## KARNES MURDER-BOBBED IN OKLA. WEDNESDAY NIGHT

Reading a newspaper article in the daily paper Thursday in which it was stated that a man had been found in the condition in the railroad yard in Grandfield, Okla., last night, A. D. Karnes of Goldthwaite, Okla., telephoned the sheriff at Goldthwaite for a description and was informed by the newspaper that the man was the son of Orville Karnes and learned that the man was Karnes instead of the man who was in a dying condition. Mr. Karnes left immediately for Grandfield, accompanied by Aaron Karnes, W. A. Smith and George Smith. A distance telephone call was made at Goldthwaite Friday morning and the information was received that Karnes had died the evening before. Funeral arrangements had not been completed at the time the Eagle went to press.

A. D. Karnes, son of Mr. and Mrs. A. D. Karnes of this city, was 21 years old and was born in this county, where he had many friends who liked his cheerful disposition. He was called to his country's call during the late war and spent several months in its service. He was the county's most popular young men, and sadness was felt by one when they learned of his brutal death.

Funeral services were received by relatives and friends Friday night stated that the body will arrive in Goldthwaite tonight, Saturday. Arrangements had not been completed early this morning.

Following is the newspaper article from Grandfield, Okla., Aug. 3.—A man was found in a dying condition in the railroad yards in Grandfield. His skull had been crushed by a blunt instrument. The hands of a hi-jacker, who had been relieved of all his money, were found on the man.

Who is an engineer, is believed to have gone to the railroad in an effort to beat his way out. He lived somewhere in the vicinity of Gainesville or Grandfield, Texas.

Between 30 and 35, five feet seven inches, weighs 140, dark hair and eyes, and several attendants say the man will not survive the night.

San Saba, Texas, Aug. 1.—Clifford B. Jones, president of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, has accepted a special invitation to speak here on August 18, the day designated as West Texas Chamber of Commerce day at the San Saba County Fair. The directors of the Fair have also extended invitations to Hon. Geo. B. Terrell, state commissioner of agriculture; Hon. Earl B. Mayfield, chairman of the railway commission of Texas; Hon. Cullen F. Thomas and other prominent men of Texas, with the idea of making West Texas Chamber of Commerce day at the San Saba fair an occasion long to be remembered.

An extensive addition is being made to the already large free camping grounds in a huge grove of pecan trees on the bank of the San Saba river, and all invited guests are urged to drive here in their cars and camp out during the four days of the fair, which will be held August 16 to 19.

## J. B. ERNEST KILLED.

J. B. Ernest, son-in-law of E. S. Lloyd, who up until May of 1920 was an employe of the Rural Telephone Company at this place, was killed last Sunday night in Houston, while in line of duty as car repairer for the Southern Pacific lines. Two cars telescoped and killed him and another man working with him.

His remains were brought to Lometa, where he was raised and where Mr. Lloyd is manager for the Rural Telephone Company, and were buried in the Lometa cemetery Tuesday of this week.

## S. H. ROUSE BEING HELD IN GOLDTHWAITE JAIL, MR. GARTMAN RECOVERS CAR

S. H. Rouse, against whom a complaint was sworn out in the court house here last Friday which charged him with the theft of the Ford car belonging to Lewis Gartman of this city, was brought to Goldthwaite from San Angelo Tuesday of this week by Sheriff J. Everett Evans and F. P. Bowman, secretary of the Mills County Automobile Protective Association. Rouse had been held in the San Angelo jail charged with stealing a car belonging to a man at Breckenridge. This car has been identified and turned over to the owner. Rouse succeeded in making bond for the San Angelo case.

An examining trial was given Rouse Wednesday afternoon before Justice of the Peace A. D. Karnes and his bond was placed at \$2,500 to await the action of the grand jury. He had not succeeded in making bond here up to Friday night and is being held in the local jail.

Lewis Gartman, accompanied by Grover Dalton, who was on the lookout for the car stolen from him, went to Llano the first of this week and brought back Mr. Gartman's car, which has been turned over to him by the court.

