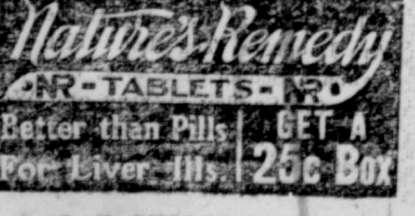

BROTHER OF W. N. SULLIVAN DIES AT SULLIVAN, MISSOURI

The following is from the Sullivan (Mo.) News:

Stephen Henry Sullivan was born near the site of the present town of Sullivan, Mo., Sept. 25, 1845. He died at his home in Sullivan Monday night, May 10, 1920, at the age of 74 years 7 months 15 days. He had been in failing health for several years and the past few weeks was confined to his bed with heart trouble.

Mr. Sullivan had been prominent in the affairs of his community ever since his early manhood. He was the grandson of Stephen Sullivan, who laid out the town of Sullivan in 1858. The railroad people gave the town his name because he donated the land for the depot grounds and built the depot himself. He also built the first house in town in 1859.

The subject of this sketch was the son of Wylie and Eliza (Teas) Sullivan and was the eldest of four children, only one of whom survives him—W. N. Sullivan, Goldthwaite, Texas. Wylie Sullivan was accidentally killed when but thirty-two years old and his children were cared for in the most part after that by the grandfather, Stephen Sullivan.

When but a boy, Stephen H. helped his grandfather in clearing the brush and timber from the townsite, and tradition relates that he dug the first grave in Buffalo Cemetery, in which the body of his friend, Samuel King, was buried. He was compelled to do so by the Union soldiers. They had previously killed Mr. King and were holding young Sullivan as a prisoner of war. About that time the soldiers hung young Sullivan's grandfather and left him for dead. He was cut down by one of his slaves, Robert Brown, and revived, but died shortly afterward.

After Price's raid, Stephen Henry went to the Rocky Mountain region and spent about ten years roughing it—fighting Indians, digging gold and hunting big game. Such were the environments under which he grew to manhood.

After Mr. Sullivan had returned to Missouri, in 1875 he was married to Martha E. Bandy, daughter of Jamison Bandy. She now survives him. To this union two children were born, Nida E. and Stephen Henry, Jr., both of whom survive and live in Sullivan.

After marriage Mr. Sullivan removed to McLennan county, Texas, where he engaged in farming, stock dealing and railroad contracting until 1882 when he returned to Franklin county, Mo. He took an active part in all public matters. He was mayor of the town early in its history and also one term a few years ago. He was instrumental in settling the school grounds in Sullivan, where our public and high school buildings now stand, and was always enthusiastic in support of all educational and social improvement interests of the town and community. He was a faithful member of the Masonic Lodge, O. E. S. Chapter, I. O. O. F. and Rebecca Lodges of Sullivan, and of Rolla Commandery No. 79, Knights Templar, and was in good standing in all of them at the time of his death.

Mr. Sullivan was a man of great physical strength and mental energy. He was a successful business affairs and accumulated substantial property in Sullivan. In 1895-1896 he engaged in the sawmill and lumber business at Endine, in Washington county, after which he followed the lumber business

in Sullivan for several years. In 1903 he and his son established the Sullivan Hardware and Furniture Company which has ever since been recognized as one of the substantial and progressive business concerns of the town.

When the Civil War broke out young Sullivan's grandfather, with whom he lived, owned a large number of slaves and much mining and farming land in this locality and naturally his interests and sympathies lay with the South. The youth shared in these sympathies but later became a very earnest supporter of the Union. Of late years his Americanism and patriotism have been the most pronounced. He saw to it that a flag staff and large flag was provided for the public school, and of his own accord he provided a staff and a flag for the Masonic building. From the time of his death until after his burial these flags and the town flag were floated at half-mast.

The funeral was held Wednesday afternoon at the family residence and was conducted by the Rev. J. R. Hamlin, assisted by the Rev. A. L. Sullivan. The Rev. Mr. Hamlin and the deceased were very close friends ever since their first acquaintance in 1869. The sermon was of a nature of a personal tribute and was an appreciative eulogy of Mr. Sullivan as a man, a friend and a citizen. Music was furnished by the old-time singers from the Christian Harmony song books.

