While Mills county did not suffer the loss or injury of as many soldiers as some counties, we did not escape from the terrible toll of war, as has been noted from time to time in these columns. It is sincerely hoped we will have no additional lists but time must elapse before we will be safe on that score and all of our boys are accounted for or returned home.

R. G. Blackburn received the distressing information this week that his son Roy had been given up as dead by the war department. He was reported missing in action some weeks ago, but the family and friends had hoped that he would yet be found in some hospital. This hope has now practically disappeared and the bereaved family has the sincere sympathy of us all.

A. E. Evans received a message from the war department last Saturday telling him that his brother Robert was severely wounded in battle in France, but the extent of the injury was not made known. It is hoped and believed the wound will not prove serious.

Mrs. Parker has been notified by the war department that her son Arthur was among those wounded in battle in France. His friends and the friends of the family sincerely hope he will recover and that there will be no serious results from the wound.

J. C. Street and family have been notified that his son Herbert was wounded in battle in France last month. The wound was in the hip, but as it is only a flesh wound it is thought it will not prove serious.

The soldiers are being brought home from France as rapidly as possible and soon millions of men who have been engaged in war work will be returned to civil life.

Influenza appears to have renewed its "grip" on the country and doubtless there are more cases of that disease now than ever before, but the percentage of fatalities does not run nearly so high.

Likely the Red Cross Christmas drive or Roll Call will be the last campaign for a year and the probabilities are there will be no other call on the public for funds to complete the war works. It is announced that the fifth issue of bonds will be offered early in the spring, but this will not be a call for contributions, but will be a splendid opportunity offered for investment and certainly will be taken more readily than any previous issue, because of the knowledge that this will likely be the last opportunity to invest in government bonds at so high a rate of interest.

The campaign waged this week for food conservation will be productive of great good in many ways. Primarily the food needed by the starving people of some of the European countries will be provided, but much more has been accomplished. The lesson of unselfishness and love for humanity that has been illustrated in this campaign will result in good for many years. Added to these benefits are the formation of plans for economical living that will be advantageous to the individual who forms it and the nation as a whole.

President Wilson made clear to congress and to the country generally, thru his message or address delivered Monday, the motives actuating him in attending the peace conference. There is good reason in his statements and even those opposed to his plans and policies must admit he believes he is right and is actuated by a desire to serve the country well. Mr. Wilson is not entitled to be deified by the people, neither is he infallible, but surely he is entitled to credit for what he has done and is endeavoring to do in the country's interest. He is also possessed with the same ambition and pride his fellow men possess and naturally desires to see the peace terms fashioned after his announced ideas.

People in all walks of life are concerned as to the future business and industrial conditions of the country. All thoughtful and observing people know that some material changes must take place before conditions again become normal. Everybody realizes how impossible it will be for conditions to remain as they are along industrial lines if the country is to avoid bankruptcy and that a change must come speedily. The cost must not continue to exceed the production and for the labor organizations to attempt to force a continuation is but to seek ruin for such organizations as well as the industries and enterprises of the country. The railroad situation proves this fact. The exorbitant and unreasonable demands of the organizations had to be granted during the war, else the transportation facilities of the country would have been tied up by strikes at a very critical time. The granting of these demands necessitated the operation of the railroads of the country at a loss totaling billions of dollars, notwithstanding the raising of the freight and passenger rates to a point that is burdensome. This is not the only place where readjustments must come, but it is one of the most important and pointed.
