THRIFT STAMPS MEETINGS

Stressing the responsibility which rests upon all adult men and women to attend the 11,000 Federal W. S. Stamp pledge meetings to be held in Texas, June 28, National War Savings Day, four-minute speakers in the state have been instructed by the Texas State Council of Defense to visit and speak at the school-houses in their counties June 28, or earlier if possible.

In the letter of instructions to the four-minute men of the state, Joseph Hirsch of Corpus Christi, publicity chairman of the Council of Defense, said:

"This is one of the most important campaigns in which we have engaged. The only way we can pay the terrible cost of this war is by saving; by rigid economy. Sooner or later our people will have to learn that lesson. If we help to teach that lesson we shall indeed be performing a national service.

Information relative to the action of the Council of Defense has been received by Louis Lipsitz, State Director of the National War Savings committee.

There are between 1,500 and 1,700 four-minute speakers in the state, Mr. Lipsitz said and they will carry the government's message to a great number of people. Every precaution is being taken to notify Texas adults of the government's desires. All persons affected by the President's Proclamation will be authoritatively summoned by the Federal government to attend the June 28 meetings; in addition to this notification, every officer who has been charged with the holding of a meeting in his district will personally summon the people of his district as far as possible. The President's Proclamation is

now being posted in all public places by sheriffs, postmasters and railroad station agents who are considered government employees. From all sections of Texas Mr. Lipsitz is receiving reports from county War Savings chairmen notifying him that all is in readiness for the pledge meetings to be held in their districts.

In attending the constitution by construction the courts frequently give to the organic law a character and color never intended by the people who adopted it. To deny the people the opportunity to amend their constitution according to their own wishes is but an exercise of despotic power. Gentlemen elected to the legislature or executive office may hold the power to deny the people but it does not follow that they possess the right to do so. There are four paramount issues before the Texas people: The extension of the elective franchise to women; another limiting the elective franchise to actual citizens whose souls as well as their bodies are in Texas; still another: the final and determinate settlement of the liquor problem; and last but by no means least, restoring the ballot to soldiers and sailors. Those who fight for our country should not be denied the privilege of voting as they fight—for the safety of the country.—Farm and Ranch

The war department announces that no opposition will be offered to the proposal to raise the military age, if the senate committee sees proper to adopt the plan, altho the department does not consider the plan necessary for the immediate future.

The new postal rate, which becomes effective July 1 adds largely to the newspaper postage and forces publishers to be more particular as to their subscription lists. The old free and easy way of sending the paper to any one who would take it from the post-office has gone and gone forever.

PROCLAMATION

Pursuant to the proclamations of the President of the United States and the Governor of the State of Texas, I, W. C. Dew, county chairman for the sale of War Savings Certificates for Mills county, acting under the authority of the United States Treasury Department do hereby call all tax-payers and wage earners to meet at the school house in their districts at 2 p. m. on Friday, June 28, to make their subscriptions for War Savings Stamps.

The school officers will preside at these meetings and these officers are hereby commanded to keep a complete record of the meeting held at their school house reporting the names of all present and the amount of War Savings Certificates subscribed for by them. The names of absent persons and those who refuse or neglect to subscribe, with their reasons for doing so must also be reported.

A definite quota of War Savings Stamps has been assigned to each school district and is as follows:

The law requires that no person can hold in their own name War Savings Stamps to exceed \$1,000 maturity value; War Savings Stamps, however, may be purchased for each member of your family, including minor children. The money invested in these stamps is not a gift or a donation but a loan to the government. It will be paid back with 4 per cent compound interest January 1, 1923. If, however, before that time the holder, because of some financial reverses or calamity, should find it necessary to use the money invested in these certificates he may do so by giving ten days notice to any Money Order postmaster, in which case they get what they paid for the stamps with interest to date of payment. The stamps are free from state and local taxes and when registered at the postoffice they are insured against loss. They are backed by all the property and resources of our great nation and are as convenient and as well paying an investment as has ever been offered by our government. In fact they are baby liberty bonds.

I hope the amounts subscribed at the various meetings on Friday, 28th of this month, will exceed the quota you are asked to buy, and will show you and your neighbors to be loyal Americans to whom our government, in this hour of her need, does not call in vain. W. C. DEW, Chairman.

