PRODUCTION AND MARKETING ARE EQUALLY IMPORTANT.

It is a difficult matter to find a well-balanced agricultural authority. One set of men declares that the great agricultural problem is greater production per hand, while another set of men is equally emphatic that the declaration that the marketing of farm products is the big problem pressing for immediate solution. The fact of the business is the two problems named and numerous other problems are pressing for solution.

The average yield of farm products per acre should be doubled within the next decade or two and strong teams, tractors and labor-saving implements should be used to enable every man to do the maximum amount of work. Every phase of the marketing of crops should, of course, receive attention, as the farmers have never received anything like the value of their products.

Thousands of our most intelligent farmers are unwilling to produce more than the consuming world is willing or able to pay for at cost of production plus a reasonable profit, and say that big yields per acre and a large number of acres per man mean overproduction, low prices and a low plane of living. We should adopt the program of sane farming and prevent overproduction by transferring mothers from the fields to the homes and the children from the homes to the schools. Later on we can reduce our working hours from twelve or fourteen to eight or ten. This course will solve many farm problems.—The Progressive Farmer.

WORLD'S NEWS IN BRIEF.

Peace Terms.—The Russian Soviet peace terms were read to the Polish delegates at their first meeting with the Soviet representatives in Minsk Tuesday.

Express.—A dispatch from Washington says an increase of 12.5 per cent in express rates has been authorized by the interstate commerce commission, effective on one day's notice.

Special Session.—Governor Hobby is being urged to call a special session of the legislature to enact laws to permit the women to vote in the Aug. 28 primary without paying poll taxes.

Diamonds.—More than 100 diamonds supposed to have been a part of the famous jewels of the Russian royal family, have been intercepted by custom officials while en route from Soviet Russia to the United States.

Letter.—A press report from Houston says a letter demanding \$5000 from S. E. J. Cox, president of the General Oil Company of Houston, under penalty of death, has been turned over to the postal authorities for investigation.

American Warships.—An American armored cruiser and a destroyer have been ordered to the Baltic sea to protect American interests there, and will proceed immediately from France to Russian waters.

Divorces.—Dr. E. M. Waits, president of the Texas Christian University, in an address in Fort Worth last Friday, said 100,000 divorces had been granted in the United States last year, and 1,162 in Fort Worth in a period of six months.

Recognize Government?—President Wilson is ready to recognize the present Mexican government if the latter agrees with terms set forth in proposals from Secretary of State Colby on this subject, according to dispatches from Mexico City this week.

Von Ludendorff.—The best informed Swiss military circles are repeating a story which they now claim is an established fact that General von Ludendorff is the directing genius behind the Russian strategy in the advance against the Poles, says a dispatch from Paris.

Want Aid.—Soviet Russia intends to seek an alliance with Germany, to make war on France, and if this is successful to undertake a conquest of England and eventually America, officials of the Bolshevik regime told the Associated Press in Poland Saturday.

English Labor.—The Laborites Council in session in London Saturday night decided to send a delegation to Paris to consult French laborites and socialists regarding method to employ to oppose a war against Russia. It is reported a Russia may declare war against France.

Abilene Judge.—Tom Bledsoe, who disappeared in March, 1913, while county judge of Taylor county, came back to Abilene last Saturday night and surrendered to the sheriff, and will face charges in connection with the alleged forging of county warrants, says a newspaper dispatch.

Girl Fights.—A 22-year-old girl in Philadelphia, held by two bandits, fought desperately to retain possession of an envelope containing \$1500 of her employer's pay roll, which she had just drawn from the bank. The robbers escaped in a car with the money, but wrecked their automobile and the \$1500 was recovered.

Tennessee Ratifies.—The Tennessee house Wednesday voted 50 to 46 to concur in the senate's ratification of the suffrage amendment, making the 36th state to ratify. This gives 17,000,000 women in the United States the right to vote in the November elections, provided the question is not reopened and defeated by the Tennessee house.

COMMISSIONERS' COURT.

