CITY COUNCIL
The city council met Monday night in regular monthly session and transacted considerable routine business.

Aldermen Walters and Steen were appointed to ascertain the feasibility of pumping water with an electric motor, the Light company proposing to supply the power, providing the council would build the line from the Eagle office to the pump house.

A sample of the city water was ordered sent to the state health officer in order that his department might know of the purity of the water supply.

Street tax for those within the road working age was increased from \$3 to \$5.

Accounts for the current month were allowed.

EXPENSIVE LIVING
Many ways have been suggested by which we can live more economically on farms, but none are more practical and dependable than that of raising our living at home, in so far as this is possible. The two leading articles of food are meat and bread, but there are others, such as milk, butter, eggs, poultry, fruits and vegetables. If an abundance of these foods are produced on the farm—and it may be done on most farms—the cash returns from farming may be conserved and used for other things, such as conveniences and comforts that cannot be raised.

The high cost of buying is a problem for those whose living is sought in town. And those who fail to raise as much of the living as the farm would yield must pay dearly for it and deprive themselves of clothing, shelter, furnishings, farm equipment and household conveniences needed to save labor and drudgery in the practice of home management.

Experience teaches that the living expenses of the farm family where most of it is raised, is a small item, whereas when it must be bought at the stores it may take all or a large part of the income from the farm. All will agree that foods produced and properly prepared on the farm are better than those ordinarily offered for sale in the small town markets.

CITY ORDINANCE

An Ordinance amending an ordinance of the City of Goldthwaite, Texas, found on page 32 of the code of ordinances of said City, entitled "An Ordinance of the City of Goldthwaite, Texas, prescribing that certain persons shall work on the public roads, streets, and alleys of the said City, or furnish a substitute, the number of days work required, the manner of performing such duty, the number of hours per day, the manner of securing exemption from such work, prescribing under whose direction same shall be performed, and who shall collect and report road tax, defining who are overseers, their powers and duties and prescribing a penalty.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Goldthwaite, Texas, that Art. 5 of the above entitled Ordinance, as adopted by the City Council of the said City on Jan. 10, 1916, be amended so that hereafter the same shall read as follows:

Article 5. Any person liable to work on the roads, streets and alleys of the City of Goldthwaite, Texas, who shall on or before the 1st day of February of each year pay to the City Tax Collector the sum of Four (\$4.00) shall be exempt from performing such duty for such year, beginning on the 1st day of February, and ending on the 31st day of January of the ensuing year. The Tax Collector shall receive and receive for all money so paid to him, and shall separately report same, together with the names of the persons paying, to the City Treasurer, who shall place said sums of money to the street and culvert fund of the said City. The Tax Collector shall also, on the 3rd day of February, or as soon thereafter as practicable, furnish to the overseer a copy of his aforesaid report.