An exceedingly large crowd attended the funeral, filling the house and the spacious yard, notwithstanding it was a very rainy afternoon. The sermon was delivered from the porch. The business houses of town all closed from 3 to 5 in respect to the deceased.

The Masonic and Odd Fellow Lodges attended the funeral in procession, marching to the residence and then to the Odd Fellows Cemetery where interment was made. The Masonic burial service was used at the grave.

The floral offerings were many and very beautiful. Each of the local fraternal orders of which Mr. Sullivan was a member furnished appropriate floral emblems, and many other flowers were furnished by members of the family and friends.

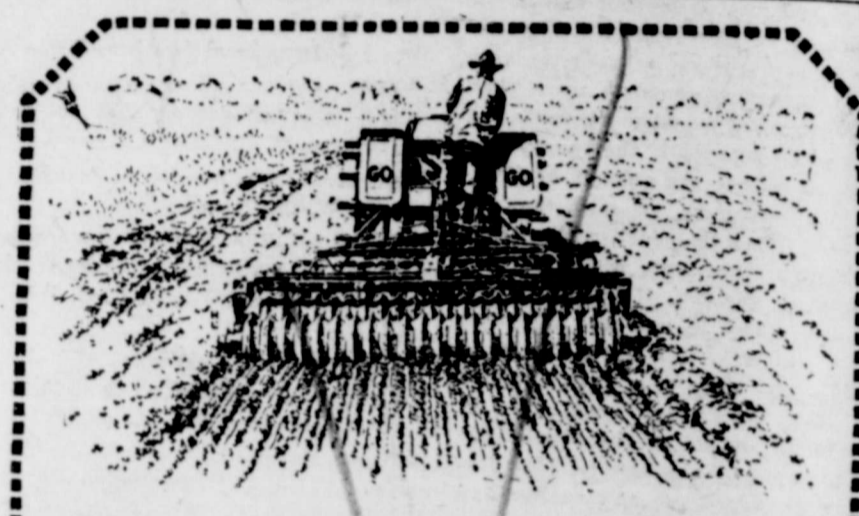

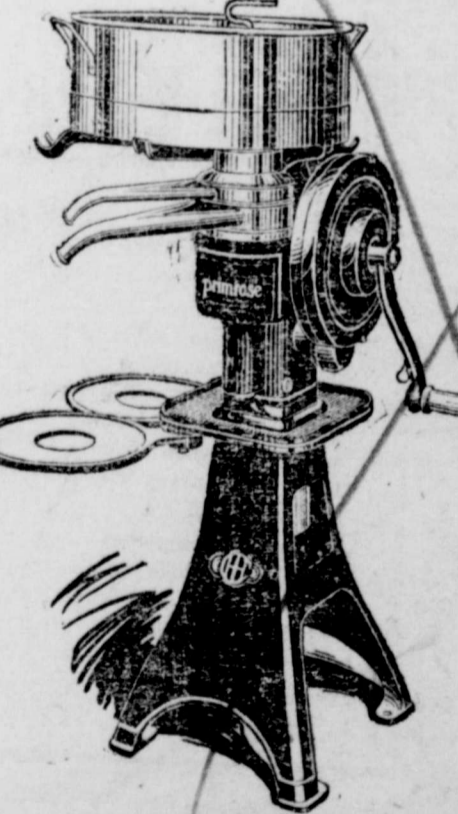

THE NATURE AND METHODS OF THE HUMAN MIND.

(Continued from last week.)

The functions of the body, as far as motion is concerned, are essentially electrical. Electrical impulses sent along the nerve tracts seem to be capable of producing any effect which is produced by the vital force.