Drew Garrett, also charged with being implicated in the theft of the Breckenridge car, was released under bond at San Angelo.

A total of eight bogus registration receipts have been gotten from the sheriff's office here. After an investigation it has been ascertained that the cars had not been bought by the parties and from the firms represented. Some of them are as follows: C. D. Another of the bogus registrations, 555593, has been found on a stolen car, making three of the numbers which have been registered here which have been located on stolen cars by the officers, who are diligently working in an effort to clear up the entire matter.

## YOUNG SON OF MR. AND MRS. CICERO WARREN SERIOUSLY HURT WED.

Lee Roy Warren, 17-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Cicero Warren of the Nabors Creek community, was seriously injured in that community Wednesday night about eleven or twelve o'clock while returning from a party to his home on a horse. It is not definitely known how the accident happened but it is thought the horse fell over a wire fence with him. The young man has not spoken since the accident. His brother, returning from the party later, found him and carried him home. The horse was not found until Thursday.

The young man was carried to a Temple sanitarium Thursday night, and although he stood the trip well, he is in a very serious condition.

**COMMUNITY ACTIVITY.**

Some impressions stand out like  
mountain peaks in the memory of  
returned tourists from "the land  
of the golden west," namely Cali-  
fornia. They have a wonderful  
land, a superb climate, with mag-  
nificent scenery. These adjectives  
I have culled from their own  
vocabulary, but there is one virtue  
they possess which commands the  
respect of all the large army  
of tourists who visit the state—  
they are paramount boosters.

Some few years ago it was my  
happy lot to sojourn for some lit-  
tle time in a small town about  
twenty odd miles from the city of  
Los Angeles. It was situated in  
the San Gabriel valley, and was  
in the renowned "orange belt" of  
Southern California. It and sur-  
rounding towns of the district  
were too small to obtain the char-  
ter from Rotary (you must have a  
town of at least five thousand to  
do so), but they were all linked  
up for "co-operative boosting" in  
an organization called the Asso-  
ciated Chambers of Commerce of  
the San Gabriel Valley and their  
avowed purpose and slogan was to  
boost the valley.

There were twenty-two towns in  
the Association and we had a  
monthly dinner in a certain town,  
chosen in alphabetical rotation,  
that was supplied at the hotel, or  
if the town was too small to boast  
of a hotel, by the good ladies of  
the community for the financial  
benefit of the churches in their  
town.

After the bountiful repast, the  
chairman called upon the secre-  
taries to report on the month's ac-  
tivities of each town. My! What  
a stream of optimistic boasting,  
not boasting oratory, flowed from  
the lips of those twenty-two men.  
It was a constant reiteration of  
the slogan in the old song,  
"something attempted, something  
done," followed by the acclama-  
tion from the members of the  
neighboring towns.

Then followed a talk by some  
experts in some phase of civic en-  
deavor such as "town planning,  
good roads, the city beautiful,  
etc.

The whole meeting generated  
such a delightful spirit of good  
fellowship that they would have  
been voted "worth while" for  
that reason alone, but above that  
were the many valuable hints and  
helps that each delegate received  
that strengthened him in the re-  
solve to help make his town more  
worthy "an annex of heaven."

The idea is given for what it is  
worth. There are not many de-  
tails printed, but these could be  
furnished and worked into the  
scheme. The main question is "is  
it possible for Goldthwaite?"

Guess I'll be home next summer  
for good. Am getting all the ex-  
perience I can. Am flying planes  
on my own hook now. Have taken  
two lessons and can handle the  
big boats all o. k. after they are  
in the air. Have not been allowed  
to take off or land them yet,  
but feel that it is not such a  
tremendous task. Have not made  
any solo flights and don't expect  
to, as this is not a training school,  
but have been promised full con-  
trol from start to finish in the  
next lesson. Am making long  
distance flights with cameras  
now. Last one was two days,  
one day down the coast and then  
return the next day. Fine hop.  
Hard on ears, however. Expect  
to take a hop to Peru soon. Have  
a plane assigned to photography  
now but we can not make more  
than four thousand feet altitude  
on account of the dense atmos-  
phere and low lying clouds so are  
getting a special camera made for  
low altitude work. Hope it works  
all right, for it is cold at eight  
thousand feet here and very hot  
at sea level, which means incon-  
veniences and the clouds nearly  
always make it impossible to do  
any mapping above four thousand  
feet anyway.

