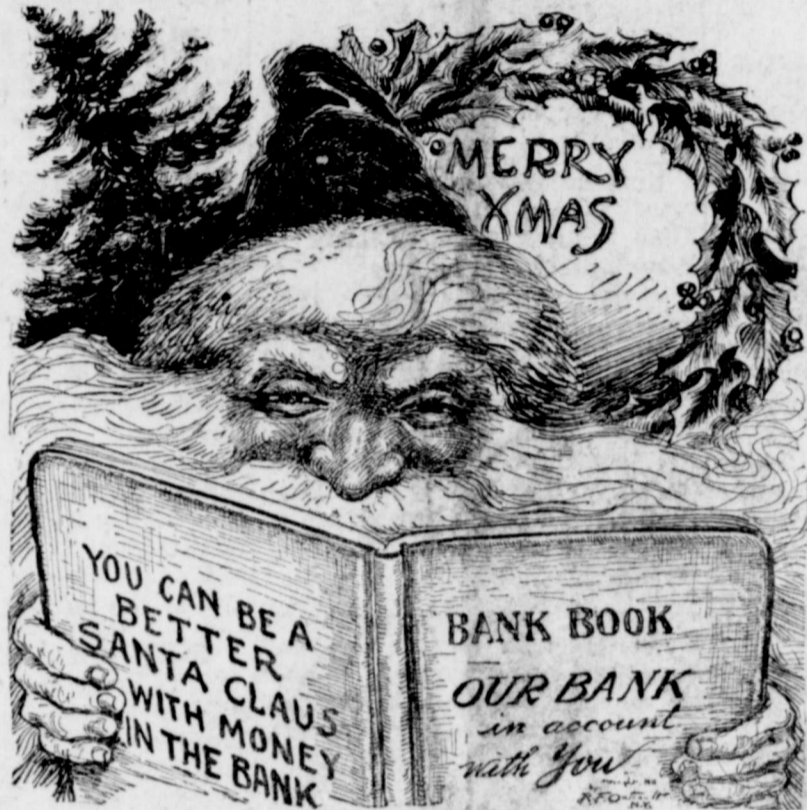

HOSPITAL FOR TUBERCULAR SOLDIERS

Pursuant to the request of Major John C. Townes, a member of the Benevolent War Risk Association, a charitable organization of Austin, Texas, the Local Board for Mills County met Monday afternoon. The purpose of the meeting was to perfect plans to raise Mills County's quota for building a hospital for tubercular soldiers. The above named association purposes to raise \$500,000.00 for building such hospital, and this county's part is \$400.00.

The necessity of the hospital is briefly, this: Over 400 Texas boys contracted this dread disease while in service. Several hundred of them are in immediate need of hospital attention. The government so far has failed to secure hospital accommodations in Texas, for those suffering from this disease. In consequence our boys are being treated in Louisiana hospitals. The climate there is not at all conducive to a cure of this affliction, hence the necessity of building a hospital here. It is proposed to build such a hospital for Texas boys at Carlsbad.

Mills county's quota will be raised by popular subscription and through the public schools. Every teacher in the county has been asked to place the matter before her pupils and ask for contributions to this noble purpose. In the different towns in the county, the following committees have been appointed to solicit subscriptions for the fund. Goldthwaite.—Prof. Arthur Smith, Mrs. W. H. Trent, Mrs. J. C. Street and Mrs. W. E. Miller.

Mullin.—Mr. H. C. Cobb, Mrs. J. T. Weems, Mrs. W. W. Tippen and Mrs. Minnie Williams. Star.—R. H. Patterson, Mrs. R. H. Patterson, Mrs. T. E. Hamilton and Mrs. Lona Burney. Priddy.—G. H. Spiser, Miss Dona Willis and Mrs. Charley Jeske.

Interest should be strong in this county in the matter of raising this money, when we remember that four of Mills county's boys were returned with this dread disease. There is no doubt but that our quota will be raised before the time comes to send it in, which is Dec. 26.

