WORLD'S NEWS IN BRIEF.

Oldest Woman.—Mrs. Mareisa Yarborough died in Houston June 6. She was 113 years old and was said to be the oldest white woman in the United States.

London Leads.—The population of New York City, as announced by the census bureau, is 5,621,151. Official figures showed London, with 6,726,753, is still the world's metropolis.

Burn to Death.—Two persons were burned to death and another received serious injuries as a result of a fire which destroyed a combined store and residence in Marshall, Texas, last Saturday.

"Dark Horse"—A dark horse boom for General Pershing as the Democratic nominee for president was launched in New York Thursday. General Pershing recently petitioned for retirement from the active list of the army.

Signs Peace.—The treaty of peace with Hungary was signed in Paris last Friday. Count Albert Apponyi, who recently resigned as the head of the Hungarian peace delegation, declared the peace terms to be a "rag of iniquity."

Strike or Rebel.—The right to strike or a revolution was, in effect, the proposition presented to the resolutions committee of the Republican party Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, Wednesday, according to newspaper reports.

Throw Pepper.—Two robbers entered a jewelry establishment in the center of New York's business district last Saturday and, throwing pepper in the eyes of one of the proprietors, escaped with a wallet said to contain \$100,000 worth of diamonds.

Criticizes Congress.—President Wilson in a telegram last Saturday to the railroad brotherhoods criticized congress for failing to take action with regard to the high cost of living, the conclusion of peace and important domestic legislation.

Car Shortage.—Another car shortage which, it is feared, will be as pronounced as that of last spring, faces the wheat counties of Texas. The wheat harvest has already started and cars for loading are as yet unavailable, says a dispatch from Chillicothe, Texas.

Bailey Files.—Former United States Senator J. W. Bailey filed his name as a candidate for governor of Texas last Saturday, says a dispatch from Dallas. Senator Bailey is scheduled to speak in practically every section of Texas between June 9 and the July primaries.

Paper Price.—The senate committee investigating the paper situation last Saturday recommended that the department of justice institute proceedings under the Sherman and Clayton acts against paper manufacturers. Present paper prices were declared "excessive and unwarranted."

League Begins.—The actual work of the League of Nations in its ordained function of peacemaker was taken up for the first time on June 11, when extraordinary session of the council was held for the purpose of considering the Persian protest against the Russian invasion, a news dispatch from London announces.

Republican Convention—A compromise long sought by the nations plank which keeps ratification of the treaty with or without reservations absolutely out of the platform and will keep the fight off the floor of the convention, was unanimously adopted by a platform "gleering committee" composed of thirteen members, at the Chicago Republican national convention Thursday. No nomination speeches have yet been made.

TRYING TO CUT WATER FROM CLARENDON NO. TWO

The Clarendon well No. 2, which struck a heavy flow of warm salt water several weeks ago, came in with an extra strong flow recently.

The crew has made several unsuccessful attempts to cut the water off. However they have not quit trying. The latter part of last week and the first of this week they spent in pulling the casing preparatory to making another attempt to shut out the water.

The management have hopes of getting oil yet if this attempt is successful. At present there is practically nothing doing in the oil game in this county. But the people have not lost faith in their belief that oil in paying quantities will eventually be found.

J. Y. Cookrum and J. H. Burnett have contracts for a couple of wells to be drilled in the Big Valley community drilling of which should commence within the next thirty days. Some of the "old heads" are looking for some renewed activity in the near future.

A. CAMPBELL DEAD

Alexander Campbell, father of Mrs. Scott Thompson, died at his home in Big Valley Sunday night. Mr. Campbell was eighty-one years of age and had been in excellent health all his life until the last year.

The funeral services were held at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Scott Thompson Monday afternoon at 2 o'clock. Interment was in the Odd Fellows cemetery at Goldthwaite.

Mr. Campbell was long a resident of Big Valley and five years ago lived in this city. He was well known over the entire county.