The foregoing amendment of the above entitled ordinance, unanimously passed by the City Council in regular session, on the 1st day of December, A. D. 1919, all members being present and voting, and the rule requiring ordinances to be read three several times being unanimously suspended, was approved by the Mayor on the 4th day of December, 1919, and ordered filed in the office of the City Secretary, to be in full force and effect immediately after its passage and publication. 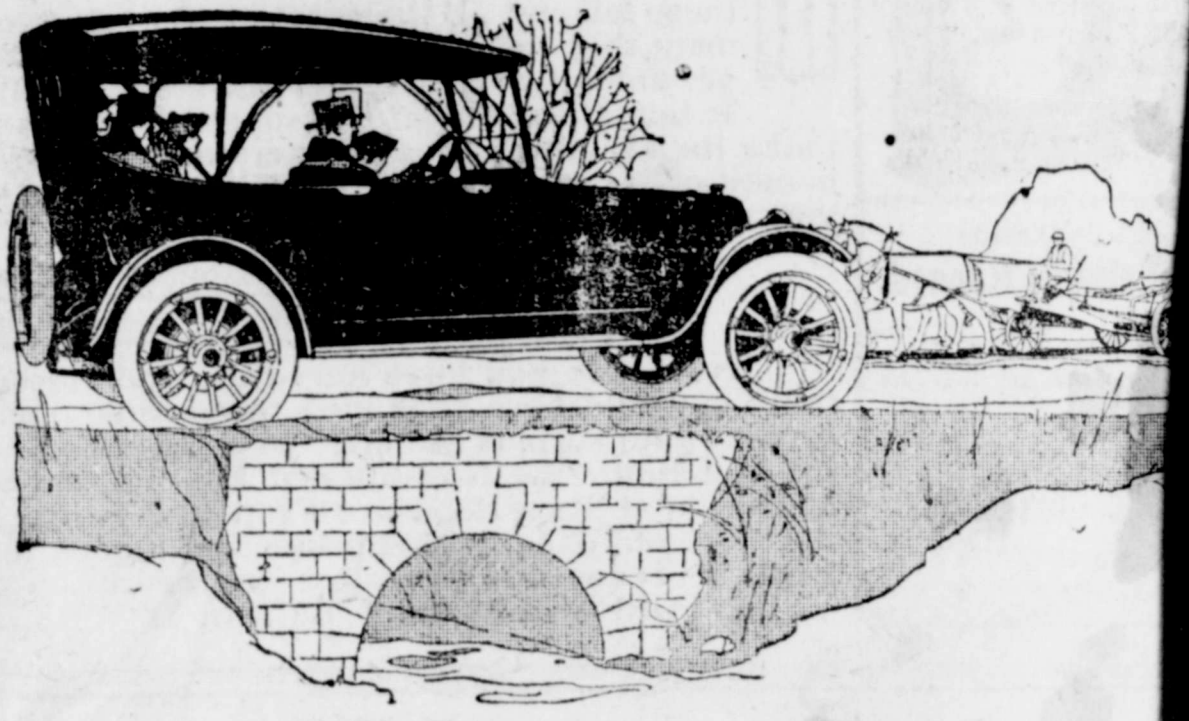

