STATE ADVISORY BOARD FOR SALVATION ARMY ORGANIZED

San Antonio, Aug. 23.—A state advisory board that will exercise jurisdiction over the activities of the Salvation Army in its extension of the Home Service Program for 1923 in the thirty-four counties in Southwest Texas was organized on Monday afternoon at a meeting of eleven of the most prominent San Antonio citizens held in the office of J. M. Savage, 540 Bell Building.

The organization of the state advisory board is one of the important links in the chain of advisory boards that the Salvation Army has built throughout the west, by which the sixteen major activities of the Salvation Army are extended to the rural communities in the same manner in which they have previously operated in the large cities.

Following the organization of the state board, a call to all members of the county advisory boards to attend a convention which will be held at the St. Anthony Hotel, San Antonio, on Wednesday, September 8, was issued by J. H. Savage, state president.

It is expected that more than 200 delegates from the thirty-four counties in the southwest will be present at this convention. The purpose of the convention will be to consider the results of the confidential studies that have been made in each county by the members of the county advisory boards and to adopt a program of service for the state that will help every county improve and correct social distress and moral disorder. The tabulated results of these confidential studies bear upon poverty, pauperism, juvenile delinquents, orphan children, dependent maternity cases and illegitimacy, prison work, Americanization and missing persons.

The state convention is an important feature of the home service program which is now in complete operation throughout the western states. By this program the whole of the sixteen major activities of the Salvation Army have been placed at the disposal of each county through the county advisory boards, in each case these boards being composed of the leading business and professional men of the county who are giving their time voluntarily in this service.

Mills county will be represented at the state convention.

GASOLINE THROWN ON MAN FOR WATER; HUMAN TORCH.

Macon, Mo., Aug. 24.—John Deher, 55, member of a bailing crew, is dead here today, the result of burns sustained when straw caught fire from a gasoline engine. Deher's clothing becoming ignited, he called for water to quench the flames. In the confusion some one threw the contents of a bucket containing gasoline, believing it to contain water, over him, converting him into a human torch.

NEW CREW SECURED FOR THE TEXAS PRODUCTION WELL; EFFORT MADE TO STOP WATER

The well of the Texas Production Company, just across the bayou, which has been flowing water for several months and which has resisted every effort to check the flow, will receive one more trial before being abandoned, according to Mr. Malone, who is directing the activities of this well.

An entire new crew from Ardmore, Okla., has been secured, experienced men, and the crew seem confident that they can stop the water. Mr. Malone, however, says it is in no manner certain that this can be done, but he is hopeful over the outlook.

Should it prove impossible to save this well it is very probable that the Texas Production Company will move their outfit back to this side of the bayou and drill another well near the sensational Clayton well, which showed such good possibilities of being a producer, but which was lost by a cave-in when an effort was made to change the casing.

It has not been definitely decided to drill this new hole, but Mr. Malone came to Mills county for the purpose of bringing in an oil well, and—nine chances out of ten—he'll do it before he quits.

WORLD'S NEWS IN BRIEF.

Russian Prisoners.—The number of Russian soviet prisoners captured in the Polish offensive will amount to 75,000, according to Warsaw advices to the French foreign office Monday.

Chance For All.—Dr. Andrew Morrison of Los Angeles, Cal., celebrated his one-hundredth birthday last Saturday by marrying Miss Mary A. Batney, 73.

Russian Rout.—A dispatch from Warsaw Aug. 20 says one hundred thousand Russians have been thrown into panic by the smashing of their front at many points by the Polish offensive.

Population.—The total population of the United States, estimated at the middle of the fiscal year 1919, was 105,082,600, according to the Census Bureau. The estimated population of Texas was 4,572,660.

U. S. Cautions.—Poland has been cautioned by the American government not to permit her armies, in the present offensive against the Bolsheviks, to advance beyond the boundaries of Poland. Poland will heed the caution.

Suffrage.—According to the attorney general of Tennessee, Governor A. H. Roberts has certified Tennessee's ratification of the suffrage amendment, sending the certificate to Secretary of State Colby by mail.

New Rates.—A dispatch from Washington says when the increased freight and passenger rates became effective Thursday, Aug. 26, there was no change in the volume of railroad traffic and none is expected by railroad experts.