Commissioners' court met Monday, August 16 in suspended session. All commissioners were present. The most important business transacted on Monday and Tuesday was:

\$1200 of Court House Sinking Fund transferred to the General Fund for temporary use, to be returned as soon as funds are available.

After discussing the tick eradication situation with T. J. Hufstutler, who had talked with the cattle men of the county, the court found that ninety per cent of Mills county is now free from ticks.

Acting on a petition filed by Hon. Jno. W. Roberts, chairman of the Mills County Democratic executive committee, the court ordered the division of voting precinct No. 1. Voting precinct No. 19 was made by the division.

Court adjourned Tuesday, the 17th, all business having been cleared.

A DEMOCRATIC APPEAL.

I have received notice from the State Democratic Executive Committee that a strong effort is being made by the leaders of the Republican, American and other political parties to have their followers participate in the runoff Democratic Primary to be held on August 28, 1920. I hereby appeal to every loyal Democrat in Mills county to assist the primary election officers in permitting none but Democrats to vote in this primary. Each election officer will be supplied with blank affidavits and it will be his duty to swear every voter whom he doubts from hearsay or otherwise of being a Democrat, and send such affidavits enclosed in an envelope with the election returns to the county chairman. Persons who swear falsely in order to vote in a primary election will be subject to indictment for perjury as in any other false swearing. Voters who affiliate with any other political party have no right to vote in a Democratic primary. The law provides that Democrats must nominate their candidates by a majority primary. Voters from other political parties have no more right in a Democratic primary than they would have in a Democratic convention if the Democrats were to nominate by conventions instead of primaries. Republicans or members of other political parties could just as consistently demand representation in a Democratic State Convention as they can demand votes in a Democratic Primary Election. Every loyal Democrat is urged to report to the primary election officers of his precinct the name of any person who he knows intends to try to vote in this primary if he has any reason to believe he is not a Democrat. BODY OF J. E. BUFKIN OF NEAR MCGIRK FOUND IN AN OIL TANK CAR IN DALLAS

It is reported that the body of J. E. Bufkin, a son of C. C. Bufkin, a prominent farmer of near McGirk was found in a tank car at Dallas Thursday, Aug. 19.

Mr. Bufkin, who was about 22 years of age, together with his father and family, came to Mills county from Bell county about two years ago. Mr. Bufkin's wife had gone to visit her parents at Crandall, Texas.

It is reported that the oil tank car in which Mr. Bufkin was found had come from Atlanta, Georgia, and had stopped in Longview, Texas, for two days. The Dallas police believe from the bruises which were found on his head that he had either been hit and thrown into the car or had been overcome by the gas and fell in. It is not known, however, at which place he was put into the tank.

The body was identified by one of Jones and Hurdle's sales tickets, and a telephone message to his relatives was the first report received here of the sad tragedy.

Mr. Bufkin left a wife, parents and other relatives at McGirk and elsewhere. The Eagle joins their numerous friends in offering them sympathy.

The train hit the car on the side and without turning it over dragged it about 75 yards down the track. At that place one of the wheels in the car hung in the rail "frog" and the car was jerked away from the train.

Especially Mrs. Dickey was in a very dangerous condition, and after being examined at a local drug store was rushed on that train to Temple for the Santa Fe hospital. THE TRACTOR MAKES BETTER LAND PREPARATION POSSIBLE

My father and I own adjoining eighties. Last fall, as I had a tractor I was able to flat break my land, turning the cotton stalks under green. My account of bad weather we plowed in (December), but nine-tenths of the stalks rotted and we are now agreed that the cultivators pull at least a third harder in father's land than they do in mine.

My tractor is an 8-20, pulling a disk plow. After finishing my land I plowed a feed patch for Dad who four good mules had done an acre at a quarter in a day. My tractor did six acres a day and better work at cost of about 70 cents an acre for gas and oil.

We expect to break both places with the engine this fall as it does better work than mules for less money. I find it easier on the driver too. Sometimes go back to the house for a drink and leave it at work. If I had just a field without corners it would plow by itself.