The giant ganglionic cells of the brain and spinal cord are essentially batteries, generating and storing up electrical force, to be disclosed under proper stimuli. Many of these cells have two and only two main wires leading from, properly insulated with the white substance of Schwann and with some of these cells the wires seem to circle them round about many times, after the manner of a dynamo coil. Other close analogies to modern electrical machinery can be found, which nearly convince an unprejudiced mind of their essential identity. Many of these functions are exhibited in the recent dead animal, when proper stimulus is applied, almost with the same perfection as during life; with this great difference, however; before death the movement designed by the experimenter takes place or does not take place, on the application of the stimulus, according as the mind of the subject wills or does not will to have it take place, while after death the movement designed takes place immediately upon the application of the stimulus, and in exactly the same manner, under exactly the same circumstances. In the first instance, mental inhibition is shown, in the latter instance it is not. Under the first condition, the body exhibits automatism and may originate motion; under the latter, the stimulus must be from outside. Under the first condition, the animal does as he wishes; in the latter, the body does as it must.

There seem to be many who would believe that thought also is a function of some of these cells, which up to this day have but yielded motion to any stimulus we have been able to apply.

If this be true, why are we not able to produce thought by stimulating these cells after death. The cells are there in no worse vital condition than are the cells the stimulation of which produces motion. If this be true, where among all the multitude of cells which compose the great nerve centers are these particular cells located, the stimulation of which may cause thought? We do not know where they are, but we are mighty sure they have not been removed or escaped, while death was taking place.

On the corner of Fourth and Pine streets there is located a great central office for the telephone system of St. Louis. Thousands of wires run into it from all portions of the city, and through this machine is conducted information of every sort. A fire is ignited and destroys a section of this office and over a large district information can no longer be received or communicated. A cyclone breaks forth and hurls down and tangles hundreds of wires. The office is there unharmed, but it is useless. It no longer performs the function for which it was created. When in good condition its batteries stood loaded with electrical force, ready to convey messages, but what has all this to do with the power which alone can originate these messages and set the machine in motion? Is not the machine sufficiently complicated? What shall be added to it, so that it will originate its own messages? There is no stranger law and more unalterable in nature, than the law of inertia. Matter at rest remains at rest, and the perpetual motion machine that generates its own running force, like the philosopher's stone and the elixir of perennial youth, remains a hidden secret, impenetrable by the eyes of man.

My friend, it seems to me that the human mind is a very different entity from this sort of machine. A certain wise philosopher declared that the brain cells secrete thought, even as the mammary glands secrete milk, but to me it seems as though mentality pre-exists and through its will and influence draws around it, consciously or unconsciously, the molecules of matter in nature and so moulds and arranges them as to construct this useful dwelling and machine, by which it is now able, in proportion to the perfection of the machine, to perceive other objects in nature, recognize other entities like itself, communicate with them and make itself manifest.

About 2,000 years ago, in the ancient city of Athens, there was assembled a sorrowful group, composed of a few scholars, about to take leave of a kind and thoughtful master. The departure was not far off, for an empty bowl stood near, in which the dregs of fellowship still lingered. One of these friends, desirous of giving some comfort to the last moments of the master,

said: "When you are dead, oh! Socrates, where would you have us bury you?" "You can do with me as you like," said Socrates, "if you can catch me;" and then from this rare soul, illuminated and made transparent by approaching dissolution, proceeded one of the most satisfactory discussions on the nature of the human mind that can be found in any language or in the recorded annals of any age. I would advise you to procure a literal translation of Plato's dialogues and read this discussion in full. It will be found under the head of Phaedo. Even at this age, we can add but little to it, with all our extended science and philosophy.

"Dissolution," said he, "pertaineth only to such things as are compounded."

The mind is an entity, composed not of parts, but one and inseparable and capable when one home wears out, of constructing for itself another and so on to infinity. Yet there are certain laws which seem to control it, and what these laws are we will now proceed to discuss.

HONEY FOR FARMERS' TABLES.

Bees work while we work and gather and store that choice food, honey. The nectar of flowers, nature's purest and most wholesome substance, is elaborated by bees and a chemical change takes place in the sac of these workers, producing delicious, appetizing food that should be on every farmer's table.

