FACTS ABOUT THE CENSUS

The fourteenth Decennial Census is to be taken during the month of January, 1920.

The first census of the United States was taken in 1790, during the administration of George Washington. It related solely to population.

The Constitution of the United States requires that a census of the United States be taken every ten years. It is by this means that the apportionment of members of the House of Representatives is made as to states.

The Bureau of the Census is a part of the Department of Commerce. It was established as a permanent Bureau in 1902. Prior to that time the census work was done by a temporary organization known as the Census Office.

A census of the country's manufactures was made for the first time in 1810. Under the present law a manufactures census is to be taken in connection with the Fourteenth Decennial Census and every two years thereafter.

An enumeration of the mines and quarries of the United States was made for the first time in 1840.

The Sixth Decennial Census, taken in 1840, was the first one to cover agriculture statistics, now one of the most important parts of the entire census.

The Department of Agriculture assisted the Census Bureau in preparing the list of questions to be asked of every farmer at the coming census.

United States marshals acted as enumerators at the first nine decennial censuses. Each marshal had as many assistants as were necessary to properly cover his allotted territory.

The statistics of the first census of the United States were published in one small volume consisting of 56 pages. The statistics of the 1910 census required

12 volumes having an aggregate of more than 40,000 pages.

About 650 people were engaged in taking the first census of the United States. The 1920 census will require the services of 90,000.

There were 6,361,502 farms reported at the last decennial census, valued at more than 40 billions of dollars. The 1920 census is expected to show more than 7,000,000 farms.

Congress extended the scope of the approaching 1920 census by providing that a census of forestry and forest products should be taken. These subjects were never specifically covered by any past census act.

ATTENTION, FARMERS!

Having recently called your attention to the fact that cotton seed for next year's planting are going to be very scarce, we wish to emphasize that fact by telling you that we are getting three times as many listings to buy seed as we are to sell them. Do not sell good seed suitable for planting to gins or mills, but store them away as you are likely to get more for them and at the same time render your fellow farmer a valuable service by selling him your good seed for planting.

How To Sell Cotton Seed

First, put them in a dry barn or house.

Second, write to T. S. Minter, Director of the Bureau of Markets, Department of Agriculture, and ask him to list them free in the Market Journal and repeat this request monthly till all your seed are sold. He does not handle the money nor the seed, but simply finds you a buyer, and his services are free.

The press has very kindly given publication to our former letter and you should take advantage of the opportunity of getting more for your good planting seed and at the same time render other farmers good service by selling them your cotton seed for planting purposes. 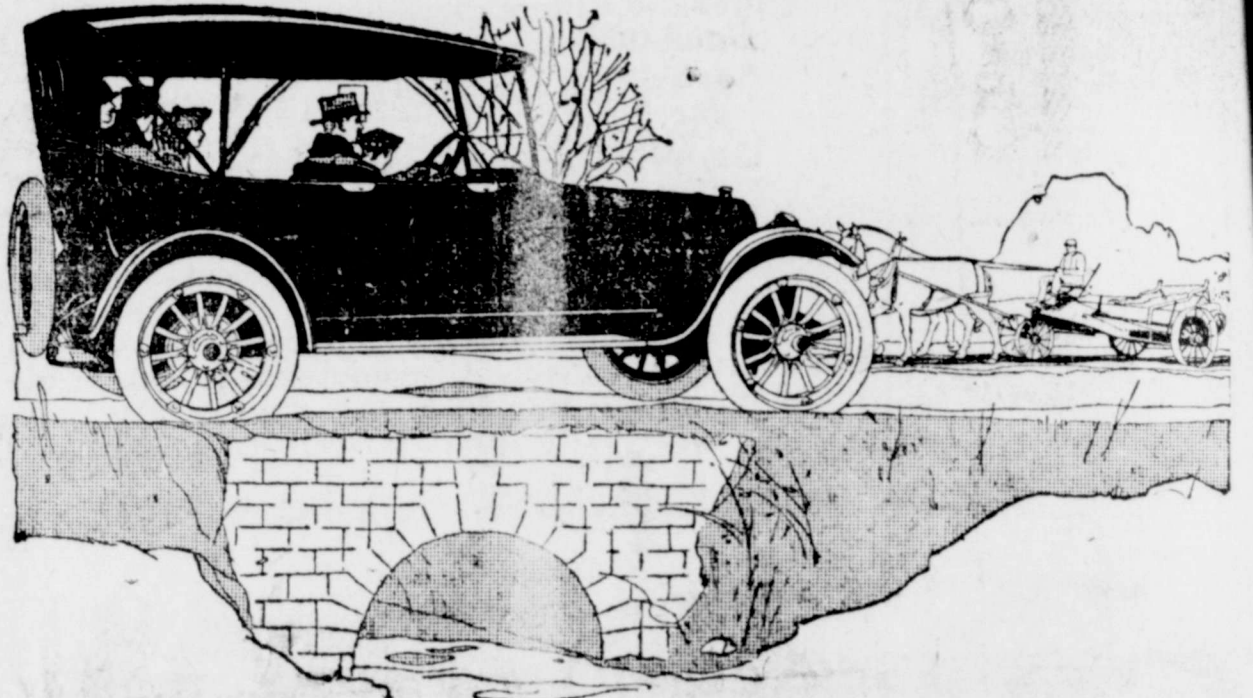

