CHANGING JOBS

Many young people and older ones too for that matter, take a very strange attitude toward their work, their "jobs," perhaps we should say. In the first place, since those of us who have to work for a living spend the greater part of our lives at it, our work should interest us, or our lives will not interest us. Most of us are actually working at least 8 hours a day and 8 hours we spend in sleep supposedly. That leaves us 8 hours to eat, tend to a few necessary things, and get what amusement we can out of life supposing we find our work uninteresting. Knowing this, why is it so many people take work simply for a job, and they do not seem to care particularly whether it interests them or not. It is merely a job and they look forward to closing time as if it meant a release from prison. Now there are plenty of jobs to fit all kind of people and you might as well be enjoying those 8 hours that you spend each day working, as to have them drag their slow and uninteresting way to an end. Get a job that fits you and keep it. A change often means a failure. This idea of changing jobs is a very wrong one yet evidently quite common. It is a poor policy to follow for several reasons. In the first place, it is a poor recommendation to any employer. Even though you may have left all your positions voluntarily it looks a little strange to him, and also he who is likely to jump his job at any minute. Then in the second place, if you change jobs so often you never give one job time enough to develop so that you can really tell whether you like it or not. And you never give develop you. Though you may your employer time enough to have the greatest faith in your own powers, he knows nothing about them, and he's not going to take your word for it. You have got to show him by actual work what you can do, and that you are able to fill a higher position and claim a higher wage, before he is going to give it to you. So don't be in such a hurry to change. Get an interesting job and one for which you are fitted and you won't want to change.

We personally knew a preacher who held his first pastorate for thirty-eight years and died pastor of that church. He was on to his job, proud of his job, and made good use of his job and the job lasted as long as the good Lord let him live to enjoy it. It is very common for persons to use the profession of teaching as a stepping stone to some other profession, therefore they never get interested as they should in teaching as they are looking forward to the time when they will change jobs, hence many school are lacking in interest for want of teachers who have chosen teaching as a profession instead of a climb up to something else. Young man, young woman, get a job, get interested in it and it won't be long until the jobs will hunt you. H. C. COBB.

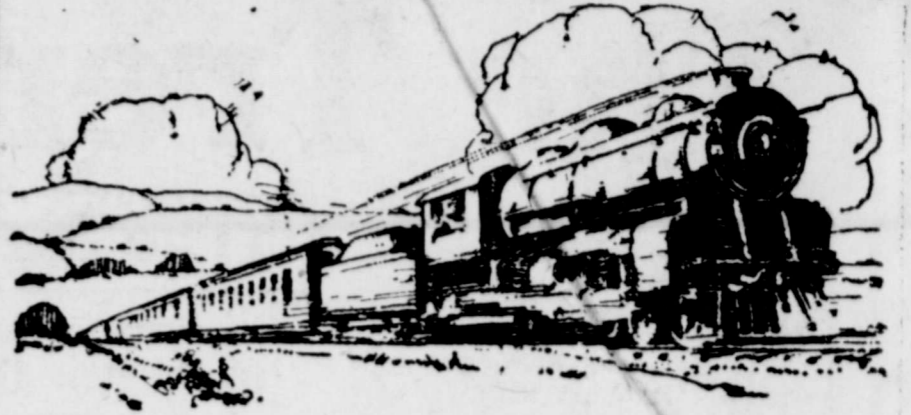

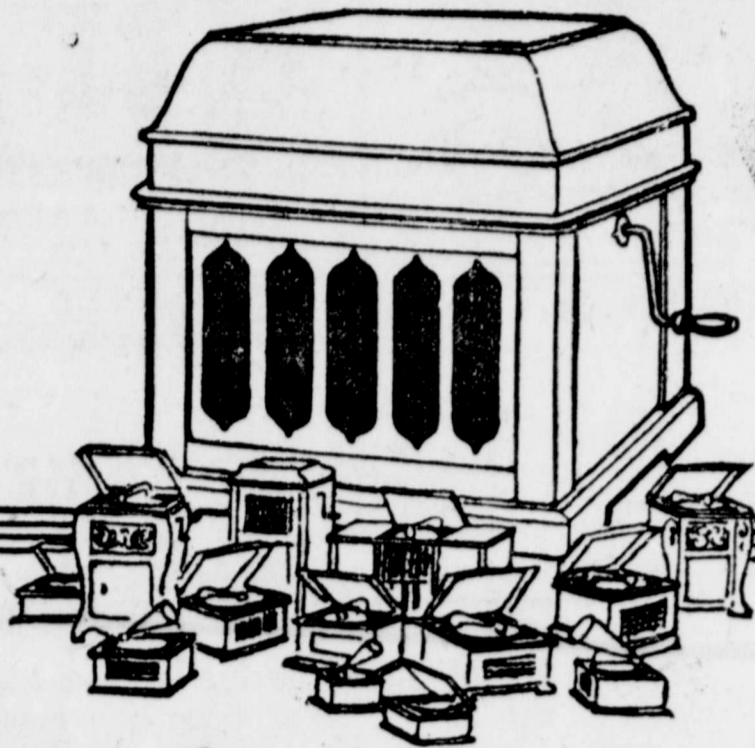

Lifelong Savings, During the Potlatch,
Are Often Passed to Another,
Leaving Giver Poor.

