Oil Well Progress.

DRILLING GOES STEADILY ON AT SEVERAL POINTS.

The city of Mart has applied to the federal court for an injunction restraining the telephone company and Postmaster General Burleson from raising the telephone rates in that town.

It is reported by the Associated Press that the former German Kaiser has become alarmed because of the receipt of so many threatening letters in Holland and will seek refuge in Switzerland.

There is a report of disagreement in the peace conference, but there is no need to become alarmed about it. All will be well in the end. Designing persons will naturally magnify any disagreement that may arise.

Fifteen hundred Sunday Schools of the Methodist Episcopal Church South, have, gone into the Centenary records of that denomination as one hundred per cent pledgers. This number of schools in many Southern cities and townships have promised to pay five cents per month per pupil enrolled for five years toward the missionary work of the church. The Centenary Campaign will ask for \$35,000,000 from the members of the denomination in a great drive May 18-25, and the Sunday School allotment which is in addition to the regular campaign, is being completed in advance of the financial drive of the church.

The Eagle editor sincerely appreciates an appointment as representative of Mills county on the Road committee of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, together with an invitation from Chairman Gamm of the Executive Board, and Mr. Adrian Pool of the Roads committee to attend a meeting at Mineral Wells April 16. The Eagle has always been an advocate of good roads, believing that the building of roads is one of the most important matters claiming the attention of the business men as well as the farmers. As we understand the plan outlined, the road improvement is to be done under the supervision of the highway commission by contract, which is the best way to handle public money on roads without danger of it being used to play politics. The Eagle hopes to be able to attend the Mineral Wells convention.

A telegraphic dispatch from Washington received in Dallas by the War Loan Organization says, "You are authorized to say that the Secretary of the Treasury wants to emphasize in the strongest possible manner that it is imperative that bonds or notes issued in the Victory Liberty Loan campaign should be distributed as widely as possible amongst the greatest possible number of people." This makes clear beyond all doubt the attitude of the Government on this important matter and it sets at rest the rumor that the banks are expected to absorb the offering. The plain facts about the Liberty Loan are that for months past the Government has been borrowing from the banks to pay our war debts and the time has now arrived when that money must be paid back. The government ran up a huge bill to buy the equipment and ammunition which saved Germany stiff and ended the war, thus saving the lives of thousands of American boys who would otherwise be fighting and dying in the trenches today. The public is being asked to lend its money to the government to pay for American boys' lives. This is not a job for the banks but for every American that is worthy of the name.

TRIP ON TRANSPORT

Camp Cortquidam, France, February 4, 1919.

Dear Father and Mother: I will try and write you a long letter and tell you something of our trip from New York City to Camp Cortquidam, France.

On Aug. 1 we steamed out of the harbor of New York. You cannot imagine how a fellow feels when he is sailing out of sight of his country, not knowing what may happen to him at any time. You know we gazed back as long as there was a speck of the U. S. A. in sight and wondered how long we would be gone. The Statue of Liberty waved farewell as our transport passed by.

When we were only a few miles from shore we were in danger of German submarines and we were not allowed to take off our lifebelts on the ship. Everything went smooth for us for five days. Then late in evening we saw a vessel in the distance and our sub destroyer set out to investigate. It proved to be an enemy barge and I was told it was sunk that night. Nothing more happened until Aug. 10. I might say here that there were nine big transports loaded with us boys. We were accompanied by one battleship and two sub destroyers. Eight more destroyers came from the French coast to meet us on the 9th.

On Aug. 10 we were attacked by German subs and on the following day, which was Sunday, we had two more attacks from the U-boats. I was on the upper deck each time and saw it all. It was sure great to see our navy boys fire their big guns at Mr. U-boat. There were several torpedoes fired at the transport I was on, but not one of them found its mark. I do not know how many of the subs were sunk, but several went to a watery grave. During the firing everyone was ready, with lifebelts and canteens on, and crews ready to man the boats. To my great surprise, dad, I did not get excited. From some unaccountable reason my nerves remained steady.

I made the trip fine—was not sea-sick a moment, altho the ship was crowded and we ate beans and pickles for breakfast.

On the morning of Aug. 12 I heard some one remark that he could see land. I ran out on deck and sure enough the shore of France was in sight. I was certainly glad to see land, for I was tired of looking at water. I stepped on French soil at Brest about 11:30 a. m., Aug. 12. Then I began to see the horrors of war. I did not see any young men, but saw only old men, women and children, all with wooden shoes on, and their surroundings gave evidence of the sacrifices they were making the battle for the life of their country.

We marched four miles to a rest camp and saw many things that looked odd to us—fields so small, two-wheeled wagons, etc. We stayed at this camp eight days. Then we hiked 100 miles down the coast to Redon, where we billeted in whatever place we could get. My bunk happened to be in the loft of an old barn. We stopped there three weeks and we all sure did wish that we could speak the French language. From there we hiked to Camp Cortquidam, which was about a 23 mile hike, and got here Sept. 5. A few days after we got to this camp we were issued horses and French 75m. guns. I never saw the front, the war being over before our training was finished, but our infantry was in action almost a month and they proved to be as good soldiers as ever faced the Huns.

I hope that all the boys from old Mills county came thru all right. There are several of the Mills county boys in this brigade and they are all in good health as far as I know. I do not know when we will get back, but do think it will not be very long. Here's hoping and trusting that I will see you all soon.

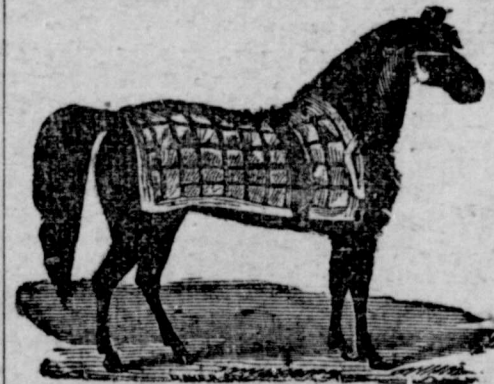
