Three Called Meetings for Live Stock Betterment in County

A meeting of the Mills County Wool Growers' Association is hereby called to meet at Goldthwaite, Wednesday, January 19, at 2 p. m. W. T. Magee, Sheep Specialist of the A. & M. College, will address the meeting and explain the Farm Bureau plan for marketing wool which has become nation wide. We insist that every wool grower in Mills county attend this meeting.

A meeting of purebred livestock owners is hereby called for Wednesday, January 19, at 2 o'clock p. m., at the court house, for the purpose of organizing a purebred livestock association. This call is made after advising with a number of stockmen who are eligible to membership in the proposed association.

The purpose of the association is to create a local demand for purebred stock and to provide for cooperative advertising and selling to outsiders. W. B. Cook, Beef Cattle Specialist of the A. & M. College, will address the meeting and assist in perfecting the organization.

We cordially invite every owner of pure bred cattle, horses, hogs, sheep, or goats to attend this meeting.

BISHOP W. N. AINSWORTH OF DALLAS TO SPEAK AT THE METHODIST CHURCH HERE

Bishop W. N. Ainsworth of Dallas, bishop of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, will deliver an address at the Methodist church here Sunday night, beginning at 6:45. So far as known, this will be the first time a bishop has ever visited the Goldthwaite church, and every one should hear the address.

Sunday morning after the eleven o'clock services, Bishop Ainsworth will dedicate the new San Saba Methodist church, which has been built entirely out of native granite. It is probable that a large crowd will attend from this city.

A telegram was received from Bishop Ainsworth last Saturday and announced from the pulpit by the pastor, Rev. F. M. Daniel, that Bishop Ainsworth would speak at the church last Sunday night, and a large audience gathered. The crowd, however, was disappointed and it is thought a mistake was made on the telegram.

COMMISSIONERS' COURT.

Commissioners Court met in regular session Monday, January 10, and transacted the following business:

J. A. Doggett was appointed constable for precinct two, the place being vacant.

H. T. White was appointed justice of the peace for precinct three this place also being vacant.

The court worked out the following schedule of wages which the county road supervisor, D. A. Hamilton, was instructed to pay: Engine man, \$4.00 per day. Grader man, \$3.20 per day. Single hand, \$2.50 per day. Man and team, \$5.00 per day.

At a previous meeting the court ordered work to begin on the county roads the first of February.

County Judge L. E. Patterson said that while to his knowledge the court had not yet instructed the road supervisor where to begin work, it is probable that work will begin on the Goldthwaite-Mullin road, at Mullin and work this way.

Eagle to Issue Bulletins Next Week During Hornsby's Trial

The trial of George F. Hornsby, alias G. H. Scott, who was arrested recently and lodged in the Brownwood jail, under indictment for the murder of J. N. Weatherby in Brownwood, is set for next Monday. A special venire of 150 men have been summoned by Judge Woodward, district judge of the Brownwood district, and it is thought that there will not be a great amount of trouble in selecting the jury. Strong counsel has been employed on both the state and defense sides, but the extent of the fight that Hornsby will put up is not known.

In its issue of last week the Eagle mentioned that plans were under advisement for issuing bulletins each day during the trial and requested those wanting them to notify this office. From the response, it is evident that almost every person in the county is intensely interested in this case.

So the Eagle will begin issuing bulletins, probably next Tuesday, or as soon as the jury has been selected and the case comes to trial. In these bulletins will be incorporated the entire details of the trial; the questions, answers and cross questions of each witness in the order they go on the witness stand. Together with this will be given a short description of the impression each witness made on the writer and the side-tints of the case.

Great interest is being manifested in the trial, and many people think there will be a hard fight, as Hornsby, when brought on the stand last week in his examining trial, while stating that he did not have a lawyer to defend him, reserved the right to bring one from Birmingham, Alabama, his home town. Numerous reports have gotten out that Hornsby has rich relatives who will fight the case to the finish. How true these are, however, it is not known. Of course, Hornsby would not give his hand away by stating at the examining trial that he would have counsel from Birmingham, even though he were sure he would. Judge Woodward appointed for him three Brownwood lawyers. It is reported that relatives of the murdered man have retained two noted lawyers to help the prosecution.

The Eagle has decided to issue these bulletins because of the great interest of the Mills county citizens in seeing the murderer, if Hornsby should be the murderer, of one of her leading citizens, given justice. On account of the great crowds that usually attend a trial of this kind, it is thought that it will be almost impossible to get a seat in the court room during the trial. And for that reason, the Eagle has undertaken to give the people the benefit of the whole trial daily as it occurs, without

the inconvenience of attending personally.

