possible
manner, the following rules
should be followed:

Under the general caption of
"letters," all sent should be pack-
ed to stand the trip. Food papers as
ed in such flimsy containers and wast-
a shoe or hat box, is for mail. Only
ed, if sent thru the cardboard,
the heaviest kind of weight wood-
or better still, light boxes should

Don't blend liquids thru the
mail, unless in liquid proof con-
tainers. Glassware must be in
wood or corrugated paste board
boxes, well packed.

It is absolutely necessary to
place the correct and complete
address on every package. This
address must be legible, and it
must show the organization to
which the soldier belongs. An
address of simply "Mr. John
Smith, Camp Travis, Texas" is
almost worthless, for there may
be several John Smiths. But
Private John Smith, Co. A, Camp
Travis, Texas," enables the
postoffice authorities to locate
the party for whom the mail is
intended at once. It should be re-
membered there are less than
a dozen cities in Texas with as
large a population as Camp Travis
and it takes the strongest kind
of co-operation on the part of
all parties to insure that mail
matter reaches the soldier it
was intended to reach.

The postoffice authorities per-
mit requests "Do not open until
Christmas," or words to that ef-
fect to be placed on the out-
side of packages. The name of the
sender should also appear.

But above all see that Chri-
stmas greetings are well packed.
Send them early. Insurance
rates are reasonable and articles
of value should be insured
against non-delivery. The postal
authorities are anxious to give
the soldiers the very best pos-
sible service. This can be done
with the active and intelligent
co-operation of the folks back
home.

The fight against disease at
Camp Travis never ceases day
or night. Every little thing
that will be of assistance in this
guard against ill health is given
prompt and thorough atten-
tion. Just to show to what ends
this fight is being carried, a
general order has been issued by
Division Headquarters requiring
all barbers employed at the var-
ious shops in the camp to wash
their hands with soap and water
before attendance upon each
man. Towels used in a barber
shop on one man, must not be
used again until they have been
laundered. All shaving cups and
brushes must be scalded after
each shaving.

Incidentally it may be stated
that in many of the organizations
a flat rate of \$1.00 a month per
man is made, which entitles the
soldier to receive two shaves per
week and two hair cuts per
month. This arrangement is not
compulsory, but the cheapness
of the service has induced prac-
tically whole companies to en-
ter into such an agreement. It
may also be mentioned that
since beginning life at Camp
Travis, the general desire for
neatness and cleanliness in many
of the soldiers has grown with
rapid strides. A well trimmed
head of hair and cleanly shav-
en face are more in keeping with
uniform than a stubby growth of
beard and a collection of dis-
heveled hair. No man can be a
good soldier in every sense of
the word and be slouchy in his
appearance.

For the benefit of those who
may visit relatives and friends
at Camp Travis it should be stat-
ed that the best time to come to
San Antonio is on Saturday.

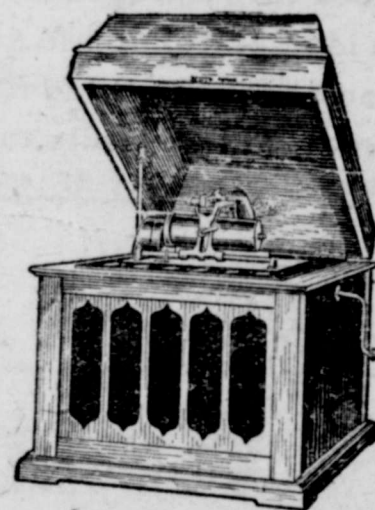

DEMONSTRATION

Commercial Club and Citizens Co-operate in Undertaking

Mills county is to keep pace with the other progressive counties of this and other states and will have a government farm demonstrator to assist the farmers and business men in securing the best markets for products, procuring the necessary seeds for planting and in many other ways, as well as giving advice as to the manner of cultivating and harvesting crops.

Messrs. J. L. Quicksall and C. H. Alvoid, representing the state and federal agricultural departments were here Tuesday and held a conference with the members of the Commercial club and other progressive citizens and an agreement was reached to have the demonstrator come at once and enter upon his duties.

Mr. Quicksall was here some weeks ago and conferred with the commissioners court relative to placing the government agent here, but his proposition was turned down by that body. The plan of placing a demonstration agent in each county where the necessary co-operation can be secured has been determined by the governmental departments as a means of increasing the production of food and feed crops and naturally the support and co-operation of the citizens of each county is expected and required in order to make the work a success.

Messrs. Quicksall and Alvoid are well acquainted with the conditions in this section and throughout the entire country, for that matter, and assured the citizens meeting that the best man available would be sent to Mills county, the citizens agreeing in case an office for the government representative could not be secured in the court house one would be secured at a convenient and accessible place, in order that the farmers, stockmen and citizens generally might have the advantage of the scientific knowledge and general information expected to be imparted to assist in growing more feed and food as a means to help win the war.

Mills county people are as patriotic and as intelligent as any people anywhere and they are entitled to an opportunity to cooperate with the government in the most important matter of helping to feed the world and their thanks are due the Commercial club, together with Messrs. Quicksall and Alvoid, for being given the opportunity.