Alexander Campbell was born April 5, 1839, in Calloway county, Kentucky; died at his home in Big Valley June 6, 1920. He moved with his widowed mother to Tennessee when a mere child, and from there he came to Burnett county, Texas, in 1879. Mr. Campbell joined the Church of Christ in early manhood and thereafter kept the faith. He was the father of ten children, five of whom survive him.

Hon. Pat Neff, candidate for the Democratic nomination for governor, of Texas, spoke to one of the largest crowds ever gathered together here to hear a political speech at the Baptist tabernacle Thursday morning from 10 to 12 o'clock. Mr. Neff came to Goldthwaite from Hamilton, where he delivered an address Wednesday night. Mr. Neff is traveling by automobile and went from here to Lometa to make another speech in the interest of his candidacy Thursday afternoon at 2:30. From Lometa he was scheduled to go to San Saba, to speak Thursday night.

Rev. A. R. Watson of Mullin, former representative of this district, made a splendid introductory address when he presented Mr. Neff to the audience here.

Much enthusiasm was shown by the audience throughout the entire speech, and Mr. Neff was very frequently interrupted by applause. The speaker delivered a clean, straight-forward speech and only referred to his opponents in the gubernatorial contest a few times. Much applause was accorded the speaker when he said: "When I am governor of Texas, I shall not let the squeal of a pig drown out the cries of the infants of this state."