TO THE VOTERS OF HAMILTON AND MILLS COUNTIES

For the first time in the history of Texas, its people are confronted with the candidacy of a man for the high position of Governor, who has been found guilty of gross misconduct in office, impeached by the House of Representatives, convicted by the Senate and declared both by the judgment of impeachment and the Constitution of Texas to be disqualified from holding any office of honor, trust or profit in this state; and who asks that he be re-elected Governor and that the people send representatives to the Legislature who will support and seat him, regardless of the judgment of impeachment and the constitutional provisions declaring him to be barred from holding office in Texas again.

Such an issue has never been placed before the people of Texas at any time in all its past history. Having sworn to uphold the constitution and laws of this state, I do not hesitate to declare myself as positively and absolutely opposed to this passingly strange appeal to the people to assist a man to override the constitution and laws of the state to gratify a personal ambition. This is no time for Texas to be plunged into discord, strife and litigation over the right of any man to hold the office of Governor, much less of one who has already been declared by his friends and associates in other branches of the government sitting as a High Court of Impeachment, to be unfit to hold that office. Our efforts and energies towards winning the Great War for Humanity should not be divided.

The gauntlet has been thrown down by expelled Governor Ferguson, namely, that he and his should control the politics of the state. My opponent in this race has shown himself to be one of Ferguson's steadfast supporters; and, for this district, I pick up the challenge that has been issued by the expelled Governor. This issue, so far as the political situation is concerned, is the main one before the people of Texas in the coming election. I believe it to be the duty of candidates for public favor to let the people know where they stand on the vital issues of the day; and I have made this open and positive declaration in order that the voters of this district may know without a doubt where I stand.

In order that the will of the people of this district may be ascertained on this principal issue, it was necessary that a candidate appear, either from Hamilton or Mills county, in opposition to the plan of things mentioned above, namely, control of state politics by Ferguson and his supporters in the Legislature; and, it is not a question of the right of my opponent to a second term according to custom, but of whether or not this district should go into the Ferguson column without an opportunity to express its disapproval.

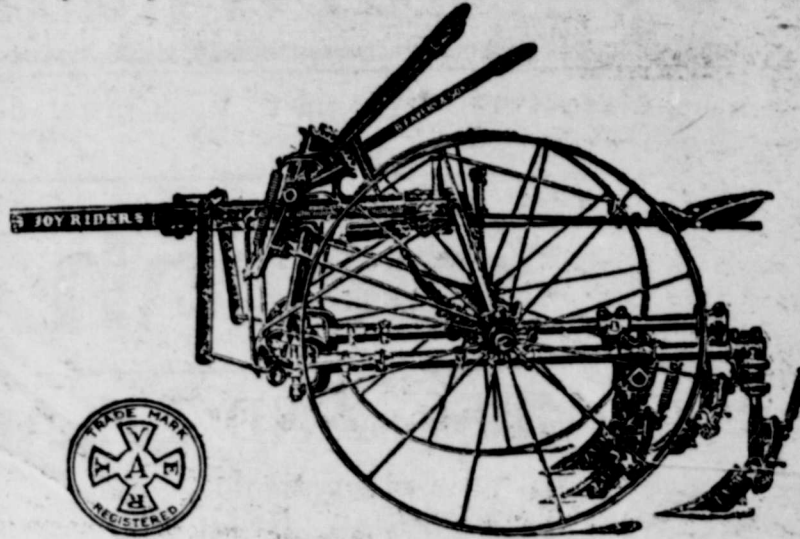

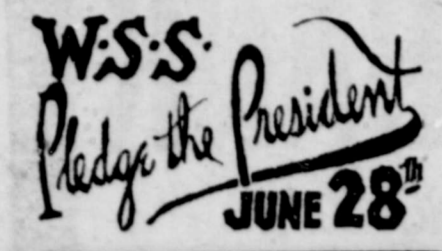

Announcement is made from Washington that the fourth liberty loan will be floated probably in October and will be for six billion dollars.

The announcement is made that a million Americans will be in France by the end of this month and they are being hurried across as rapidly as possible.

Next Friday is the date for all patriotic citizens to assemble and pledge the government the amount of thrift stamps they will buy during the year. Those who do not make the pledge will be given an opportunity to explain their failure.

