

Senate Joint Resolution No. 17.

Proposing an amendment to Section 3 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas by exempting independent and common school triets from the limitation of a total tax of one dollar on the one hundred dollars valuation for any one year, and making an appropriation

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

SECTION 1. That Section 3 of Artiele VII of the Constitution be so amended as hereafter to read as follows: (Creating a new Section 3.)

Section 3.
