**MILLS COUNTY CHAMBER OF COMMERCE ORGANIZED HERE MONDAY NIGHT**

Last Monday night there was a meeting of 32 of the business and professional men of the city at the court house. This meeting was a culmination of the efforts and meetings heretofore to organize a Chamber of Commerce or like body operating for the interests of Mills county cooperatively.

The meeting was called to order by Temporary Chairman L. E. Miller with J. A. Gillespie acting as secretary. The reports of the committees selected at a previous meeting were read by the secretary. The committee on regulations and by-laws and method of organization reported that they had received data from several bodies throughout the state and found that the form used by the San Saba Chamber of Commerce, with slight changes where necessary fit the Goldthwaite's needs better than others. A synopsis of their constitution was read and adopted. Resolutions were present, thus bringing into being the first commercial organization in the county.

The following are the officers elected: President—Mrs. R. E. Clements; Secretary—Mrs. R. E. Clements; Treasurer—Mrs. R. E. Clements. Standing committees are formed for the different branches of the service, each committee headed by a director and composed of members of the organization. Fees for business men, \$1 initial and \$1 per month, payable six months in advance. Fee for farmers and stockmen, 50c initial and 50c per month, payable six months in advance.

A call for members resulted in practically every man present signing up for six months.

Plans were made for a Trades Day here the first Monday in each month, beginning with Monday, May 7. Prizes of considerable magnitude will be given at these trades days, both on drawings and feats of skill, such as races, boxing and wrestling among the boys and displays of canning, poultry, etc., among the girls.

Mr. Whittaker, connected with the farm display service of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce was present at the meeting and made the audience an appreciated talk, giving timely advice and showing what other Chambers of Commerce are doing.

The meeting was adjourned after a decision was made to meet again next Monday night at 7:30 in the ladies' club room at the court house. And it is thought that potential members who were absent from the last meeting will be able to be there at that time.

After the adjournment of the meeting there was a meeting of the directors of the organization and committees were formed, officers elected, and other necessary business transacted.

**WORLD'S NEWS IN BRIEF.**

**Whiskey Found.**—The Cuban steamship Monte Tenotte, towed into the port of Key West Sunday against the will of her captain, was searched and, according to Federal authorities, 2,100 cases of whisky were found in her hold.

**Egg Eater.**—Warren G. Noggle of Wheatland, Cal., while on a visit to Moscow, Idaho, the first of this week, consumed for breakfast 31 soft boiled eggs in addition to a bowl of breakfast food, one-half a grape fruit, one orange and a piece of toast. The champion egg eater beat the previous record of 30 eggs made last year.

**Argue Over Road.**—An argument over the right of way when two men met in cars resulted in the death of Jan Windham and the detention of Rodney Gellatley with a bullet wound in his leg, at San Augustine Sunday.

**Another Term.**—Attorney General Daugherty has predicted that President Harding will be nominated next year for a second term.

**Falls in Asphalt Mixer.**—Falling in a bug asphalt mixer unobserved, Rafael Juarez, Mexican laborer, was crushed to death Monday morning in Fort Worth. It is not known how long his body was in the mixer, it being found, terribly crushed and torn, when the machine ran out of material and was stopped. He was a new man and was feeding the machine.

**Get \$10,000.**—Approximately \$10,000 in cash was obtained by four bandits in Kansas City Monday who held up the cashier of the Missouri Dairy Co. after shooting and seriously wounding a motorcycle patrolman.

**Fire.**—A lighted cigar believed to have been carelessly tossed by an intoxicated man, started a fire in New York the first of the week, which destroyed a seven-story building and resulted in the death of four persons.

**Good Rains.**—Rainfall of from one-half inch at San Angelo to two and one-half inches at Sterling City soaked West Texas Tuesday. Rain fell south to the Rio Grande.

**Outlaws.**—A gang of five outlaws, believed to have been led by the famous Al Spencer, after fighting off for nearly 24 hours the stubborn advance of a posse which pursued, slipped thru the armed officers and citizens late Tuesday afternoon near Tulsa, Okla., and escaped. One of the bandits was killed and another captured in a fight the day before.

**Peace Note.**—News dispatches from London this week state it is expected the allies will dispatch a note to the Turkish government, stating that the Turkish peace proposal admit of discussion and that the allies are prepared to resume negotiations. The middle of April is expected to be suggested as the date for the meet and Lausanne the place.

DEPARTMENT WARNS COT-  
TON PLANTERS AGAINST  
FAKE WEEVIL 'REMEDIES'

The present great interest in the boll weevil problem in the Southeastern States has resulted in a large number of patented preparations and machines which are being vigorously exploited, says the United States Department of Agriculture. This is a repetition of what has occurred in every region invaded by the boll weevil. During the first few years the farmers exploited and many useless or practically useless devices are sold to them. In a few years however, history shows that such organizations go out of business. Their operations are especially important at the present time since the losses caused by the boll weevil will be increased by the expense of buying nostrums of various kinds.