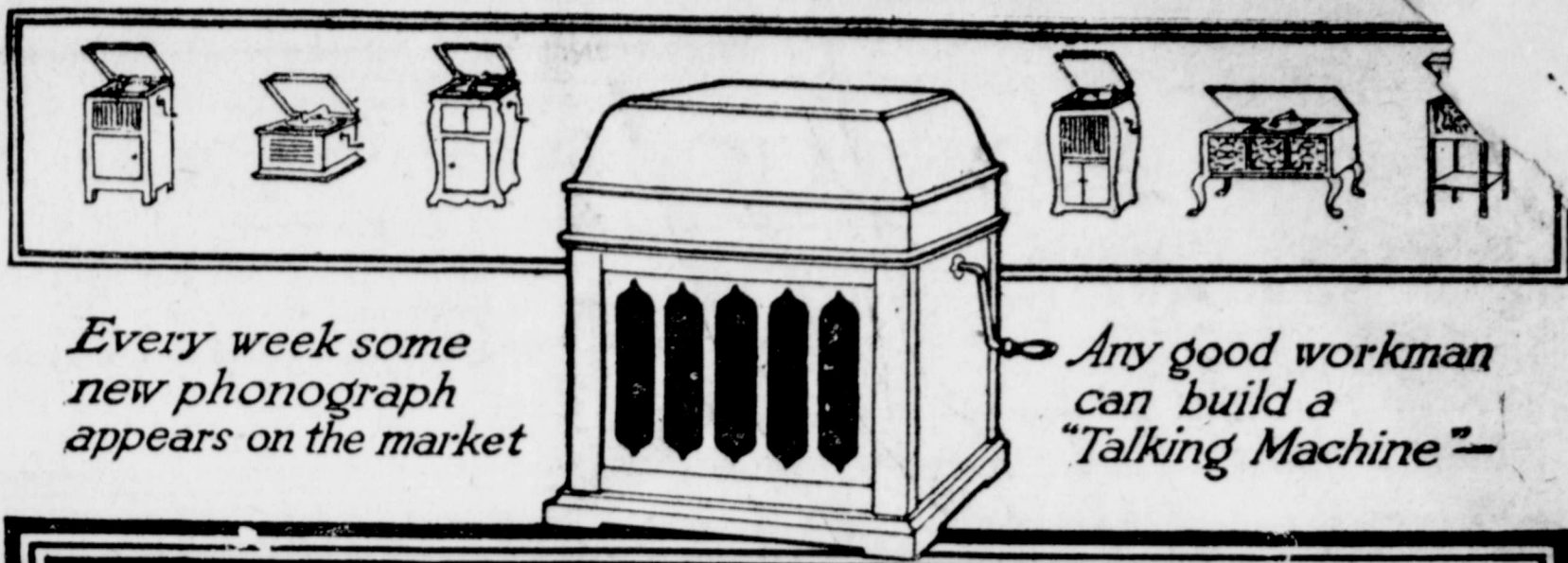

Serious thinking people do not expect that money will continue to be as abundant as it is now. Every war in recent history has been followed by a short period of great prosperity only to have its corresponding reaction when money is scarce and hard to obtain.

How will those who spend everything they earn now be able to reduce their standards of living to meet the requirements of hard times? Or how shall laborers who demand and obtain shorter working days be able to live when prices of labor decline?

Investments should be very conservative now while industrial conditions are abnormal. But those who spend all they earn now may not be able to earn enough to live on comfortably when times are dull and labor cheap. Few doubt that such conditions are coming, though no one would have the temerity to prophecy when hard times shall come.—Farm and Ranch.

PAY POLL TAX

The ladies who expect to participate in the primary election next year should not forget to pay their poll tax prior to the end of January. The receipt costs \$1.75 and is obtained from the county tax collector. In many counties a great many ladies have already secured their poll tax receipts, but very few have paid so far in Mills county. The election next year promises to be decidedly interesting and it is surely worth the price of a poll tax to be able to participate in the campaign. It is worth that much to one's feelings sometimes to be able to run a big black line thru the name of a candidate even tho he has no opponent. Don't forget to pay your poll tax—and this applies to men as well as ladies.

WHO HOLDS THE SACK?

No doubt newspaper publishers, more so perhaps than others, feel all the effect of the present unreasonable high prices of the country, and no body of men are less able, perhaps, to protect themselves than the average country newspaper man.

To raise the subscription price of his paper to correspond with the increased price of print paper, which would make \$1.50 a year papers be at least \$5.00 a year, would be suicidal, and to raise the advertising rate in right proportion would also ruin the average country newspaper, so what is to be done?

Print paper is not all that has increased in price beyond all reason, but is one of the items and a very important one.—Publishers Review.

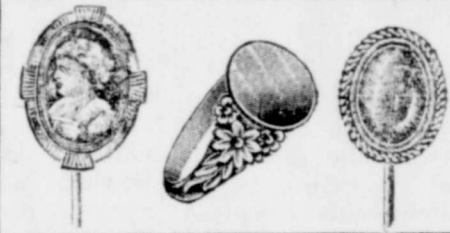

Congress is expected to revise the revenue laws very soon, placing additional tax on luxuries and profits as well as distributing the taxation and revenue assessment on all lines.

In the state convention of school teachers, held in Houston, a resolution was adopted providing for the beginning of a campaign to increase the salaries of teachers to double what they are at present.

With the dawning of the new year it is expected that the gubernatorial campaign in this state will be opened in earnest. Governor Hobby, ex-Attorney General Looney, Hon. Pat Neff and other candidates are already "fixing fences," but the campaign can not be said to be on in earnest.

Burglars overpowered two watchmen at a big department store in Omaha, Nebraska, Sunday night and secured \$63,000 in cash and valuables from the vault. They gave each of the watchmen \$20 for their "trouble" in being bound and gagged, after which they made good their escape.

