J. M. WEATHERBY MURDERED IN BROWNWOOD TUESDAY NIGHT; ROBBED OF JEWELRY

Norman Weatherby, whom all the people of Mills county know and who was a friend of every man in this section, was foully murdered at a home in Brownwood last night. His body was found this morning about 10 o'clock by one of the employees of his garage.

Mr. Weatherby was lured to a residence in Brownwood by a note handed to him about 6 p. m. Monday afternoon. Mr. Weatherby immediately got in his car and went to the place.

The police of Brownwood think that the motive for luring Mr. Weatherby to the house was to rob him, as he had about \$2,500 worth of diamonds on him, besides other valuables. When his body was found his diamonds and pocketbook were gone; however, his watch had not been taken.

TWO MEN SUSPECTED.

It has been ascertained by the police that two desperadoes from Oklahoma had been in Brownwood at that time and some reports were that they were at this house when Mr. Weatherby arrived. It is thought that these men had written the note, in order to get Mr. Weatherby to the place. These men have disappeared, and it is believed they were headed for their old haunts in Oklahoma. Officers over the county are searching diligently, practically passing every portion of the state through a fine comb. They have a pretty good description of the two men and should find them would have no trouble in recognizing them. The officers have no definite clue that they will let out, but think there will be very little trouble in finding and identifying the guilty party or parties.

EXCITEMENT INTENSE.

Great excitement was created in Brownwood by this dirty murder. Norman Weatherby was well liked in Brownwood as he was here, and the people very emphatically desire to give full justice to the murderers.

BROTHERS AND MOTHER WENT TO BROWNWOOD TODAY

Mr. Weatherby's brothers, all of whom live in town here and in the county, and his mother hurried to Brownwood as quickly as news had been flashed here. Accompanying them were some other of Mr. Weatherby's relatives and many of his friends.

INDICATIONS ARE THAT HE PUT UP A TIGHT FIGHT.

From all indications Mr. Weatherby, when he found that he had been led into a trap, had fought the two men with every ounce of strength in his body. A number of bruises over his face and neck indicate that he fought them tight. Various reports on his body show that he was a man of considerable strength and that he had had some experience in boxing or wrestling. It is believed that he put up a tight fight.

SCHOOL CHILDREN'S PARADE AND SPEAKING ON FRIDAY, OCT. 23 FOR BETTER SCHOOLS

The school children of the Goldthwaite High school will parade in the streets of this city on Friday, Oct. 23, in the interest of the passing of the amendment in November which allows every school district the privilege of voting whatever amount of tax they desire. On the afternoon of the same day there will be a public speaking by one of the state school inspectors in the interest of the amendment.

The campaign for better schools which is now under way rests almost solely on the ability of the friends of the amendment to put the matter properly before the people.

The amendment is for the purpose of allowing the rural schools the same privilege the city schools have; that is, to vote as much tax for the maintenance of their schools as they deem necessary. Heretofore and now there is a limit of 50 cents on the hundred dollars valuation allowed for school purposes. In many instances this limit is sufficient, and many times it is more than is necessary, but there are hundreds of schools in Texas which will require a bigger tax than that to permit their running on a satisfactory basis. And oftentimes the people in that unfortunate district are only too willing to increase the tax were it possible.

The purpose of the amendment is to take the power away from the legislature of Texas to fix the amount of tax an isolated body of people can vote on themselves and put it into their own hands. In other words, passing the amendment will give the people local option in school matters in their own district.

This better school amendment, unlike the majority of the amendments which come before the people of Texas, does not raise the taxation of anybody's property. There is not even an appropriation attached to it to see that it will be enforced if passed. It is ONE law that can hurt no one and will benefit many.