The claims for the preparations are not based on scientific tests although in many cases persons exploiting them are undoubtedly sincere in their belief that they will yield good results. Generally speaking they are based on misinterpretations of what occurs in the field. To determine whether a remedy is effective, it is necessary to have control areas and to consider the effects of numerous culture practices. It is very easy for an untrained observer to attribute the same preparation he has applied, the beneficial results of some variation in the climatic or cultural factors.

The department of Agriculture and many of the State experiment stations have tested the new boll weevil remedies which have been proposed from year to year; many of these now being offered the public are not essentially different from the kind that have been tested and been discarded.

The Association of Southern Agricultural Workers at its recent convention at Memphis considered the whole problem of boll weevil control, and in addition to certain cultural methods, it recommended the consideration of three remedies.

This convention heartily endorsed the use of dusting methods in areas where the yield of cotton was high enough to warrant the expense. It also endorsed the Florida method for region in which it has been proven to be applicable and further recommended extensive tests of this method in other regions of light yield.

In another paragraph it called attention to the fact that the molasses arsenate treatment, although not yet subjected to sufficiently detailed experimental tests to warrant its endorsement, had apparently given results over wide area that warranted further consideration, and it therefore recommended thorough and immediate tests of this method by State and Federal agencies.

The State and Government institutions are anxious to help farmers thru the agency of any new method of controlling the boll weevil which may be discovered. As promptly as possible careful tests are conducted. The department strongly recommends that farmers exercise due caution in spending money for new boll weevil remedies. In all cases farmers should demand evidence of official tests and communicate with the experiment stations for detailed information regarding any of the new remedies. If anything of value is discovered by the State experiment stations or by the Federal Department, prompt and wide spread notice of the fact will be given to the public. In the meantime it is safe to say that in all probability any money spent for patented mixtures or machines will be wasted.

### DRILLING IN FISHER WELL WATCHED WITH INTEREST

Progress on the Fisher wildcat oil test being drilled about eleven miles north of this city, is being watched with interest by oil men. The latter part of this week the bit was around 2300 feet, drilling in grey lime. It is reported that considerable gas has been discovered necessitating the moving back of the boiler. The following appeared in one of the daily papers this week:

Ranger, March 28.—Ranger oil operators are turning towards wildcat territory 22 miles south of Comanche. Reports of drillers reaching black lime on the Fisher ranch on the Mullin road is sending several automobile loads of ranger oil men to that vicinity daily. The well was at 2,685 feet when the black lime was struck.

It is known that at least one Ranger oil operator has secured a 40-acre lease on land near this well this week, with a drilling contract.

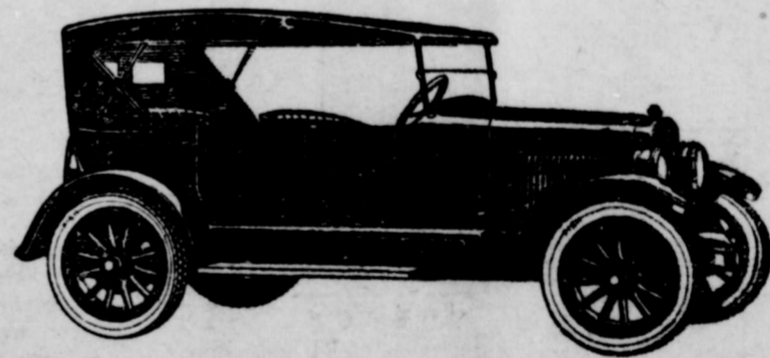

**116,000 FORDS FOR FEBRUARY; SHORTEST MONTH MAKES SALES RECORD**

Detroit, Mich., March 23—With 116,080 Fords sold at retail in February, a new record for the shortest month in the year has been established. February sales exceed those of January by more than 15,000 and marked the eleventh month in which Ford sales have topped the 100,000 line.

This sale record bares out predictions made at the opening of the year that an acute shortage in Ford cars is certain and this shortage is expected to be felt within the two months with the increased volume of car buying which is always attendant upon the spring months.

Even the high production schedule set at the Ford Motor Company's factory here, which will reach 6,000 cars and trucks a day about Apr. 1, will be unable to meet the apparent demand for Ford products.

Anticipating a great increase in the demand for Ford cars during the present year, the factory here laid plans for increasing production to the 6,000 cars a day schedule and since January first had been constantly speeding up manufacture to reach this figure. Demand so far has been of such great proportions as to absorb nearly all production, and stock in hands of dealers are at present the lowest they have been in months.

February sales of 116,080 cars were made in the face of unfavorable weather conditions in many sections of the country which tied up freight traffic and prevented many deliveries. This was particularly true through the Northwest, the northern tier of states and in New England. In California, too, cold weather during a part of the month had its effect upon car sales.

Yet with these unfavorable conditions, the February sales topped those of January by 15 per cent, and set a new high record for mid-winter selling.

With February the eleventh month in which Ford cars sales have gone over the 100,000, the total for this period is close to 1,256,000 cars.

Peak car sales usually are reached during the summer months which drops in the fall and winter. This feature of automobile absorption by the buying public has been completely changed during the last few months through the activities of the Ford dealer organization which has raised the "peak" line to include every month of the year.