Have a motion picture camera  
of my own now and am making  
news stuff for Kinograms and  
Pathe News. If you see any pic-  
tures of fourth of July celebra-

tions on the Zone you can rest as-  
sured they are mine for I was the  
only movie on the Zone at the  
time. Expect to get two hun-  
dred dollars, or more, for that  
day's work. Not so bad, eh?  
Dollar a foot and the film runs  
through the camera at the rate of  
sixty feet a minute.  
We are equipping the labora-  
tory for complete finishing of mo-  
tion picture negatives, mapping,  
etc., so this lab will be one of the  
best in the service. Getting a  
brand new \$2100 motion picture  
camera for the lab so I guess I'll  
have plenty to do.  
Well, doctor, guess that is about

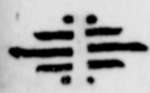

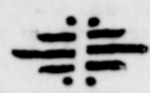

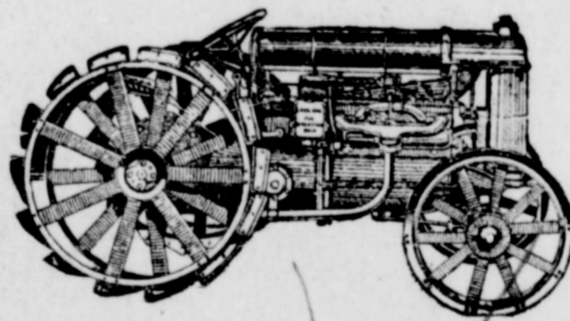

## FINANCING THE FARM BUREAU COTTON ASSOCIATION.

(By County Agent Weaver.)

The financing of the Farm Bureau Cotton Association seemed to many thoughtful men to be the most difficult problem. However, it proved to be the least difficult of all its many great problems. A few days ago, Mr. Sapiro went east, on what seemed to many the impossible errand—of securing \$15,000,000 to finance the Texas Cotton Growers' Association. He found the task surprisingly easy. The War Finance Corporation at Washington furnished ten million dollars at seven per cent, a group of New York banks \$2,500,000 on bankers' acceptances, and a New York bank \$2,500,000 at New York rates.

It is extremely gratifying to Farm Bureau members that this is the first instance of a department of government financing farmers.

There will be difficult problems to solve all along the line, but the farmers are determined to face them and will find a satisfactory solution for them all.

The Farm Bureau has proved its efficiency in co-operative marketing of alfalfa in West Texas, hay in south Texas, tomatoes in east Texas, and watermelons in east and south parts of the state.

The alfalfa association raised the price of its commodity from \$8.50 to \$14 per ton. The Haymakers Association is selling for \$8.50 per ton instead of \$4.00. The Watermelon Association averages \$350 per car against an average of \$96 last year. The Tomato Growers are getting fifty per cent more than ever before.

The above figures should greatly encourage the cotton growers. The Farm Bureau is living very near to its motto: "Organized for Business."

Yet, in spite of the above facts, some men question the right of the farmers to organize for business. In the management of the above associations, he has shown himself wonderfully efficient in handling his own business. This fact seems to disturb those who for generations have elected themselves to manage the farmers' business without bond or liability of any kind whatsoever.

## HORNSBY MURDER CASE HEARING HAS BEEN SET FOR NOV. 2 BY THE COURT

Private advices received here this week by John H. Burnett stated the Supreme Court has ordered the hearing on the Hornsby murder case to be held at Austin next Wednesday, November 2. Attorneys for Hornsby and for the state will be present at the hearing. A decision by the court is expected within a few days after the hearing.

Hornsby was tried at Belton in March this year for the murder of J. N. Weatherby at Brownwood in October, 1920, and was given the death penalty on the first ballot. The case was appealed to the supreme court.