The discovery has been made that the commander of one of German submarines operating off the Atlantic coast was for five years a member of the United States navy. This goes to prove the far-reaching and long-thought-out plan of the present war and the extent to which the spy system of Germany has reached.

The property of Mrs. Adolphus Busch has been taken over by the custodian of alien property and will be sold and the amount held in custody until the close of the war. Mrs. Busch makes her home in Germany, but has returned to the United States to protest against the seizure of the property.

A report from Austin says more than 200 names have been dropped from the Confederate pension roll of Texas because of the pensioners possessing the necessary amount of property to debar them from the list. A homestead valued at over \$1000 or an annual income of \$300 will prevent a veteran drawing a pension under the Confederate veterans pension act.

Every day the campaign continues increases the number of women who will go into the primary. At first it was freely talked that very few would care to vote, but since the campaign has warmed up and the issues have become more apparent the ladies have taken another view of the situation and now many of them are rejoiced that they will have a voice in the conduct of affairs political.

It was the "wash day" for the family entertaining the guest and the washerwoman failed to appear, it being learned that she had gone to the cotton patch, where the pay was more than for standing over a tub. The family linen could not wait, so the visiting girl proposed that she and her girl friend perform the service; it was agreed upon, and both entered heartily into the job. The result was all that could be desired and the lady of the household presented them with the money that she would have been forced to pay the hired labor. It was accepted and that noon the two happy girls drove to town and invested the whole amount in thrift stamps. The reporter gives this for a true story, which it is, and would like to know if any one has a better one to tell. Even fiction could not surpass it. Wills Point Chronicle.

IMPORTANT MEETING

Democratic Executive Committee Arrange For Primary

The Democratic Executive committee of Mills county held a meeting in the court house Monday afternoon in obedience to the call of the chairman and the requirement of the election law. Members present representing the various precincts were: G. W. Jackson, Goldthwaite; F. R. Hines Antelope Gap; W. J. Benning-Bld. Payne; Joe Peek, Star; W. H. Leverett, Caradan; E. F. Casey, Mullin; Wm. Dennard, Big Valley; J. M. Traylor, Rock Springs; W. H. McFarland, Ratter; T. J. Hufstutler, Rye Valley; Jno. W. Roberts, chairman; R. M. Thompson, secretary.

Applications for names being placed on the primary ticket were inspected first and it was found that all avowed candidates for county and precinct offices had filed their application in the time prescribed except Joe Taff, candidate for sheriff and tax collector, who had overlooked the matter. He came before the committee and made a statement, after which an agreement was secured from his opponents for the office agreeing for the name to be placed on the tickets. The matter was referred to the attorney general for a ruling as to whether or not the committee had the right of discretion in the matter.

In the drawing for places on the tickets the names were placed in accordance with the way all announced candidates in the Eagle appear in the announcement column. Of the four candidates for governor the names appear in the following order: Henry Clark, J. E. Ferguson, V. W. Grubbe, W. P. Hobby. The arrangement of other names would not likely be of sufficient interest to the readers to be given in this report.

It was agreed that nominations for the county officers should be made by a majority, since the law requires a second primary for state and district officers where no majority is received by a candidate in the first primary and the local candidates are required to pay for a second primary anyway.

Assessments to pay the expense of the primaries were made as follows:

The chairman was instructed to pay \$2 per day for election judges and clerks, only one day's pay to be allowed. He was also authorized to allow one day's pay for bringing in the returns. The precinct chairmen were named as presiding officers of the primary election for their several voting boxes with authority to select their helpers. They were advised that it was legal to appoint women clerks, if they so desired.

The statutory pledge was ordered placed on the ticket and the presiding officer was directed to make personal inquiry where any doubt existed as to the intention of the voter to support the nominees of the primary. The pledge outlined by the election law is: "I am a Democrat and pledge myself to support the nominees of this primary."

A primary committee composed of Messrs. Wm. Dennard, J. M. Traylor, W. H. McFarland, E. F. Casey and T. J. Hufstutler was appointed to meet the second Monday in July to prepare the election supplies.

All candidates whose names are to appear on the official ballot must pay their assessment to the county chairman on or before next Monday, June 24.