There is difference of opinion as to the value of sugar as a food, especially when eaten in large quantities. Dr. Kellogg says that cane-sugar should be eaten only in small quantities. "Large quantities," he says, "cause acidity and give rise to gastric catarrh and indigestion. Sweet fruits such as raisins and figs, honey and maltose sugar are natural and wholesome sweets and may be eaten freely." Another authority, Dr. C. C. Miller, says: "It would be greatly for the health of the present generation if honey could be at least partially restored to its former place as a common article of diet."

Every farmer could keep a few stands of bees and supply his table with honey. The cost would be negligible, but the value of the honey considerable when we compare it to sugar at present prices. There are very few purposes in sweetening foods where honey could not replace sugar and for most purposes it is superior.

The honey bee has an additional value to that of producing honey, as important as honey producing is. It collects pollen on its rugged body in searching for nectar and carries it to other flowers, thus helping nature cross-fertilize stigmas and produce better seeds, fruits and flowers. For this purpose alone, bees are worth keeping, not to mention the sweetest and best of food produced for our tables.—Farm and Ranch.

GETTING EVEN WITH INSECTS.

Of the numerous insect enemies with which the Southwestern farmer must contend none are more numerous nor more destructive to the wealth he produces than those that infest garden vegetables. With the possible exception of those that infest deciduous trees the species that are found in the garden are the most numerous. No less eminent authority than Chrittenden estimated a few years ago that the annual loss to vegetables in this country is 20 per cent of their value. This is 10 per cent more than is claimed for the annual loss to field crops as a result of insect depredation.

When we remember that the average farmer is busy when vegetables need protection from their insect enemies we can understand how the loss to garden vegetables is so great. The home garden is not grown for market purposes as a general rule, but for family use. If something must be neglected it had best be something that does not bring cash, the average farmer reasons.

There are ways of checking garden insects if a beginning be made as soon as they are discovered. By spraying, dusting or hand picking the few first discovered, it is possible to save much trouble later before the young have time to develop. By getting rid of the females that reproduce so rapidly the garden may be saved and much progress made in the garden work.—Farm and Ranch.

PLANTING FOR LATE HARVEST.

Floods have been common in many parts of the humid Southwest, while timely rains have in many instances broken drought in portions of arid localities. Late planting may be desirable in many instances. The early spring has been so unfavorable for good stands that many farmers will not hesitate to plant later crops. For such crops as the grain sorghums, peas, cow beans, peanuts and Sudan there is still a good prospect, and no hesitation is justified in planting now, or as soon as the land can be prepared. Feed crops will be needed; cover crops may be desirable and crops of whatever kind that will bring in revenue, either for sale, for feed, for food, or for fertility.

An unfavorable season requires the farm manager to change his original plan of crop rotation, but it cannot defeat the plans of resourceful, diligent farmers, whose determination has been tested many previous years.—Farm and Ranch.

These community happenings—parties, singings, church announcements, etc., and personal items—are considered by many to be one of the most interesting parts of a weekly paper. Vice President Thomas Riley Marshall opened the seventh-fifth Southern Baptist convention, saying: "I hope the clergy and laymen of this country will understand that their divine mission is to go out and preach the gospel and not beat the bass drum in a political parade. There is enough for the church to do without trying to reform congress. I am a part of congress and I know." May the Lord send us more Marshalls and fill every pulpit in the world with Gospel preachers who will preach the Gospel instead of politics.

The cold storage bill requiring that the date of entry of goods into cold storage be marked on them when they are offered for sale, and limiting the period of such storage passed the senate Monday and was sent to conference. This was one of the measures proposed by President Wilson in his message to congress last year making recommendations as to means of reducing the living costs. If the bill becomes a law it will probably lower commodities usually held in storage, as it will have a tendency to release larger amounts of storage produce and thereby throw more on the market at a time. This condition will gradually adjust itself until it will work for the best interests of both producer and consumer, and will to a certain extent stabilize prices.