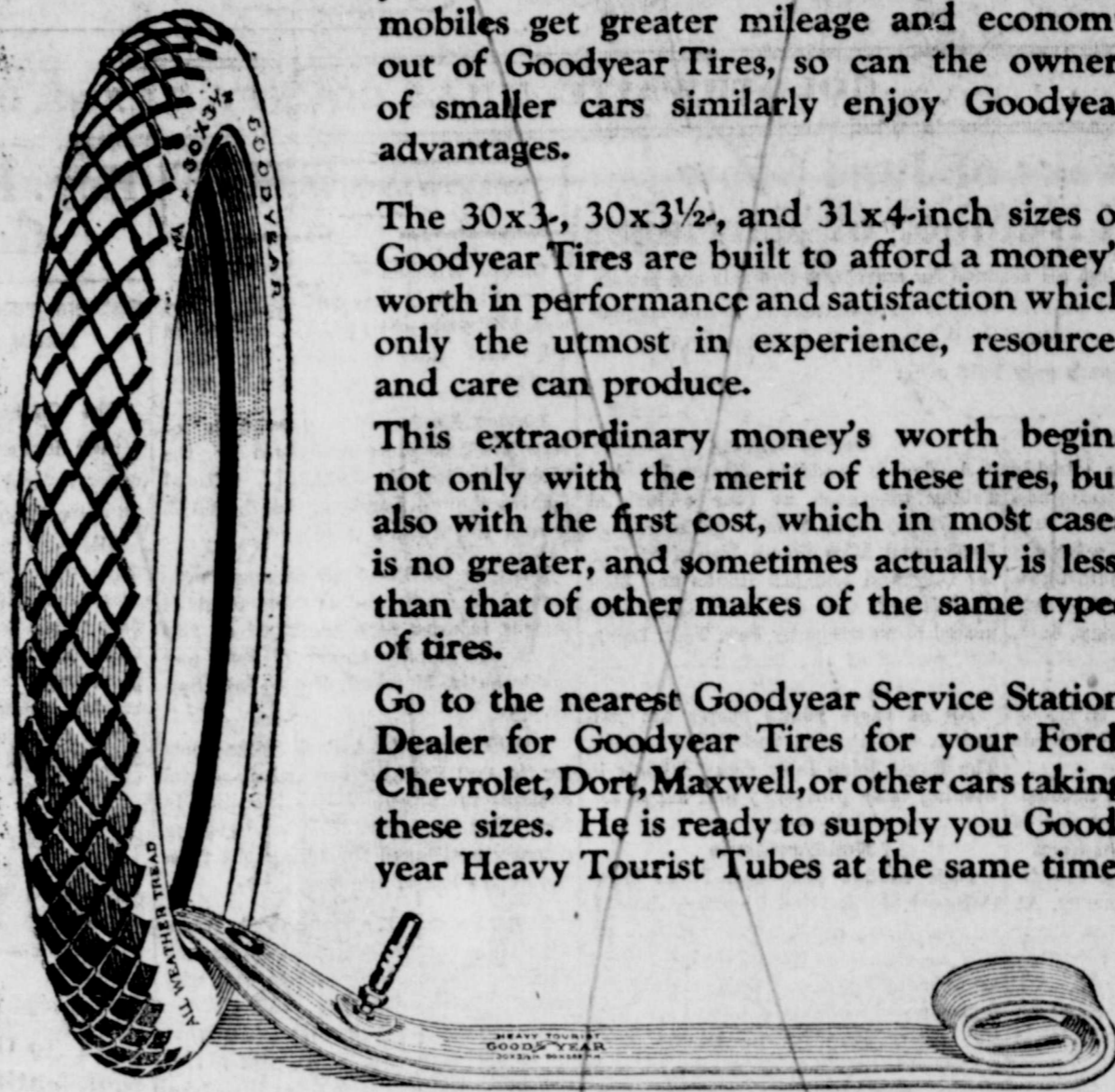

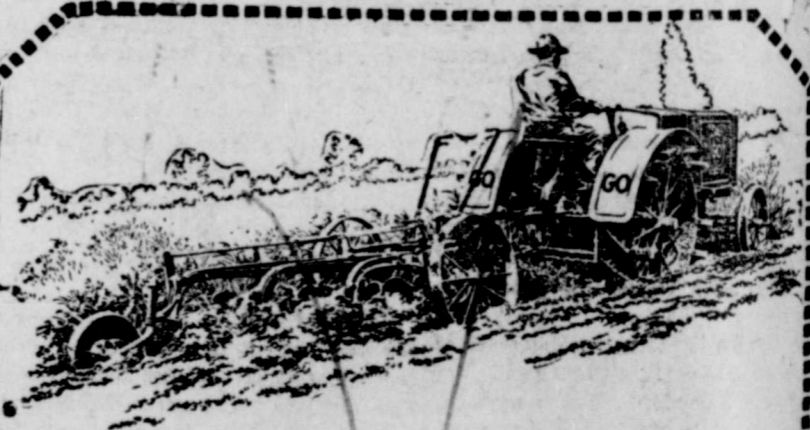

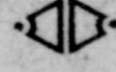

We now believe that the Eagle is read by every one in the county—we made an error the other day and everybody we saw told us about it.

Republican differences over the League of Nations at the Chicago Convention Wednesday culminated in an open threat from senators to leave the party unless it declared flat against the League of Nations.

The Eagle has always said that Mills county is the best county in the best state in the world, and now comes along the government in official figures which prove our contention true. The estimate of the cotton crop percentage for this year at this time is placed at sixty per cent, while the per cent for Mills county is placed at seventy-two per cent.

Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, told the resolutions committee of the Republican party in Chicago this week that such laws as the Esch-Cummings railroad bill or the Industrial Relations Court in Kansas would inevitably result in a revolutionary whirlwind that no government, labor organization, or labor leader would have the power to allay. Deny labor the right to strike, and there will be a revolution, thinks Mr. Gompers.

A movement has been started over the entire state to have the legislature to pass a bill appropriating five million dollars additional money for the schools of Texas. Investigation has shown that this amount is now in state treasury and that additional taxes will not have to be levied for at least two years. The Eagle thinks that this money should be turned over to the schools—the rural schools. Farm boys and girls will stay on the farms if they have the opportunity to enjoy good roads and good schools. And better roads and better schools cost more money than they formerly cost.

