FIRST OIL SUIT

The first echo of the dissatisfaction of those people who leascd for oil development early in the game is now heard. The talk of cancellation has been going for several weeks. The first actual suit filed was for W. E. Johnson against S. H. Jackson, lessor, alleged insufficient consideration and various other irregularities.

Many of the first leases were taken for a small cash consideration and the further agreement to drill, pay a royalty, etc. Since the game became more interesting and the wells continued to come in from Brownwood field and further up the line the lease price has continued to advance. Now the lands in the north part of the county are leasing all the way from 25 cents to \$5 an acre. The man who leascd early for a nominal cash price and now sees his neighbor getting \$2 and more an acre is sore.—San Saba News

I was indeed glad to see the announcement of a woman candidate in last week's issue of the Eagle, i. e. Miss May Hill for county clerk. I think it is an excellent "war measure" to give the clerical work and such other work as women can do to them, for our experience so far in war has demonstrated that more producers of food are needed and the only way to get this increase of labor and corresponding increase in food is to release the men from other duties that they may enter the field of agriculture.

But this is not the only reason I was glad to see the announcement. I was glad because it is the dawning of a new era for our sisters and daughters in this county. It opens for them a new field of work and a new inspiration for achievement. Heretofore the only incentive for the farmers' daughters to qualify themselves by education for anything beyond household duties was the possibility of securing a place as school teacher and that, too, as assistant to some man in a larger school, else the teaching of some country school for a few months each year. If we open the county offices to the girls and let them know that the voters are ready and willing to give them an equal showing with the men we will make considerable advancement toward giving them justice and helping them to be self-reliant and self-supporting and certain it is that many women will have to be self supporting after the war.

I say, hurrah for the farmers' daughter who has come forward with her announcement and I sincerely hope she will be elected by a good majority, not that I have anything against any man who may want this or any other office, but because I want the girls—the farmers' daughters—to be given an equal chance to do work for which they are qualified.

SCHOLASTIC CENSUS

I have sent the supplies to each school district for taking the scholastic census, together with instruction sheet which the census enumerator will carefully follow. There are some changes in the manner of taking the census this year, but there is no need of difficulty if those instructions are followed carefully. There is a separate blank to be filled out for each child and the census trustee should be careful to put the name and age—surname first—date of birth and age on the first of September, 1918, and the parent should sign the card for each child.

The census must be taken this month, the summary and roll blanks filled out and reported before the first day of April. All children seven and under eighteen years of age should be enumerated. The census trustee should be careful not to miss any such child in the district and anyone knowing of any children not enumerated after the trustee has made his round they should notify the census trustee at once, in order that none may be left off the roll.

Secretary of War Newton D. Baker, is now among the soldiers in Europe, making a personal inspection and learning how the men fare and how they are progressing.

Nevada has a woman candidate for the United States senate to succeed Senator Newlands deceased. In her campaign literature the lady states she believes women should have a voice in framing war measures, as the welfare of women is as much at stake and as important as that of the men.

All Americans must feel a pride as well as satisfaction over the heroic action of our troops on the European battlefield. They fight with such speed and determination, regardless of the dangers that the enemy is appalled and in many instances put to rout without our boys receiving injuries of any kind. As the American forces are increased on the other side the victories will be more numerous and the acts of valor more common.

The federal congress has given authority to the custodian of alien-owned property to sell all property in America belonging to alien enemies and retain the receipts for disposition after the war. During the discussion of the subject it was shown that even the kaiser of Germany has large and lucrative business investments in this country. The action by congress will forever close to alien enemies the business channels in the United States that have been profitable to them for generations.

An order has been issued by Provost Marshal Crowder calling for 95,000 men in five days from March 29. A part of this number will be supplied from the list of those not yet called into service from the first draft and the remainder will be made up from the second draft. It is stated that 800,000 more men will be called into service during the year, movement to begin as soon as congress makes the necessary provisions for the appointment of men to the states on the basis of registrants instead of population.