Sugar.—Sugar retail prices have not yet touched bottom, but are certain to drop to lower levels, with the market heavily glutted with stocks far beyond the normal need, it was announced by the Department of Justice at Washington Monday.

American Prisoners.—Pedro Zamora, bandit chief in Western Jalisco, Mexico, has kidnapped six Americans, five men and one woman, and is holding them for 200,000 pesos ransom each, according to reports reaching Mexico City last Sunday.

Future Wars.—A dispatch from London says organization of all workers in the world is urged in an appeal to the "proletariat of the universe," issued by the international league of trade unions at Rotterdam and signed by a number of European labor leaders.

War Would Cease?—Civil war in Russia would cease immediately if the Russian people were free to organize a government according to their own wishes, General Baron Wrangel, who was recognized as head of the South Russia government by France a few days ago, declared.

Suffrage.—Mrs. J. S. Pinckard, who represented the Southern Women's Rejection League during the Tennessee fight on suffrage, and who later made charges that members of the Tennessee legislature sold their votes, when told Sec. of State Colby had signed the proclamation ratifying the amendment, said suit will be brought testing the legality of the action.

Word has been received here by friends of the death of Dr. McKian, a physician and old citizen of Lometa. According to the information received, burial was in the Old Senterfitt cemetery, three miles west of Lometa, on Thursday. His death was caused by a stroke of paralysis.

Dr. McKian was known and respected by many Goldthwaite people and word of his death will be received with regret by them.

BISBEE OIL WELL ON THE WEATHERBY RANCH IS NOW STANDING 200 FEET IN OIL

Well Had Been Abandoned for Several Months.—Discovered Last Monday Morning When Attempt Was Made to Draw Stock Water.—Excitement.

The citizens of Goldthwaite woke up Monday afternoon with a well on their hands with real oil in it. The people stood around dazed for a few minutes and then made a concerted rush for the well. As the first comers reached the well they witnessed a sight which had been the dream of Goldthwaite for several years and which had become no more than a dream to most of the citizens—REAL OIL BEING DRAWN FROM A WELL.

Several months ago the Bisbee Texas Co., of Bisbee, Ariz., abandoned this well, which is located on the Omar Weatherby ranch about eight miles south-west of town, and in a deal gave Mr. Weatherby absolute ownership of the well and the drilling rig. Mr. Weatherby had done nothing with his property until last Monday he decided to fire up his boiler and bail out his well preparatory to putting a windmill over it—as the well had stood 500 feet in water when it was abandoned.

Imagine their surprise when the first bailer full of water drawn was oil—pure liquid gold. They kept drawing and during the afternoon drew something near seven barrels of extra good grade oil from the well.

It is reported that this oil tested 42 per cent gravity test, among the best oil found anywhere in Texas. This fact is accounted for by experienced oil men by the supposition that the oil is coming from the bottom of the well through some 400 to 500 feet of water. This would naturally remove all the grit and to a certain extent, refine the oil.

Nothing definite has been decided upon by Mr. Weatherby as to how he will go about developing his oil possibilities, but he is figuring on plans for immediate tests in order to prove the worth of the well.

Most all the experienced oil men of Mills county, pioneer oil men who have steadfastly held to the belief that there is oil here in paying quantities, have examined the well and say that it looks pretty good to them.

This is the best showing Mills county has gotten yet and should it be that the oil is coming from the bottom of the hole, old Mills may be in the center of the biggest oil pool in Texas.

Taking into consideration the depth of the hole—910 feet—and the grade of oil gotten out—gravity test 42—this is a remarkable showing and it may take only a few more feet to hit the pay sand.

The geologists who located this well estimated that the black lime deposit would be of a depth of from 50 to 75 feet and that the pay sand would be struck either in the black lime or directly under it. This means that by going 100 more feet positive proof can be had on whether the oil bearing sand is there.

The only other supposition to which the interested parties can arrive concerning the finding of the oil is that there may be a small vein close to the surface of the hole and the oil has been gradually collecting in it. This supposition, however, doesn't appear as reasonable as the other, owing to the grade of oil and the absence of any grit in it.

It won't be long until we can have proof of the worth of this well and we are betting that it proves up good.

SHERIFF'S NOTICE OF ELECTION.

