FOOD WILL WIN THE WAR

Governor Hobby signed the state wide prohibition bill Thursday and the law becomes effective June 26, putting prohibition in force in this state. Already the legislature had adopted and the governor had signed the bill prohibiting the sale of liquor in ten miles of any army training camp. The bill allowing women to vote in the July primary has not been finally disposed of by the governor, but it is certain of approval and the ladies may as well begin to select their candidates for nomination. The matter of female suffrage in general elections is one to be reached by constitutional amendment, but as nominations in Texas are equivalent to an election the ladies need not bother about not being allowed to vote in November. The constitutional amendment allowing equal suffrage will be adopted whenever it is submitted to the voters which will be at no far distant day.

No business man in any town should allow a newspaper published in his town to go without his name and business being mentioned somewhere in its columns. This applies to all kinds of business—general stores, dry goods, groceries, furniture dealers, manufacturing establishments and professional men. This does not mean that you should have a whole or half page or even a quarter page but your name and business should be mentioned if you do not use over a two lines of space. A stranger picking up the paper should be able to tell just what business is represented in the town by looking at business mentioned in the paper. This is the best possible town advertising. The man who doesn't advertise does an injustice to himself and his city. One who insists on sharing the business that comes to town but refuses to advertise his business is not a valuable addition to any town.—Montana Trade Journal.

VOTERS RESPONSIBLE

The time is here when every voter should know what he is doing. Furthermore every loyal citizen has the right to know why he is doing it. Ballots control the policy of our government and upon our governmental policy depends American liberty. When we permit the reckless use of the ballot we gamble with the enemy. Whoever wins controls. Russia's pitiful predicament is but the result of enemy propaganda tampering with the government at home in order to disrupt the army at the front. The ballot is the front line of American defense. Let none but patriots be placed on guard.

Unless a voter can read, mark his own ballot he cannot understand the effect and purpose of the vote he casts. The legislature is now in session. It has the power to amend the election law so as to provide that all voters shall mark their own ballots. This would eliminate most of the undesirable "declaration of intention" votes. Actual citizens should wire their representatives and senators to amend the law so that every voter shall make out his own ballot.—Farm and Ranch.

It is estimated that the female suffrage act will increase the vote in the Democratic primary in July at least 50 per cent.

The business section of Temple suffered a \$90,000 fire Monday morning, when one of the largest dry goods stores of the town burned.

Two soldiers from Illinois at Houston, who attempted to escape military duty by shooting each other in the foot, have been sentenced to federal prison for fifteen years.

According to reports Texas fell behind in the sale of War Savings Stamps and Certificates for the month of February. When the final count is made, however, it will be found that the Lone Star State is well up at the front.

Already eight states have ratified the federal prohibition amendment. While it was stated in the outset that six years would be required to get a hearing from all the states, the present rate indicates the matter will be settled in much less time.

It is announced that Secretary McAdoo will make a tour of Texas in April and deliver at least three addresses on the third Liberty loan. Already he has agreed to speak in Houston, San Antonio and El Paso and it is thought possible he will speak in Waco, Dallas and Fort Worth.

The cotton market this week reached the highest point known in recent years. Before the high price of feed stuff and food crops the increased price for cotton would have been a great incentive to grow more of the staple, but now the farmers know that a small crop of cotton gets more money than a large crop and they can get a good price for all the food and feed crops they can grow.

Sunday night at Clairemont, Kent county, Judge C. C. Higgins was assassinated while at supper in a hotel. He served as district judge in that district for eighteen years and at the time of his elevation to the bench was the youngest judge in the state. He had retired from the bench and was engaged in the practice of his profession and is supposed to have been killed by some one whom he had opposed in a law suit.

Many arrests have been made throughout the country of persons who have been circulating a book alleged to have been written by "Pastor" Russell entitled "The Finished Mystery" and containing unpatriotic matter. An order was issued by the department of justice some weeks ago against the circulation of that and kindred literature. All persons having a copy of this book in their possession would do well to deliver it to the federal authorities.

The "daylight saving" bill was finally passed by congress last Saturday and becomes effective March 31. At 2 o'clock on the morning of that day all clocks are to be set forward one hour and will continue on that schedule until Oct. 27, when they will be turned backward one hour, making the time then the same as now. By the new arrangement it is believed many millions of dollars will be saved to the American people and the plan is accepted with enthusiasm all over the country. Those who fail to advance their time-pieces on the last Sunday in this month will find themselves out of balance with the rest of the world.

TWO MORE MONTHS OF SCHOOL

I wish at this time to say a word to our patrons in regard to the work we are expecting to accomplish during the closing months of school. Many times the question is discussed among our patrons, do our schools accomplish as much toward the real advancement of the child as it should be during the closing months?

Many times this question must be answered in the negative for a number of reasons, but mainly on account of the child drifting into the habit that as school is nearing a close their work is finished. Then sometimes the pupil assumes a state of indifference on account of their teacher failing to stress the importance of the last few months of work, but mainly by the child assuming their work finished, and spending two and three nights out of each week away from their studies. No child can be expected to accomplish any great deal and be allowed to take part in very much social going during school nights.