The McCormick resolution calls upon the reserve board to inform the senate what steps it is taking to end the present inflation of currency and credit and what it proposes to do to mobilize credits to move the 1920 crop. This resolution was adopted in the senate Monday. Senator Owen of Oklahoma declared Wednesday that the resolution of the senate to make the above enquiry of the board gives the federal reserve board an excellent opportunity for declaring a policy of deflation. Senator Owen was author of the Federal reserve act, which is intended to prevent panics. Senator Owen warned the senate that the people would not stand for a panic now and if it is caused by their policy a big row will be started. He said the country would not submit to any depression created by the banks of the country. We need a few more senators like Owen.

BRIEFS.

Bolsheviki Win.—The Bolsheviki won important successes this week over the Poles in passing the Dvina River at Polotzk, in the government of Vitobsk, according to an official statement by the Soviet government at Moscow.

Investigate.—Favorable report was ordered Wednesday by the Senate Auditing Committee on the Borah resolution calling for an investigation by the senate into all expenditures made by Republican and Democratic presidential candidates, as well as the contributions received in their behalf.

The Eagle notes an advertised cut in prices of a number of department stores throughout the nation. While large supplies may have something to do with the cut, still another factor comes in for its share of responsibility—"fear." The large dealers are afraid of being caught in the decline expected as a war aftermath. Prices steadily advanced after the armistice was signed until a new high level was reached, and are now thought by many to be at their highest point. This is what is making the large dealers shaky, and they are advertising a cut in prices to hedge their loss by reducing stocks fast. It has been ascertained that some of the larger stores in the cities made enormous profits. By carefully comparing prices with the prices prevailing in Goldthwaite, it is to be noted that a reduction of twenty or even thirty per cent could be made by some of the larger stores in the cities and still not be down to the level of some of the country merchants in the smaller towns. Even in the same towns there is a difference in prices at certain times, even as high as ten cents a yard on cotton goods, as illustrated by the advertisements of two merchants in a Texas city a few days ago. One advertised gingham at a twenty per cent reduction, but it appears that this merchant had been selling this brand of goods at fifty cents a yard. Another merchant in the same town advertised that he had never sold this brand of goods for over forty cents a yard, which price was about equal to the prices the goods of the first merchant would bring after the cut. People should note these things and find out if the cut was really a cut price or a reduction to a fair price. Twenty per cent reduction is a large reduction, as twenty per cent in dry goods is considered a fair margin of profit, and dealers tell us that they would be glad if they could get that much the year round in Goldthwaite. If the wholesale price should break considerably then we should expect a reduction by the retail merchants, but so far the wholesale price has not changed on woollens and cotton goods to any appreciable extent, and the large cuts now advertised in the Eastern cities is only another way "marking them up in order to mark them down."