The cost of employing a stenographer to take the evidence, and the placing of another man in Brownwood for writing the case, together with the extra labor and paper incidental to printing these bulletins compels the Eagle to charge 10c per copy for them. And it is estimated that this will not cover the cost of publication.

The bulletins, if present plans are carried out, will be of four to eight pages, half the present size of the paper. Copies will be on sale at different places in this city and Mullin, as well as at the Eagle office. However, a limited number will be printed, and to be sure to get one each day it will be advisable to notify this office beforehand. The bulletins will be in such form that when all are issued and bound together, the owner will have a complete review of the trial, which is thought will be one of the most interesting ever held in Texas.

People on rural routes and star routes in the county and at other places in the state who wish bulletins mailed to them each morning of the previous day's trial, who have not notified us, will find below for their convenience a blank form which they should tear out around the heavy black line, fill out the necessary information and mail to us at once. On account of the fact that the number of issues cannot be ascertained, do not send any money with order. A statement will be mailed to each subscriber at the end of the trial.

Persons wishing copies mailed to friends in other parts of the state or out of the state, should notify the Eagle of the number of copies and correct addresses at their earliest convenience. In this way, the bulletins will go to almost any part of Texas on the day printed. No extra charge is made for mailing to any place in the United States.

FIRST ANNUAL CONVENTION OF TEXAS FARM BUREAU FEDERATION JAN. 26

Dallas, Jan. 14.—The first annual convention of the Texas Farm Bureau Federation will be held in Dallas Wednesday and Thursday, January 26 and 27, at which time permanent officers will be elected. The convention had been announced for an earlier date, but has been postponed until the 26th and 27th in order that the delegates may hear Aaron Sapiro who is unable to be in Texas in January except on the given dates.

It is expected that there will be nearly 40,000 farmers in the Texas Farm Bureau Federation at the time of the annual meeting. These members are in the first twenty-five counties canvassed by the organization. When the organization started it was hoped to have one hundred thousand members in Texas by 1922. Officials are of the opinion, however, that the one hundred thousand mark may be reached by mid-summer. The organization has a million and a half members now in the United States and is functioning in forty-five states.

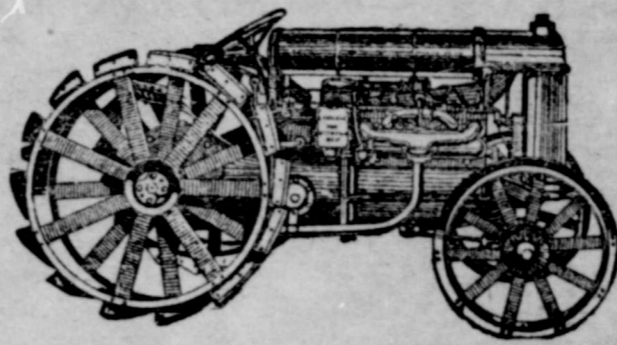

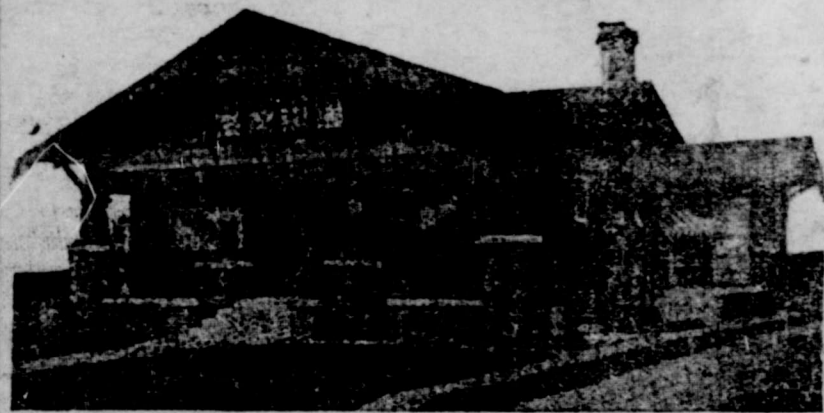

Since his appointment Mr. Weaver has worked incessantly for the betterment of the county. For doing this Mr. Weaver has hit on the best plan—the organizing of associations of live stock raisers. Elsewhere in this paper will be found calls for the Sheep and Wool Growers' Association, a meeting for the purpose of organizing a pure bred stock raisers association and one to organize a poultry growers association. Too much stress can not be put on the advantages to the growers on associations of this kind. Mills county has always needed them and now is sadly handicapped for the lack of them. Let us urge that every farmer and stock raiser in the county come out. You may not be interested in it, but you should be, and the more you know of the good done by these organizations the more enthusiastic you will become. Watch the dates of the meetings carefully, and don't be too busy to be there. We must have purebred stuff in order to compete with foreign markets and the easiest and only practical way is to get it through associations.