I also use my tractor for pulling a four-section harrow, for ditching and road work and for running a hay baler.—H. A. Best, in The Progressive Farmer.

A. J. HARRISON WRITES OF SCENES IN OLD VIRGINIA

Harrisonburg, Va., Aug. 20, Editor Eagle, Goldthwaite, Texas:

Sir:—I will try below to give you a brief sketch of the country we are visiting.

Harrisonburg is situated in Rockingham county, Virginia. This county represents a portion, and I believe really the garden spot of the famous valley of Virginia. It lies between the Massanutton mountains and the Blue Ridge on the east and the North Mountain and other portions of the Alleghenies on the west. These two ranges form the Appalachian system of the eastern part of the United States.

The country is rolling in many places—so rolling and rocky that the average Texan would pass it up as worthless save in crop time. The crops growing on these clay soil hills are simply marvelous. Wheat ranges, for an average crop, from 20 to 35 bushels per acre and of a very fine plump quality. Corn ranges from 35 to 75 bushels per acre and is of fine quality. On account of the scarcity of labor and because it both pays and improves the land, many of these beautiful valley farms are being set to blue grass and the valley is fast becoming a grazing region to a considerable extent and it is doubtful if the famous blue grass region of Kentucky will have any edge over the blue grass region of the valley of Virginia in a few more years.

Fruits, vegetables and crops of all kinds are grown here. The gardens are the finest I ever saw. The residences of the section on an average, are the most beautiful, the most commodious and the most substantial I ever saw in any section of the country, especially through the agricultural and grazing sections. The farms look so clean and green and well kept that the girls began exclaiming as soon as our train burst through the mountains on the west of the valley, "Oh, look! How beautiful! Why these farms look like they have been swept and dusted this morning." And, indeed, it was so. The grain had just been shaved from the hills and in most instances had been stored in the great red barns. The hills were covered with a clean, well kept sward of bluegrass where the farm crops of wheat, oats and corn were not grown; the buildings and fences were well kept, and there were few patches of weeds or brush to mar the whole beautiful scene.

Harrisonburg, the county seat of Rockingham county, is a beautiful, substantial, well kept little city of some six or seven thousand inhabitants. Its public buildings, its business buildings and its residents would all be a credit to any city many times its size and its street paving, of which it has an unusual amount for a city of its size, is as good as I ever saw in any city. Its beautiful shade trees of almost every variety I take to surpass anything of the kind I have ever seen. I shall not attempt a description of these as time and space will not permit, neither am I able to do this feature of the little city's beauty justice, as it is beautiful and attractive beyond any power to describe.

There is a little history connected with the locating of the county seat

here that I think worth telling, as it will cause a smile of amusement to cross the face of your readers.

The county of Rockingham was created in 1785 and the usual scramble was begun for the county seat. Two men started to Richmond to present their claims in the state legislature that was then in session. One was named Keezle from Keezletown, about five miles east of Harrisonburg, and one was named Harrison, who hailed from Rocktown. The trip to Richmond had to be made on horse back as it was about the only means of travel in those days. Keezle, it is presumed, became weary with the long, tiresome journey and in an effort to stimulate both body and mind stopped at a wayside inn and imbibed a slight overdose of John Barleycorn. This made him so optimistic that he remained at the inn celebrating too long and Harrison beat him to Richmond and secured the county seat. Whether Harrison celebrated or not is not recorded, but if he did he put it off until he got what he went after. As a reward for staying duly sober until his object was securely fastened and as a mark of gratitude of the citizens of Rocktown, the name of that place was changed to Harrisonburg. Now the place has grown into the beautiful and substantial little city above described and is the home of several thousand highly educated, refined and hospitable people, among whom it is a perfect delight to visit. R. F. McDERMOTT SAYS CATHOLIC CHURCH IS NOT IN POLITICS

Mr. Editor:—

In replying to the latest article from the pen of Mr. Harrison, we will consider the question 'Church and Politics.'