Congress convened Monday for the long term and it is expected the session will continue until after the election next year. The League of Nations and peace treaty are already under consideration by the senate and will consume a considerable portion of the time of that body for several weeks, it is believed by those in position to judge.

Political slates are slow in the making at this time, because of the many issues involved and the desire of the politicians to find the popular side. The league of nations, of course, takes first place in the public mind and after that the labor situation, the high cost of living and the various and sundry other issues which keep politicians awake nights endeavoring to figure just where to land.

Villa, the rebel chief of Mexico, promises to burn at the stake all those who took part in the execution of Gen. Angeles, who was condemned and shot as a rebel by the Carranza forces some days ago. To Villa's credit it can be said that he has made good his threats against his Mexican enemies so far, notwithstanding he is as villainous as any of them. From the testimony and circumstances surrounding Angeles' actions it is likely he was the best of the entire gang of greasers and certain it is he had more sense and ability than most of them and it was because of his ability more than his actions that caused the Carranza faction to fear him and finally murder him.

It is to the credit of the American farmer that he sacrificed rather than sought the advantage of other members of society during the war. Farmers could have declined to increase the wheat acreage when the price was fixed in favor of the consumer and against the producer. But they responded loyally to the government's request, even to the point of over-work and under-pay. The market for cotton was almost ruined by the embargo on cotton; prices were fixed on hogs in favor of the consumer, and this limited the price of corn and other grains. Farmers' wives and children went to the fields and labored early and late because the boys had gone to the front, and production must be maintained so that the war could be won. It was won and history will accord honor and patriotism to the American farmer.—Farm and Ranch.