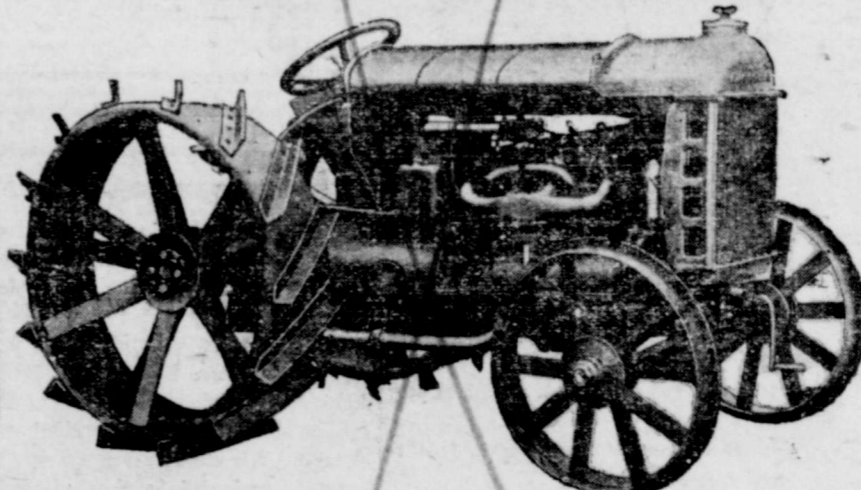

BIRTHS OF CHILDREN SHOULD ALWAYS BE RECORDED, SAYS STATE BOARD OF HEALTH

Austin, Texas, May 19.—It is largely up to the mothers of Texas to put the state in the registration area; the State Board of Health fully recognizes that if Texas as a state is ever to get into what is known as the registration area of the United States Vital Statistics Bureau and become recognized as being on a par with those states which now enjoy this great advantage that this will come about largely through the co-operation of the mothers themselves. There are almost daily evidences of the fact that mothers are becoming more and more aware of the vital importance of having their children's births recorded which is important not only from a legal, social and industrial standpoint, but is absolutely necessary for the accurate and scientific study of disease and its proper prevention.

While it is the duty of the mother to know that her child's birth is recorded it should at the same time be a great pleasure and a source of satisfaction to her to know that she has performed this important piece of business for her helpless child and there is no one thing requiring so little time and effort on her part that will be so much appreciated by the child when it has grown to realize the value of this forethought on the part of its own mother.

During 1919, probably more than 10,000 children were born in the state of Texas whose births were not reported.

Millions of dollars have been lost in claims and millions more have been spent in litigation for property rights which might have been saved to some one's children if only mother or some one had acted in time in behalf of the child by recording the date of birth.

Mother, will you help your child by making such report to the State Board of Health and also urge other mothers to do likewise?

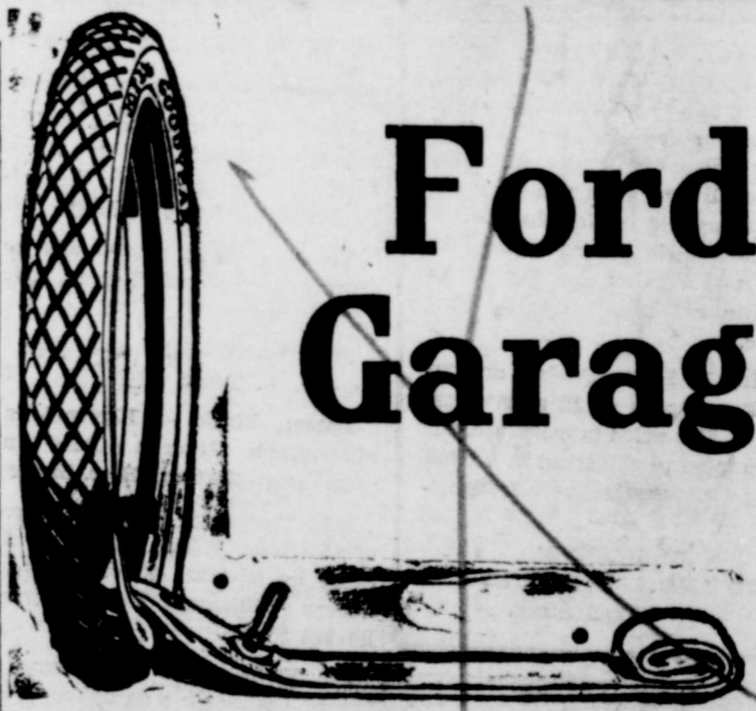

DON'TS FOR THE POULTRY GROWER.

Don't allow your hens to eat decayed flesh of any kind unless you want them to get limberneck. Many fowls die from this trouble.

Don't allow filth and dampness in and around your poultry roosting house; these will cause roup and its attending ills.

Don't let the mites and lice get the upper hand about your place. They will cause untold trouble and loss of both young and old stock.

Don't be afraid to give your fowls an abundance of green stuff at all seasons. It is their salvation, whether they are old or young.

Don't be afraid to invest a few dollars in good stock any more than you would in improved seeds and grain.

Don't keep any males with the females unless you are hatching the eggs. Infertile eggs will keep much longer than fertile ones.

Don't allow a dirty, stale egg to go into your market basket no matter how high eggs are or how much you need the money.