The potlatch or fete in vogue
among the Indians from Puget
sound to southern Alaska, gives a
very good idea of the unselfishness
or vanity of the giver. At this func-
tion, the Christian Science Monitor
states, a rich man gives to the peo-
ple of his tribe, or a neighboring
one, all his worldly goods. Leaving
the donor, as it does, in actual need
of the bare necessities of life, this
practice is considered as an evidence
of his greatness. In many instances
the giver sacrifices the accumulation
of a lifetime.

Such acts may be attributed more
to vanity than to any real desire
to give pleasure to others. It is well
known by those who have lived
among Indians that any unusual
kindness or gift injures rather than
aids the benefactor. The Indian will
consider the gift only as a true evi-
dence of his worth, and not to any
generosity on the part of the giver—
a trait not altogether foreign to
more civilized peoples.

Personal adornment is more
coveted than anything else, although
it is an Indian's nature to want to
possess about everything he sees.
And he is very likely to ask if one
has a duplicate, quite equivalent to
asking for the only one you have.

Knight family.

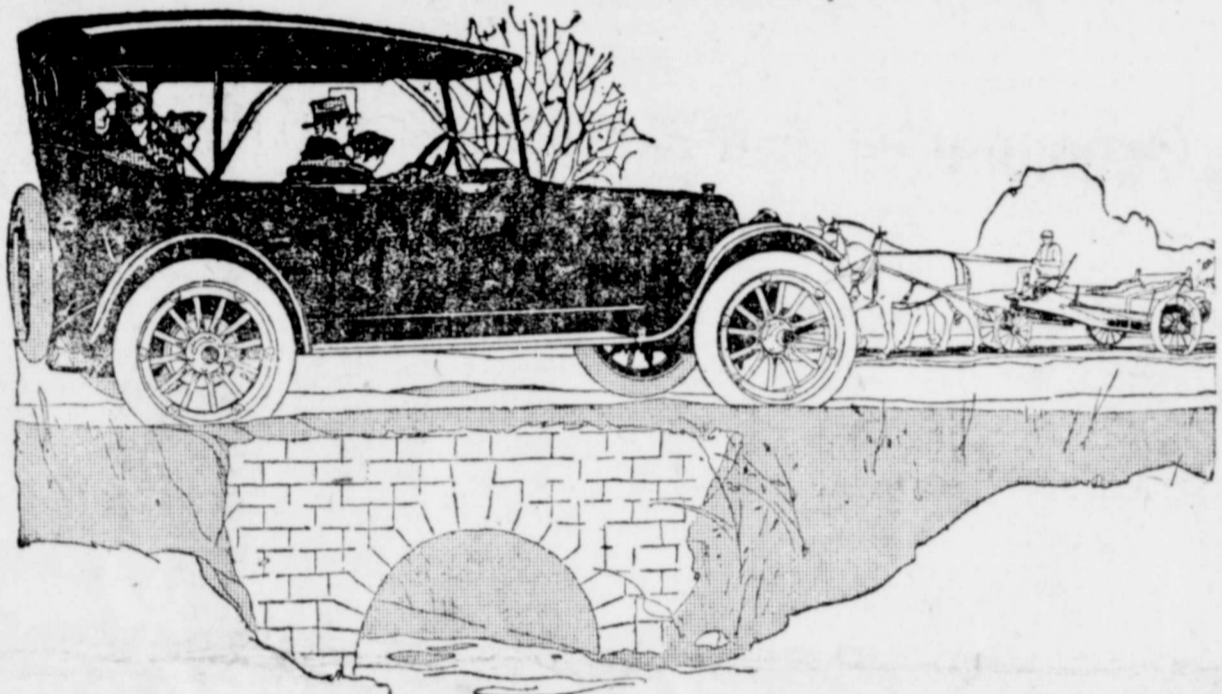

In a pistol battle in Ranger Monday three men were killed. The trouble grew out of a dispute over a laundry bill.

The ban was lifted on the liquor business in Canada the first of the week and all military prisoners were released at the same time. Those Canucks know how to make one great hilarious Christmas.