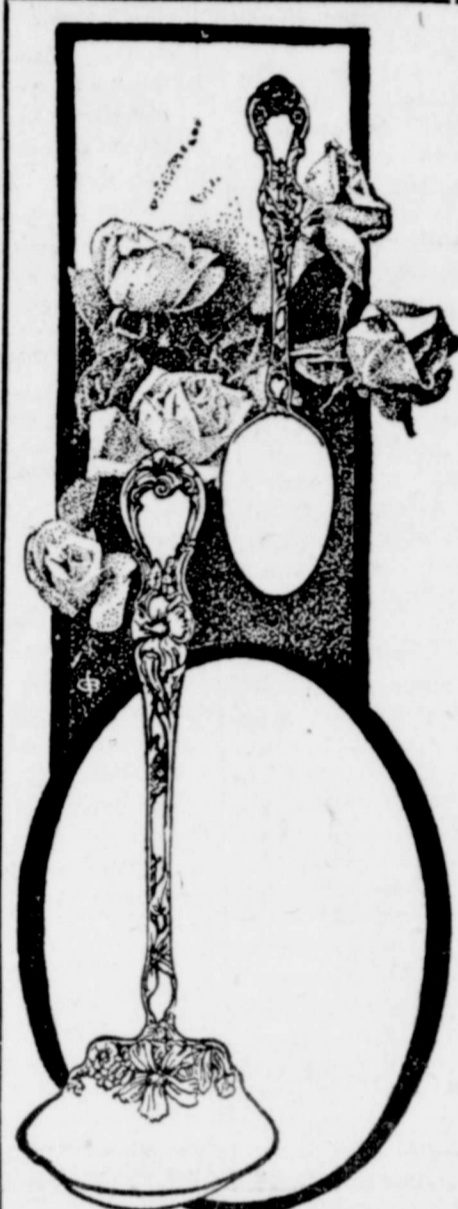

Baylor University faculty and students have far exceeded their quota for contributions in the Baptist seventy-five million campaign.

The supreme court of the United States has adjourned until the early part of next month. When the court re-convenes a decision on the national prohibition amendment is expected.

A British servant girl, who is said to be quite pretty and attractive, has announced a determination to try for a seat in parliament on the Labor ticket. Her candidacy is receiving favorable comment and will doubtless have a considerable bearing on the election.

The examining trial of Jim Callan, a Menard county rancher and former president of the state cattle growers association, charged with the killing of a DeWitte county stockman in Menard county a few days ago, was completed at Menard Saturday and his bond was fixed at \$20,000 to await the action of the grand jury.

A Washington special says: "The American embassy at Paris has been instructed by the state department to make the 'strongest representations possible' to the French government for the removal of American soldiers now buried in France. The hope was expressed that an understanding would be reached to enable the war department to undertake as speedily as possible the return of the bodies to the United States."

A statement issued by former secretary of the treasury and railroad administrator, Wm. G. McAdoo, says the operators of coal mines should not be permitted by the government to raise their prices on coal because of the necessary increase of pay to the miners. He says the profits of many of these operators have been shocking and in some cases have been as much as 2000 per cent.

The Mexican government has forwarded to the United States government a document which they believe to be strong defense of the action of the officers in that country in arresting and incarcerating W. O. Jenkins, the United States representative at Puebla, who was kidnapped and held for ransom until he and his friends paid a large sum to the bandits. It is the claim of the Mexican government that Mr. Jenkins was a party to the plot, which was intended to force this government to pay for his release.

