RED CROSS HELPS.

Life is gradually returning to the dead city of Rheims. With the assistance of the local authorities the American Red Cross has erected sleeping quarters for five hundred people. The largest school in the ruined city has been turned over to the Red Cross, which has repaired the roof and walls and installed beds and kitchens for returning refugees. Until these accommodations were ready the only place where it was possible to obtain food was the canteen in the cellar of the Bureau de la Place, near the cathedral ruins, where toiled Mme. Fouriaux, "the woman of granite," who, despite her seventy years, was the first on hand to welcome the refugees.

D. 1919, the same being the 5th day of May, A. D. 1919, then and there to answer a petition filed in said Court on the 27th day of March, A. D. 1919, in a suit numbered on the docket of said Court No. 18570, wherein M. D. Mills is Plaintiff, and Mrs. Bessie Burns and husband—whose name is unknown—and James Langford and John Henry Langford, and the unknown heirs, legal representatives, legatees and devisees, of each and all of the above named parties, all alleged to be deceased are Defendants and said petition alleging substantially as follows:

1st. That the plaintiff, M. D. Mills, resides in Mills County, Texas, but that the place of residence of the defendants herein as well as the names and places of residence of each and all of the unknown heirs, legal representatives, legatees and devisees, of the above named defendants, and each of them alleged to be deceased, are unknown to the plaintiff.

2nd. And for cause of action herein the plaintiff represents to the Court that on or about the first day of January 1919, he was lawfully seized and possessed of the following described lands and premises, located and situated in Mills County, Texas, holding and claiming the same in fee simple, to wit:

3rd. That on the day and year last aforesaid the defendants entered upon the said premises and ejected the plaintiff therefrom and unlawfully withheld from him the possession thereof to his damage in the sum of One Thousand Dollars.

4th. And for further cause of action herein the plaintiff says that he is entitled to recover in this action, the title and possession of the lands and premises

And for further cause of action herein the plaintiff says, that he is entitled to recover of all the defendants and each of them the title and possession of the lands and premises described in their petition, because they say, that they and those whose estate they have, claiming the same under deeds duly registered in the office of the County Clerk of Mills County, Texas, the County in which said land is located, have had peaceable, continuous, and adverse possession of said lands and tenements, claimed in their petition, cultivating, using, and enjoying the same, and paying all taxes due thereon for more than five years after defendants cause of action accrued, and before the commencement of this suit and this they are ready to verify.

6th. And for further cause of action herein the plaintiffs say, that they are entitled to recover of and from the defendants, the title and possession of the lands and premises described in their petition herein, because they say that they and those whose estate they have, claiming to have good and perfect right and title to the said lands, have had and held peaceable, and adverse possession of the lands claimed, cultivating, using and enjoying the same under actual enclosures of the said lands and tenements for a period of more than ten years after defendants cause of action accrued, and before the commencement of this suit, and this they are ready to verify.

7th. Plaintiffs further aver that the nature of the defendants title, or claim of title, to the above described lands and premises is unknown to them.

8th. Premises considered, plaintiffs pray that the defendants and each of them be cited to appear and answer herein, and that upon the trial hereof, they have judgment for the title and possession of the lands and premises described in plaintiffs petition as against each and all of the above named defendants, and that they be quieted in their title thereto, and that the cloud cast upon the title of the plaintiffs, by the claims of the defendants, be removed and held for naught and for such other and further relief to which they may be entitled in law or equity.