George P. Hampton, managing director of the Farmers' National Council, has sent a statement of policy indorsed by 750,000 farmers, to both the Democratic and Republican national committees, with a request that it be incorporated in both platforms. The main planks in the statement of policy are: Government ownership and control of the railroads; government ownership of the merchant marine; packer control legislation; payment of the war debt by taxing war profits, and excessive incomes; a tax on land and other natural resources held for speculation; a rapidly progressive tax on capital value of property, with an exemption of \$25,000; legislation providing cheap and adequate credit for farmers. These planks are all good ones and should be incorporated in the platforms of both the leading parties. Profiteers who made millions out of the war while farmers' sons were fighting should be made pay for it, and not the farmers.

The attention of Eagle readers is called to the political advertisements in this issue of the paper. The campaign is now beginning to warm up and much interesting matter of a political nature will appear from now until the July primaries. Each voter in this county should read the political news and hear all the political speeches possible in order to best make up his mind concerning his choice. The U. S. has the best form of government in the world—a government of the people, for the people, and by the people—if the people take the trouble to form their own opinions and vote. If they do not do this, the U. S. will have a government of the politician, for the politician and by the politician. No man has the right to "elect" the government or any office holder unless he voted in the last election. Every man has a right to his own opinion. Don't let someone else do your thinking for you—vote your own convictions.

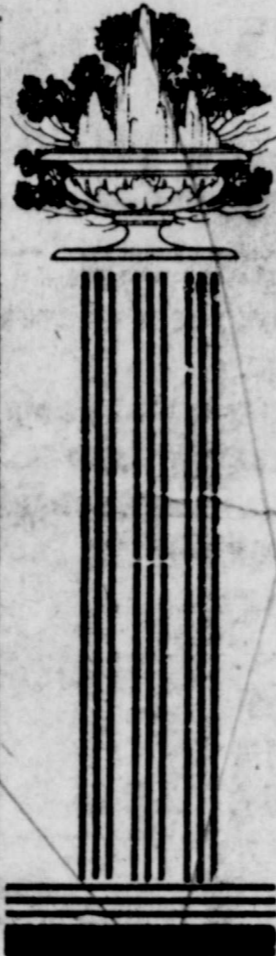

THE HOPE OF ISRAEL IS ABOUT TO BE REALIZED

When the Turkish delegation, now at the table of the peace conference, signs the treaty, the treaty will become effective with Turkey and a mandate given England over Palestine. England has pledged herself to make the Holy Land the home of the Jews.

The Fort Worth Record says: "The Israel that crumbled under the tyrannical heel of Titus in A. D. 70 will be reborn in its native religious glory, but on American political lines—that is if the Jews of the United States have anything to say."
U. S. Supreme Justice Louis D. Brandies and Judge Julian W. Mack of the U. S. Commerce Court are two of the leading Zionists of America. And we may expect that they will have a great deal to do with the shaping of the government of the Jews in their own land.

According to the map, the present plot called Palestine is practically the same as the original cantonment. The lines of the map of the Fort Worth Record indicate that it now extends south to the southern extremity of the Dead Sea, north to Sidon, west to the Great Sea, and east to just include the Jordan. While the proposed or new lines will extend north of Sidon a few miles and south to and parallel with the Gulf of Akabah; thence west to the Great Sea (Mediterranean) and along its coast to a few miles north of Sidon; thence east to longitude 36, south to near lat. 33; thence east to longitude 37, or about 57 miles east of the present eastern line. This would appear to about establish the old lines of settlement of Israel.

It is remarkable that the lines should so nearly conform to the divine settlement of the Jews under the ancients. It puts one to wondering if Providence has anything to do with this settlement about to take place under our very eyes. And again we wonder if this is a fulfillment of prophecy. And still again, are the prophecies about the land of Israel literal? We have heard some people say they were spiritual and that there would never be a literal settlement of the Jews in the Holy Land. Whom are we to believe, and what are we to think? Will some of the wise of this age dig down into the prophecies and straighten out this kink or what we believe to be a tangle, for it cannot be both spiritually and literally fulfilled?

Plan for Gradual Return of Jews.