The State of Texas—County of MILLS.
Notice is hereby given that an election will be held on the 11th day of September, 1920, at Washboard School House in Common School District No. 23 of this county, as established by order of the county board of trustees of date the 26th day of June, 1920, which is of record in book designated Record of School Districts, on pages 37 and 38, to determine whether a majority of the legally qualified property tax-paying voters of said district desire the issuance of bonds on the faith and credit of said common school district in the amount of \$2000, the bonds to be of the denomination of \$100 each, numbered consecutively from one to twenty, both inclusive, payable 20 years from their date, with option of redemption at any time after 10 years from their date and bearing 5 per cent interest per annum, payable annually on April 10th of each year, to provide funds to be expended in payment of accounts legally contracted in constructing permanent repairs of wood material to the Washboard public free school building, which is of wood material, of said district and to determine whether the commissioners' court of this county shall be authorized to levy, assess and collect annually while said bonds or any of them are outstanding a tax upon all taxable property within said district sufficient to pay the current interest on said bonds and to provide a sinking fund sufficient to pay the principal at maturity.

All persons who are legally qualified voters of this state and county and who are resident property taxpayers in said district shall be entitled to vote at said election and all voters desiring to support the proposition to issue the bonds shall have written or printed on their ballots the words:

"For the Bonds."
And those opposed shall have written or printed on their ballots the words:
"Against the Bonds."

L. A. Bagley has been appointed presiding officer for said election and he shall select two judges and two clerks to assist him in holding the same, and he shall within five days after said election has been held make due return thereof to the commissioners court of this county as is required by law for holding a general election.

Said election was ordered by the county judge of this county by order made on the 12th day of August, 1920, and this notice is given in pursuance of said order.

FATHER OF MRS. EDNA HORTON DIED RECENTLY IN ROGERS

The following sketch of the life of Samuel L. Frazier, father of Mrs. Edna Horton of Goldthwaite, is taken from the Rogers (Bell County) News. Mr. Frazier lived in Goldthwaite for fifteen years, coming here in 1903 from Bell county, and will be remembered by many people here, who will regret to learn of his death, which recently occurred at his home in Rogers.

Samuel L. Frazier was born in Perry County, Ala., Feb. 3, 1851. He was raised in Alabama, living there until Dec. 28, 1873, on which date he was united in marriage to Miss Mary Pouncey, starting immediately with his bride to Texas, where they intended to make their home.

The young groom and bride first located in Austin county, living there some 10 years, after which they moved to Milam county, locating in the Sandy Ridge community, about three miles from the city of Rogers. Here they lived nearly twenty years, moving from Sandy Ridge to Goldthwaite, where they made their home for fifteen years, moving back to Sandy Ridge something over two years ago.

To this marriage union with Miss Mary Pouncey were born eight children, three sons and five daughters, one daughter being dead.

The three sons, George, Chester and Samuel Frazier, and one daughter, Mrs. Frank Cloud, reside near Rogers. Two daughters, Mrs. Maggie Bearden and Mrs. Annie Nelson live at Rochelle, Texas, and one daughter, Mrs. Edna Horton, at Goldthwaite.

There are thirty-two grand-children, two of whom are married.

All of his children except one were present at his bedside when he passed away.

Brother Frazier united with the Christian church in 1881, and all who were in a position to observe his life will testify that he was a consistent follower of the Lord Jesus. When the end approached Brother Frazier was perfectly conscious of the fact that he was soon to be called hence, and conversed frankly and freely with those about him, steadfastly maintaining his trust in God and confidence in the world's Redeemer. A few days before he died he told the writer of this sketch not a cloud intervened between him and his Heavenly Father, and the only regret he felt was leaving his family, and even that he trusted to the Lord, knowing full well that God's infinite love would ever sustain them.

He had been a member of the Masonic fraternity for 34 years, and was regarded as an upright Mason by all his brethren, and was buried with all the honors of that order.

He was a faithful, devoted husband, and the last word he was known to utter was "Mary," the name of his wife; and let it be told here that "Mary," who had for 47 years given her heart and love to him, responded to the very last word and tried to bring relief and comfort to her husband's last appeal.