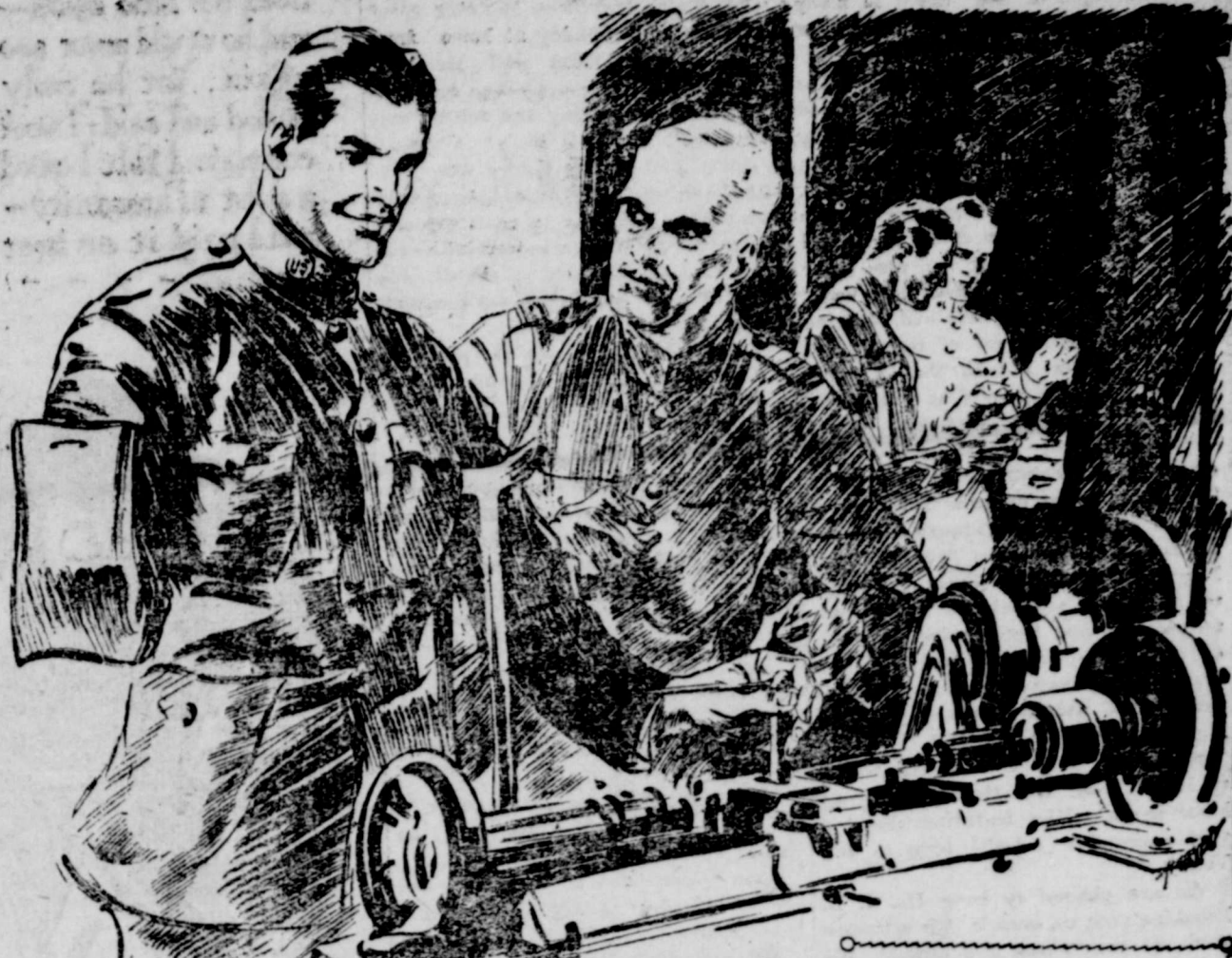

The New York World, a strong administration organ, has entered the fight against Postmaster General Burleson and plainly states he should be dismissed as a disturber and an autocrat. Mr. Burleson is being severely censured in many quarters for his action in telephone and telegraph rate making.

A man claiming to be a farmer was arrested at Texarkana this week charged with being implicated in many crooked financial transactions, including swindling Houston banks out of \$11,000, robbing the safe on a steamboat en route to Seattle in 1910 and also procuring large amounts fraudulently from banks in Seattle, Denver and Atlanta. The man enters a denial to the charge.

Doubtless all discharged soldiers know of the regulation requiring them to wear the red chevron on the sleeve when wearing their uniform, but to make sure that no mistake is made the following announcement has been sent out: "Officers and enlisted men who have been discharged from the United States Army lay themselves liable to civil prosecution if they wear their uniform without the red chevron on the sleeve denoting that they have been discharged. The penalty is a fine not to exceed \$300 or imprisonment not to exceed six months or by both fine and imprisonment."

Governor Hobby vetoed the act of the legislature allowing the returning soldiers and sailors to vote without paying poll tax. Because of his veto there has been a great amount of criticism by his opponents—not opponents because of the act, but those who were already his opponents and engaged in magnifying what seems to them to be a mistake on his part, but it is really unfair to the public as well as to Governor Hobby to charge him with a wrongful act in this matter, when it was a clear case of his sworn duty to veto the bill when he knew it was unconstitutional and he was so advised by the attorney general.

To be sure, there have always been opportunities to invest in various enterprises, some worthy and some unworthy, but the Thrift Stamp, War Saving Stamp, Government Bonds and Treasury Certificates are the safest kind of investment and offer opportunity to the small investor as well as to those of large resources. Every citizen should own some of these securities, not alone because of the patriotic duty or the pleasure they will give in after years, but because of the good business judgment indicated by such investment.