New York, June 5.—Arrangements for the gradual immigration of 4,000,000 Jews to Palestine, following the San Remo sessions of the peace conference which gave Great Britain the mandate over that country for the establishment of a Jewish national home land, were discussed at an extraordinary conference of the Zionist organization of America.
The conference was attended by 1,700 delegates from the United States and Canada. It was said, "the most important and historic gathering of Jews ever held in America." Under the leadership of Justice Brandies of the United States Supreme Court and United States Judge Julian W. Mack, immediate action toward the re-establishment of the Jewish people in the Near East after 2,000 years of exile, was taken, thus bringing to pass the realization of the movement begun twenty-three years ago by Dr. Theodor Herzl, father of political Zionism.

These principles, it is said, will govern the new Jewish home land:
"Political and civil equality, irrespective of race, sex or faith of all inhabitants; equality of opportunity which, with due regard to existing rights, shall tend to establish the ownership and control of the land, of all natural resources and of all public utilities in the whole people; application of the co-operative principle so far as feasible in the organization of all agricultural, industrial, commercial and financial undertakings and the establishment of a fiscal policy which shall protect the people from evils of land speculation and from every other form of financial oppression."
Although millions of Jews, particularly from Eastern Europe, are said to be prepared to leave at a moment's notice, the Zionists say that "no mad rush of immigrants will be permitted to flood Palestine," but that a well-regulated, careful, scientific immigration of perhaps 50,000 annually will be undertaken, in order to insure the proper economic and cultural development of the country.

This will include the reclamation of swamp and waste land, irrigation, modernizing of Palestine cities, sanitation, the building of a harbor at Haifa and the establishment of clothing and shoe factories, oil and soap plants and other industrial and commercial enterprises.

Another faculty we may mention, peculiar to the subjective mind, is an absolute perfect knowledge of mathematics. Not the painful, tedious process by which we figure out problems, but an instantaneous perception of the result, when the question is once clearly stated.

Zera Colburn, when but a child of eight years and before he had acquired the simplest knowledge of arithmetic as taught in schools, was able almost instantaneously to answer any question in mathematics which could be propounded to him, raising numbers to any

and the correct answers would no longer appear at his will; and at the age of eighteen he was practically an imbecile. This case I relate singly, but it is not the only one on record where this faculty was exhibited.

Closely allied with natural mathematics is the faculty of deductive reasoning, when by a careful accumulation of facts a true rule is formed or a natural law discovered. The application of that rule or law in solving problems is known as deduction. In logic it takes the form of syllogism. Natural orators are perhaps more frequently known than any other manifestations of the subjective order. It is said that Henry Clay was accustomed to become entirely oblivious to his outward surround-

ings when engaged in delivering his celebrated orations. On one occasion, it is related that he requested a friend to stop him when he had spoken a certain length of time, as he did not feel in sufficiently good health to endure a more sustained effort. As the moment drew near, his friend attempted to attract his attention, but without success. He then pulled at his coat tail and falling in this, stuck a pin in his anatomy. Henry Clay continued his flight of oratory in spite of all far upwards of two hours, at the end of which time the spring ran out and ceased to upbraid his friend severely for not stopping him, as he had agreed to do. 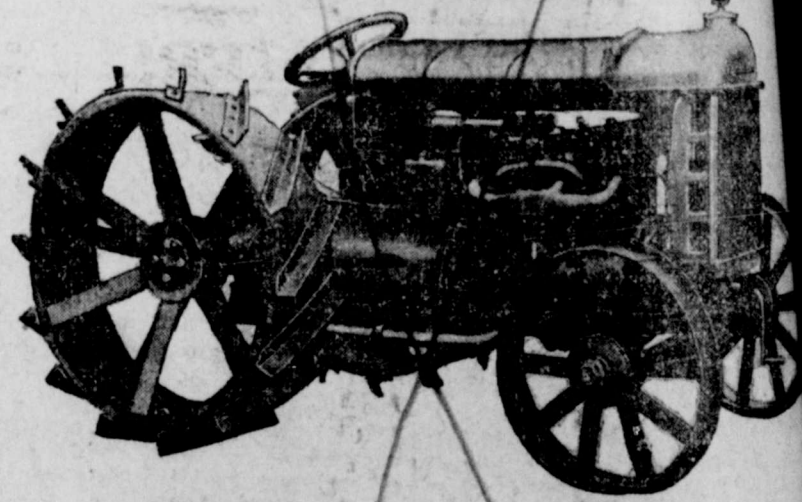

"For the Bonds."