God's promise is that if we raise a child in the way he should go, that when old he would not depart from it; now, we believe this is true in the teachings of Samuel Frazier. He was a tender, affectionate father, inculcating at all times those higher traits of character that go to make up all that is noblest and best in life, and we shall ever trust in the promises of God.

Let us emulate all that was good and pure in this life. And to you, Sister Frazier, who was his companion for 47 years, a period longer than Moses was traveling in the wilderness, I pray God's peace to sustain you, and when the time comes I feel sure you will be ready to join him over yonder, where death never comes.

Lastly, so you, his sons and daughters, live that life that you know he so much desired you to live, so that your last days may be like his triumphant and happy.

Mr. Editor:—As I have been slow of speech for so long, I am sure I can claim your indulgence to some of my rambling remarks. We are having rains down here in this black mud country, which is interfering with the cotton picking to some extent. The cotton is good and hundreds of pickers are doing their part to try to gather it. Through the kindness of some new-made friends who own cars, I made two trips to the country last week. One of the trips was with men inspecting cotton in the fields, so I had an opportunity to see some of the best farming section of Nueces county, which is level and almost one solid cotton field as far as the eye can see. The crops range from 200 to 300 acres and gins are dotted here and there in the country. Men claim they are making a bale to the acre. We are quite sure some will make a bale per acre if nothing interferes with getting it picked. I heard today that there is one man who has over 500 pickers and is picking a bale of cotton per minute. I cannot vouch for this, but it doesn't look so unreasonable as 3 pounds of seed cotton per picker per minute would give the results claimed. We can hear all the big things that are going on that were calculated to boost this section of the state. It is said that a man came to Corpus with a very bad eye and a glass eye. His bad eye got well in a very short while and he is beginning to see out of his glass eye.
Some person or persons catch tarpons every day, but very few succeed in landing them. I had the pleasure of seeing a very large one caught, flayed down and when nearly to shore ran around a post, broke loose and got away.

M. MCGIRK MAKES REMARKS ON CATHOLIC DISCUSSION

Mr. Editor: I wish to make a few remarks and compliments on R. F. McDermott's reply in the last issue of your paper to Mr. Harrison's letter.
Evidently Mr. McDermott's life has been east or spent along pleasant lines; has spent most of his years in a Protestant community, and has not had a chance to see all the workings of the Catholic church; as there are two kinds of Catholic churches, Greek and Roman. Then I asked him, "Why does the Catholic church keep and maintain an ambassador or delegation in Washington City?" The reply was: "To prevent the passage of laws which might prove detrimental to the Catholic church." And so the Catholic church is not in politics? "Tell it not, in Gath."
It makes little difference to the Catholic church which party, Republican or Democratic, is in power, well knowing our national constitution is a shield and breastwork under which all may take refuge.
Such things as national campaigns do not trouble the Pope of Rome; he knows what and who to depend on if trouble to the church should come.
It makes little difference what is one's political affiliation or his religious faith and preference, none of us like to be romped on; but for all that, the "signs of the times" are so plain that he who runs may read them, and very easily too.