The qualified voters will be called upon to either sanction or reject four constitutional amendments on May 24. These amendments were all published in full in the Eagle and in all other counties in Texas a few weeks ago. They propose a prohibition amendment one granting female suffrage, one increasing the governor's salary from \$4,000 per year to \$10,000, and one allowing the legislature to authorize the loaning of the state's credit to assist citizens who are heads of families to procure or improve their homes. Those who have not read these amendments should be sure to inform themselves on the subject before the date of election in order that they may vote intelligently.

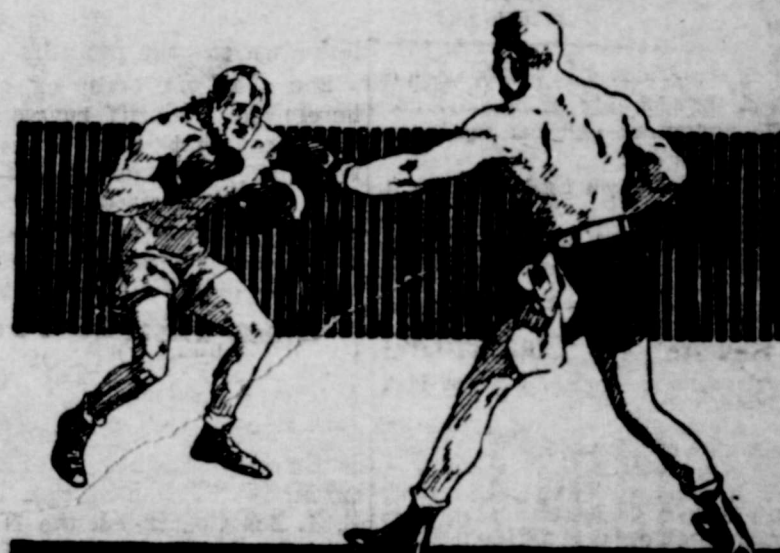

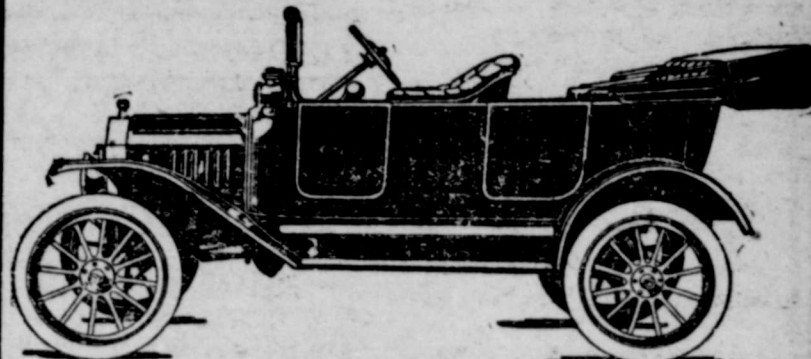

VICTORY LIBERTY LOAN.

This government loan is conducted on about the same plan as former loans and as the people are thoroughly familiar with the plan of the government in securing funds from the citizens through bonds and the necessity of this loan, no argument is necessary why people should purchase bonds as a duty of citizenship.

The quota given Mills county is \$60,000 and if all do their part this amount can be quickly raised. The quota represents only a little more than one per cent of the assessed valuation of the county and far below one per cent of the real valuation and only a very meager per cent of the bank deposits. Our quota can be raised and I believe it will be, for surely the people of this county will not so easily quit but will help to finish the job. It is a just debt and should be met cheerfully. The fighting has ceased but the war is not over and to do war work now, to sacrifice, to lend our money is the real test of true American patriotism. While our soldiers do guard duty and the tremendous expense of demobilization goes on, let every citizen do his or her full duty when the government calls for funds. The government must, of course, have the money and our only choice is to invest in short term interest bearing notes with the return of principal or to be taxed without a return.

The campaign differs this time in that it is not planned to hold mass meetings with public speaking, but as many individuals as it is possible to reach will be asked through the mail to invest a certain amount which is reasonably estimated will be near their share, taking into consideration the estimated value of property, earning capacity and ability to raise the amount. Let every one do his dead level best to buy at the maximum of his ability. This is the last loan of this character the people will be called on to make and as Mills county has never fallen behind in the service of the country let it not happen this time but let us put over the loan that we may hold that reputation and also to aid in the finish of the enemy.

The notes bear 4% per cent interest and mature in three or four years as the government chooses later. Interest payable semi-annually. Make application at any of the banks of the county and through them receive the notes.

CITATION.