For several years Kansas has been famous as a state without a public debt, but will soon have nothing on Wyoming, which in 3 or 4 years will be the first state without taxation. In Wyoming the state receives oil royalties. In three years it is believed there will be enough of this revenue to meet all the expenses of the state and pile up a good road's fund. Wyoming gets it because the oil leases are on public land but the idea has more than that behind it, why shouldn't all the people share in the benefits of natural resources?—Capper's Weekly.

The announcement of B. F. Looney, ex-attorney general, as a candidate for governor of this state has caused the other candidates to "sit up and take notice." One of the planks in his platform that will be heartily endorsed is a curtailment of the pardoning power of the governor. Everybody knows that this right has been grievously and outrageously abused by some of the chief executives of this state in the past and a remedy should be sought that will give society some protection and prevent the governor allowing his sympathy to thwart the ends of justice.

TRIFLES FROM COWS' HORNS

Source of Tortoiseshell and Other Things That Are Useful as Well as Pretty.

A cow's horn is susceptible of objects of beauty when properly manipulated. First, the core is taken out of it and sent to the glue factory, after which the horn is sawed into pieces. These are boiled in oil, which makes the material so soft that it can be rolled out into a sheet, like putty. The sheet thus prepared is stamped, colored and put through a variety of processes until it comes out in the shape of a most exquisite comb or other object in elaborate carved "tortoiseshell."

Cups and other vessels, so thin as to be transparent, and most elegant and ornamental, are made from cows' horns. Likewise cane and umbrella heads, and handles for knives and spoons.

In the National museum at Washington is exhibited a real "great horn spoon," made by an Indian artificer from the horn of a Rocky mountain goat. Properly speaking, it is a ladle, with a bowl big enough to hold a quart of soup.

DRESSED FOR THE OCCASION

Chilly Mortal Evidently Only Enjoyed Boat Rides When His Attire Was Suitable.

Down along the Wabash, boat rides are very popular indeed. An Indianapolis lawyer went down to his brother's home in this neighborhood for his vacation. One evening the family took him on a boat ride and were rather surprised that he did not express as much elation over the event as they did. A few evenings later they announced that there would be another one the first of the next week. The lawyer listened and then wrote a long letter home.

Two days later the parcel post man brought him a large box. He did not confide the contents of it to anyone. But he went on the boat ride and enjoyed it. He also demanded more boat rides, and in fact before he left, was out on the water almost every evening. His brother wondered over the change in him but couldn't guess the reason for it until he visited in Indianapolis recently and was told by his mother that she had dispatched the lawyer his winter flannels, for boat-riding purposes.—Indianapolis News.

CALIFORNIA'S BIG TREES.

Authorities on the subject who have examined the big trees of California, declare that they have grown more than 4,000 years. They were growing when the pyramids of Egypt were built, they were old trees when Rome was founded and had been growing for centuries when Columbus set out on the voyage that proved so important. Some of the ruins of Greece and Assyria, of course, antedate these trees, but no growing things. If man's greed would spare these trees they would doubtless live for hundreds of years to come, for the ordinary forest fire has no effect upon them. They are, however, wanted for timber.

DEADLY GERMS IN THE JORDAN.

Bathing in the River Jordan, famous in sacred history, has lost its popularity as the result of the discovery by American physicians that it is a dangerous disease germ carrier, according to the Detroit News. One of the first steps taken by the American Red Cross unit reaching that region was an analysis of the river water. It was found laden with the germs of skin diseases and other maladies. There have never been restrictions on bathing in the stream, regardless of the physical conditions of the bathers, but the revelations of the danger lurking in the Jordan's water caused the local authorities to place a ban on the unrestricted bathing.

Many Young Men and Women Offer Themselves For Christian Service

Southern Baptists Will Have Ample Working Force for New Program—Campaign Hopes to Strengthen Local Churches and Win 2,500,000 Lost to Christ During Next Five Years.

Probably the most encouraging development that has come to the Baptist 75 Million Campaign, so far, is the large number of young men and women throughout the South and Southwest who have volunteered their services for special Christian work wherever it may be needed. A special day was set apart in the Baptist schools and churches for "calling out the volunteers" when it was expected to secure a minimum of 5,000 volunteers for special Christian service, this number being necessary, it was held, if the program of the campaign was to be carried out. Returns from these services are still coming in with the prospect that the number will reach at least 7,500.