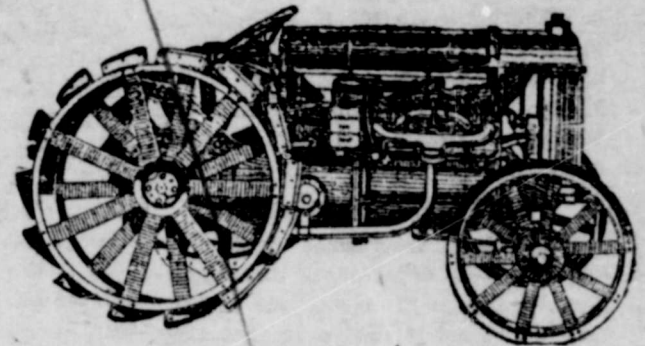

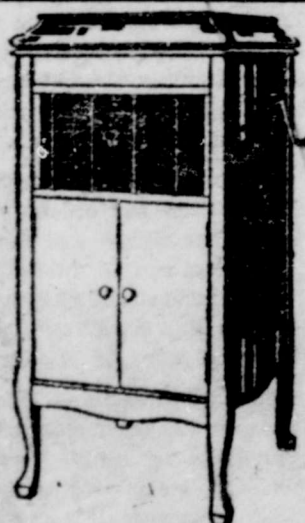

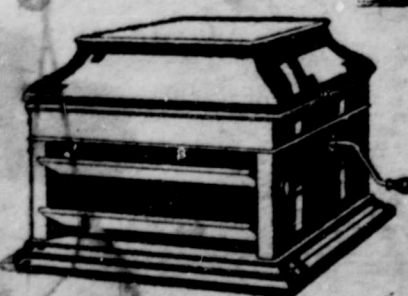

Now as to the ownership of Shantung at the time of the Versailles conference, I will say that Japan was in possession of that territory at that time, and I think rightly so, and her ownership was not disputed by any of the great nations so far as I know, and hence it would have been impossible for Germany to return that country to China at the time alluded to. Germany knew when the war terminated as it did that the ownership of Shantung had passed from her hands, and the treaty between Great Britain and Japan when Japan entered the war was a recognition by Great Britain of Japan's ownership. Therefore, whether the title to Shantung was in Japan in a technical sense at the time referred to or not, it was in fact. To try to make it appear that the occupation of Alsace and Lorraine by the American soldiers during the war is parallel with the occupation of Shantung by Japan after the campaign that transferred that peninsula into the possession of Japan, is certainly wide of the mark, and when Mr. Harrison takes that position I think it may be safely said that "no reading, thinking man" will take him seriously. But he the facts as to the technical ownership of Shantung at the time of the Versailles conference as they may, still, the important question with reference to that matter is as to whether that situation was any real justification for the rejection of the peace treaty.

AGAINST THE AMENDMENTS.

The constitutional amendments to be voted on Nov. 2 authorize or provide for increased taxes or appropriations.

The one relating to school taxes is generally understood as raising the authorized levy from 50 cents to \$1 on the \$100 valuation of property. But it goes much further. In addition thereto, it authorizes the levy of a state school tax of 35 cents on the \$100 valuation and further appropriation from the general funds to meet deficits.

It takes off ALL LIMIT on school taxes that may be voted in independent school districts in cities and towns. It further authorizes the legislature to create all other territory in the state into common or independent school districts and removes ALL LIMIT on taxes that may be voted therein.

Under present law, school districts are created by the commissioners' court on petition of the voters of the territory designated by them. If this amendment passes, and the legislature exercises the authority conferred, the commissioners' court and people, thereafter, can never legally create or designate school districts. It can then only be done by the legislature "by general or special laws, without notice," etc.

It is a Democratic creed that the "power to tax is the power to destroy," and taxes should never be increased nor authorized except when, and in such amounts only, as may be necessary under rigid economy.

Another amendment authorizes the legislature to fix the salaries of all officers, state and county. The design of this amendment is obviously to increase salaries, else it would not have been submitted. It abrogates all constitutional limit on salaries of officers, making the legislature the door to the treasury.

If the voters make a mistake and ratify these amendments, they will never have a chance to repeal them, as no legislature has ever submitted an amendment to decrease taxes or to deprive itself of power. If these amendments are defeated we will have numerous opportunities later to vote taxes and salaries.

This is of peculiar interest to farmers: All others except farmers have many ways of adding increases in salaries, fees or prices and thus pass along to their customers taxes and expenses. Farmers alone cannot add anything to the price of what they sell. I submit in candor that the time has come to vote against further increase in taxes or salaries. J. M. POER.