Two men accused of having swindled a Texas cattleman out of \$45,000 in a fictitious oil deal in Fort Worth about six weeks ago, have been arrested in California and brought back to answer to the charge.

Some of those implicated in defying Federal Judge Anderson's order restraining them from inciting coal miners to strike have been jailed. Judge Anderson rightly states that the matter of defying a court order is very serious and dangerous to the whole government.

The Goldthwaite merchants certainly have cause to be gratified over the splendid Christmas trade. The stores were crowded for several days prior to Christmas and every line of business was rushed. The people of this section are prospering and look forward to the coming year with hopeful anticipation.

The death of James Hays Quarles, a well known newspaper writer, is regretted sincerely, not only by the newspaper profession, but by the general public. Mr. Quarles was secretary to the board of water engineers at Austin and was found dead in his bed Monday morning, death being due to natural causes.

The trial of Harry New, alleged son of Senator New of Indiana, charged with the murder of his sweetheart near Los Angeles, Cal., is in progress at that place. Several sensational features have been developed and others are promised. Senator New disclaims the parentage of the young man, but his mother is persistent in her claim and is using every effort and all of her means in defense of her son.

A press dispatch bearing the New York date line Monday contained the following very pleasing information. "Army transport Buford, having on board Emma Goldman, Alexander Berkman and more than 200 other radicals, left this port at 4 a. m. today for an unknown destination. The radicals, who are being deported, will be taken to a European port which will be made known on the opening of the captain's orders when the Buford is twenty-four hours out of port. The 249 passengers on the ark of the Soviet expected to be landed at some far northern port giving access to Soviet Russia.

The price of print paper is interesting the big dailies as well as the county papers and other weeklies. The price has advanced from 3 1/2 cents per pound before the war to 9 cents now and there appears to be no relief in sight. In fact, those in position to judge say the price has not yet reached the maximum by any means. Already many papers have been forced to suspend. Grading down from the great St. Louis Republic to small community papers they have either discontinued business or been consolidated with other papers. The condition is indeed peculiar. The United States has only one-fifteenth of the population of the world, yet uses one-half of the paper manufactured in the world. It is evident, therefore, that supply and demand have somewhat to do with the scarcity of paper and the supply, but the Eagle believes the trust has much more to do with it.

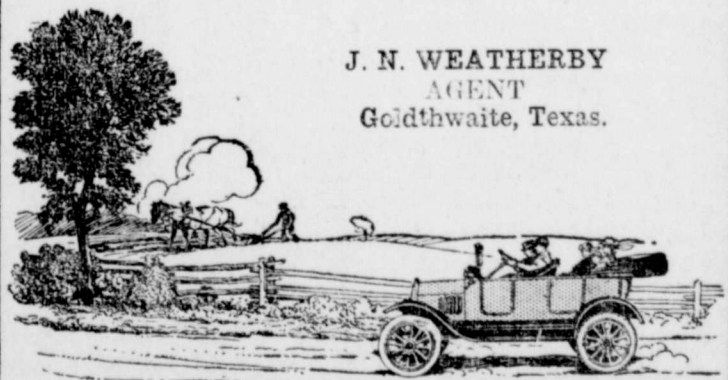

WEATHER SHOWN ON SCREEN

Films of Forecast Charts Now Reveal the Progress of Great Atmospheric Changes.

One may now watch the development and progress of a great storm, or of a cold wave, on the moving-picture screen. The films used for the purpose are not pictures of the storm itself, but of successive weather maps of it, like those prepared by our weather bureau. The spectator sees a low pressure area arise, expand and move across the continent, as he watches, on the screen, the movements of the curves of equal air pressure on the map.

It is claimed that this method of representation, invented recently by a French meteorologist, will be a great aid to the study of weather conditions, and that interesting facts regarding the general circulation of the atmosphere have already been deduced by its aid. Now that aerial navigation has become an accomplished fact, this circulation will soon have a practical bearing on commerce, even greater than it possessed in the days of the sailing ship. Of late its use has been limited to weather forecasts.—Literary Digest.

TWELVE MILES EACH SECOND

Scientists Have Given That as the Speed of the Earth in Its Flight in Space.

An artillery shell, with the velocity of the solar system, would penetrate a sheet of steel four blocks thick, writes William Joseph Showalter, in the National Geographic Magazine, in describing the speed of the sun and earth. The velocity of an artillery shell is 3,000 feet a second, while that of the sun is 63,000 feet. The speed at which the earth travels is 12 miles a second. Persons living near the equator travel 9,000,000 miles in the flight around the earth's axis. While doing this the whole earth is being carried off into new and untried regions of space at the rate of 400,000,000 miles a year.