The State of Texas
To the Sheriff of Any County of Mills County—Greeting:

You are hereby commanded to summon Mrs. Ida Hearne by making publication of this Citation once in each week for four consecutive weeks previous to the return day hereof, in some newspaper published in your County, to appear at the next regular term of the district Court of Mills County, to be holden at the Court House thereof, in Goldthwaite, Texas, on the first Monday in May, A. D. 1919, the same being the 5th day of May, A. D. 1919, then and there to answer a petition filed in said Court on the 9th day of April, A. D. 1919, in a suit numbered on the docket of said Court No. 1858, wherein W. F. Hearne is Plaintiff, and Mrs. Ida Hearne is defendant and said petition alleging substantially as follows:

That the plaintiff, W. F. Hearne, resides in Mills County, Texas, and that the defendant, Mrs. Ida Hearne, is a transient person whose residence is unknown to plaintiff.

And for cause of action herein the plaintiff represents to the court, that he is and has been for a period of more than twelve months, prior to exhibiting the petition herein, an actual bona fide inhabitant of the State of Texas, and has resided in Mills County, Texas, for a period of more than six months next preceding the filing of this suit.

For further cause of action herein the plaintiff represents to the court, that he was lawfully married to defendant, a widow, then Mrs. Ida Cornelious, on Sept. 23, 1910, at Lampasas, Texas; that they continued to live together as husband and wife until on or about October, 1911, when she upon her own volition and without any cause known to plaintiff, without his consent, and against his persuasion voluntarily left and abandoned the bed and abode of the plaintiff with the intention of finally separating and living apart from him, and that she has continued so to do up to the filing of this suit.

Plaintiff further represents to the court that no children have been born to them as the fruits of said marriage; that no community property was acquired between them during their marriage; that all of the property owned by him, both real and personal, was acquired and fully paid for by him long before his marriage to defendant, and that said property was and is his personal property.

Plaintiff further alleges that during the time he and defendant lived together as aforesaid, he was kind and affectionate to her and always provided for her support and maintenance, but that the defendant, unmindful of the duties and obligations of her marital vows, voluntarily left him as above stated.

Wherefore, plaintiff prays that defendant be cited to appear and answer this petition, and that said marriage between plaintiff and defendant be dissolved and declared null and void; that he be quieted in the title to his property; and the same be vested in him as his separate property; and for such other and further relief as he may be justly entitled to in law or equity.

Herein fail not, but have before said Court, at its aforesaid next regular term, this writ with your return thereon, showing how you have executed the same.

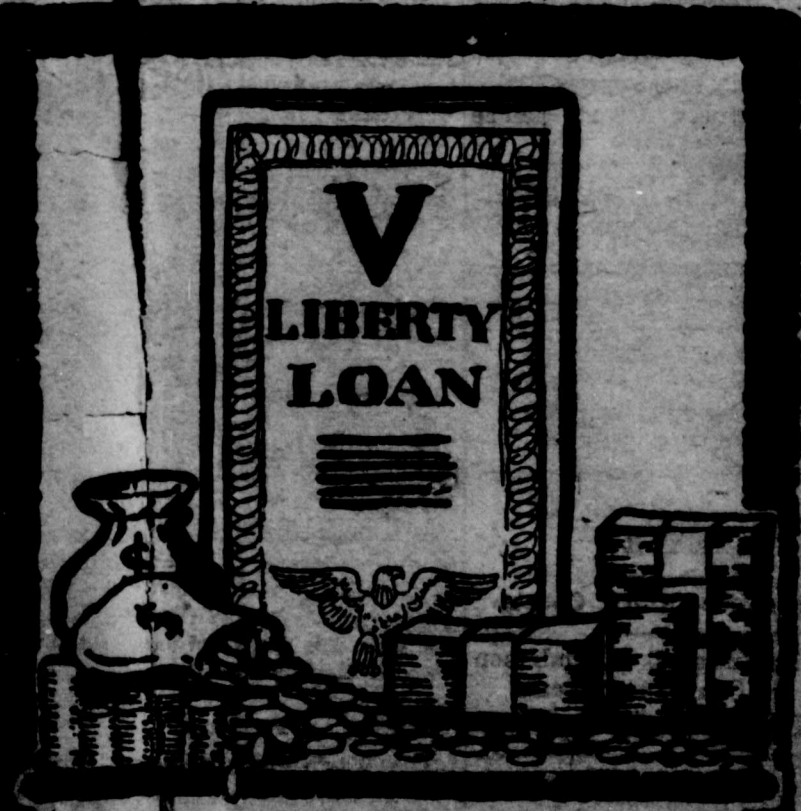