If the supreme court sustains the action of the jury, the date of hanging will be set. According to law, the hanging must take place within one hundred yards of the Belton jail.

Mr. Burnett, who immediately after the murder uncovered evidence leading to Hornsby's arrest and who had no small part in the arrest, stated Hornsby was still in the Belton jail, confined to a cell. It is reported he is doing all kinds of gymnastic stunts on the bars of his cell, keeping himself in trim.

## 'A SINNER SAVED BY GRACE'

As the shades of night were quietly gathering about the patient sufferer's bed, consciously, the fevered lids closed in the earthly bed chamber to open at early morn in that home not made with hands.

Knowing that his hours were numbered, Charlie Rudd talked freely with those who were nearest and dearest to him by earthly ties of his home-going and assured them that all was well. Not once did a murmur fall from his lips; but when asked how he felt, the reply came that he was suffering some but perhaps that pain would pass away soon. To those who were permitted to be with him even to the last, the closing experiences of his life are a solace and comfort to their torn hearts.

When Charlie Rudd was a wee "small boy his mother taught him the child-prayer that he in time taught to his own boys:

"Now I lay me down to sleep;  
I pray the Lord my soul to keep;  
If I should die before I wake,  
I pray the Lord my soul to take."

As he grew older and the temptations of life became more alluring, the memory of those childhood scenes and the Christian principles stored away in his heart and life ever beckoned him to the straight and narrow path. When he was just a youth in his early teens, the pungent conviction of his sinful condition got hold upon him and he realized that he was one among the chief of sinners and that Christ came to save the chief of sinners; so casting himself and his sins upon the Savior, he anchored his hope in

the abiding love that solaced him in the last, dark hour.

This experience of grace was his constant anchor on the battle-fields in the struggle of right against wrong.

Later in life, he walked with his Master down to a watery grave of baptism and felt the joys of Heaven rest upon him in blessings when he had followed out the symbol the Master commissioned to be carried out when He went to the Father.

To those who knew Charlie Rudd most intimately, his Christian life was resplendent. He was not a person who took an active part in public worship, but to any one in need of succor he offered unobstructive help; and his motto through life was the Apostle James' definition of pure religion:

"Pure religion and undefiled, before our God and Father is this, to visit the fatherless and widows in their affliction, and to keep oneself unspotted from the world."

**PLAN COMMUNITY MEETING TO DISCUSS DAIRYING**

What is the biggest problem confronting the southern farmer today? It is the production of some product on the farm which will not deplete the soil and will be readily marketable at all times of the year. There is only one answer. It is not cotton. It is not rice. It is the dairy cow. "The Foster Mother of the World."

Texas is the most wonderfully endowed, in natural resources, of any of the states of the Union. Her people have not appreciated the value of the dairy cow on the farm to the same extent that some of the farmers in the neighboring states have, however.

To illustrate: Texas, with all her wonderful natural advantages expressed by some as thirty-five per cent greater than those of any other state, fell short of the record made by every other southern state except North Carolina. Texas increased her dairy herds only five per cent, while in Louisiana the increase was 41 per cent, in Mississippi it was 32, in Alabama 31, and in Arizona and New Mexico it was 30 per cent.

Texas leads the entire country in the number of farms and crop

acreage, but stands fifth in number of dairy cattle and thirty-ninth in number of these dairy cattle on the farm. These conditions surely show great opportunity for improvement. It is a subject of great importance to every farmer, every merchant, every banker and every citizen. It is for the purpose of discussing this great subject that a big community meeting will be held at Goldthwaite, on Nov. 10 at 8 p. m.

At this meeting H. A. Clapp, a well known dairy man and very interesting speaker who has talked to the farmers in over a hundred Texas counties, will lead the discussion and introduce to the audience many new and practical ideas. He will tell how Texas farmers can become permanently prosperous; how their lands can increase in production of farm crops; how present herds can be built up in productive ability with very little cost. He will tell why contented cows make prosperous people.

The meeting is free. Every man, woman and child is invited to attend. Town people will find these lectures full of interest and as beneficial as to those who live on the farm.