We thank your correspondent for the compliment as regards my integrity, but regret that we can not see his way to consider all Catholics as myself, and believe that it is because he does not know of the teachings of the Catholic church or he would not be ready to believe all that he hears about it from outsiders, but would come to members for his information, and he could get the true facts.

He tells us that the Catholic vote of the United States is a great political asset, also that it has been sought successfully by one political nominee or the other, all of which we agree to; but now comes "the vote of the Catholic church as a church organization." Where do you get this? There is no such an animal, brother, never was, and we hope never will be. Catholics, like other citizens, have politics, but the Catholic church has none. Some of the Catholic bishops of the United States are Republicans, some Democrats. So it is with the priests and people. Not only is there never a word from Rome or elsewhere about what Catholics should be in the matter of politics, but the clergy never so much as intimate to the people how they should vote. This should be plain to any observant person. Some of our states where Catholics constitute nearly one-half of the population, will go Republican, whilst other states where they are equally strong will be carried by the Democrats. If Catholics were in politics nearly all of the Eastern States would have Catholic governors, most of the big cities, Catholic mayors. Religion is not carried into politics by Catholics.

The Catholic church has never taken part in the selection or election of any candidate in the United States, notwithstanding your remarks to the contrary. She has another mission of much greater importance and has been very successful in that field, that of Christianizing the Universal World. Please show us from the writings, sermons or public addresses of any of the Cardinals, Arch-Bishops or Bishops and even the priests in this country that they have ever tried to influence the Catholic vote in any of the presidential campaigns, or any state campaign. You know there has never been such a thing and you know also that if there had been, the radical element, who hate the Catholic church, would never stop giving it publicity. The pulpit of the Catholic church has never been used for the purpose of giving political speeches.

It positively is a violation of the Constitution for the Catholic church, your church or any other church to consider only the religious affiliation of one candidate over the other candidate, all other conditions considered. I am not saying that Senator Harding is not all you claim for him; he is, and more. Also I intend to vote for him because I believe him to be the better man, also because he is a Republican.

The view which you admit is a narrow one is entirely your own, for the Catholic church has NEVER SET THE PRECEDENT. If it has, we are certainly ignorant of the time, place, etc.; I am only stating plain facts and being a Catholic, as you admit that every one knows me to be, I am better qualified to express the true teachings of that church than those who never saw the inside of the church or read its history from authoritative and non-prejudiced sources.

SCHOOL TEACHERS SHOULD BE GIVEN INCREASE THIS YEAR

To Presidents of School Boards.

Mr. Dear Sir: Complaints are constantly reaching my office to the effect that, though the Legislature passed the \$4,000,000 appropriation for the express purpose of raising the salaries of teachers, in many cases, school boards have refused the increase to the teacher on the ground that they have already signed contracts.

One of the main purposes that the Legislature had in mind, in making this appropriation, was to stem the exodus from the schools and make teachers satisfied to remain in the profession. They also desired to secure teachers of the best class—to induce capable people to enter the profession.

It is not encouraging to teachers who have been loyal and patriotic enough to remain in the profession and to sign contracts before an increase was assured, to find that this attitude will be taken advantage of, when the funds are granted to give a well-deserved increase of salary.

If your board has given the increase, I wish to thank you for this act of justice to the teachers. If not, I desire to urge you to take this action. Texas has not suffered, as has other states, from the bolshevik in our school rooms. Let us not arouse the bolshevik spirit in our teachers.

It was estimated by the Legislature that \$4,000,000 ought to give each teacher a substantial increase over what was paid last session. You cannot legally use this money for any other purposes but to pay teachers' salaries, and for the two other purposes for which state funds may be used. Morally, the teachers are entitled to the increase, for the state granted the money especially for this purpose.

I have been urging upon teachers that, if they will study and improve their qualifications, our state will make it worth while for them to remain in the profession. Will you not help me in this attempt to hold and to recruit teachers?

If you are reducing your local fund, and replacing it by state funds, you are taking a course that will, in the future, discourage the state in its attempts to aid you to maintain good schools.