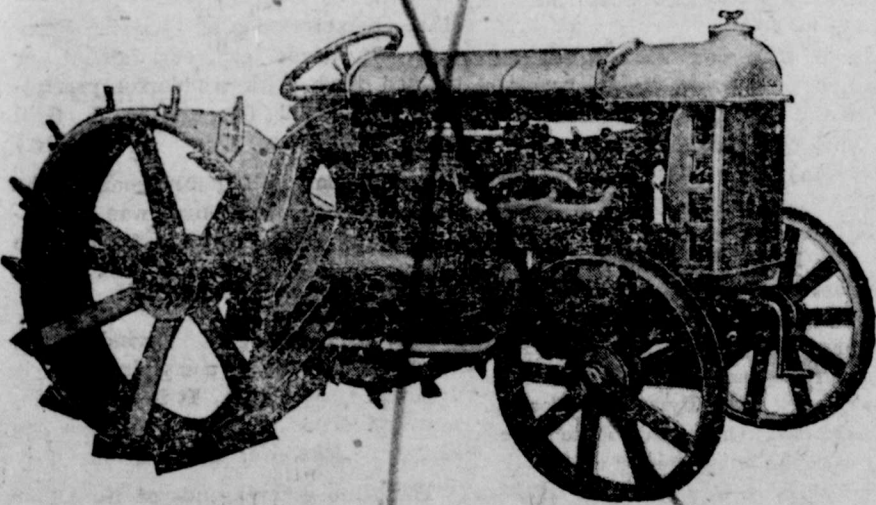

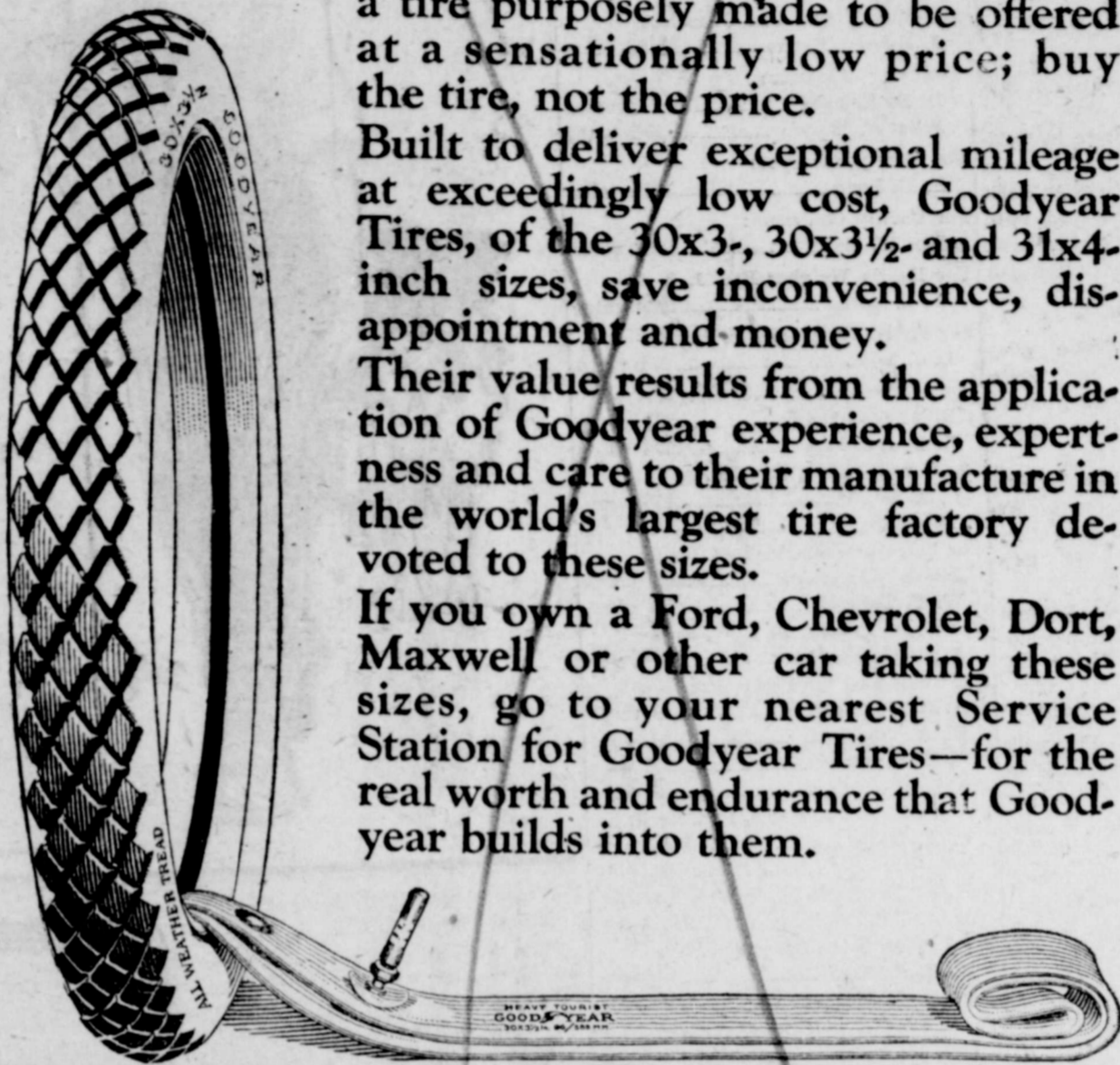
WOMEN SHOULD BRING 45 TO 50 CENTS, SAYS ED R. KONE