By an agreement between the senate and house in the matter of the date for the 10-mile zone law to become effective, the law will go into effect April 15. It will also be unlawful to sell liquor in any but incorporated towns or cities in this state. This measure was necessary to prevent saloons being placed at roadsides and elsewhere just outside the 10-mile limit from cantonments and ship-building yards. Every day brings us nearer the time when old John Barleycorn will pack his grip and say goodbye forever.

When John Redmond died in a London hospital Wednesday Ireland lost her greatest leader. Redmond was indeed a statesman in fact as well as in name and brought reforms for his country by a battle of brains, when such achievements are more often attained by revolutions and bloodshed. For more than a quarter of a century John Redmond occupied highest rank as a leader of Irish nationalists and his achievements for his nation forced the admiration of his opponents and the world at large. Parnell was, perhaps a greater man in some respects and O'Brien was undoubtedly a man of ability, but neither of them held leadership in Ireland for so long a time and certain it is that neither accomplished as much for their nation as did Redmond.

Special attention is called to the following requirements of the law:

Every unmarried person receiving, during 1917, a net income of \$1000.00 or more, and every married person receiving a net income of \$2000.00, or more, is required to make a report, using Form 1040-A. If the net income was \$3000.00, or more, form 1040 should be used.

Every person receiving a net income of \$6000.00, or more, is required to file a report under the War Excess Profits Tax Law, using Form 1101.

Every person who pays another person, firm, or corporation \$800 or more, in way of rents, salaries, or interest, must report the fact, using Form 1099 and Form 1096.

All corporations are required to report on Form 1031 and this report is required, regardless of whether the company had an income.

Every corporation having a net income of \$3000.00, or more, must file a report under the War Excess Profits Tax Law, using Form 1103; likewise a report showing each payment of rent, salary, or interest, amounting to \$800.00, or more, using Form 1099.

Partnerships receiving a net income of \$5,000.00, or more must file a report under the War Excess Profits Tax Law, using Form 1102. They must also file returns of information on Form 1099, accompanied by Form 1096, showing all payments of salaries, rents, or interest amounting to \$800.00, or more.

Reports on Form 1099 are required of banks that pay interest on deposits, either to individuals or to other banks, in fact this report is required for any payment amounting to \$800 or more, by any firm or corporation, to another firm or corporation, except in the payment of corporation dividends.

All persons, firms or corporations, who pay any fixed or determinable income to a non-resident alien are required to file report on Form 1042, and withhold income tax at the source. Also corporations paying interest on tax free bonds are required to report such payments monthly on Form 1012. Bond interest paid to non-resident aliens is subject to withholding, whether bonds carry tax-free clause or not.

A part of this number will be supplied from the list of those not yet called into service from the first draft and the remainder will be made up from the second draft. It is stated that 800,000 more men will be called into service during the year, movement to begin as soon as congress makes the necessary provisions for the apportionment of men to the states on the basis of registrants instead of population.

By an agreement between the senate and house in the matter of the date for the 10-mile zone law to become effective, the law will go into effect April 15. It will also be unlawful to sell liquor in any but incorporated towns or cities in this state. This measure was necessary to prevent saloons being placed at roadsides and elsewhere just outside the 10-mile limit from cantonments and ship-building yards. Scrapings from cowlots and barnyards are not included in this plan, but the owners of premises where stock or fowls are kept should see to it that all lots, barns, pens and buildings are properly cleaned and necessary disinfectants used.

INCOME TAX

Special attention is called to the following requirements of the law:

Every unmarried person receiving, during 1917, a net income of \$1000.00 or more, and every married person receiving a net income of \$2000.00, or more, is required to make a report, using Form 1040-A. If the net income was \$3000.00, or more, form 1040 should be used.

Every person receiving a net income of \$6000.00, or more, is required to file a report under the War Excess Profits Tax Law, using Form 1101.