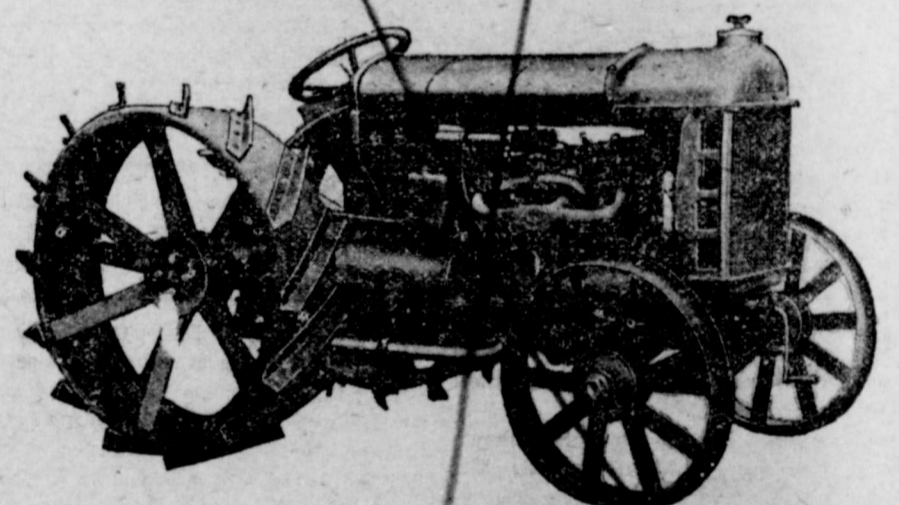

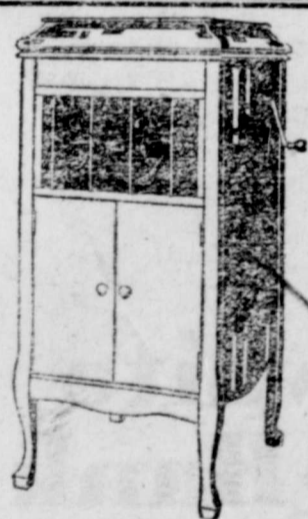

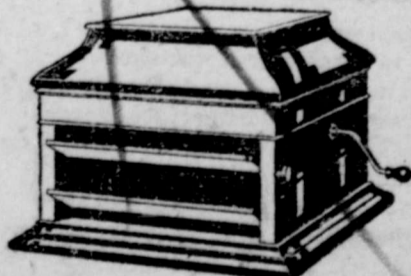

LEAGUE OF NATIONS.

The American government has declared for the maintenance of the political independence and territorial integrity of all nations and against any dismemberment of territory. Premier Lloyd George, speaking at the Russo-Polish crisis, says the attack on Russia was not just: in the opinion of the British government and that the Soviet government in any condition of peace, was not to take into account the attacks made by the Poles upon Russia, and that those attacks were delivered in the warnings of the Allies to the Soviet. The Soviet, he declared, was not to demand such guarantees as were exacted by any power against the violation of attacks of that kind. When the Soviet was challenged, he says, was that the Soviet justified retaliation, reprisal and punishment which goes to the extent of endangering national existence. The declarations are both made in the name of the doctrine laid down in Article 10 of the peace covenant, which guarantees the territorial integrity of all outside aggression. Now it is said that President Wilson says Article 10 is the heart of the covenant. For what kind of a League of Nations would it be that would suffer a strong nation to annihilate a confederate nation? Would you take Article 10 out of the covenant so some Napoleon of the future could go into the business of map making and make through slaughter to some and place on his bald head the crown of the Lombards? Article 10 is to prevent imperialism and territorial expansion as well as annihilation of nations. Most wars have been waged because of some man's desire for dominion, power and military glory. We have a history of two centuries being embodied in a civil war because of one man's passion, for and another man's resentment about a woman. It would not be, in my humble opinion, advisable, practical, feasible or democratic to meddle with the internal dissensions, civil and domestic troubles of another nation unless they were putting mines or submarines on the high seas so as to endanger non-combatants. It is perfectly clear to my mind that disputes between nations can be settled in court in a fair, equitable and satisfactory manner. The armament will cheapen the cost of the armament and in a measure prevent war. Ballots would take the place