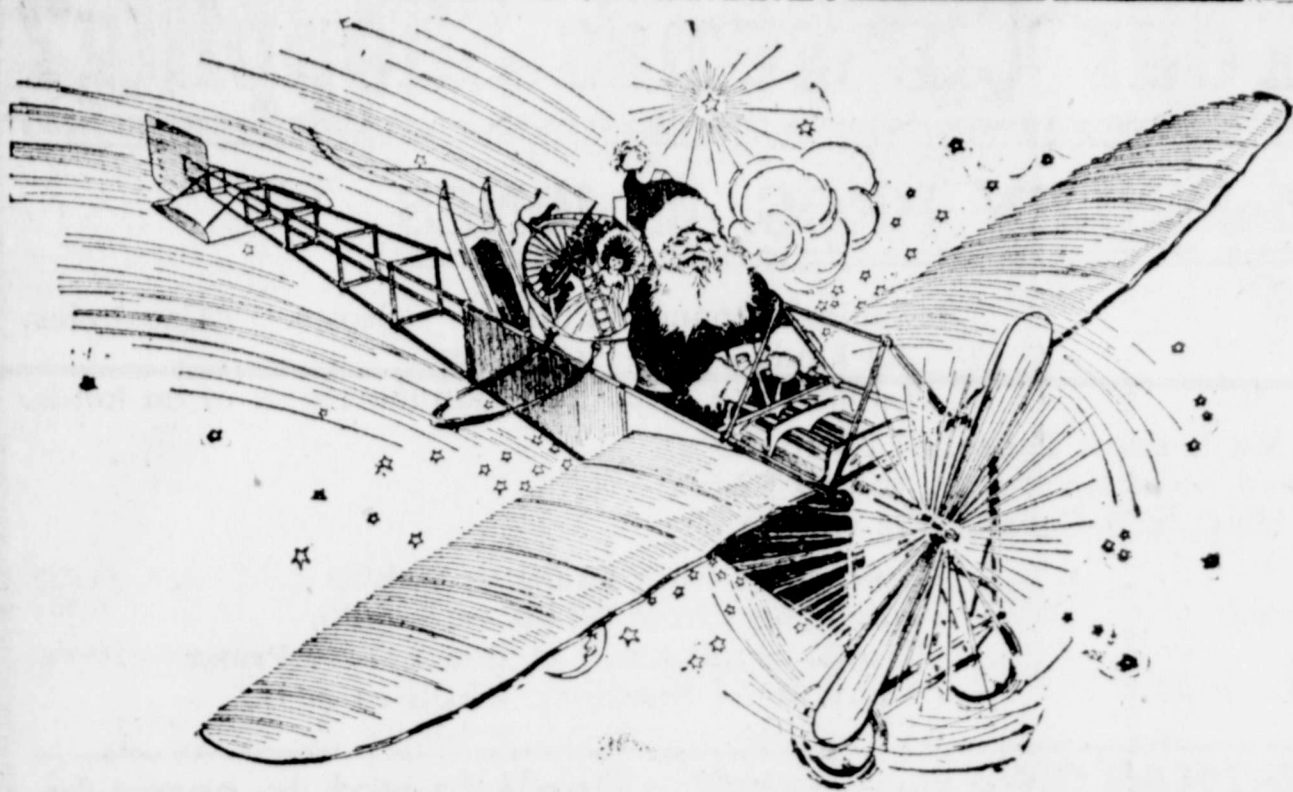

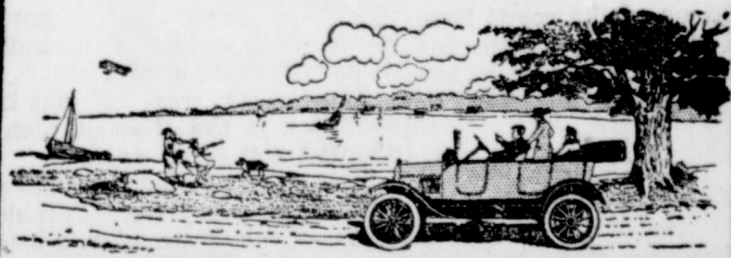

FROM THE UNIVERSITY

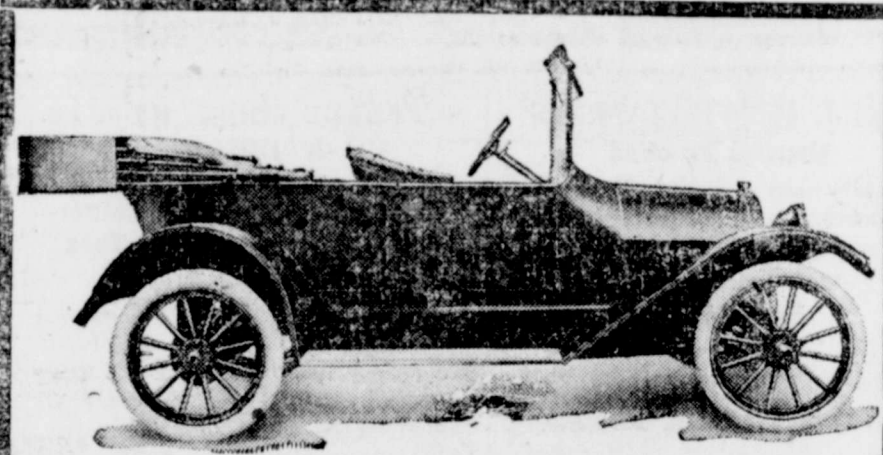
One of the latest organizations

BAPTISTS PLAN TO FIGHT BOLSHEVISM

ITEM IS RECOMMENDED FOR PREVENTION OF RADICALISM IN THE SOUTH.

AMERICANIZE FOREIGNERS

...Them English and Ideals of United States and Christianity is Part of Program of 75 Million Campaign.

Southern Baptists have no sympathy for the I. W. W.'s., Bolsheviks and anarchists, and while radicals of this type are not numerous in this section of the country as yet, it is the purpose of the Baptist 75 Million Campaign to make the spread of such deplorable propaganda here impossible by pervading with the gospel all centers where radicalism might expect to gain a foothold as to make it impossible for the professional agitators to receive a sympathetic hearing. In other words, it is the hope of the campaign to so extend the work of Americanizing and Christianizing the foreigners living within the territory of the Southern Baptist Convention that it will measure up to the highest standards of patriotism and religion.