Every person who pays another person, firm, or corporation \$800 or more, in way of rents, salaries, or interest, must report the fact, using Form 1099 and Form 1096.

All corporations are required to report on Form 1031 and this report is required, regardless of whether the company had an income.

Every corporation having a net income of \$3000.00, or more, must file a report under the War Excess Profits Tax Law, using Form 1103; likewise a report showing each payment of rent, salary, or interest, amounting to \$800.00, or more, using Form 1099.

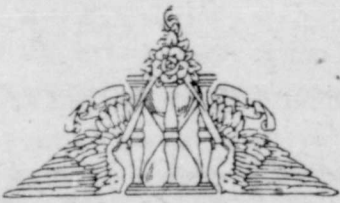

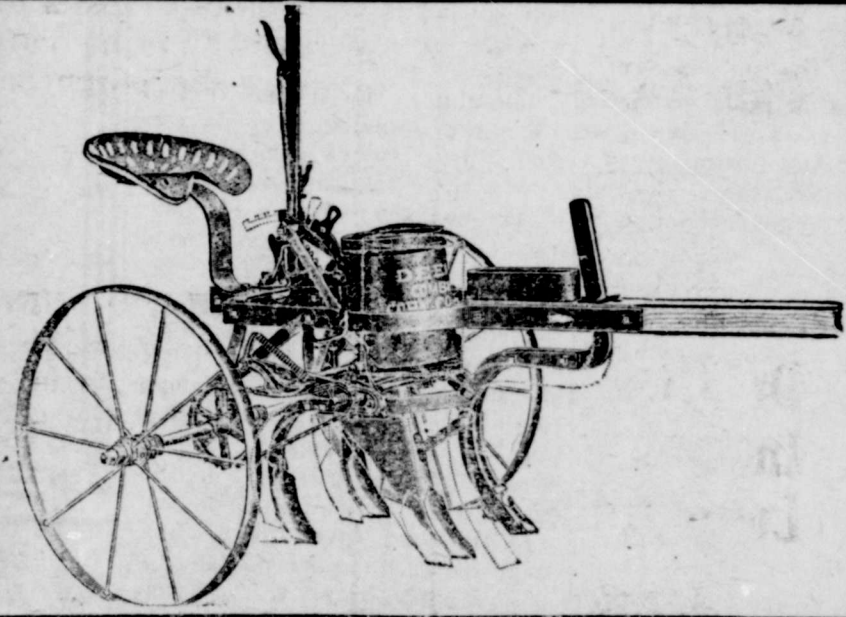
MISS ANNIE POWERS

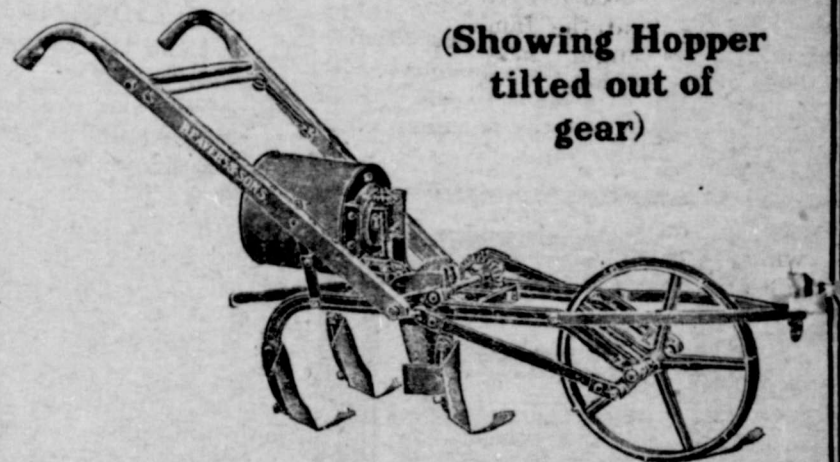