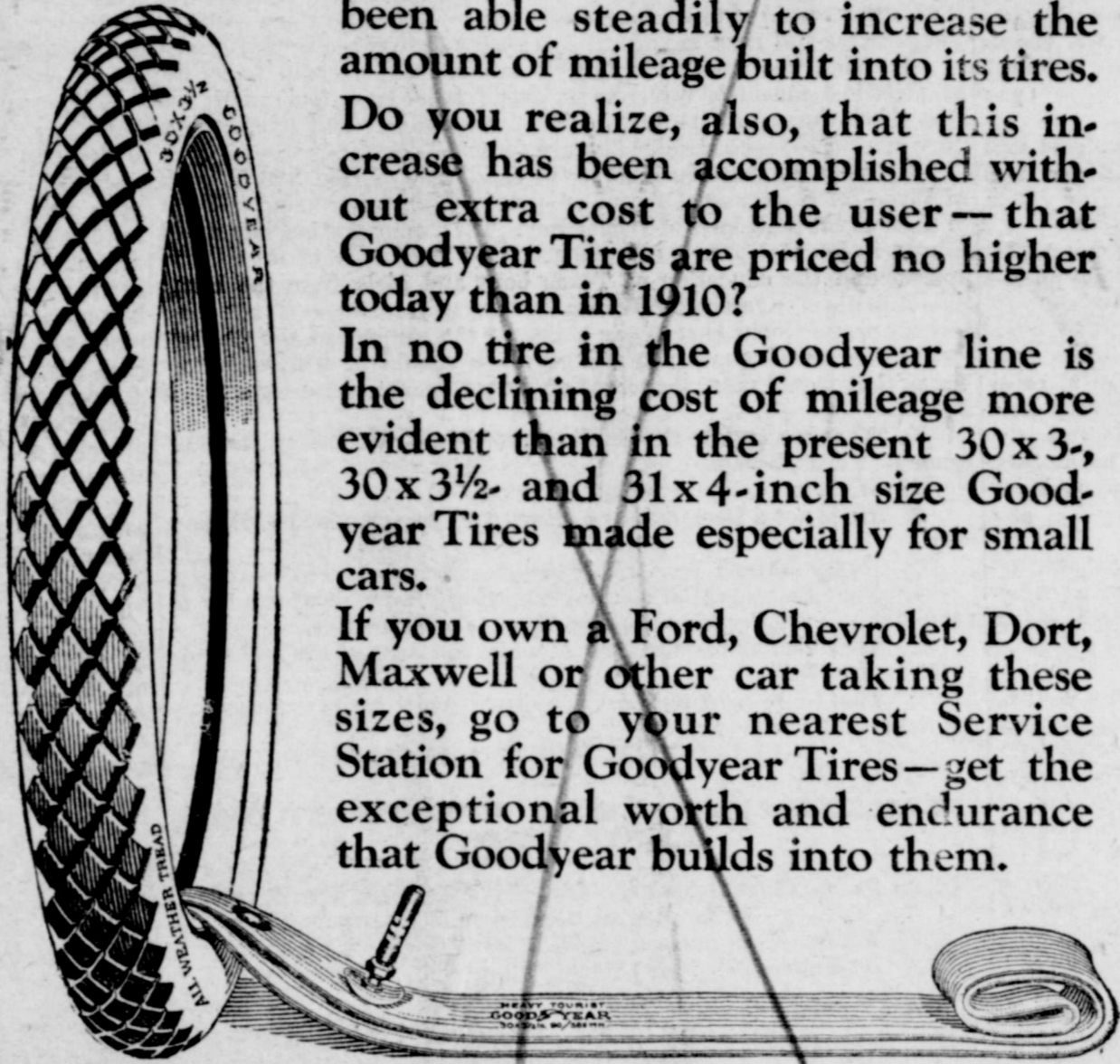

I believe if we do not ratify the League of Nations and help establish international courts we will be caught in the maelstrom of another world's war. But we will soon have the League. Cox says this is the paramount issue. He is a winner, and champions the noblest movement of modern civilization. Democracy is dominant, militant and eternal. Republicanism may hold it in check, but not this time. The war lords have had their day. Attila (scourge of God), Genghis Kahn (scourge of mankind), and the Kaiser (scourge of modern civilization) must go. Women will be given suffrage and war will be arraigned in an international court of justice, found guilty and banished forever. The sword of Alexander descended to the strongest. The sword of Mars will be given now to the wisest and put safely in the vault of innocuous desuetude. W. J. Bryan of cross of gold, crown of thorns and prince of peace fame, missed the psychological moment of his life when he failed to espouse the cause of the League of Nations without reservations. But from the way Cox handles it, it is alright with interpretations anyhow. If Bryan was one half as zealous as Tag for the League, he would have an immortal thrown on his grave. Harding says peace first, then the league. He has the idea inverted. If the first efforts to establish a league and an international court is abortive and we are precipitated into an awful world war, then mankind must persevere and try, try and try again. W. H. WOOD.

COX-ROOSEVELT-NEFF CLUB IS ORGANIZED BY COOKE COUNTY WOMEN.

Claim Bailey Owes School Children for Poll Taxes Yet Unpaid. His Record Condemned.

The following resolutions were adopted by the Cooke County Women's Cox-Roosevelt-Neff Club at Gainesville, (Bailey's Home town), August 14: Be it resolved, by the Women's Cox-Roosevelt-Neff Club of Cooke County, Texas, in Convention Assembled: 1. We indorse the administration of President Woodrow Wilson, both in peace and in war. We believe that the future historian will rank President Wilson the greatest American of this age, while his defamers will sink into oblivion. 2. We indorse the San Francisco platform, and we have the utmost faith and confidence in Governor James M. Cox, and Mr. Franklin D. Roosevelt. We commend them for standing four-square upon that platform, and in making the league of nations the paramount issue in the present presidential campaign. 