In this connection, I want to be plainly understood by the patrons, and that is I shall not only expect faithful and efficient work from your children during the last months of school, but it becomes my duty to insist that this work be kept up earnestly from the primary grades up to and including the senior work in the high school before I can feel myself justifiable in signing any certificates of promotion or diplomas.

The teachers, with your splendid co-operation, have worked hard to give to you the best school possible under the circumstances, and I believe that the great majority of the patrons of the Goldthwaite schools are satisfied with our efforts, but in order to give to you the very best service possible during the remainder of the term, I must again call upon each patron to co-operate with us in seeing to it that your child devotes his very best efforts to his school work during the coming two months. It will be absolutely necessary that the children abstain from any going during school nights if they are to do their work creditably. I am very sorry to say that I find a great disposition on the part of the children in all grades to look upon their work as practically finished and nothing to do but await the end. This policy must not be, and I am going to expect real work from each pupil until the last week of school.

I have had the splendid co-operation of all the patrons so far in all our school moves, and I feel that I may depend upon each one in this case to help me to see to it that your child gets all possible out of the remaining term.

I have tried, since coming to your town, to devote my entire time strictly to the school business and while I have made mistakes, and there are possibly those who do not agree with all my work, yet the motive I had in view has at all times been for the good of the school.

FARM LOAN BANK

Editor Eagle:

Every few days I receive letters from some one asking for information as to how they should proceed in securing a loan from the Federal Farm Loan Bank of Houston, Texas. Through the columns of the Eagle I shall try to give some information which will be of value to those desiring to secure loans:

First—If you own a piece of land unincumbered with a mortgage or a mechanics lien and the title for which the loan must be upon the land and the improvement thereon, before your application is considered.

Second—If you own a piece of land worth \$4000, and the debt on it is \$1000, you can not borrow \$2000, the excess of your equity for improvement.

Third—If you own a piece of land worth \$2000, and you have a mortgage on it for \$1000, you can borrow \$1000, the excess of the appraised value of the land and use it for improving such as fencing, digging, wells, wind mills and buying machinery. You can not use the money to buy cultivators, reapers, wagons or anything that does not add to the value of the land.

Fourth—If you wish to borrow on two or more tracts of land you should give field notes of each tract separate from the other, as you can only borrow on each tract separately. For instance: If you owe \$400 on one piece of land and \$600 on the other you can not borrow \$1000 on the two as each tract is the security for its own indebtedness.

Every application for a loan should be type written and every question answered and an affidavit made that same is a correct answer. All applications should be filled out and sworn to and sent to the secretary-treasurer of whatever association you wish to become a member. The Bethel association charges \$2.50 as membership fee, which must be paid when application is delivered by secretary-treasurer. These charges are for the purpose of paying the secretary-treasurer. After a loan has been approved by the bank those abstracts should have been brought down to date and those not having abstracts should have them made at once, so as not to delay the loan longer than necessary.

All loans not closed by April 15 will bear 5 1/2 per cent interest. All payments are semi-annually. All loans are for a term of 36 years, but you can pay all or part of loan after 5 years. Each borrower must take stock to the amount of 5 per cent of his loan. Those borrowing on homesteads must send for stock before vouchers are issued for their money. Those borrowing on land in excess of a homestead can have money for stock retained from loan.

Now, I believe this is all the information necessary for any one to understand in order to make application for loan correctly. The Federal Farm Loan Bank has now passed out of the stage of experimental legislation and have become a permanent institution of our state and nation and thousands of farmers in Texas are receiving the benefit of low rate of interest and long term payments. Contrary to expectations of many, the bankers and business men of our country have fallen in line and are doing everything in their power to help us secure these loans and I am sure us farmers heartily appreciate their good will and assistance.