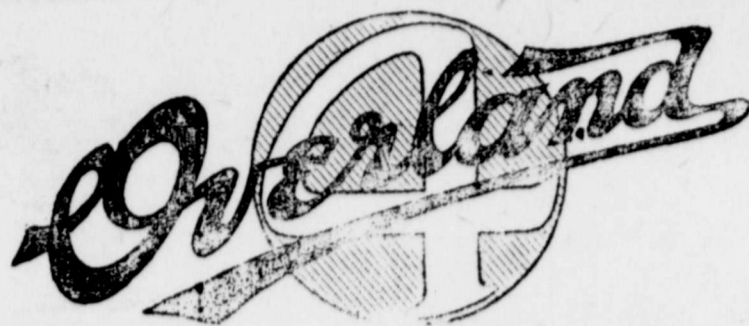

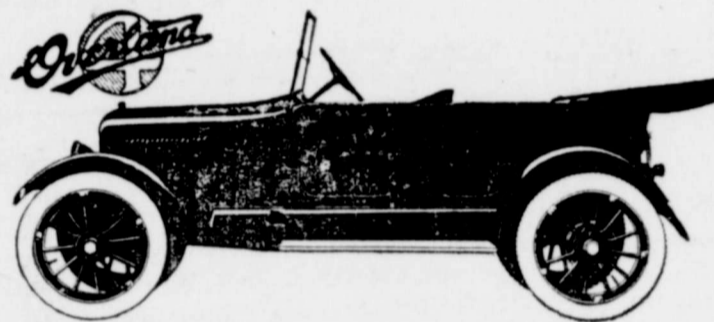

The federal court at Fort Worth this week upheld the constitutionality of the Texas anti-pool hall law and refused to perpetuate the injunction against its enforcement.

It is stated from the steel strikers headquarters that they are preparing for a long struggle. This is information the public can accept as news, since we all thought the strikers had learned by this time that they lost the strike. It seems to be a case of dead and don't know it.

The Eagle has found one good use for the copy sent in for free publication by the various governmental departments and the numerous drive promoters. We use the reverse of the sheet for "copy" paper. This plan turns waste into service and at the same time relieves our waste basket.

The court of appeals has sustained the law allowing women to vote in primaries and refusing an injunction to the opponents of woman suffrage to prevent the issuance of poll tax receipts to them. It is said the case will be carried to the supreme court, but the advocates of the law are now feeling no alarm.

Discharged soldiers and sailors are not required to pay a poll tax, but will be allowed to vote upon presentation of their certificate of discharge. No exemption certificate will be issued to them by the tax collector, as none is needed. They can pay the poll tax if they so desire, but it is not necessary.

The striking coal miners have nearly all returned to work under the agreement proposed by President Wilson allowing them an increase of 14 per cent in wages until a commission can determine an equitable basis for settlement. It is not certain, however, that the finding of the commission will be satisfactory to either side of the controversy.

The supreme court of the United States handed down an opinion Monday, which was unanimous by the court, holding that war time prohibition is constitutional and effective. The court also says the enforcement is binding on the various states. Another decision is booked for next Monday on the validity of the enforcement act, known as the Volstead law.

All restrictions regarding the use of coal, which were made necessary by the shortage of fuel during the strike of the coal miners, have been removed. Various industries that were characterized as non-essential and denied the right to use coal have been enabled to resume and railroad trains which were discontinued for a week are again being operated.

The attorney general of England has all arrangements perfected for the trial of the former emperor of Germany on the charge of having been the direct cause of the war and, therefore, being guilty of various crimes incident thereto. It is understood the note to Holland demanding surrender of the ex-emperor is being prepared by representatives of the allies.