3. We condemn and have words of censure for J. W. Bailey because of his rude and unpolished remarks for the good women and mothers of Texas in calling them sissies and she-men, and holding them up to ridicule. We well remember how Mr. Bailey used to praise and laud us when we thought he stood for the things we stand for, but now that he is advocating things which the good men and mothers of Texas abhor and shun, and condemning what we advocate, he has words of censure for us. If Mr. Bailey had not abandoned us, and his principles of 1887, we would now be for him. We cannot follow him, but he should repent and follow us. We are at a loss to understand how the fathers, husbands and brothers of the good women of Texas can sit and hear Mr. Bailey bemean us as he does. Give Support to Neff. 4. We indorse the candidacy of Hon. Pat M. Neff for governor of Texas, and oppose the candidacy of J. W. Bailey for governor for the following reasons: Neff favors the Wilson administration, Bailey is a bitter opponent; and says he can find nothing the administration has done worthy of praise; Neff favors the league of nations, Bailey is its enemy, and calls it a league of notions; Neff, Cox and the San Francisco platform say the Federal Reserve bank was the greatest piece of constructive legislation of the age; Bailey says the money is not legal tender. Neff, Cox, Roosevelt and the San Francisco platform find words of praise for the Texas legislature in ratifying the woman suffrage amendment; Bailey says the legislature embezzled its power. Neff and Cox favor child labor laws; Bailey opposes such laws; Neff favors the eighteenth amendment; Bailey says it was ratified unconstitutionally. Neff is a staunch prohibitionist; Bailey admits he is in the employ of the association opposed to national prohibitions. Neff has always been a true and loyal Democrat; Bailey abandoned the party last year and joined hands with Jim Ferguson to form a new party to make war on the Democratic party, which had once so signally honored him. Neff has always defended the Democratic party and has words of criticism for the Republican party, while Bailey has bitterly fought the Democratic party and called President Wilson a Socialist, but Bailey fails and refuses to criticize the Republican party, and now a Republican paper urges Bailey's election. Neff is standing four-square upon the San Francisco platform, while Bailey has sealed his lips and refuses to indorse the platform, the yardstick of Democracy. Neff lives in Texas and has never abandoned Texas while out of office, while Bailey, when out of office, resides in a distant city outside of Texas. Owes the School Children.