Don't be afraid to work with your poultry the year round. It is the only road to success. No matter what other duties are, the poultry should not be neglected.

Don't expect every egg to hatch when you buy eggs from a breeder. Your own eggs will not do that well as a rule.

Don't attempt to raise more than one kind of good standard bred chickens if you expect to reap the most benefit from them. Learn to specialize.—H. L. Williams, Poultry Specialist, Extension Division, Louisiana State University.—The Progressive Farmer.

DIRIGIBLE WILL BE USED TO SUPERVISE COTTON GROWING

For the first time in history, cotton growing will be supervised from the air when within the next four months a small dirigible will be used for this purpose on the 28,000 acre plantation of The Goodyear Tire and Rubber Company at Goodyear and Litchfield, Arizona, near Phoenix.

At present mounted overseers are employed, but the company has been advised to use more modern means by the acquisition of many thousand more acres of desert which will be irrigated to grow long staple cotton used in fabric for the manufacture of automobile tires.

Besides its use for purposes of supervision, the dirigible will probably be used to transport Goodyear officials to Phoenix and even as far as the California factory at Los Angeles, a trip of about 400 miles.

For these purposes the "pony blimp" type of airship will be used because of its ease in handling and small crew requirements. Built as the first dirigible used in this country for commercial purposes, the little airship, probably the smallest practicable dirigible ever constructed, is now being manufactured at the company's shops in Akron, Ohio. Completion is expected within four months, after which the ship will be sent to Arizona and used for inspection and supervision of the immense cotton plantation of the country in the midst of the desert.

Company officials believe that the use of an airship for purposes of supervision on the cotton plantation will show that this commercial use of dirigibles can be extended to wheat field survey and similar purposes.

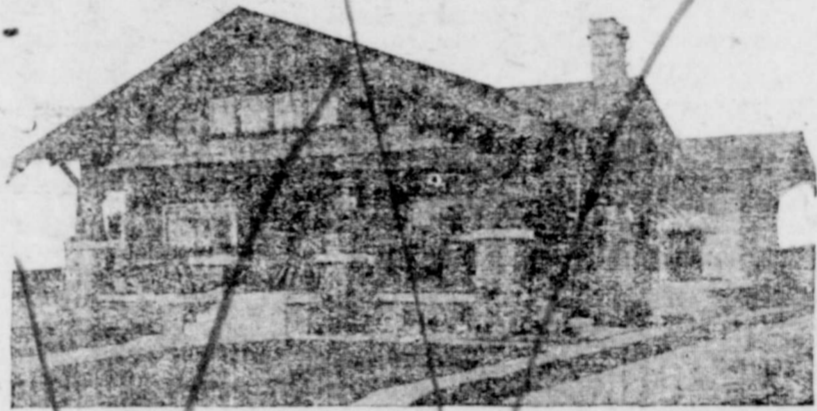

"HOW EUROPE CAN ESCAPE COLLAPSE"

"We Must Aid By Extending Credits," Says Davison.

"GRAVE MENACE TO U. S. A."

"European Ruin Would Involve America—Starvation and Disease Rampant."

Des Moines, Ia.—Speaking before the general conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, Henry P. Davison, chairman of the board of governors of the league of Red Cross societies, said:

As chairman of the convention of Red Cross societies, composed of representatives of twenty seven nations that met recently in Geneva, I am custodian of authoritative reports recording appalling conditions among millions of people living in eastern Europe.

One of the most terrible tragedies in the history of the human race is being enacted within the broad belt of territory lying between the Baltic and the Black and Adriatic seas.

This includes the New Baltic states—Poland, Czecho-Slovakia, the Ukraine, Austria, Hungary, Roumania, Montenegro, Albania and Serbia.

The reports which come to us make it clear that in these war ravaged lands civilization has broken down. Disease, bereavement and suffering are present in practically every household, while food and clothing are insufficient to make life tolerable.

Men, women and children are dying by thousands, and over vast once-civilized areas there are to be found neither medicinal appliances nor medical skill sufficient to cope with the devastating plagues.