Very few counties report any considerable number of women paying their poll tax and those who fail to secure a receipt for this tax before the end of January will be debarred from voting for twelve months, regardless of what action the supreme court may take on the constitutional question to be submitted. Unlike men, women can pay their ad valorem tax without paying their poll tax.

FARM INVESTMENTS

Fewer unprofitable acres and more profitable acres should be the aim of every farmer in the country as plans are being made for the next crops. War emergency is over and it is hoped will never again be required. Instead of emergency farming to save the country from starvation, as has been necessary, we should turn our attention to safe and profitable farming with special reference to soil fertility and the requirements of the farmer and his family.

The high cost of improvements, such as buildings, improved farm equipment, terracing, draining, should not deter us from these improvements if business judgment leads us to believe they are advisable. There has never been in the memory of old men a brighter prospect for progressive, enterprising farmers. There is sure to be a great demand for the staple and indispensable products farmers raise. The problem is to produce livestock and crops so that a fair profit can be made on the labor and the farm investment.

It now seems that the future will require a greater investment in the farm and its equipment than has been necessary in the past. But if that be true there will be better profits and doubtless less risk in farming.—Farm and Ranch.

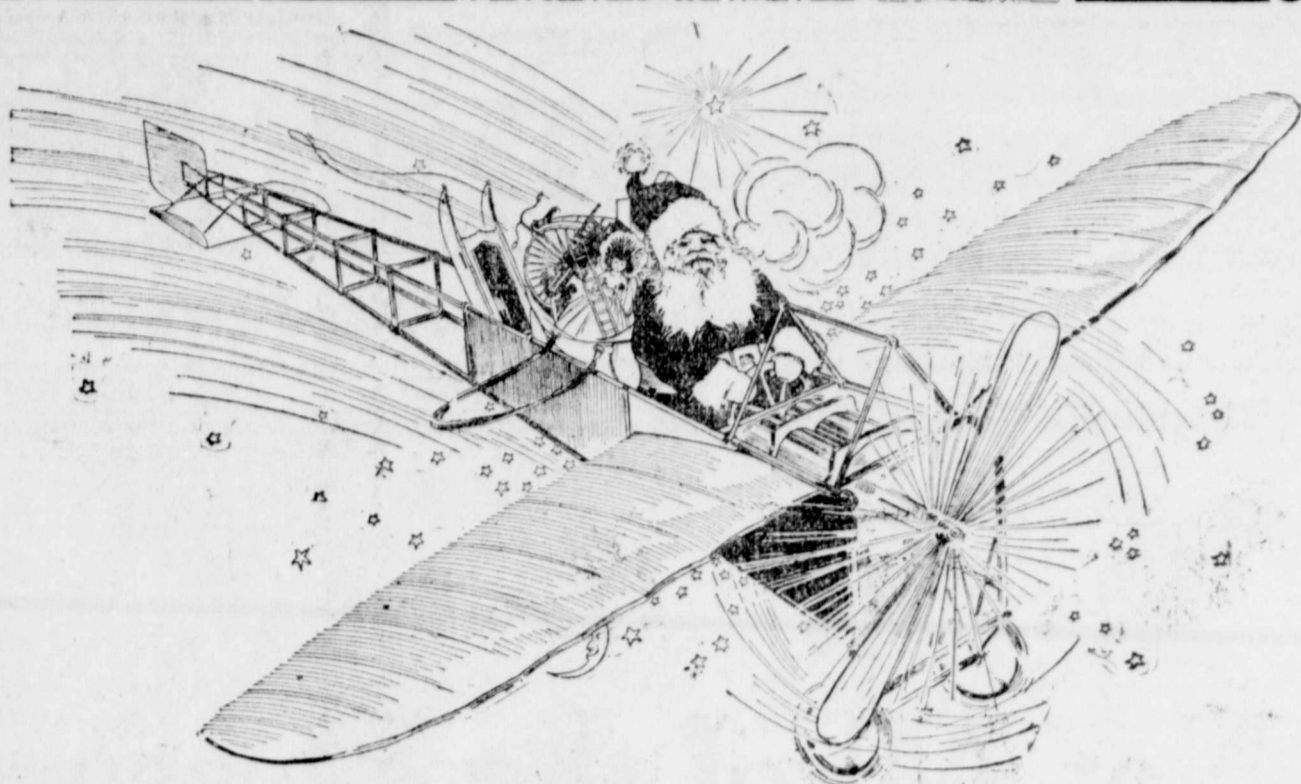

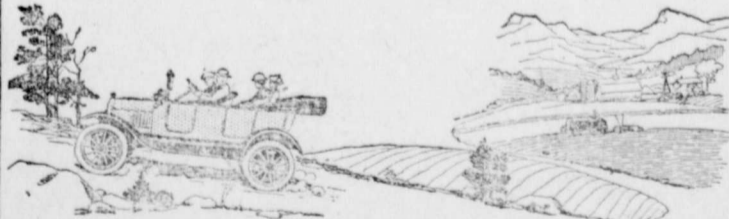

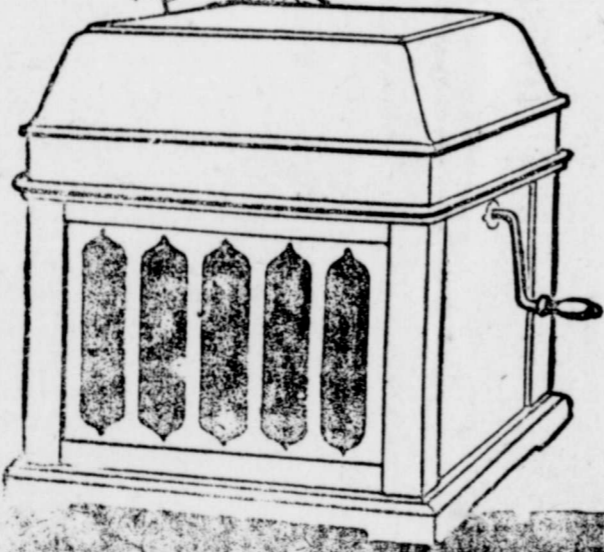