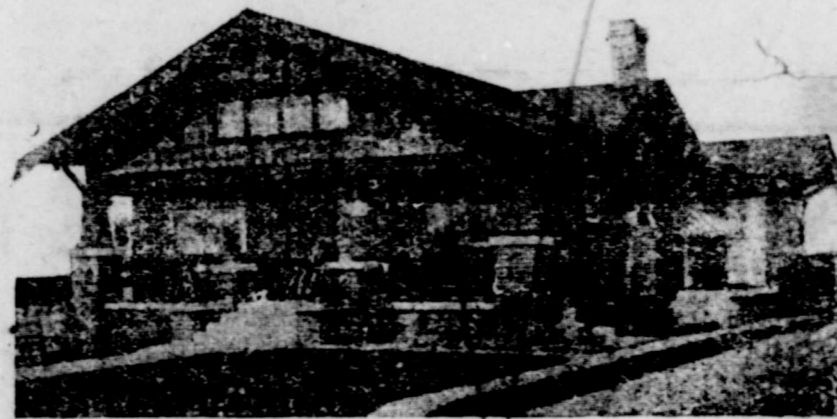

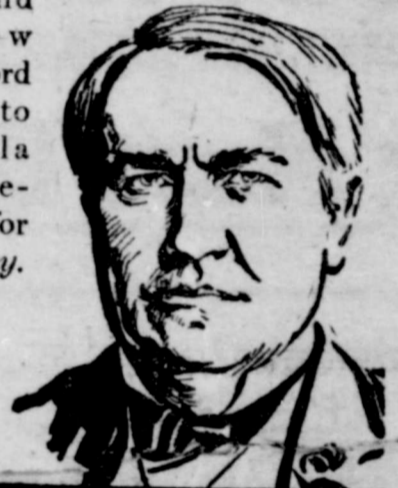

MORAL PUSH

There is being much said and written just now on the matter called League of Nations. That some combine is needed to avoid future wars is evident to the mind of every one.

Even the effort to create such a league is both humane and commendable. It is not claimed that war will be impossible under the influence of the proposed league, but that war would be more improbable than under any international agreement that has yet been suggested. Politics has confused some points in the document, but much force in its favor is added when some of the ablest leaders in the Republican party say they are in favor of adopting the league without reservations. I speak of ex-President Taft's position, and others.

I didn't begin this article with intention to write on the much reputed league, but to say something of the class of people who live under the protection of our government and all enemies to it. I couldn't keep from dipping in a little.

I am trying to believe that most of the destructive fires in various parts of the South said to be by incendiaries are fires from carelessness and accident. It seems almost unthinkable that one could become so demoralized as to destroy needed and laudable industries out of a malignant spirit. Such a class must be comparatively small in number. In a government like ours—a government by the people—there are ways to meet the needs of every class without violence. I want to be written down at all times as one for law and order.

It goes without saying that all men are imperfect and when one does his utmost in making or administering laws there are usually mistakes. People of a democracy can and do mend mistakes, usually as soon as opportunity comes. I have known some corrections in both state and nation without change of officers, and again I have observed correction by first changing officers.

All along we have been needing more teaching on patriotic lines. We have a great country, possessed by a great people, and the strength and happiness of our civilization will grow in proportion to our strength in morals and brotherhood. We have too much left off teaching patriotism in the classroom. We have committed that kind of teaching to the public schools, and they are on an average doing too little of it.

Why should one prefer to bitterly censure a government made by a majority of the people with whom he lives? He is either ignorant or had at heart—maybe both, for in many cases ignorance is the cause of an evil heart.

It is a hard condition for oneself to feel as though all politicians or leaders in political circles would sell out if they haven't already sold out. Really I have never known one to sell. I only heard that some were supposed to do so. I have known many more who I know never did sell; some of them were tried severely.

Those under the burden of great responsibility should have cooperation and sympathy. Co-operation when they go right, and sympathy when they fail. Free speech is a fine American heritage, but it was never intended to aid a man in making himself a dunce of the first degree. There will be a better day when men know not to slander and censure one's own government. Suggest and criticize, of course, but it need be done in a spirit to help and to foster love for one's country.

One other thing would be helpful—the would-be political leader refuse to relate and discuss supposed evils of his opponent in a spirit of acrimony. He who would be meritorious should live on a plane above dirt and eager accusation. None of us ever knew a person so unworthy and hateful but had something in his heart to admire and we never knew one so great and good but had faults which we could air and comment on much, were we so evil as to do so. It all has its part in destroying confidence and creating suspicion.

Public sentiment ruling in patriotism should be sufficiently strong to shame the man who would be an enemy to our government. Light, foolish and ignorant talking is influencing things in the wrong direction. Especially does it have unwelcome influence on the youth. SAM SAY.

MR. WATSON'S ILLUSTRATION OF THE WORKING OF THE LEAGUE OF NATIONS.

As the campaign is drawing to a close, and, of necessity, this controversy must close with it, it seems necessary that we shall run double headers for the remainder of the time in order that we may conclude argument before the vote is taken on Nov. 2. In that connection, I wish to call the attention of our readers to Bro. Watson's illustration of the working of the league.

I quote from his illustration as follows:

"I do not know much of the domestic affairs of Mr. Harrison, but for the sake of illustration we will show that he has a 14-year-old boy who rebels against the family government and Mr. Harrison undertakes to subdue the disobedient and obstreperous youngster and in doing so it becomes necessary for the father to give the son a sound spanking, and when he is preparing for the performance I interfere and say to the boy that I will join him in an attack upon his father and in that way enable him to have his way; but just as I am preparing to join the boy in his resistance a company of six able-bodied men step up to me and taking me by the collar say to me: 'Sir, this is none of your affair; and if you undertake to meddle with the domestic affairs of this man we will thrash you until your wife can't recognize you.'