These volunteers will enter the ministry, go as missionaries, Christian doctors, nurses and teachers to foreign lands, labor in the homeland for the advancement of the kingdom of God or serve in any special capacity where they feel the Lord directs them. Baylor College, Belton, Texas, an institution for young women, led the list of schools with 430 volunteers; Bessie College, Forsythe, Ga., responded with 243; Louisiana College, Pineville, La., 93; Women's Training School, Louisville, Ky., 115; Southwestern Theological Seminary, Ft. Worth, Tex., for the foreign field alone; Oklahoma Baptist University, Shawnee, 57; while similar responses came from numerous other institutions in the various states comprising the territory of the Southern Baptist Convention.

Prominent among the many interesting accounts of the special services held in the churches was a report from Rev. E. Allison, a Baptist minister of Doravah, N. C., who, now in his eighth

year, looks back over an active ministry of sixty years, practically all of which has been spent in the vicinity which he is now serving. Mr. Allison has the unusual distinction of having baptized 5,526 persons and at least 700 additional converts under his ministry have been baptized by an assistant pastor since Mr. Allison's health has not been good, due to his advanced years. When this aged minister of the gospel presented the call for volunteers for special Christian service in this campaign, three young men, all of whom were converted and reared under Mr. Allison's ministry, responded to the ministry themselves, one of them being his nephew.

But the campaign hopes to enlist a large number of Christian workers other than those several thousand who will give themselves entirely to special religious work. The campaign hopes to enlist 2,000,000 additional pupils in the Sunday Schools of the South and Southwest; win 2,500,000 additional souls of this section to Christ during the next five years; bring the Baptist church membership in the South to 5,500,000 and enlist all these in all forms of church work; increase the number of Baptist churches in the South to 40,000, and enroll 40,000 young men and women in the denomination's schools where they will prepare themselves for lives of Christian usefulness in their communities or for service in any part of the world where they may be needed.

While it is the hope to raise \$75,000,000 to be invested in the larger program of Christian service which gave the campaign its name, raising the money is only one of the objects sought. Baptists are being implored to give themselves and all of their talents as well as their money to God, Director Scarborough announces.

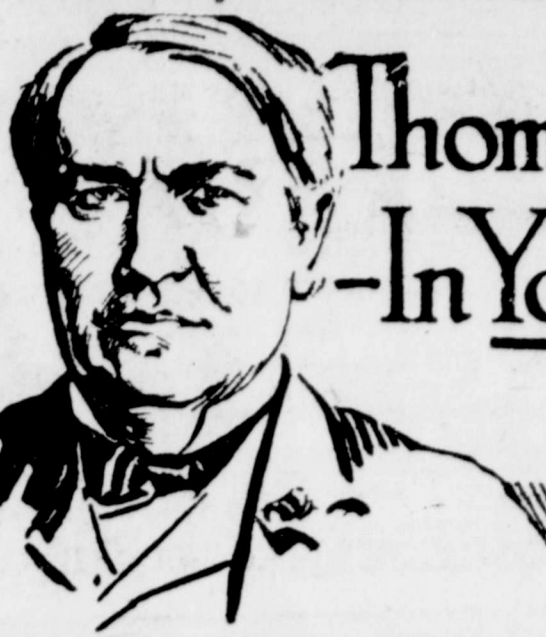

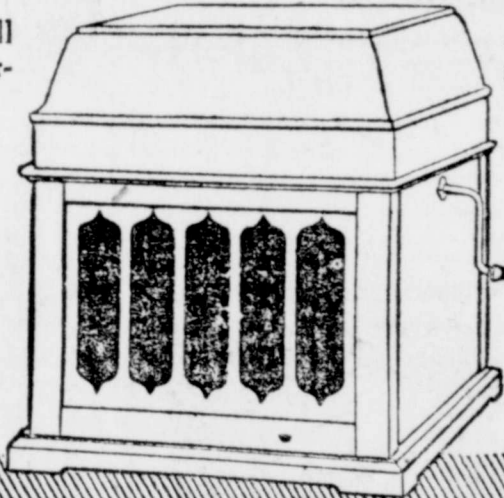

It developed among other things that he had some experience in acetylene torch work. A certain glitter in his eye when this came out made the adviser think that there was a keen interest here.