# School Notes

## New Rules Governing Admission to University of Texas.

Superintendent W. E. Cantrell has received the following letter from E. J. Mathews, Registrar, of the University of Texas:

Requirements. Since the last catalogue was published the General Faculty and the Board of Regents have passed some legislations affecting the requirements for admission to the University, as follows: (1) Music, one unit, has been added to the list of subjects that may be offered for admission to the University. This means theoretical, not applied, music. (2) At present, and in 1923-24, students may be admitted with a condition (in elective units or in foreign language) of two units. In 1924-25, a quantity condition of only one unit will be allowed for admission to the Main University at Austin, and in 1925-26 and thereafter no quantity condition will be allowed. We shall continue, though, to admit students with a subject condition of two units in foreign language. That is to say, in 1924-25 a student must have at least fourteen units and in 1925-26 and thereafter full fifteen units must be presented for admission to the Main University. But students who have the required total and all the other prescribed units (three in English, two in history, two in algebra, and one in plane geometry) may be admitted with a condition in foreign language.

It is believed by giving generous notice in advance and by making this increase gradual no hurtful results will follow and that the University of Texas will put itself into line with the best state universities of the country.

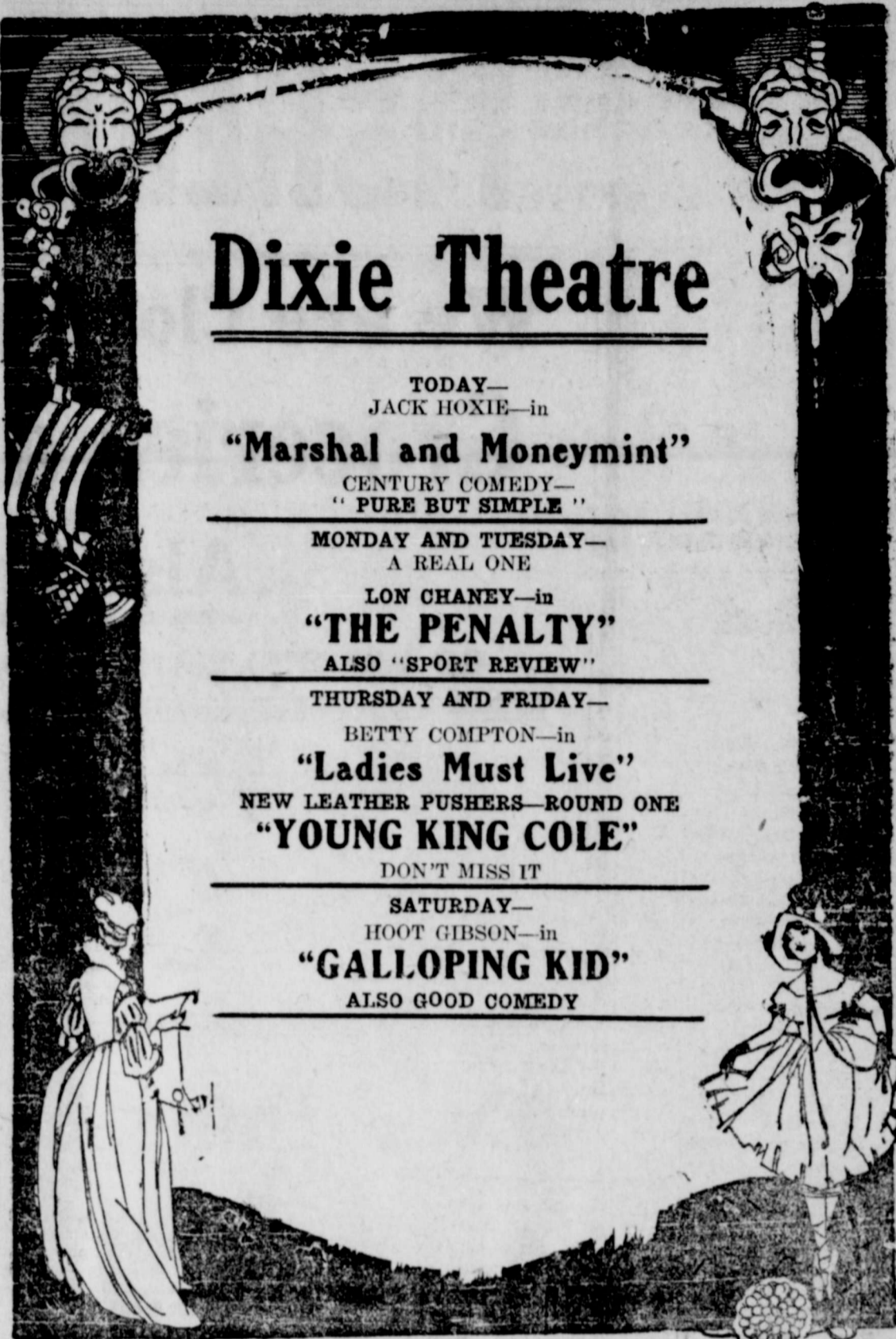