Now this is the way my friend Watson illustrates the working of his League of Nations, and to my mind his illustration is quite correct and discloses fully the British hand and complicity in the instrument and one of the things it was particularly designed to do for the British government.

To make this plainer let me use Bro. Watson's illustration and instead of using individuals as he did, let me personify two nations, each of which I am sure Bro. Watson will readily recognize.

Bro. Watson, away back in 1776 there was a little maiden known as Miss America who had a mother known as Mother Britain. Miss America had grown quite large and her mother, Mrs. Britain, undertook to impose on her. The object of the mother was to draw from the substance of Miss America by an unusually heavy tax on tea. Miss America decided to quit using tea and one night, rather than to receive a great cargo of tea and pay the tax imposed, Miss America, in the Boston tea party, filled a few chests disguised as Indians who entered the British vessel as she lay in the Boston harbor and dumped the tea overboard. Miss America did not like the home government as you explained about my 14-year old boy above, and became very obstreperous, so Old Mother Britain undertook to give her daughter, Miss America, a sound spanking, using your language above. But a gallant gentleman, Mr. France, stepped up and said to this old overbearing mother, 'You shan't whip Miss America, I will help her. Now, Brother Watson, if your League of Nations had been functioning at that time and the six big husky nations had stepped in and told France to keep her hands off or they would whip her until her neighbors over seas could not recognize her, what would you and I most likely have been now? We would most likely have been subjects of a king instead of free American citizens. Had you ever thought of that?

This was wholly a domestic affair, as the American colonies belonged to Great Britain at that time. France intervened in this domestic affair and by her intervention made possible, as I believe, the foundation and building of the greatest nation on earth and now your league of nations repudiates the wonderful friendship from France and by your illustration of its working you propose to guarantee to Great Britain that no other one of her colonies shall ever have the friend we have in France and if such a friend should appear on behalf of our neighbor Canada who might from oppression at some time, strike for the same independence we enjoy, that your country would immediately appear on the scene with American lives and American treasure and help to whip Canada's friend until her neighbor would not know her.

You say by your illustration that Canada, Australia, New Zealand, India, South Africa, Egypt and many other British colonies shall never have a friend like we had in France if they become oppressed and strike for independence, for America has guaranteed that never a friend shall aid these colonies like France aided us and that if a friend should arise there America would yield up the lives of her young men and the treasure of her country in fighting that friend away so that Great Britain might continue to hold those colonies in her possession. I say shame on such a contingent! The covenant of Versailles, scandalous as it must seem, makes America a perfect tool of Great Britain in the event one of her colonies rebelled and a friendly nation should lend a helping hand to the rebellious colony like France did to us.

Does the Democratic party want our country to again become the servant of Great Britain? Does the Democratic party really mean that it is wrong for an oppressed colony to be a friend in an outside nation? At most certainly does when it guarantees or proposes to guarantee that none of Britain's colonies, no difference how badly oppressed, shall ever again have an outside friend to lend them aid. I must repeat again, shame on any American who will tolerate the idea that an oppressed colony should never again have a friend on the face of this earth. This alone ought to and must forever condemn Section 10 of your league to every thinking, liberty loving man. It points out the fact to every thinking man that section ten is that part of this nefarious concoction called the League of Nations that makes a British tool out of every nation ratifying it.

France's act of friendship to us would today be "outside aggression" as defined in section ten of the covenant, as you very well know and illustrate and you, an American, are advocating, today, that we guarantee against such friendship ever again being extended to an oppressed colony. Your spirit of liberty and righteousness is certainly being offered at a discount.

There was a remarkable wedding celebration in Franklin county Ark. last Sunday when four sisters, aged from 15 to 22 were married to four men at one ceremony.

He was one of the most prominent men in that state and was Republican committeeman for sixteen years and refused election to the United States senate by the first legislature of New Mexico.

An unusual operation was performed in Cincinnati a few days ago when a screw was taken from a boy's throat by aid of a magnet. Three years ago he swallowed a screw an inch long. The screw slid into the windpipe and gradually worked down to a position where it was impossible to reach it. A magnet was placed over the spot where the "X-ray" had shown the screw to be. The magnet forced it upwards and in a short time the screw was extracted.

A special from St. Louis, Mo., says that, with two perfectly formed heads rising from a single neck and normal body, a three-days-old child is engaging the attention of physicians of Josephine hospital. The child is the daughter of Lola Williams, 18 years old, of DeSoto, Mo. Both heads are normally formed. There are two complete sets of eyes and ears, two noses and two mouths. The child is living and taking nourishment. The mother is also doing well. While twins have been born, like the famous Siamese pair, bound together by skin and ligaments, never before, it is claimed, have two bodies been merged into one as completely as in the case of the Williams child.