We do not believe Bailey is a resident of Gainesville. He pays his poll tax in odd years in the First Ward in Gainesville, but where in the First Ward does he reside? Give us the name of the street and the number of his house. When Bailey comes to Gainesville he stops at the Turner Hotel, which is in the Second Ward. His cemetery lot, the only property he owns in Gainesville, is in the Fourth Ward. If Bailey is a citizen of Texas he owes the school children the poll taxes he has not paid. Neff made four-minute speeches and helped sell bonds during the war, while Bailey was dumb as an oyster and kept his mouth closed. We do not believe any man should be governor who is silent in war, when our country needed his assistance, but in times of peace is garrulous and talkative against the administration and the conduct of the war.

LABOR AND CAPITAL, EMPLOYER AND EMPLOYEE, OPEN SHOP AND CLOSED SHOP

(Extract from Speech made by Mr. Neff at San Antonio Aug. 9, 1920) Many suggestions have been made, theories advanced and objections raised during this campaign in regard to labor and capital, the respective rights of employer and employee. I am glad to state that my views in regard to capital and labor are in hearty accord with the declaration of principles set forth in our National Democratic Platform. I believe that labor and capital each has the right to organize, each has the right to bargain collectively, each has the right to deal with the other at all times through duly designated representatives. Every man who toils with either brain or brawn has the right to quit work whenever he wants to, but let it be understood when he quits his job that any other American citizen has the right to do the work his neighbor did not want to do. Every man should be left free to make whatever contract he desires as to his employment both as to compensation and hours of service. The employee should be left free to join either the open shop or the closed shop or stay out of both, just as he sees fit. The employer should be permitted to employ whomsoever he pleases and on whatever terms are satisfactory to the two contracting parties. In the peaceful conduct of one's business and in the peaceful pursuit of one's trade the government should grant to each equal protection. If I am elected Governor, neither labor nor capital can rule in Texas. High above them both, I shall place the law of the land. Corporate power should never ascend high that the strong arm of the law could not reach it, and labor should never descend so low that its voice could not be heard in the temple of justice. I am a friend to both capital and labor, to the employer and the employee. When I become your Governor I shall have an open mind and clean hands as to each. Whatever trouble arises in our industrial life, I propose to go in person as your Governor at with a cool head and a warm heart hear the complaints of each, and thus around the council table in peace and as friends settle whatever differences may have arisen. If it is a public question the solution of which is of serious consequence I shall gladly invite three or more of the best men of the state, in whom all the people have confidence, to meet and counsel with us as to how best to solve the problem. I am a friend to Texas who as a candidate for Governor preaches the gospel of hate and stirs up strife and discord, jealousy and mistrust among different classes of our people. The candidate who does it is either an ignoramus, a demagogue or a hypocrite.

JOE BAILEY'S RECORD.

Bailey Opposed the Democratic Administration. In a speech at Wichita Falls, March 30th, Bailey said: "Viewing the whole thing from top to bottom, not one single achievement of the entire Democratic Administration meets with my approval." Bailey Opposed the principles of the Democratic Party. Bailey said in effect: "If Woodrow Wilson is a Democrat then I was never one. I can never vote for a man who entertains the convictions of Woodrow Wilson—as long as I live." Bailey Opposed the National Prohibition Amendment. Bailey admitted in a speech at Beaumont that he was paid to represent the Association Opposed to National Prohibition. Bailey Opposed Woman's Suffrage. He said it would prove to be a greater evil than prohibition. Bailey Opposed advising his friends to buy Liberty Bonds because they would lose money in making the investment.
