The recipes given below have been carefully prepared by Miss Lou Stallman, Government Foo Demonstrator.

CREAM OF ONION SOUP.

1 cup of cooked and selved onions
1 cup of liquor in which onions were
boiled.
1 cup of milk
1½ tablespoon rice flour
1½ tablespoon vegetable oil
Sait and pepper to taste.

Cook onions until tender and mask through a seive, reserving one cup of liquor in which onions were cooked Combine onions, liquor, seasoning, fat and milk, then bind with the rice flour moistened with a small amount of cold milk. Cook until slightly thickened. A few celery leaves cooked in the mixture will give an added flavor. Strain out before serving.

ESCALLOPED ONIONS

Place boiled onions in an oiled baking dish and cover with white sauce. Sprinkle oiled crumbs over the top. Crumbs may be made from left over biscuits muffins, etc., made from substitute flours. Oil with peanut oil. Bake until a delicate brown. Season crumbs well with salt and pepper.

BUTTERED ONIONS.

Boll as above, seasoning with mar-arine, salt and pepper. If butter is de-ired as seasoning, reduce the quantity ormally placed on the table for family e by just so much. Butter should not used in cooking.

BAKED ONIONS. Peel, wash and bake in oven around meat roast, basting with the juice from the meat, or with hot water to which oil has been added. Use ½ cup of hot water and 2 tablespoons of oil.



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



This is the preamble to the message received by Administrator Peden from National Administrator Hoover setting forth the principles of the new program of meat conservation to replace the original program of meatless days and meals suspended on the last day of March. The message reads:

"The Food Administration is extremely desirous of securing economy in consumption of all kinds of meat without reinstallation of meatless day for the present. Seasonal decline in volume of animals coming to market is now in progress and its volume will undoubtedly further decrease during the next few months, as is usual, but probable amount of such decrease is yet

Four Thousand a Month Must Be Sup plied if America is to Do Her Share.

More than 2,000 American Red Cross surses have gone to Europe for active service since last Easter, quietly, as American soldiers have gone and are soins; under orders of obedience, like the soldiers; and, like the soldiers again, for the duration of the war, in the face of danger and hardship, prepared for any sacrifice to protect the lives of our fighting men.



Uncertainty of shipping tonnage to convey Cuban sugar to American ports and the need of all surplus of sugar for

preserving purposes has led the United States Food Administration to adopt a sugar ration system for manufacturers which becomes effective May 15 and extends to July. The ration system is to be a perfect check upon all sugar going to manufacturers, large or small, and the certificate resembles closely that of a banknote. Every firm requiring sugar for manufacturing purposes will be required to submit certificate in the denomination of pounds authorized, this certificate must be signed by the firm receiving the allotment and countersigned by the firm making the sale.

The check on all manufacturers will be maintained through the federal district food administrators. Manufacturers who entered business or increased their capacity after July 1, 1917, and before November 1, 1917, receive an 80 per cent allowance; those who entered business after November 1, 1917, and before April 1, 1918, are to receive 50 per cent, while those entering business after April 1, will receive no sugar at all, unless specially authorized by the distribu-tion division at Washington.

The object of the plan is to conserve sugar in order to give all sugar necessary to manufac-turers conserving fruits of the coming harvest; and at the same time not give any man who has disobeyed the regulations sugar that will give him an advantage over his competitors. Another aim is to cut down the abnormal increase in the manufacture of candy and soft drinks.

Manufacturers of ice cream are to be allowed 100 per cent of sugar as a measure to save milk and help the dairy interests; but no sugar will be issued for the making of ices and sherbets. Manufacturers of chocolates, soft drinks, beverages, bottlers of soft drinks, makers of fruit syrups, sweet pickles, chewing gum, cocoa, invert sugar, are cut down to 80 per cent. The only exceptions in the ration plan are public eating places, and bakers and cracker manufacturers engaged exclusively in the manufacture of their product.