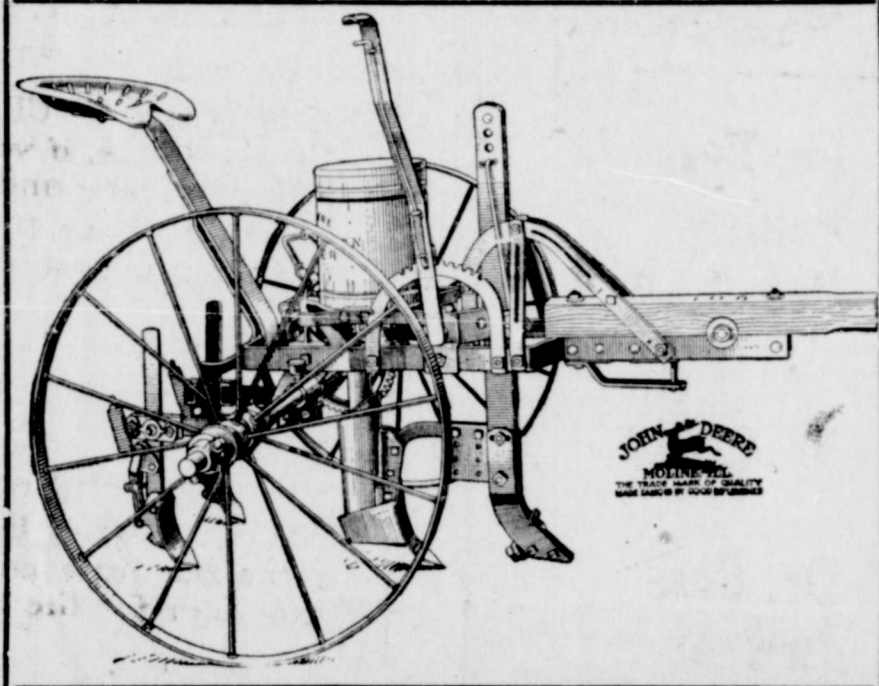

FLOUR REGULATION

On account of the flour situation throughout Texas, caused mainly by transportation difficulties, the following program should be followed to the letter, by retailers selling to the consumer, and this new program cancels recent orders covering sales of flour in twelve and twenty-four pound packages.

Retailers are permitted to sell consumers a thirty day supply of flour, basing such sales on an allowance of six pounds per person per month, provided said six pounds is not in excess of 70 per cent of consumer's normal requirements.

Retailers, as far as possible, should confine their sales to their regular customers, and must satisfy themselves as to the number of persons supplied by the individual purchaser. Retailers are required to keep a record of their flour sales, which record shall be open to inspection of representatives of the U. S. Food Administration at all times.

No retailer of wheat flour is permitted to sell or deliver any wheat flour unless he sells at the same time an equal weight, pound for pound, of any or all of the following wheat flour substitutes: Corn meal, hominy (not canned), grits, edible corn starch, corn starch, barley flour, rice, oat meal, rolled oats, buckwheat flour, potato flour, sweet potato flour, soy bean flour, feterita flour and meal.

Prepared so called breakfast foods and pan cake flour not considered as wheat substitutes. Rye flour not a substitute. Whole wheat and graham flour may be sold with the above substitutes in proportions of 6-10 of a pound of substitutes to each pound of whole graham flour. Housewives are requested to use their flour for bread purposes only, and in making biscuits or bread they should use as much substitutes as possible with wheat flour. As pastries, cakes, etc., are luxuries, the housewife should consider it a patriotic duty to refrain from making or consuming same, as long as the present situation lasts.

Farmers with home grown substitutes on hand remain on the same basis as formerly in purchasing flour, but must cut their consumption down to six pounds per person per month.

WATCHING PLANTS

By watching plants from the time the seeds germinate till the crop is ready for harvest much valuable information can be had. Any one who observes plants may determine the needs of his soil.

The farmer who observes can tell what fields he should drain, terrace or irrigate. He can determine the best direction to run the rows, the seasons best for planting, cultivating, harvesting, etc. He soon learns the crops that will likely be best for the various fields and can then arrange his rotation to include the best crops as often as is consistent with good farming.

In seed selection it is necessary that the manager study his plants carefully to determine those that show vigor, earliness, yield, freedom from diseases, etc. It is not enough to go over the fields at harvest time to select the best for seed; the plants should be observed during the growing season so selection may be made intelligently. Some plants that make a good showing during the season may not be suitable seed. It will take all the information you can get to select the desirable for seed.—Farm and Ranch

This committee can continue to gather books until a call is made for them. Don't let any books get yellow on your shelves. Send them where they may afford a pleasurable hour or two for the men who are fighting for your home and fireside.

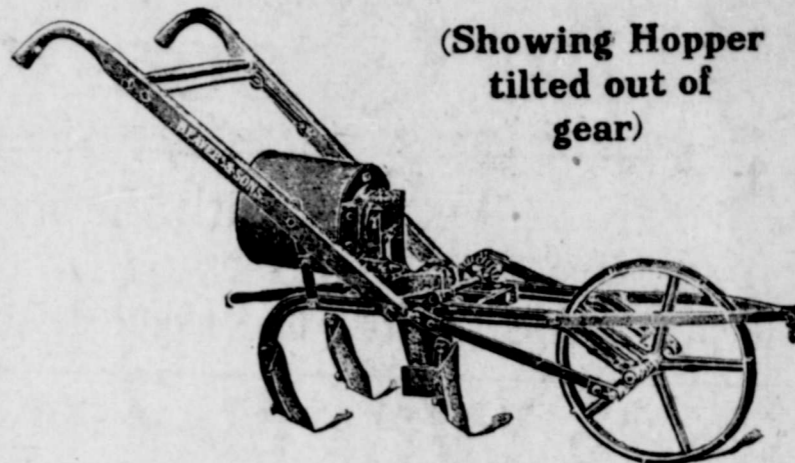
