

I arrived at Dellas Augest 8 and left for the training we laid over for five hours, then we earight the S. P. line to Los Angeles, Cai., and from there we come on the Sonta Fe to San Witness C. D. Lane, clerk of pany. We divided at Los Angeire District Court of Mills county, s, four of the company going to Sar, Pedro, Cal., and Robert Given under my hand and seal Boney from Dallas and myself

We had a very pleasant trip 'ne 27th day of August, A. D., all the way, for all the country tfler we left Dallee was new to all of us. From Del Rio, Texas, on until we reached the line of California the condity afforded us lots of wild scenery.

We crossed some deep eanyons and gorges and at the same time mewing the mountains of old Maxico. Some of the country in New Mexico through which we passed is a barren waste of sage bresh and caetus. Very seldom von would see any stock at all. Atter we got into Arizona the wav loods through the Yuma browing white sand and alkali. a that it was the coolest day they hat had for several months.

We also wert through some of the irrigated districts in and bound such places as Tueson nd Tempe. The country looks the a sandy desert, but owing to the fact that they have good vater sapply from the rivers and also good wells, they carry an atensive farming. It looks like a gerden spot in a desert. After we reached the Colifornia line we beheld the great forests and n i kinds of orchards.

I've been here twelve days. Of sourse I haven't learned much | bout the navy yet, for I've been an detention eamp and will be in it until August 29th. The next day after I arrived I was examined and vaccinated. We have been drilling some every day exrept on Wednesday, Saturday evening and Sunday.

The Y. M. C. A, people are certunly good to us. They bring us all kinds of things.

I will soon be in the barracks. where the real training will be gin. We should all be anxious to get there so we can soon be come ready for active service in the world's great battle for Democracy. 