America is the land of opportunity. Practically every illustrious American, whether statesman, scholar or captain of industry, began with only his hands and his head for capital. Most of them began as farm boys. On the farms boys are still taught to work, hope, plan, contrive. And it is working, hoping, planning and contriving that makes one successful, either in money getting or fame-attaining. Those who regard work as an evil are as personally unhappy as they are civically unworthy. Work is not an enemy, but a friend. The bank president who hates his job and is at loggerheads with his board of directors is a far less happy man than the blacksmith who enjoys shaping red iron with a hammer. Henry Clay Frick was a conspicuously successful man. An anarchist nut—who after all these years is about to be deported to his happy Russia—once attempted to end H. C. Frick's life with a bomb. He had no grudge against Mr. Frick, except that the latter was a capitalist who had founded big industries and was paymaster for ten thousand workmen. The anarchist hated success, as all anarchists and their lazzarone associates do. Yet without the Fricks this world would be about what Russia is, Russia, the lovely land where there are no capitalists, but millions of starvelings; no industry, but millions of loafers. —State Press in Dallas News.

Cities and towns with active and energetic commercial organizations can render the consumers a valuable service by rendering farmers assistance in marketing crops and livestock. There are many expensive and unnecessary requirements that farmers must meet to get their products upon the tables of consumers. It is evident to thinking men that much of the expensive handling of farm products could be dispensed with. In what better way could farmers' buying be increased than in allowing them more for what they sell? There seems to be wide enough margin between the producer and consumer to allow farmers a fair profit on their labor and investments and give the consumer the advantage of economical marketing. And this would benefit the town as well as the country. The high cost of waste in marketing is a great factor in the city man's high cost of living. By saving marketing cost, city men create business for every legitimate industry.—Exchange.