This talk was the beginning of an intensive course of five weeks in oxy-acetylene welding. After it was over he was placed in railway shops as a skilled workman.

He came in again recently. He had an artificial foot and no crutches, and held his head high as a man does who is making good.

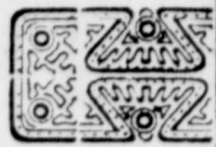

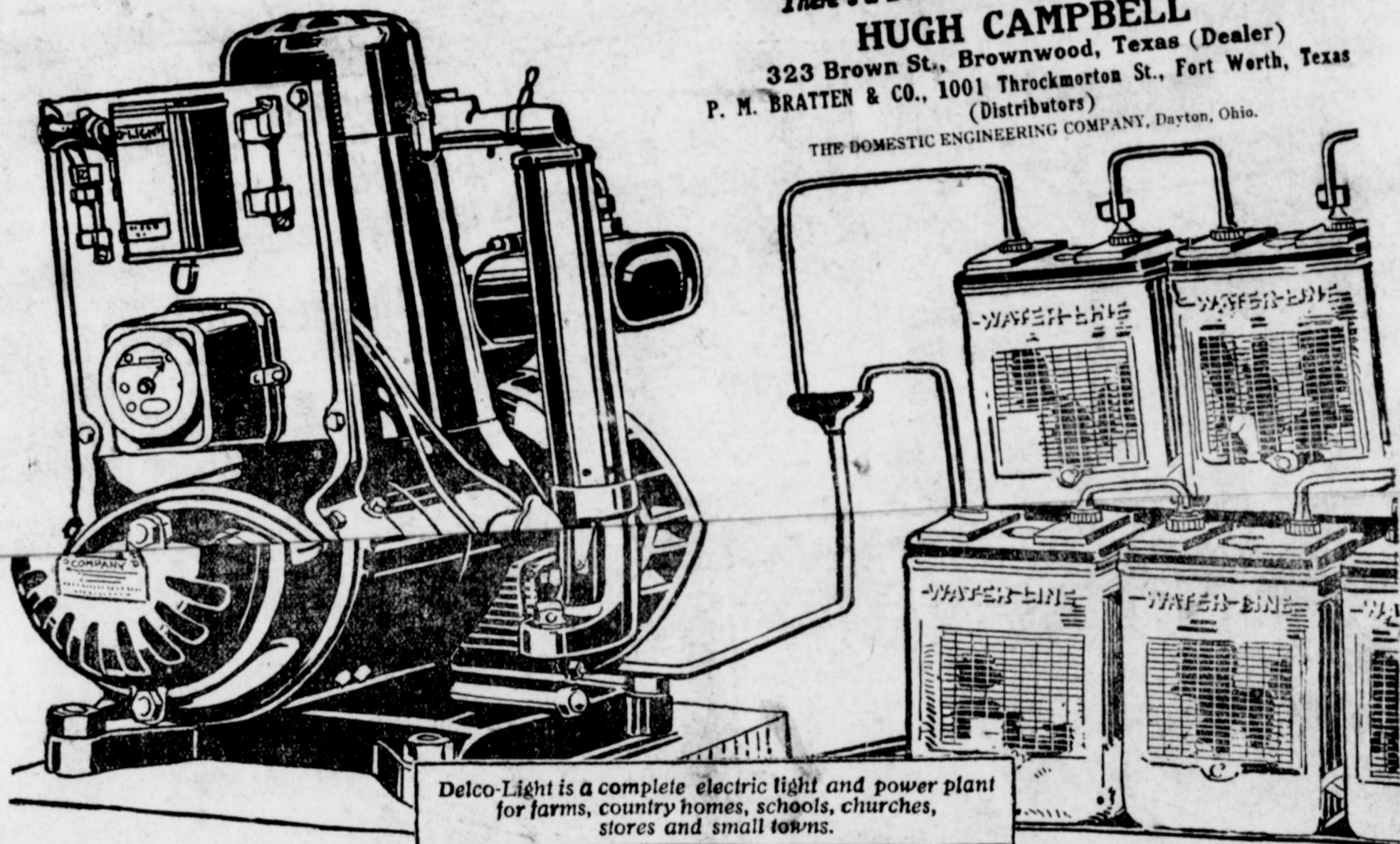