Wholesale starvation is threatened in Poland this summer unless she can procure food supplies in large quantities. There are now approximately 250,000 cases of typhus in Poland and in the area occupied by Polish troops.

"Worst Typhus Epidemic in History" This is already one of the worst typhus epidemics in the world's history. In Galicia whole towns are crippled and business suspended. In some districts there is but one doctor to each 150,000 people.

In the Ukraine, we were told, typhus and influenza have affected most of the population. A report from Vienna, dated February 12, said: "There are rations for three weeks. Death stalks through the streets of Vienna and takes unhindered toll."

Budapest, according to our information, is one vast city of misery and suffering, the number of deaths is double that of births. Of the 180,000 children in the schools, 100,000 are dependent on public charity. There are 150,000 workers idle.

Typhus and smallpox have invaded the four countries composing Czecho-

In Serbia, typhus has broken out again, and there are but 200 physicians to minister to the needs of that entire country.

In Montenegro, where food is running short, there are but five physicians for a population of 950,000.

Returning to the United States a few weeks ago with all these stories ringing in my ears I found myself once more in a land whose granaries were overflowing, where health and plenty abounded and where life and activity and eager enterprise were in the full flood.

I asked myself: "What if this plague and famine were here in the great territory between the Atlantic seaboard and the Mississippi valley which fairly parallels the extent of these ravaged countries and that 65,000,000 of our own people condemned to idleness by lack of raw material and whose fields had been devastated by invasion and rapine were racked by starvation and pestilence and if we had lifted up our voices and invoked the attention of our brothers in happier Europe to our own deep miseries and our cries had fallen on deaf ears, would we not in our despair exclaim against their heartlessness?"

"Only Three Ways to Help Europe."

There are three ways by which these stricken lands can secure supplies from the outside world. One is by payment, one by credit, and the third is by exchange of commodities. If these peoples tried to buy materials and supplies in America at the present market value of their currencies, Austria would have to pay forty times the original cost, Germany thirteen times, Greece just double, Czecho-Slovakia fourteen times and Poland fifty times. These figures are official and are a true index of the economic plight of these countries.

WILL MILLS COUNTY ADVANCE OR STAND STILL IS QUESTION TO BE DECIDED BY VOTERS

The question to be settled today is: Will Mills county advance or stand still? For many years Mills county has had commissioners to oversee the construction and repair of roads. Everybody knows the result. Last winter during the influenza epidemic people living in the country had to bring double teams to town after the doctors, in order to save the lives of members of their families. The roads were impassable by automobiles—the quick way of travel. Will this happen again in Mills county this winter? Where is the man who will vote for this condition?

Mills county is in the most prosperous condition in its history. Crop prospects were never better. A large majority of the progressive farmers own automobiles. More will own them as soon as local dealers can get them from the factories.

The road superintendent idea is not an experiment. This idea originated in the brain of a Goldthwaite lawyer. The law was adopted bodily by the citizens of Dallas county, and is claimed by them to be the best plan yet put forward. Mills county has had some good commissioners. All, in fact very few, who make good commissioners do not make road experts. The old day of cheap wages and slow work is past. The cry of the hour is for efficiency. We elect commissioners and pay taxes in order to learn them to work roads, and after four years they are replaced by politicians who are campaigning while the commissioners are busy filling up the mud holes.

For over four years Germany was beating to their knees five of the greatest nations of the earth. The armies of these nations were controlled exactly as the road work is now controlled in Mills county—each one under a separate head. Some wise American originated the idea of combining these armies and placing them under one command. In one hundred and fifteen days Germany was crushed.

For many years the hard-working citizens of Mills county have given battle to what is thought to be civilization's greatest retarding factor next to war—bad roads. Each precinct has had its own road overseer and much money has been spent and much hard work has been done. Last fall and winter the farmers could hardly move their crops to market. Many farmers took their produce to other counties in order to travel over good roads. One man at Star last fall spent over two hundred dollars of his personal money on the road to Goldthwaite in order to get his crops to the railroad. Now a wise