CHAMBER OF COMMERCE.

We noticed in the Mullin Enterprise in its last issue that the good citizens of Mullin had, with great enthusiasm, established a commercial organization of about fifty members, including both men and women, for the purpose of promoting the general welfare of the city. This is a very necessary step forward for any town and one of which the citizens of Mullin should be proud. Many years ago Goldthwaite had a commercial club, but during the years of drought it died. Several vain efforts have been made to revive it or organize another. Mullin sees the necessity of such a body. All towns which wish to advance start right by organizing a commercial body, composed of the leading citizens. In union there is strength; eliminating a few chronic grouches who receive secret satisfaction from every misfortune to any individual or body of citizens, the business men of Goldthwaite really want a Chamber of Commerce. AND Goldthwaite should have a Chamber of Commerce.

WORLD'S NEWS IN BRIEF.

U. S. Navy Officer.—The United States will make formal protest to Japan concerning the shooting of Lieut. W. H. Langdon of the U. S. Navy, by a Japanese sentry at Vladivostok, the State Department at Washington has announced. The sentry who fired the shot is being court-martialed, according to dispatches from Tokio.

Steal Safes.—For the third time within six weeks, thieves have stolen an office safe in Tulsa, Okla. Thursday morning they made off with a 1,000-pound iron strongbox containing \$2,500 in checks, belonging to a dairy company.

Postmasters.—A dispatch from Washington says more than 15,000 nominations by President Wilson are being held up by the Senate. Few of these, if any, are likely to be confirmed. The list includes 85 postmasters in Texas, among which are John R. Clark, Mullin; P. E. Leatherwood, Lampasas.

Navy.—Secretary of the Navy Daniels appeared Monday before the House Committee on Naval Affairs, and in a frank discussion of the armament question declared that the United States must either join at once a worldwide agreement to reduce armament, or else embark on a great new building program which will make the American navy the greatest in the world.

Population.—For the first time in history, more than half of the continental United States is living in cities and towns, according to the census.

Legislature.—The Texas Legislature met at noon Tuesday and a flood of bills were presented. The splendid condition of the Texas treasury on Sept. 1, 1920, was shown by the report of the comptroller. The state revenue account has a balance in the treasury of \$8,840,758.79.

Livestock.—The American National Livestock Association met in annual convention at El Paso Wednesday and problems were brought up to be solved on the questions of better market prices, how to restock thousands of acres of land and how to obtain credit to finance the cattle industry.

Curfew Law.—The curfew law will be inaugurated in Dallas immediately, says a dispatch, if the crime wave continues and citizens keep objecting to be stopped by police at night.

ful refusal to make a return
the penalty is a fine of not more than
\$10,000 or not exceeding one
year's imprisonment or both to-
gether with the costs of prosecu-
tion. A similar penalty is provid-
ed for making a false or fraudu-
lent return, together with an addi-
tional assessment of 50 per cent of
the amount of tax evaded.

The income tax applies to wo-
men as well as men. Husband and
wife must consider the income of
both plus that of minor dependent
children, and if the total equals or
exceeds \$2,000 a return must be
filed. A minor who has a net in-
come in his own right of \$1,000 or
more must file a separate return.
To be allowed the \$2,000 exemp-
tion a married person must be liv-
ing with husband or wife on the
last day of the taxable year, De-
cember 31st, 1920. Divorcees, per-
sons separated by natural agree-
ment, widows and widowers, un-
less they are sole support of oth-
ers living in the same household,
in which case they are allowed the
\$2,000 exemption granted the
head of a family, are entitled only
to \$1,000 exemption.

The normal tax rate for 1920 is
the same as for 1919—4 per cent
on the first \$4,000 of net income
above the exemption and 8 per cent
on the remaining net income. This
applies to every citizen and resi-
dent of the United States. In ad-
dition to the normal tax a surtax
is imposed upon net income in
excess of \$5,000.

Full instructions for making out
returns are contained on the
forms, copies of which may be ob-
tained from collectors of internal
revenue. Persons whose net in-
come for 1920 was \$5,000 or less
should use Form 1040A. Those
with incomes in excess of \$5,000
should use Form 1040.

Revenue officers will visit ev-
ery county in the United States to
assist taxpayers in making out
their returns. The date of their
arrival and the location of their
offices will be announced by this
newspaper.