And those opposed shall have written or printed on their ballots the words:

"Against the Bonds."

Kirby has been appointed presiding officer for said election and he shall select two judges and two clerks to assist him in holding the same, and he shall within five days after said election has been held make due return thereof to the commissioners court of this county as is required by law for holding a general election.

READ THIS ARTICLE AND LEARN HOW TO LIVE LONGER

From two and one-half to five years of life for each individual in the United States can be saved in this country if tuberculosis is eradicated, is the declaration of the National Tuberculosis Association. This conclusion is reached on the basis of figures compiled for the Association by Miss Jesamine S. Whitney, research secretary, and Dr. Louis I. Dublin, statistician of the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company. Based on the census of 1910, the Texas Public Health Association estimates that 9,741,255 years of life are lost to the people of the Lone Star State through the ravages of the white plague. Bringing this down to "dollars and cents" at \$100 per person, a more than moderate estimate, this is a prospective saving of almost \$1,000,000,000 to the State of Texas if tuberculosis were eliminated.

The research workers found that the number of years lost to each individual in the United States on account of tuberculosis varied from 2.6 for white women to five years for colored women, while the average loss for white men is 3.48 years, and for colored men 4.95 years.

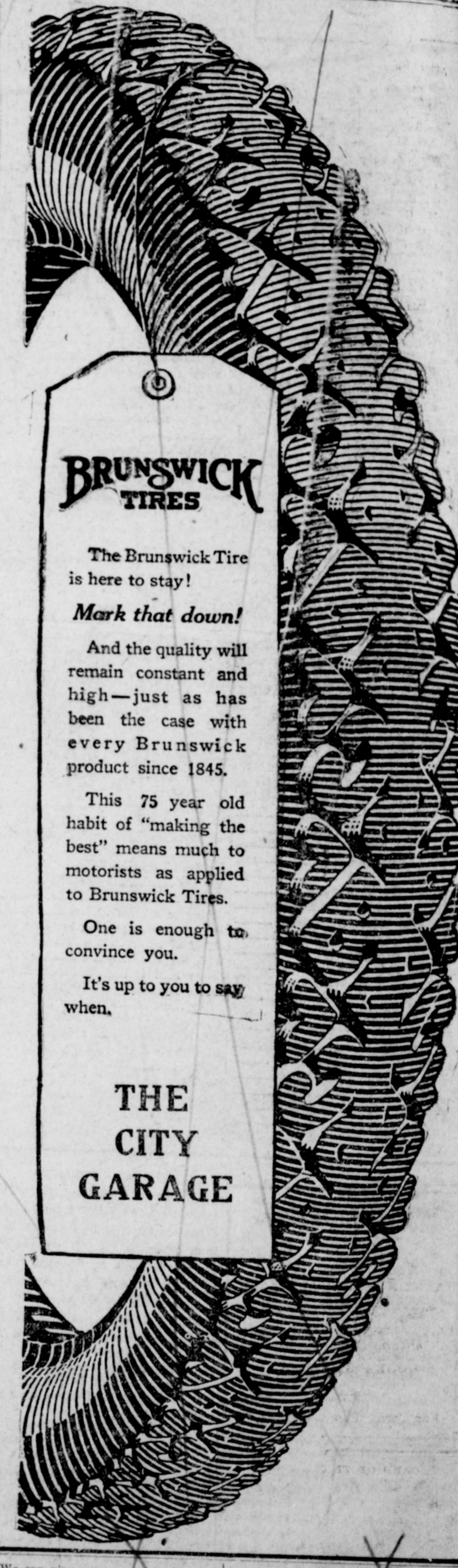