Spectroscopic studies and sky observations alike tell us that our sun and its family are headed in a great migration across the sky toward a point between the constellations of Hercules and Lyra. It is not known for certain whether the solar system is traveling in a straight direction or the sun is revolving around some greater body, even as the earth is around the sun, and the moon around the earth. If the sun has an orbit, its curve has defied detection by astronomers.

The large volume of light which the small filament emits is diffused to the point where the bulb itself appears luminous. The white bulb—it is milky white in appearance—is made in the 50-watt size, and, notwithstanding the low brightness of the bulb, supplies more light than the 50-watt clear glass bulb.—Scientific American.

USEFUL NEW PARASITE.

A recent bulletin of the United States department of agriculture states that a European parasitic fly, *Compsilura cinnamata* has been used with great success to destroy gypsy moth and brown-tail moth in New England. It will also aid in the control of other insect pests. A few years ago the white-marked tussock moth was a serious pest in New England, but has practically disappeared since *Compsilura* became established. The cabbage worm, the celery worm and the fall webworm have all been reduced by the activities of the new parasite.—Scientific American.

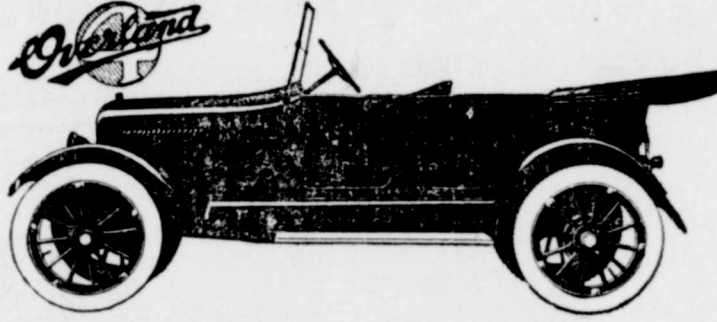

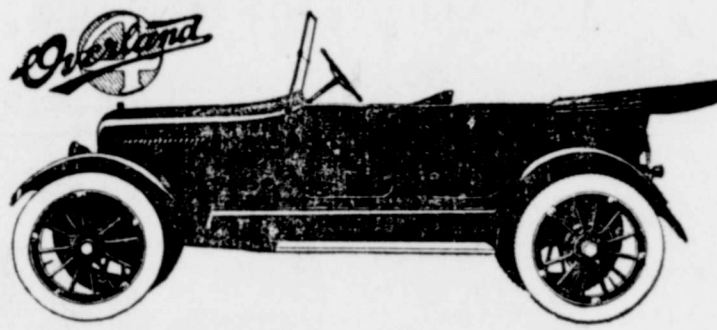

THE COMMUNITY DEBT TO THE SCHOOLS

Fifty, perhaps twenty-five, years ago, people were discussing the debt which the school owed to the community. It was not an uncommon thing for a bragging tax payer to boast of the fact that the teachers of the schools were indebted to him for their daily bread—to make even the teachers feel that they were paid their wages mainly through the charity of the community in which they taught. The schools in the small towns and villages were rude structures with no conveniences. The people would have considered it a sinful waste of money to put in modern improvements, such as scientific laboratories, gymnasiums and special vocational courses. Even in the cities when these things were granted it was usually with the air of humoring a few foolish dreamers. But how these ideas have changed in the past few years! A good school is a live wire in any community. They have a greater connection with the outside world than almost any other unit in the community and their spirit is more widely felt. If that spirit is a boosting spirit the results are surprising. After graduation the students go their various ways—some to college or professional schools, some to the farm or to otherwise make their living in their communities. If they go with a spirit to boost their home town what a tremendous advantage it is for that town. Think of the people they will meet who are looking for that kind of a town. And the teachers, what of them? They are constantly changing their positions, and if you have treated them as you should and they see your town is a live growing thing they are not going to keep still about it when they go into other communities to teach. Neither will they keep still if the opposite condition is true. This is only one of the advantages of good schools—and we might say a minor one. Think of the good citizens your school

gives you. Think how it builds up your people's civic pride—how it teaches them right thinking and right living.

And it is only by right living that we ever hope to achieve success for ourselves, for our town or for our country. Don't grow "hardshelled" toward the blessings of a good school in your community. The success of the school depends largely on how you as a patron warm up to it. A very small percent of the patrons ever visit the schools, therefore, are not in position to pass any just criticisms on the way the school is managed.

It is not a hard matter for a teacher to locate the concerned parents without meeting them, except as they meet them in the life of the child. If your child fails to measure up with others in their grades, don't get grouchy at the teacher before first taking a close look into your own home life. If the building stands it must have a safe foundation. The teacher is not responsible for the first six years of the child's life.