There are 4,000,000 persons of foreign birth and children of foreigners within the territory of the Southern Baptist Convention, and while considerable work has been done already in the line of teaching Americanism and the Christian religion to these people, this work will be greatly enhanced as a result of this campaign. The Southwestern states there are 2,000,000 Mexicans, 600,000 living in Texas, 200,000 in New Mexico, 75,000 in Louisiana and a large number in Oklahoma and Missouri. Because of the growing importance of

the Mexican work the campaign has appropriated \$575,000 to it alone for the next five years.

But the Americanization and evangelization of the foreigners is not confined to Mexicans. This work is carried on also among the newly-arrived immigrants at the various Southern ports, among those of foreign birth in the mining districts of Alabama, Oklahoma and Illinois and among other groups of people of foreign birth in Florida, Louisiana, Texas, Maryland and Virginia. Some of the state organizations carry on work of their own among these people, while in many places the program is carried out cooperatively between the state mission boards and the Home Mission Board. In many instances a large work is done by the latter agency alone.

Believing that both Americanization and evangelization can be accomplished most effectively by first reaching the children, Baptist agencies have established schools where the English language is taught, along with American and Christian ideals. Such schools are already being conducted with great success among the Italian and Cuban children at Tampa, Fla., for French-speaking children at Church Point, La., for Mexican children at El Paso and other Texas points, while community center work is carried on extensively at many of these points and at numerous towns and mining centers where people of foreign birth make up a large percentage of the population, the social work of this character being conducted by Baptist women.

Large results are expected to follow the work of the Baptist Bible Institute at New Orleans, where instruction is given in English, French, Italian and Spanish. All foreign-speaking people are required to take some English work and the Bible is taught in certain practical subjects to them in their own languages, thus facilitating their grasp of it. Practical Christian activities are also required of all the students, some of whom are training for foreign mission work and others for service among the peoples of foreign birth in this country. Patriotism and high ideals of Christian civilization are given emphasis throughout the institution and it is the belief of those familiar with its work that it will prove a potent factor in the Americanization and Christianization of the peoples of foreign birth in this country.

EGGS \$1.00 A DOZEN

European Demand Sends Price of Eggs and Poultry to Top Notch Figure

At no time in the history of the country, since the Civil War, have eggs and poultry been in such demand. It is reported by all the large cities that the cold storage supply has been just about exhausted by the enormous demands made by the European powers. It is estimated that a million cases of eggs have been exported and unless dealers in cold storage can get immediate supplies it is predicted eggs will bring a dollar a dozen within two months, and that fattened poultry will bring from 40c to 60c per pound killed.

These top notch prices have excited a great deal of activity, not alone in the markets, but among the small poultry raisers and farmers wives who raise fowls. One man who raises poultry on a large scale has contracted to supply a New York hotel with guaranteed fresh eggs for the entire season at 60c per dozen and fattened fowls at 35c per pound, dressed. He says these prices will be obtained very easily and that the ordinary poultry raiser could double and treble his profits if he would keep his fowls toned up with a good laying tonic and keep roun out of the flock. These are two simple precautions and with the present outlook any one who neglects these things is simply robbing himself of just so many dollars per week.

It is also stated on authority that cold storage dealers as well as all large buyers are now demanding fowls that are in perfect condition, on account of the huge export trade in these stocks, and when they are barreled and sent abroad they have to be in prime health and those eggs are also in heavy demand which are being sold on a guarantee of being fresh. This is going to be a great year for the poultry raiser, both large and small, and various sources already report more scientific care and study of fowls, due to the above mentioned rigid demand and the enormous call at big prices for perfectly fresh eggs and fattened fowls. With the advent of colder weather there will be a loud call for fresh eggs at fancy prices.—Poultry Journal.
